## TRANSACTION OF MONEY ORDER BUSINESS BETWEEN THE UNITED KINGDOM AND VIC- TORIA.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the 27th day of January,  
1862.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the 17th year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, *An Act to amend the Law relating to Post Offices*, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to make arrangements with the constituted authorities in England, for the transmission, through the medium of the post office, of money between England and Victoria by order or otherwise, and for the delivery and payment of the same; the accounting for all money which shall be due and owing to any country on account of such arrangements for the transmission of any balance thereon; to make such rules and regulations; to defray such discounts and exchanges as may be necessary; and to establish such rates of payment as seem fit in such behalf respectively. And whereas by an Act passed in the 21st year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, *An Act to enable the Postmaster General to issue Money Orders in the Colony of Victoria*, it is further, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, from time to time, to make such regulations as shall be needed relating to money orders, and to the persons by or through whom; and to the restrictions as to number and amount under which money orders shall be issued; and to the places where all money orders issued shall be payable; and to the length of time during which money orders shall be current, and after which they shall become void; and to the managing of credits, accounts, and other matters and things necessary to be forwarded, transmitted or managed in reference to money orders; and relating to every other matter or thing necessary to be regulated or done, for perfecting a system whereby the public may be enabled promptly and safely to remit small sums of money to all parts through the post office.

Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that the rules herunto annexed for the transaction of money order business, between the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and Victoria, be adopted.

That on and after the seventeenth day of February now next ensuing, money orders may and shall be issued, under the rules

aforsaid, at all post offices in the colony of Victoria, to which the money order system is now or may hereafter be extended, on such post offices in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as the Postmaster General in England shall from time to time notify, as post offices at which such money orders can be made payable.

That on and after the date above mentioned, all money orders drawn in Great Britain and Ireland, by postmasters and others duly authorised in that behalf, on the post offices in Victoria at which money order business is transacted, shall be payable under the rules aforesaid.

That the amount of premium to be charged on all money orders issued in the colony of Victoria on the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, shall be as follows:—

For any sum not exceeding £5, Two shillings and sixpence.  
Ditto above £5, and not exceeding £10, Five shillings.

That the Postmaster General in Victoria shall pay to the British Post Office, the sum of four pence for every money order issued in Victoria, and ten shillings sterling per cent. on the amount of such order, and the British Post Office to make a like payment to the Postmaster General of Victoria on every order issued in the United Kingdom.

That the largest amount for which any money order shall be issued in Victoria on the United Kingdom, shall be (£10) ten pounds.

And the Honorable George Samuel Evans, Her Majesty's Postmaster General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

## RULES PROPOSED FOR ADOPTION IN THE TRANSACTION OF MONEY ORDER BUSINESS BETWEEN THE UNITED KING- DOM OF GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND AND VICTORIA.

1. *Maximum amount for money orders.*—Commission.—The maximum amount for which a money order may be drawn in the United Kingdom upon Victoria to be fixed by the British Government, and the maximum amount for which a money order may be drawn in Victoria upon the United Kingdom to be fixed by the Colonial Government, on the understanding, however, that in neither country shall this amount exceed £10. Each Government also to be left to fix the rate of commission to be charged on the issue of money orders.

2. *Division of commission.*—The British post office to pay to the post office of Victoria the sum of Fourpence for every money order issued in the United Kingdom, and Ten shillings sterling per cent. on the amount of such order; and the post office of Victoria to make a like payment to the British post office for every money order issued in Victoria.

3. *Orders to be drawn in sterling.*—All money orders to be drawn in sterling money, and no order to include a fractional part of a penny.

4. *Particulars required for a money order.*—With the following exceptions, no money order to be issued unless the applicant furnish the surname and, at least, the initial of one Christian name, both of the remitter and the payee, together with the address of the remitter, for entry in the office books, so that, if necessary, he may be traced. If the applicant, however, tender the name of either the remitter or the payee at greater length, such particulars to be received, and the advice to be made out accordingly.

1. If the remitter or payee be a peer or bishop, his ordinary title to be sufficient; if a firm, the usual designation of such firm, such as "Baring Brothers," "Smith and Son," "Jones and Co.," to suffice; but the mere term "Messrs.," such as "Messrs. Rivington," or the name of a company trading under a title which does not consist of the names of the persons composing it, such as the "Carron Co.," to be inadmissible.

11. The remitter, on stating that the order is to be paid only through a bank, to have the option of giving or withholding the name of the payee, or to substitute for the name of the payee any other designation, such as "The Chief Clerk of the Foreign Office," in such cases, the officer drawing the order to cross it in the same way that cheques are commonly crossed when they are intended to be paid through a bank.

5. *Form of money order.*—Every money order to be drawn on the authorised form. The form of money order (having attached to it a form of advice) now used in the United Kingdom, with such slight alterations as may be necessary, to be adopted for money orders between the United Kingdom and Victoria. A specimen of this form is annexed.

