WATER SUPPLY TO CASTLEMAINE AND SANDHURST.

THE Board of Land and Works being desirous of ascertaining the practicability of obtaining a supply of water from the Coliban River for the supply of the towns of Castlemaine and Sandhurst for domestic uses and mining operations, are prepared to receive from engineers, surveyors, and others, preliminary designs and plans for effecting that object, for the two most eligible of which a premium of £250 and £150 respectively will be awarded.

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The plan (on a scale of not less than two miles to one inch) to show the source of supply, the proposed line and levels of pipe tracks or races, the localities to which the water would be conveyed; and the report to embody the uses to which it could be applied, the estimated cost of the proposed works, and the probable amount of revenue to be derived from the sale of water.

The plan and reports to be accompanied by a tender for executing the surveys and levels, and preparing the necessary plans and sections, and the working drawings and specifications, with a detailed estimate of the cost of the works, but not to include the cost of superintendence.

If any tender is accepted, then the premiums paid for the preliminary design is to be considered as a payment on account of it, but the board does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender; and, before the payment of any premium for a preliminary design, &c., it is to be understood that the person to whom it is awarded shall enter into a bond, with approved sureties, for the carrying out of his tender for the surveys.

Preliminary designs with reports, and the tenders, in separate envelopes, but bearing the same motto, must be addressed to the Inspector General of Public Works, on or before the 30th day of November, 1862.

Sealed envelopes, containing the name and address of each competitor, and with the motto on his designs, &c., legibly written on the outside of the envelope, to accompany the plans and tender.

NOTICE TO LESSEES OF SUBDIVISIONS OF ALLOTMENTS UNDER THE LAND SALES ACT, No. 117.

IT is hereby notified, for the information of persons who have rented subdivisions of allotments under the 34th section of the Land Sales Act, No. 117, and who have not purchased the same under the 40th section of the said Act, or applied to surrender their leases and receive leases under *The Land Act*, 1862, that the yearly rentals, in advance, at the rate of One shilling per acre, must be paid to the Land Officer for the survey district within which the land may be situated, within one month from the date upon which such rentals will fall due. SUBJECTS FOR THE EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE.

THE Governor in Council, in pursuance of the provisions contained in the 18th clause of the Act No. 160, intituled, *An Act to regulate the Civil Service*, has directed that candidates for admission into the Ordinary or the Professional Division of the Civil Service shall pass before the Board of Examiners an examination, without competition, on the subjects hereinafter mentioned, viz. :—

Candidates for admission to the Ordinary Division of the Civil Service will be required to pass an examination in the following subjects :—

1.—ENGLISH.

Exercises designed to test Handwriting and Orthography. d. 1
English Grammar and Composition.

2.—ARITHMETIC.

First Rules.
Vulgar and Decimal Fractions so far as to include the Rule of Three.

Any candidate who fails to answer satisfactorily in either of the above subjects will not be permitted to proceed further in the examination.

Candidates who have successfully passed the preceding portion of the examination may then select any *two* out of the following seven subjects :—

1.—LATIN.

Any one of the following, at the option of the candidate :—

Sallust.—Catinile and Jugurtha.
Virgil.—Any four books of the *Æneid*.
Horace.—1. Odes and Epodes, or
2. Satires and Epistles.
Cæsar.—De Bello Gallico.
Cicero.—De Senectute, and
De Amicitia.

Passages for translation will be set from these authors, and candidates will be required to answer easy grammatical and historical questions arising out of the passages so set.

2.—FRENCH.

Translations from Fénelon's "Télémaque."
Easy translations from English into French, and *vice versa*.

3.—EUCLID.

The first two books, including the Definitions and Axioms.

4.—ALGEBRA.

So far as to include the solution of Simple Equations.

5.—HISTORY.

The outlines of the History of England from the Norman Conquest, to the Battle of Waterloo.

6.—POLITICAL ECONOMY.

Elementary principles of.

7.—GEOGRAPHY.

Outlines of Political and Physical Geography.

