## EXTENSION OF TIME FOR RECEIVING CERTAIN APPLICATIONS FOR RESIDENCE AND CULTIVATION CERTIFICATES UNDER THE REGULATIONS OF 25TH AUGUST, 1861.

## THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF WOODEND.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that any district of the colony of Victoria, the area whereof should not exceed nine square miles, and which should contain a population of householders not less than three hundred, might, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be constituted a municipal district as thereinafter mentioned, provided that no one point in any such area should be distant more than six miles from any other point; and it was further enacted that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than one hundred and fifty householders resident within any such district, praying that such district might be declared a municipal district under the said Act, to cause the substance and prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition, signed by an equal or greater number of householders resident within such locality, should have been delivered at the office of the Colonial Secretary within one month from the date of such publication) the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice aforesaid, might, if he should think fit, declare by Proclamation such locality a municipal district by a name to be mentioned in such Proclamation, and also by the same or any other Proclamation might define the limits and boundaries of such municipal district, and such limits and boundaries at any time thereafter in the same manner, on receipt of a similar petition, might vary and alter, but so as in no case, save as thereinafter mentioned, to include within the limits or boundaries of such municipal district an area of more than nine square miles, and upon the publication of any such Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, such locality so defined should be deemed and taken to be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act: And whereas a petition for the purposes aforesaid has been presented to the Governor by the householders resident at and near Woodend, in the county of Dalhousie, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published as directed by the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation declare that the district hereinafter described and named shall be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF WOODEND.—Commencing at a point on the Campaspe River where it is intersected by the south boundary of the parish of Woodend; thence by that boundary east four miles, more or less, to the south-east angle of allotment 104, parish of Woodend; thence by the east boundary

of said parish north four miles seven chains, more or less, to the south-east angle of allotment 85, parish aforesaid; thence by the south boundary of last-named allotment, bearing west ten chains seventy links to the south-east angle of "Newham" pre-emptive right, and by the south boundary of that pre-emptive right bearing west eighty chains sixty-five links; thence crossing a road west one chain to the north side of a road forming the south boundaries of allotments 80 and 77, parish aforesaid, bearing west one hundred and five chains twenty-two links, more or less, to the east side of the Mount Alexander road; thence by a line bearing west, crossing the Mount Alexander road, one mile, more or less, to the Campaspe River; and by that river southerly to the commencing point.

And I do hereby, with the advice aforesaid, direct that the council of the said municipal district shall be called by the name and style of "The Municipal Council of Woodend."

#### SALE OF SPIRITS, ETC., BY WHOLESALE, IN THE DISTRICT OF THE MURRAY.

##### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the twentieth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act to amend the laws relative to the vending of fermented and spirituous liquors*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by proclamation, to declare any city, town, district, or place in Victoria, a city, town, district, or place wherein premises for the sale of spirits or fermented liquors, in quantities not less than two gallons, might be registered under the authority of the Acts mentioned in the first schedule to the said Act annexed: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke all former proclamations of towns and districts situate within the district of the Murray, under the provisions of the said Act; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do by this my Proclamation declare that the whole of the district of the Murray, as hereinafter described, shall be a district wherein premises for the sale of spirits or fermented liquors in quantities not less than two gallons may be registered under the authority of the Acts mentioned in the first schedule to the above recited Act, that is to say:—

THE MURRAY DISTRICT.—Bounded on the south and west by the counties of Evelyn and Anglesey, and the River Goulburn to its junction with the River Murray; on the north and north-east by the River Murray; and on the south-east by the Great Dividing Range.

In the report for November the mortality of that month was spoken of as having been unprecedentedly low; it was therefore to be expected, leaving the season of the year out of the question, that an increase in the number of deaths would take place in the following month. Such increase has taken place. The deaths in December amounted to 322, or a daily average of 10.39, against only 189 deaths, or a daily average of 6.30 in November. On comparing the mortality of December, however, with that of the same month in the two previous years, the contrast is to a very marked extent in favor of the month under review, as the deaths in December, 1860, numbered 525, and those in December, 1859, numbered 479, or an excess of 203 and 157 respectively over the deaths in December, 1860.

The mean temperature in the shade during the month of December was 62.8°, being higher by 2½ degrees than that of November, but lower by 3½ degrees than that of December, 1860, and 5 degrees lower than that of December, 1859. The highest point reached by the thermometer (86.9°) was at 2 p.m. on the 27th, and the lowest 45° was at 3 and 4 a.m. on the 8th, the range for the month thus being 41.9°. The daily range of temperature will be given in a subsequent portion of this report. The mean height of the barometer for the month was 29.716 in. against 29.804 in. for December, 1860, and against 29.827 in. for December, 1859. The greatest atmospheric pressure (30.176 in.) was experienced at 11 a.m. on the 29th, and the least (29.137) at noon on the 2nd; the range of pressure for the month thus being 1.039 in.