6. *Payment of an order through a bank.*—When an order is presented for payment through a bank, a receipt by any person to be sufficient, and no regard to be paid to any discrepancy between the signature to the receipt and the name of the payee given in the advice, provided the order be crossed with the name of the bank, and be presented by some person known to be in the employ of such bank.

7. *Transmission of advices.*—The advices of all money orders drawn upon Victoria by postmasters in England to be sent in the first instance to the Chief Money Order Office in London. Advices of orders drawn in Scotland to be sent to Edinburgh, and advices of orders drawn in Ireland to be sent to Dublin. These advices, after being stamped in London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, with a date stamp, to be forwarded with a list, similar to the accompanying form (No. 1 O) under a cover to the "Postmaster General of Victoria," from the Post Office, Melbourne, after being again stamped with the date stamp of that office, the advices to be despatched to the several offices drawn upon. The advantage of sending a list of the orders, as well as the advices, is this, that if an advice should miscarry, the Postmaster General of Victoria will be able to issue a duplicate advice provided the order appears in the list.

8. *Route by which advices are to be sent.*—All money order advices which reach the Chief Money Order Offices in London, Dublin, or Edinburgh, before the departure of the mail *via* Southampton to be sent by that mail, but advices of orders drawn between the departure of the Southampton Mail and the departure of the Marseilles Mail to be sent *via* Marseilles. A separate list to accompany the advices sent by each route. In like manner, the advices of all money orders drawn upon the United Kingdom by postmasters in Victoria to be sent in the first instance to Melbourne, there to be stamped with a date stamp, and afterwards to be forwarded by the first packet to England. The advices of orders drawn on towns in England to be put under a cover, addressed to the "Comptroller of the Chief Money Order Office, London;" the advices of orders drawn on towns in Scotland under a cover, addressed to the "Secretary of the General Post Office, Edinburgh;" and the advices of orders drawn on towns in Ireland under a cover, addressed to the "Secretary of the General Post Office, Dublin."

These advices to be invariably sent *via* Southampton; but in each case a list, similar to those proposed to be used in the United Kingdom, to be made out in Melbourne, and to be forwarded *via* Marseilles for the information of the London, Edinburgh, and Dublin offices.

9. *Orders not to be paid unless advices bear stamp of chief office.*—The postmasters in each country to be instructed to pay no order unless the advice has been previously received, and unless that advice bears the stamp of the London, Dublin, or Edinburgh office, as well as that of the Melbourne office. By this arrangement the post office of the country in which the orders are drawn will have the means of ascertaining that all those orders are duly accounted for by its postmasters, and the post office of the country in which the orders are paid will be informed of the amount of money which each of its postmasters will require in order to meet the orders drawn upon him.

10. *Advices to be returned to country whence issued.*—The advices, after the orders to which they relate have been paid, or have lapsed, to be returned to the chief office of the country in which the orders were drawn.

11. *Payments to be made in sterling.*—All payments for money orders, whether by the public to the post office or by the post office to the public, to be made in sterling money, and at par; provided, however, that if in Victoria there be a difficulty at any time in procuring sterling money, such payments may be made, to the nearest equivalent, in other coins current in that colony.

12. *Receipt for a money order; attested mark in place of signature.*—The signature of the payee of a money order to be affixed to the order in the place provided for the purpose. If the payee be unable to write, he should sign the receipt by making his mark, to be witnessed in writing; as, for example—

Joseph Allen,  
x  
his mark.

Witness—John Fuller, High street, Leicester.

The witness to sign his name, with his address, in the presence of the paying officer, and the latter to certify the payment by adding his initials. The witness should not be connected with the post office; he need not be personally acquainted with the payee, but he should be known to the paying officer. In no case should the paying officer act as witness.

13. *Lapsed and void orders.*—Payment of an order to be obtained before the end of the sixth calendar month after that in which it was drawn; for instance, if drawn in January, payment to be obtained before the end of July; otherwise the order to become lapsed and a new order (for which a second commission, to be deducted from the amount of the order, will be charged) to become necessary.

14. Any person presenting a lapsed order to be directed to transmit it, with an application for a new order, to the chief office of the country in which it was payable.

15. If an order be not paid before the end of the twelfth calendar month after that in which it was drawn—for instance, if drawn in January and not paid before the end of the following January—all claim to the money to be forfeited, unless, under peculiar circumstances, the post office of the country in which the order was drawn think proper to allow it.

16. *No claim after an order has once been paid.*—After once paying a money order, by whomsoever presented, the paying office not to be liable to any further claim. If a wrong payment, however, be made owing to negligence on the part of any officer of the department, the postmaster general of the country in which the negligence occurs to be authorised, if he see fit, to require the officer in fault to make good the loss.