Candidates for admission to the Professional Division, or into those departments of the Ordinary Division which require special qualifications, will, in addition to the foregoing, be examined as follows :—

1. In Geometrical and Free-hand Drawing.

DISTRICTS OF INSPECTORS OF SHEEP.

THE several districts into which the colony of Victoria has been divided, and for which inspectors of sheep have been appointed; in accordance with the Act No. 143, intituled, *An Act to repeal the Act intituled An Act for preventing the extension of the Disease called Scab in Sheep, and to substitute other provisions in lieu thereof*, are hereinafter described for general information, that is to say:—

THE BENALLA SCAB DISTRICT.—Commencing at the junction of the Goulburn and Murray Rivers; thence by the Murray River, bearing easterly to Cowrang Creek; thence by Cowrang Creek, a range, Livingstone Creek, and a line, together bearing southerly to the Dividing Range (and being the eastern boundary of the Beechworth Commissioner's district); thence by the Dividing Range, bearing westerly to the south-east corner of the county of Anglesey; and thence by the east boundary of that county and the Goulburn River, together bearing northerly to the point of commencement.

THE GEELONG SCAB DISTRICT.—Commencing at the south-west corner of the county of Villiers; thence by the west boundary of that county and the west boundary of the county

of Ripon, together bearing northerly; thence by the north boundary of the county of Ripon and part of the north boundaries of the counties of Grenville and Grant, together bearing easterly to the north-east angle of the last-named county; thence by the east boundary of that county, bearing southerly to Point Lonsdale; and thence by the sea-coast, bearing westerly to the point of commencement.

THE GIPPS LAND SCAB DISTRICT.—Commencing at the south-east angle of the county of Mornington; thence by the east boundaries of that county and county of Evelyn, together bearing northerly to the Dividing Range; thence by that range bearing easterly to the south-east corner of the Bechworth Commissioner's district; thence by the east boundary of that district (being a line passing along Livingstone Creek, a range, and Cowrang Creek to its junction to the Murray River), bearing northerly to the Murray River; thence by the Murray and the north-east boundary of the colony of Victoria, bearing south-easterly to Cape Howe; and thence by the sea-coast, bearing westerly to the point of commencement.

THE MELBOURNE SCAB DISTRICT.—Commencing at the south-west corner of the county of Bourke; thence by the west boundary of that county, bearing northerly to the north-east corner of the county of Grant; thence by part of the south boundary of the county of Talbot and portion of the Dividing Range, together bearing westerly to the source of the Avoca River; thence by that river bearing northerly to Lake Bael-bael; thence by a line bearing north magnetic to the junction of the Marraboor and Loddon Rivers; thence by the Marraboor River, bearing northerly to its junction with the Murray River; thence by the Murray River, bearing south-easterly to its junction with the Goulburn River; thence by the Goulburn River, bearing southerly and easterly to the north-east corner of the county of Anglesy; thence by the east boundary of that county and the east boundaries of the counties of Evelyn and Mornington, together bearing southerly to the sea-coast; and thence by the sea-coast, bearing westerly, and the shore of Port Phillip Bay, bearing northerly and westerly, to the point of commencement.

THE PORTLAND SCAB DISTRICT.—Commencing at the south-west corner of the colony of Victoria; thence by the west boundary of that colony, bearing north to the north-west corner of the county of Follett; thence easterly by the north boundaries of the counties of Follett and Dundas; thence by part of the west boundary of the county of Ripon and the west boundary of the county of Villiers, together bearing southerly to the sea-coast; and thence by the sea-coast, bearing westerly to the point of commencement.

THE EAST WIMMERA SCAB DISTRICT.—Commencing at the north-west angle of the colony of Victoria; thence by the Murray River, bearing south-easterly to its upper junction with the Marraboor River; thence by that river bearing south-westerly to its junction with the Loddon River; thence by a line bearing magnetic south to Lake Bael-bael; thence southerly to the Avoca River; thence by that river bearing southerly to the Dividing Range; thence westerly by that range to the source of the Wimmera River; thence by that river northerly to its intersection with a magnetic east and west line passing two miles south of Lake Albacutya; thence by that line bearing west magnetic to the west boundary of the colony of Victoria; and thence by that boundary bearing north to the point of commencement.