Of the 322 deaths which took place during the month, 186 or about 58 per cent. were of males, and 136 or about 42 per cent. were of females. The deaths of children under five exceeded those of persons above that age by 46, the numbers being 184 and 138, and the proportions, 57 and 43 per cent. Although the mortality of children as compared with the total mortality shows considerable increase upon that of November, yet it is far less than that of December, 1860, when 72 per cent. of the deaths were those of children who had not attained their fifth year.

Eighteen deaths which occurred on the 27th was the highest mortality recorded as having taken place on any one day; 17 persons also died upon the 12th, the same number upon the 30th, and 16 on the 15th. In the previous month eleven deaths was the maximum of daily mortality, but in December, 1860, four days showed respectively 31, 27, 26, and 21 deaths; four more days showed 19 deaths upon each, and upon each of four others 18 deaths occurred.

A male who had attained the age of 80 years, died during the month, of bronchitis, and another who had reached that of 77 died of old age. Two males aged respectively 26 and 41 committed suicide by drowning, and one of 35 by hanging. Five other male adults were accidentally drowned, besides a boy of 9 and a girl of 2 years of age who met the same fate. A professed curer of snakebites, 57 years of age, died through the bite of a snake. A railway porter, 24 years old, was killed by an engine. A boy of 14 was killed through a fall from a horse, a girl of 6 years old through being run over by a car. Another of 3 years old through an injury to her neck, and a child of a year old died of a scald. Two infants were accidentally suffocated, one at its birth and the other at the age of seven weeks.

Forty deaths or about an eighth of the entire number occurred in public institutions, of which 30 took place in the Melbourne Hospital, 6 in the Benevolent Asylum, 3 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, and 1 in the Immigrants' Home.

NOTE.—The population of the different sub-districts according to the recent census is given subject to future revision, but it is believed that when finally corrected the figures will not differ materially from the above.

Of the 184 children under five years of age who died during the month, 98, or 53 per cent., were males, and 86, or 47 per cent., were females; 126 were under a year old, 33 were between one and two years, 9 between two and three, 8 between three and four, and 8 between four and five years.

Of the 138 deaths which occurred to persons above five years of age, 88, or 64 per cent., were of males, and 50, or 36 per cent., of females; 14 were between five years and ten, 4 between ten and fifteen, 6 between fifteen and twenty, 9 between twenty and twenty-five, 17 between twenty-five and thirty, 17 between thirty and thirty-five, 20 between thirty-five and forty, 12 between forty and forty-five, 11 between forty-five and fifty, 8 between fifty and fifty-five, 6 between fifty-five and sixty, 7 between sixty and sixty-five, 1 between sixty-five and seventy, 3 between seventy and seventy-five, and 3 seventy-five years old and upwards.

The principal feature calling for notice in the above disease table, as far as regards zymotic diseases, is the increase in diarrhoea and dysentery, the number of deaths from which complaints augmented from 23 in the previous month to 50 in the

month in question. Deaths from zymotic diseases generally, although they increased in numbers from 44 to 70, diminished in their proportion to the total from 24 to 22 per cent.

Reviewing the deaths which took place from sporadic diseases, it is found that most of the classes increased in actual numbers, but that deaths from diseases of uncertain seat and those of the nervous system augmented in a greater ratio than the deaths from all causes, as their proportions to the total increased from 15 and 13 to 19 and 18 per cent.; but diseases of the respiratory system, and those of the digestive organs, did not augment in the same ratio as the deaths generally, as their proportions to the total have become reduced from 22 and 11 to 17 and 9 per cent. Nineteen deaths, which is above the average, were occasioned during the month by violent or accidental causes.

It is thus seen that whilst the mean temperature of the past quarter was lower than that of the same quarter in the two previous years, the mortality was less therein than in the same quarter of 1860 by nearly one-half, and less than in the same quarter of 1859 by about a third.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and ninety householders, resident at Chiltern, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that they reside within the area hereinafter defined, and that the township of Chiltern is the centre of an extensive mining district, and comprises a mining and trading population who have invested large sums in trading stock, buildings, and mining plant.

That the land in the township has been lately sold, some of it at a high price, and that notwithstanding the amount paid to Government no provision has been made for roads or approaches to the town, the streets of which are sometimes almost impassable.

That the township contains over fifteen hundred residents. The petitioners state that they are resident landholders and householders in the locality hereinafter described, and known as "Brown's and Scarsdale," in the parish of Scarsdale, which they are desirous should be erected into a municipal district.

That there are between 5000 and 6000 inhabitants in the proposed district, most of whom are engaged in mining, commercial, and agricultural pursuits, and are located at Brown's, Scarsdale, and Black Hill, and that there is, besides, a large number of scattered habitations, the occupants of which it is desirable to include, and thus to secure to all the comforts and advantages derivable from centralization.