17. *Transmission of accounts.*—The London and Melbourne offices are to render to each other by every mail an account (Form No. 1 N annexed) showing the several orders drawn in one country, and paid or renewed in the other, during the period to which the account relates; such account to be accompanied by the orders as vouchers.

18. *Balance of accounts.*—The balance due from one country to the other on account of money orders to be remitted every month. This balance to be estimated by the remitting country, and to be subject to a quarterly adjustment.

19. *Mode of payment.*—All payments by Victoria to be in sterling money and at par, and to be made through the commissariat chest, as in the case of British postage collected in Victoria. Payments due from the United Kingdom to be made by bills at not more than thirty days' sight, or the amount to be deducted from the balance of postage due from the colony to the United Kingdom.

20. *Additional precautions and facilities.*—The postmaster general in each country to be authorised to adopt any additional rules (if not repugnant to the foregoing) for the greater security, against fraud, or for the better working of the system generally. All such additional rules, however, to be communicated to the postmaster general of the other country.

21. *Power to increase commission or to suspend issue of money orders.*—Should it appear that money orders are used by mercantile men, either in the United Kingdom or in Victoria, for the transmission of large sums of money, the British or Victoria office, as the case may be, to consider the propriety of increasing the commission, and to have power even wholly to suspend for a time the issue of money orders.

The foregoing rules are proposed as an arrangement to be agreed upon between the British and the Victoria post offices for the establishment of a money order system between the United Kingdom and Victoria; subject to such alterations from time to time as may be mutually agreed-upon. The whole arrangement to be terminable by either party on a notice of one year.

Notice is hereby given that on and after the 17th instant, Money Orders payable in the United Kingdom may be obtained at the undermentioned Post Offices in Victoria, at which further particulars may be had on application.

#### AMENDED FORM OF MINING LEASE OF MINERAL LANDS.

(Under the Act 24 Victoria No. 117.)

At the Government House, Melbourne, the third day of February, 1862.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council shall have full power from time to time by proclamation to make any

rules and regulations for prescribing the form of leases for mining purposes to be issued under the said Act, and the conditions on which such leases shall be issued: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council, made on the second day of September, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, it is amongst other things directed, that leases for mining purposes, to be issued under the said Act, shall be in the form set forth in Schedule E, annexed to the said Order, or as near thereto as may be: And whereas it is expedient to alter the said form: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby rescind so much of the said Order as prescribes the form of lease in Schedule E, annexed to the said Order; and doth hereby direct that every lease to be hereafter issued for mining purposes under the said Order shall be in the form following, that is to say:—

**T**HIS Indenture, made the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_ A.D. 18\_\_\_\_, between Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria of the first part; Sir Henry Barkly, Knight Commander of the Bath, Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, of the second part; and

of \_\_\_\_\_ (hereinafter called the lessee \_\_\_\_\_), of the third part: Whereas by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the twenty-fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, numbered one hundred and seventeen, it was made lawful for the Governor to demise, under such restrictions, limitations, and conditions as might be deemed necessary by the Governor in Council, to any person, for any term not exceeding thirty years from the making of such lease, any Crown lands not exceeding six hundred and forty acres, for the purpose of mining for any mineral or metal, except gold, but no such lease was to be granted in reversion: And by the said Act power was given to the Governor in Council from time to time to make rules and regulations for prescribing the form of leases for such purposes to be issued under the said Act, and the conditions on which such leases should be issued: And whereas such rules and regulations have been made: And whereas the said lessee \_\_\_\_\_, in compliance with such regulations, duly applied for a lease of the land hereinafter described: And whereas one month's notice has been given in the *Government Gazette* of the intention to grant this lease: Now this indenture witnesseth, that in consideration of the rents, reservations, covenants, provisoes, and agreements hereinafter contained on the part of the said lessee \_\_\_\_\_, h \_\_\_\_\_ executors, administrators, and assigns, to be paid, observed, and performed, Her Majesty the Queen (so far as the grant hereinafter contained is not included in or does not interfere with any former and similar grants) doth by these presents grant and demise: And the said Sir Henry Barkly, as such Governor as aforesaid, pursuant to and in exercise of the power in this behalf given to him by the said Act of Parliament, doth hereby demise unto the said lessee \_\_\_\_\_, h \_\_\_\_\_ executors, administrators, and assigns, all \_\_\_\_\_ piece or parcel of land \_\_\_\_\_ particularly described in the first schedule hereto, and as the same