THE WEST WIMMERA SCAB DISTRICT.—Commencing at the source of the Wimmera River; thence by that river bearing northerly to its intersection with a magnetic east and west line passing two miles south of Lake Albacutya; thence by that line bearing west magnetic to the west boundary of the colony of Victoria; thence by that boundary bearing south to the north-west corner of the county of Follett; and thence easterly by the north boundaries of the counties of Follett and Dundas, and part of the north boundary of the county of Ripon, together bearing easterly to the point of commencement.

NOTICE TO OWNERS OF SHEEP.

THE attention of all owners of sheep throughout the colony is specially directed to the following clauses of the Act No. 143, intituled, *An Act to repeal the Act intituled An Act for preventing the extension of the Disease called Scab in Sheep, and to substitute other provisions in lieu thereof*, which came into operation from and after the 1st instant, viz. —

"§2. *Penalty on owners of scabby sheep.*—Every person who not being licensed under this Act shall own any sheep infected with the disease called scab shall be liable to pay the sum of three shillings in respect of every sheep so infected.

"§3. *License to keep scabby sheep.*—Any inspector on being applied to by any owner of sheep shall issue to such owner upon payment of a fee of threepence for every sheep so infected a license to keep the said sheep for a period of six months for the purpose of cleansing the same and any inspector may from time to time renew such license for a further period of four calendar months upon payment of the sum of sixpence for every sheep so infected for the first renewal of ninepence for the second renewal and of an additional threepence beyond such sum of ninepence for every additional renewal of such license. Provided that every such license shall be void if during the continuance thereof the person to whom the same is granted shall be convicted under this Act.

"§4. *Owners of sheep to deliver correct account of infected sheep.*—Every person owning sheep or having the care or management of sheep within Victoria shall whenever thereunto

required by a notice in writing to be personally delivered to such owner or manager aforesaid or left at his usual or last known place of abode in the said colony deliver to the inspector a correct account of all sheep in his possession or custody infected with scab with the marks and brands of such sheep and the description of their age and sex as near as may be and of the places where such sheep may be depasturing or kept. And if any such owner or other person shall not within fourteen days after the delivery or leaving of such notice deliver such account he shall forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding twenty pounds."

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the lands hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the above recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE FOOTSCRAY MUNICIPAL COMMON shall comprise both the portions of the Footscray Town Common respectively described in two several Proclamations, bearing date the third day of June, 1861, and the twenty-second day of September, 1862.—(G.F.8819.)

THE NEWSTEAD TOWN COMMON, for all householders in the town of Newstead, shall comprise all the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries of the said town as indicated on a plan deposited at the Office of Lands and Survey, Melbourne.—(G.F.9032.)

THE PORTARLINGTON TOWN COMMON, for all householders in the town of Portarlington, shall comprise all the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries of the said town, as indicated on a plan deposited at the Office of Lands and Survey, Melbourne.—(G.F.8834.)

THE PORTLAND MUNICIPAL COMMON shall comprise the Portland Town Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the eighteenth day of February, 1861, together with the unappropriated Crown lands situate within the municipal district of Portland, as indicated on a plan deposited at the Office of Lands and Survey, Melbourne, the total area of such municipal common being about 5900 acres.—(G.E.8560.)

THE TARADALE MUNICIPAL COMMON shall comprise the unsold and unappropriated Crown lands within the municipal district of Taradale, and situate on the west side of the Coliban River, as indicated on a plan deposited at the Office of Lands and Survey, Melbourne.—(G.F.7035.)

THE WOODEND MUNICIPAL COMMON shall comprise the unappropriated Crown lands within the municipal district of Woodend, as indicated on a plan deposited at the Office of Lands and Survey, Melbourne.—(G.E.7079.)

