COURT OF MINES. RULE OF PRACTICE.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relating to the Gold Fields*, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the several persons who for the time being shall be the Attorney General, Solicitor General, and Judges of the Courts of Mines, or any four of them, of whom the said Attorney or Solicitor shall be one, from time to time to frame such General Rules as to them shall seem expedient for and concerning the practice and proceedings of the courts holden under the said Act, either in their original or appellate jurisdiction, and for other purposes: Now therefore we do frame the following General Rules, that is to say:—In every suit, appeal, matter or proceeding before the Court of Mines, or any judge thereof, after the plaintiff, appellant, respondent, or applicant, his attorney or counsel, shall have stated his case or made his application, and before he shall have called any witness, the judge may, if he

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shall think proper, call upon the defendant, appellant, respondent, or person called upon to answer, his attorney or counsel, to state the nature of his defence or answer; and neither party shall be permitted to depart from such opening statement, defence, or answer, without leave of the judge; and in no case shall such permission be given so as to enable any person to rely upon a purely technical defence or answer after he has stated a defence or answer upon the merits.

WATER SUPPLY TO CASTLEMAINE AND SANDHURST.

THE Board of Land and Works being desirous of ascertaining the practicability of obtaining a supply of water from the Coliban River for the supply of the towns of Castlemaine and Sandhurst for domestic uses and mining operations, are prepared to receive from engineers, surveyors, and others, preliminary designs and plans for effecting that object, for the two most eligible of which a premium of £250 and £150 respectively will be awarded.

The plan (on a scale of not less than two miles to one inch) to show the source of supply, the proposed line and levels of pipe tracks or races, the localities to which the water would be conveyed; and the report to embody the uses to which it could be applied, the estimated cost of the proposed works, and the probable amount of revenue to be derived from the sale of water.

The plan and reports to be accompanied by a tender for executing the surveys and levels, and preparing the necessary plans and sections, and the working drawings and specifications, with a detailed estimate of the cost of the works, but not to include the cost of superintendence.

If any tender is accepted, then the premiums paid for the preliminary design is to be considered as a payment on account of it, but the board does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender; and, before the payment of any premium for a preliminary design, &c., it is to be understood that the person to whom it is awarded shall enter into a bond, with approved sureties, for the carrying out of his tender for the surveys.

Preliminary designs with reports, and the tenders, in separate envelopes, but bearing the same motto, must be addressed to the Inspector General of Public Works, on or before the 30th day of November, 1862.

Sealed envelopes, containing the name and address of each competitor, and with the motto on his designs, &c., legibly written on the outside of the envelope, to accompany the plans and tender.

SECTIONS V. TO X. OF THE TOWN AND COUNTRY POLICE ACT EXTENDED TO THE TOWNSHIP OF BRIGHT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty (Number 14), intituled, *An Act to provide for the Management of Towns and other places in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that so many of the provisions of the said Act as relate to the good order of towns and other populous places, being sections numbered V., VI., VII., VIII., IX., and X., in the said Act, shall extend to and be in force in such cities, towns, districts, and places as the Lieutenant Governor may by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare to come under the operation of the same respectively, or any of them; and it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor to define the limits of such places, and to vary and alter such limits and revoke any such Proclamation; and all the other provisions of the said Act except the last (being numbered XXXIX.) shall extend to and be in operation throughout Victoria and its dependencies from and after the passing thereof: Now I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare that the township of Bright, at Morse's Creek, the limits whereof are hereinafter defined, shall come under the operation of the sections of the said Act numbered respectively V., VI., VII., VIII., IX., and X.

And I do hereby define the limits of the said township of Bright in manner following, viz.—County unnamed, situate at Morse's Creek, Owens district: Commencing at the north-east angle of the town reserve, being a point bearing north twenty-five chains from the north-east angle of suburban allotment 5, section C; bounded on the north by a line bearing west eighty chains; on the west by a line bearing south eighty chains, crossing the the Owens River; on the south by a line bearing east eighty chains; and on the east by a line bearing north, again crossing the Owens River, eighty chains to the point of commencement.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-seventh day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and in the twenty-sixth year of Her Majesty's reign.

The petitioners state that they are farmers, traders, and yeomen, and constitute the majority of the householders within the town and suburbs of Wangaratta, to which they desire the extension of municipal institutions.

They further state that the town contains a large trading and farming population, and is the centre of a very extensive agricultural district, comprising (amongst other localities) Oxley, Docker's Plains, Estcourt, and Tarrawingee, which are all thickly settled tracts; while the town itself is of twenty years' standing, is for the most part composed of substantial brick buildings, and contains 2 churches, 3 schools, 2 tanneries, 3 large steam flour-mills, 1 bank, 1 brewery, 12 stores, 1 steam bonemill, 2 other steam-power works, 4 smithies, 3 wheelwrights' yards, 2 timber yards, and various other places of business.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

BUTTLEGORCK AND HOLDON FARMERS' COMMONS.

RULES and Regulations for the management of the Buttlegorck and Holdon Farmers' Commons.

1. No person shall be entitled to the use of the common, unless he holds or occupies not less than ten acres of land within five miles of the boundary of said common.
2. That each person entitled to commonage shall be permitted to graze one head of cattle for every two acres he may have under cultivation during the current year.
3. Cultivation shall mean and be understood as ploughed land for crop, ploughed land for fallow, or self-sown crop intended to be harvested.
4. That all cattle sent to said common shall have the owner or owners' brand (in legible and distinct characters or letters) on them, in order that the herdsman may be able to discover any strange cattle that may be at any time upon said common. Parties removing their cattle will intimate the same to the herdsman by notice in writing.
5. All persons applying for a license to depasture their cattle will be required to fill up a form, to be obtained from either of the managers or herdsman, setting forth the number of acres he has under cultivation according to the intent and meaning of these regulations, and also make a declaration before a justice of the peace as to the correctness of the same.
6. Any person found depasturing more cattle than what he has taken out a license for, the managers will have the power to cancel his license and prevent him the use of the common during that year.
7. The fees for all cattle (horses excepted) will be at the rate of Five shillings per head per annum, and for horses Eight shillings per head, payable in each case in advance; all cattle under six months old, free.
8. That the year shall commence on the first day of _____ and end on the _____ day of _____ and no less fees will be charged during the currency of said year.
9. That in no case will sheep be permitted to graze on said common during the first year; at the end of which time, if the then licensed commoners (or a majority of them) agree to depasture sheep, this rule will be altered or amended to suit their wishes.

17. Should the managers at any time consider the herdsman incompetent or neglectful of his duties, they can remove or discharge him without notice, and he can have no claim upon them for compensation whatever.
18. The managers do not hold themselves responsible for any neglect or irregularity of the herdsman; and can alter or amend these rules when they consider it necessary. No. 1745