set forth and delineated on the map or plan hereon endorsed \_\_\_\_\_ and therein colored yellow, for the purpose of mining \_\_\_\_\_ together with all and singular, pits, shafts, pumps, levels, drifts, works, roads, ways, watercourses, and appurtenances to the same, now or which may during the term hereby granted, be belonging or therewith occupied and enjoyed: And also with full and free liberty for the said lessee \_\_\_\_\_, h \_\_\_\_\_ executors, administrators, and assigns, to search for and take from the said land all \_\_\_\_\_ contained therein, and to dig, sink, drive, make and use all such pits, shafts, pumps, levels, watercourses, and other works which may be necessary for winning, working, and obtaining the \_\_\_\_\_ therein contained: And for the purposes aforesaid, to erect, make, and employ all such fire, steam, water, and other engines, buildings, workmen's houses, machines, shops, sheds, or huts, machinery, and works which may be proper and reasonable for such purpose: Except and always reserved unto Her Majesty, her heirs, successors, assigns, and her and their servants, full and free liberty, at all proper and seasonable times during the continuance of this demise, to enter into and upon the land, mines, works, and premises hereby demised, in order to view and examine the condition thereof, and for that purpose to make use of any of the roads, ways, machinery, and works now or which may be at any time belonging to the said land, mines, and premises: And also to use any drifts, levels, shafts, watercourses, adits, or passages now being or hereafter to be, or to make and use any drifts, levels, shafts, watercourses, adits, or passages in or upon any part of the premises hereby demised or the surface thereof, for the purpose of freeing any other land or mines whatsoever from water, or for conducting water for the use of any such lastmentioned land or mines or the machinery or works connected therewith, or for supplying the same with good fresh air: And also full and free liberty at all times during the continuance of this demise to make any level, drift, shaft, adit, watercourse, sludge channels, railroad or other road or way, in, through, or upon any part or parts of the premises hereby demised or the surface thereof, for effectually winning or working any other adjoining or neighboring mines, or for any public purpose whatsoever; causing thereby nevertheless as little as possible obstruction or injury to any of the levels, drifts, shafts, adits, watercourses, sludge channels, roads or ways and works belonging to the said land, mines, and premises hereby demised and in actual use: And except and always further reserved unto Her Majesty, her heirs, successors, and assigns, all such parts and so much of the land hereby demised as may be required for making races, dams, public ways, canals, or railroads, in, over, and through the same, to be set out by the Governor for the time being of the colony of Victoria, or some other person by him authorised in that respect: And also excepting and reserving all gold and all sand, clay, stone, gravel, and indigenous timber, and all other materials the natural produce of the said land which may be required at any time or times hereafter for the construction or repair of any races, dams, public ways, bridges, canals, and railroads, or

any fences, embankments, sewers, or drains necessary for the same, together with the right of taking and removing all such materials; and also with the right of full and free ingress, egress, and regress, into, out of, and upon the said land, for the several purposes aforesaid: To have and to hold the said land and all and singular other the premises hereinbefore mentioned or referred to, and hereby demised, or expressed or intended so to be, with their and every of their appurtenances (except as aforesaid), unto the said lessee \_\_\_\_\_, h \_\_\_\_\_ executors, administrators, and assigns, from the day of the date hereof, for and during the full term of \_\_\_\_\_ years next ensuing, and fully to be complete and ended, to the intent that the same shall be used for the purpose of mining for \_\_\_\_\_: Yielding and paying therefor unto Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, during the said term, the yearly rent of Two shillings for every acre of the said land, such rent to be always paid in advance, and on non-payment in advance, to be distrained for, if deemed expedient; and the next payment thereof to be made on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_ next, and thereafter to be paid on the same day in every succeeding year (the payment thereof for the current year having been made on the day of the date of these presents): And also yielding and paying unto Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, during the said term, the further yearly rent of Two pounds sterling for every One hundred pounds worth or value, and so in proportion for any less quantity than One hundred pounds worth or value, of all \_\_\_\_\_ which shall be raised, gotten, or obtained from or out of the said land during the said term, such further rent to be paid quarterly on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_ the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, and the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_

in every year, the first payment thereof to be made on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_ next: And also yielding and paying unto Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, during the said term, in respect of every ore, metal, or mineral (other than gold and \_\_\_\_\_), which shall be raised, gotten, or obtained from or out of the said demised land, the yearly rent of One shilling for every acre of the said land, such lastmentioned rent to be paid yearly, and the first payment thereof to be made at the expiration of twelve calendar months from the commencement of working for such ores, metals, or minerals respectively, and thenceforth to be paid yearly on the same day in every succeeding year during the said term hereby granted: And also yielding and paying unto Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, during the said term, the further yearly rent of Two pounds sterling for every One hundred pounds worth or value, and so in proportion for any less quantity than One hundred pounds worth or value, of every ore, metal, or mineral (other than gold and \_\_\_\_\_), which shall be raised, gotten, or obtained from or out of the said demised land, such lastmentioned rent to be paid half-yearly, and the first half-yearly payment thereof to be made at the expiration of six calendar months from the commencement of working for such ores, metals, or minerals respectively, and thenceforth to be paid half-yearly during the said term hereby granted: the said several and respective rents, or such of them as shall become payable, to be paid free from and clear of all present and future taxes, rates, and assessments, and all other charges and deductions whatsoever: Provided always, and it is hereby agreed and declared, that the worth or value of each ton of \_\_\_\_\_, and also of each ton of every other ore, metal, or mineral, which shall be raised, gotten, or obtained, from or out of the said demised land, shall be estimated as if the \_\_\_\_\_ or the ore, metal, or mineral, were sold at the pit's mouth; and such worth or value shall be ascertained, fixed, and determined from time to time by the government district mining surveyor or other government officer authorised or appointed in that behalf, whose determination shall be final and conclusive: And the said lessee, for h \_\_\_\_\_, h \_\_\_\_\_ heirs, executors, administrators, and assigns, do \_\_\_\_\_ by these presents