They state, lastly, that there are three hundred householders within the proposed new boundaries, which will comprise not more than nine square miles.

PROPOSED ROAD DISTRICT. BUNGAREE.

A MEMORIAL, signed by William Henry Surplice, Esq., chairman, in the name and on the behalf of a public meeting held at the police quarters, in the parish of Bungaree, near Ballaarat, on the 2nd of last June, has been presented to the Governor, setting forth the following effect:—

The memorialists represent that they are owners and occupiers of lands in the parish of Bungaree and the vicinity, and request His Excellency to cause to be proclaimed a road district, under the designation of "The Bungaree Road District," with the following boundaries, viz:—

Commencing at the head of the Bullarook Creek; thence by a line westerly to the north-eastern angle of portion 63, parish of Ballaarat, being the southern boundary of the Creswick road district; thence by the eastern boundary of the Ballaarat road district to the northern boundary of the Ballaarat municipality; thence easterly along the said boundary, and along the boundary of the municipality of Ballaarat East, to the north-east angle of the said boundary; thence southerly, along the said boundary, to a point where it crosses the Melbourne and Ballaarat road; thence easterly along the said road, being a portion of the northern boundary of the Buninyong road district to the western branch of the River Moorabool; thence northerly by the said river to its source; thence by a line to the commencing point at the head of the Bullarook Creek.

The memorialists urge in support of their request the importance of their locality, the existence of several lines of road therein, connecting the railway, Melbourne, Ballaarat, &c., with Creswick, Clunes, Daylesford, &c., the ill-condition of these roads, upon none of which has the Government expended anything, and the consequent difficulty of intercommunication owing to the adjacent lands being in course of being rapidly fenced in.

They further represent that the whole of the timber for building, mining, and other purposes, for Ballaarat and the vicinity, is either drawn from or passes through the proposed district; that the land is second to none in the colony for agricultural purposes, and needs only to be rendered accessible; that the produce, and especially timber, might be conveyed to Melbourne, and even exported to India and elsewhere, and would form a valuable addition to the railway traffic; and, lastly, that there are many valuable saw-mills in the district, from each of which at least twenty-five drays, on an average, daily convey timber, and that it is estimated that 200 drays daily pass through the district, and carry about half a million feet of timber weekly to Ballaarat and other markets.

ELECTIONS.

No election took place during the currency of the half-year, but a vacancy occurred through the decease of Councillor Brown, the filling up of which it was deemed expedient to defer till the September annual election, as Councillor Brown's seat would have become vacant then by effluxion of time.

APPLICATIONS.

Applications to the Government have been made for the establishment of a local district survey office.—Declined.

For a special grant towards forming the approaches to the town, three applications.—Refused.

For a share, as heretofore, of the grant for fencing and improving public parks in aid of the Botanical Gardens.—Refused, on the ground that the aggregate amount hitherto apportioned to Belfast is in excess of what it is entitled to in proportion to its population.

The application for a manure depôt, referred to in last report, has been acceded to, and the land selected and marked off under instructions of the district surveyor, but the reservation has not yet been gazetted.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The contract for forming and paving 46½ chains of the Mount Napier road has been completed, and numerous repairs effected from time to time on the Rosebrook and Yambuk roads.

A mass of trap rock, containing upwards of 250 cubic yards has been quarried and removed from hip of bank-street, and the proper formation given the street, footpath, and water-table.

700 lineal yards of footpath, 12 feet wide, have been brought to a proper formation and level, and coated with 4 inches of limestone broken small, and rolled down to a hard and even surface.

160 lineal yards bluestone kerbing have been laid down, and 100 yards old kerbing lifted and reset.

400 chains water-channels have been cleaned out and deepened, and upwards of 1000 loads earth removed from water-channels and hips of streets.

FINANCE.

In consequence of the unexpectedly great reduction in amount of grant-in-aid this year, the councillors have had to become personally liable to the bank for an overdraft, by giving their joint pro. note for £300, a large portion of which, however, will be met by second moiety of the grant-in-aid for 1862, and which has not yet been distributed.