covenant with and to Her Majesty, her heirs, successors, and assigns, in manner following, that is to say, that the said lessee \_\_\_\_\_, h \_\_\_\_\_ executors, administrators, or assigns, shall and will pay the several and respective rents hereby reserved upon the days and times hereinbefore appointed for the payment thereof respectively, free and clear as aforesaid, according to the true intent and meaning of these presents: And shall and will at all times during the continuance of this demise, prepare and keep correct and proper plans or sections of all the workings, and of the actual condition of the mines and premises hereby demised, such plans to be upon such scale and in accordance with such directions as the district mining surveyor or other officer authorised or appointed in that behalf shall from time to time direct, and shall deliver on every \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_ and \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_

and in such state and condition shall and will at the end or other sooner determination of the said term deliver peaceable possession thereof, and of all and singular the premises hereby demised, to Her Majesty, her heirs, successors, or assigns, or to the warden or other officer authorised to receive possession thereof: And, further, that he, the said lessee, his executors, administrators, or assigns, will, at least one week prior to commencing any mining operations in or upon the said demised land for any ore, metal, or mineral (other than gold and silver), give notice in writing of his or their intention so to do, addressed, through the nearest commissioner of Crown lands or gold fields warden, to the commissioner of mines or mining minister for the time being of the said colony: And if gold shall be found to be associated with any other mineral or metal in the said land hereby demised, the said lessee, his executors, administrators, or assigns, shall forthwith give notice of the same, addressed, as aforesaid, through the nearest commissioner of Crown lands or gold fields warden, and will apply for and obtain a lease, in accordance with the Orders in Council regulating gold mining leases, before mining for gold in or upon or removing any discovered gold from off the said land hereby demised: [And further shall and will likewise observe, perform, fulfil, and keep the

further conditions, covenants and provisoes (if any) set forth and contained in the second schedule hereto]: And also, shall not nor will cut or use any timber growing upon the said land except for the purposes of the mining operations hereby contemplated, or for the domestic purposes of those engaged or employed thereon, and shall not nor will use or occupy, or permit to be used or occupied, the land hereby demised for any other than the said mining purposes, or the depasturage of cattle used in connection therewith, or the formation and cultivation of gardens and garden produce for the use of those so engaged or employed as aforesaid, but not for the purposes of sale or barter: And further that the said lessee, his executors, administrators, or licensed assigns shall not nor will assign, set over, mortgage, charge, or otherwise part with or encumber this present indenture of lease or the premises hereby demised, or any part or parts thereof or make any underlease of the premises hereby demised or of any part or parts thereof unto any person or persons whomsoever without the consent, in writing, of the person or persons authorised for the time being to grant leases of Crown lands for mining purposes first for that purpose under his or their hand or seal or hands and seals obtained: Provided also, and it is hereby expressly declared and agreed, that if the said lessee, his executors, administrators, or assigns shall at any time during the continuance of this demise refuse or neglect to observe or perform all or any of the conditions, covenants and provisoes hereinbefore on his part contained or referred to, then and in such case the said term hereby granted shall cease, determine and be void, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding: And it shall thereupon be lawful for Her Majesty, her heirs, successors, or assigns, or her or their agents or officers to enter forthwith into and upon the said demised premises and the same to re-possess and enjoy as fully and effectually as if these presents had not been made and executed: And it is hereby agreed and declared that in any such case it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, her heirs, successors, or assigns, and her or their agents or officers appointed in that behalf without any demand whatsoever to enter upon the said demised premises, and the said lessee and all persons claiming under him for ever, to expel and remove therefrom without any legal process whatsoever, and as effectually as any sheriff might do in case Her Majesty, her heirs, successors, or assigns had obtained judgment in ejectment for recovery of possession thereof, and a writ of *habere facias possessionem* or other process had issued on such judgment directed to such sheriff in due form of law; and that in case of such entry, and any action being brought or other proceedings taken for the same, by any person whomsoever, the defendants to such action may plead leave and license of the leave and license of the said lessee; and all persons claiming under them, or any of them, to Her Majesty, her heirs, successors, or assigns, and all persons acting therein by her or their or any of their order, for the entry or trespasses, or other matters to be complained of in such action or other proceeding.

#### THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF CHILTERN.

##### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that any district of the colony of Victoria, the area whereof should not exceed nine square miles, and which should contain a population of householders not less than three hundred, might, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be constituted a municipal district as thereafter mentioned, provided that no one point in any such area should be distant more than six miles from any other

point; and it was further enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than one hundred and fifty householders resident within any such district, praying that such district might be declared a municipal district under the said Act, to cause the substance and prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition, signed by an equal or greater number of householders resident within such locality, should have been delivered at the office of the Colonial Secretary within one month from the date of such publication) the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice aforesaid, might, if he should think fit, declare by Proclamation such locality a municipal district by a name to be mentioned in such Proclamation, and also by the same or any other Proclamation might define the limits and boundaries of such municipal district, and such limits and boundaries at any time thereafter in the same manner, on receipt of a similar petition, might vary and alter, but so as in no case, save as thereafter mentioned, to include within the limits or boundaries of such municipal district an area of more than nine square miles, and upon the publication of any such Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, such locality so defined should be deemed and taken to be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act: And whereas a petition for the purposes aforesaid has been presented to the Governor by the householders and landowners resident at and near Chiltern, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published as directed by the said Act, and no counter-petition has been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation declare that the district hereinafter described and named shall be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—

**THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF CHILTERN.**—Commencing at the north-west angle of the town reserve of Chiltern proper; thence by the north boundary of that township and the north boundary of the town reserve of Chiltern East, bearing east one hundred and sixty chains; on the east by the east boundary of Chiltern East and a line bearing south one hundred and twelve chains fifty links to the north boundary of suburban lands, parish of Chiltern, and by that north boundary and a line bearing west one hundred and sixty chains; thence by a line and the west boundary of Chiltern proper, bearing north one hundred and twelve chains fifty links to the point of commencement.

And I do hereby, with the advice aforesaid, direct that the council of the said municipal district shall be called by the name and style of "The Municipal Council of Chiltern."

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this tenth day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and in the twenty-fifth year of Her Majesty's reign.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

SAILING DIRECTIONS FOR THE EASTERN ENTRANCE INTO WESTERN PORT, AND FOR THE ANCHORAGES OFF CAPE WOLLAMAI AND THE EAST END OF PHILLIP ISLAND.

THE eastern passage into Western Port has recently been surveyed, and its hidden dangers and prominent points marked by beacons and buoys.

Vessels in the neighborhood desirous of entering Western Port, or seeking shelter and unable to fetch the western entrance, need not lose ground by running back round Wilson's Promontory, but in any weather, if the S.E. point of Cape Wollamai can be seen, may with confidence steer for the eastern passage, where good anchorage, easy of access, sheltered from all winds, will be found for vessels drawing fourteen (14) feet.

Vessels of larger tonnage and heavier draught, up to eighteen (18) feet, can lie in the deep water anchorage, to the S.E. of Black Reef, sheltered from all winds except S.E. gales. Vessels drawing twelve (12) feet can go through the passage into Western Port at high water.

## DESCRIPTION OF THE WEST SIDE OF THE PASSAGE.

**Cape Wollamai.**—The S.E. end of Phillip Island lies E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S. twenty-two miles from Cape Schanck, is a high steep wedge-shaped granite headland, sloping towards the N.W., of a red color, and is the highest land near the coast.

A rocky ledge, awash, lies about a cable's length off the pitch of the cape, upon which the sea breaks heavily in bad weather.

A small sunken rock, which only shows awash at low water, lies about a cable's length and a half to the northward of the S.E. part of the cape, and half a cable's length off shore.

**Red Point** is the northernmost part of the western head of the entrance, is about fifty feet high, and composed of bare red granite boulders with a small patch of trees on the rising ground to the westward of it, and may be known by a square open-framed wooden beacon, colored black, standing forty (40) feet from the water's edge. About two cables' length to the southward of the black beacon, an isolated square block of granite, colored white, juts out from the other rocks close to the water's edge.

**Black Reef.**—This reef divides the outer from the inner anchorage, and runs out N. by E. a cable's length from the N.W. end of the sandy bight inside of Red Point. About twenty fathoms N. by W. from the end of the reef lies a rocky patch thirty (30) feet in diameter, with three feet over it and twelve feet between it and the reef. A pillar beacon, surmounted by a black ball, is placed on the middle of the patch, with the following bearings:—

Red Point, S.E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E. 5 $\frac{1}{2}$  cables' length.  
Sandy Peak, S.W. by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W.

**Sandy Peak** is the highest and most southerly of the sand hills on the east end of Phillip Island. The peak is steep, well defined, and marked by a cross beacon on the top, and is a good mark for the anchorage.

**Woody Point.**—The north-eastern end of Phillip Island is low, and covered with trees. It forms the western side of the inner heads, and bears N.  $\frac{3}{4}$  W. two miles and one-tenth from Red Point.

**Middle Rocks** are two isolated flat rocks; the easternmost is the largest, being about one hundred and twenty feet long and thirty feet broad, and marked by a pillar beacon and black ball. These rocks cover at half tide, and lie about a quarter of a cable's length east from Woody Point, with five fathoms close alongside of the easternmost.

An extensive mud flat, which partly dries at low water, stretches out from Woody Point into the passage in a south and south-west direction, and into Western Port, N.N.E., about a mile, trending away in a W.N.W. direction upwards of four miles. The southern end is marked by a pillar beacon and black ball, with the following bearings:—

Davis Point, E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N.  
Sandy Peak, S. by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W.

The south-east and north ends inside of Western Port are marked by two black buoys, and the eastern edge of the flat by three black cross beacons. The following are the bearings of the buoys:—

East buoy, in seven feet	{ White house on Church Hill Island, W. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. Hut on Woody Point, S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.
North buoy, in ten feet	

## DESCRIPTION OF THE EAST SIDE OF THE PASSAGE.

**Griffith Point.**—The S.W. part of the mainland; is a sandstone bluff, about seventy (70) feet high, and bare of trees for some distance inland. A rocky ledge runs out S.W. about two cables' length from the point. The extensive sandbank, which partly blocks up the eastern passage, having only four feet of water over it in most places, stretches out from Griffith Point upwards of three-quarters of a mile to the S.W. and westward. The S.W. tongue lies about two cables N.E. from Red Point, with four feet over it, and two and three fathoms close to its edge. In bad weather, especially during ebb tide, the sea always breaks over the edge of the bank, which dries in patches at the north end.

**White Beacon Patch** lies N.W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W. one mile from Red Point; is a small rocky patch on the west end of the sand, with three feet over it, and two fathoms close to the western end; is marked by a pillar beacon and white ball.

The N.W. end of the sand is marked by a white cask buoy, moored in 12 feet, with the following bearings:—

Sandy Peak, just open to the westward of white beacon, S. by W.  
Griffith Point ... .. E. by S.

**Davis Point.**—The westernmost part of the main land is low, sandy, and wooded to water's edge; it forms the eastern side of the inner head; a long mud flat extends from it in a N.E. direction. The N.W. part, on which there is a heap of loose stones, is marked by a pillar beacon with white ball; the edge of the channel, to the north of the flat, is marked by three white cross beacons placed in five feet water, bearing from each other N. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E. and S. by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W.

The coal shaft recently opened lies N.E. three-quarters of a mile from Davis Point, close to the water's edge. Should coal be found in large quantities, there is excellent shelter for vessels to lie and load up to sixteen feet within three cables' lengths of the shaft.

## DESCRIPTION OF THE ANCHORAGES.

The distance between the N.E. part of Cape Wollamai (Red Point) and Griffith Point is about a mile.

The navigable channel into Western Port and the anchorages is between these points close over towards Cape Wollamai at its south-east end, and close to Davis Point at its north end.

The deep water anchorage is to the N.W. of Red Point, between the south-western edge of the sand and the sandy bight off the east end of Phillip Island; the available anchorage space is two cables broad and about half a mile long, in three and four fathoms sandy bottom.

The inner anchorage is further to the northward, past Black Reef beacon, is from two to three cables broad, and about a mile and a half long, with from fifteen to twenty feet water, sandy and mud bottom.

## DIRECTIONS FOR ENTERING THE DEEP WATER ANCHORAGE.

After rounding the south-east end of Cape Wollamai, haul in to the northward for Red Point, keeping a look out for the tail of the sand, taking care to be within a cable's length of the point before it is brought to bear S.W. to clear the sand spit which lies N.E. two cables' length from Red Point, passing which you may anchor midway between it and Black Reef beacon keeping as close to the island side as the depth of water will admit. The soundings signal gradually from eight fathoms off the S.E. part of Cape Wollamai to three fathoms close to Red Point and the tail of the sand.

If bound to the inner anchorage, after passing Red Point keep midway between Black Reef beacon and the western edge of the sand, where the channel is only a cable's length broad, but widens out immediately you are past the reef, to the N.W. of which you will find good shelter going as close in shore as the depth will permit; or after passing reef beacon steer N.W. half a mile, keeping the white beacon a little on the starboard bow, giving it a berth of half a cable's length in passing, and anchor midway between it and the white buoy; or you can run to the northward of the white buoy and anchor between it and Davis Point. The channel here is over three cables' length wide and gives more room for getting under weigh again.

Vessels drawing twelve feet can, by choosing a proper time of tide, enter Western Port by the eastern passage, but they should wait at the inner anchorage until nearly slack water, as the tide runs with great force through the narrows up to the north black buoy.

The navigable channel above Woody Point through the mud flats, which has been beached off, has not over seven feet at low water at its northern and southern ends.

The directions already given for the inner anchorage will take vessels bound into Western Port up to Davis Point, which may be passed within twenty fathoms, and a course shaped for the south black buoy, bearing from Davis Point N.N.E. 6-10 of a mile, pass to the eastward of it about half a cable's length when haul to the N.W. towards the edge of the mud flat off Woody Point, and when you open the northernmost white beacon to the westward of the other two stand up N.N.E. midway between them and the black beacons until past the northernmost black buoy, when you are clear of the mud flats. If bound towards Observation Point, a N.W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N. course four and a half miles will carry you to it, keeping in three fathoms.

A small rocky patch with only three feet on it lies E. by N.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N. about three-quarters of a mile from the north black buoy, and a mile N.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N. from Anderson's Bluff. The patch is marked by a black and red chequered buoy.



Vessels within Western Port, and bound to sea through the eastern passage, after passing Observation Point, may steer S.E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S. for the north black buoy, keeping in three fathoms until close up to the buoy, give it a berth of half a cable's length in passing, and steer to the southward between the white and black beacons, hauling gradually to the eastward before passing the last black beacon. Leave the south black buoy on the starboard hand, steering about S.W. by S. through the narrows, keeping close over to Davis Point, and when Griffith Point bears E. by S.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S. haul out south for half a mile, and round white beacon patch; thence steer about S.E. by E. out to sea, keeping about half a cable's length from the western edge of the sand, leaving the beacons on Black Reef and Red Point on the starboard hand.

*Tides.*—It is high water at full and change at Woody Point at 12.50. Springs rise about eight feet, and neaps about five. The tide runs with great force all through the passage, especially at the narrows, and between the Black Reef and the western edge of the sand. Vessels at anchor would do well to run a keel out to keep them from fouling.

Excellent fresh water can be obtained at all times close to the fisherman's hut, just inside of Red Point.

All bearings are magnetic, and soundings low water spring tides.

The petitioners state that they are resident landholders and householders in the locality hereinafter described, and known as "Brown's and Scarsdale," in the parish of Scarsdale, which they are desirous should be erected into a municipal district.

That there are between 5000 and 6000 inhabitants in the proposed district, most of whom are engaged in mining, commercial, and agricultural pursuits, and are located at Brown's, Scarsdale, and Black Hill, and that there is, besides, a large number of scattered habitations, the occupants of which it is desirable to include, and thus to secure to all the comforts and advantages derivable from centralization.

That the locality is well adapted for agriculture, and if rendered available by division into allotments of from half an acre to five acres or more will be capable of producing cereals and vegetables at present imported from other localities, and that the saving anticipated from such an arrangement might be applied to municipal requirements.

That the elements of wealth, such as a large and increasing population, a genial soil, and mineral productiveness, are here concentrated; that 325 acres are held under mining leases at a rental of £1625; and that there are 35 steam-engines in operation, which, with their appliances, are valued at £50,000; fifteen commodious hotels, a large number of mercantile establishments of a costly description, comfortable dwellings, a considerable

number of horses and cattle, and a weekly yield of about 1500 ounces of gold.

That the greatest inconvenience experienced by the petitioners arises from want of roads, there being but ten chains of made road in the district, and the intercourse with surrounding localities constant and frequent, and that the prices of articles of necessity are enhanced through the hazards and delay inseparable from bad roads.

Lastly, the petitioners are stimulated to improve the surrounding lines of communication by the anticipation that their district will become the entrepôt between the western district and the sea-board *via* the Ballarat and Geelong Railway.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—"Your petitioners seeing the manifold advantages of municipal institutions in other districts believe that similar results would follow the extension of the Municipal Act to theirs, and they therefore most humbly pray your Excellency to proclaim the area herein described as 'The municipal district of Brown's and Scarsdale,' [viz.]—commencing at the south-east corner of the Smythesdale municipality; thence west along the south boundary of the said municipality one hundred and twenty chains; thence by a continuation of the same line sixty chains; thence south three hundred and twenty chains; thence east one hundred and eighty chains, running partly along the north boundary of Brown's pre-emptive right; thence north three hundred and twenty chains to the commencing point aforesaid, the whole area being nine square miles."

TWELFTH HALF-YEARLY REPORT, 11TH JULY, 1861, TO 10TH JANUARY, 1862.

**PUBLIC WORKS.**

THE works completed during the half-year or now in progress are:—

Earthwork formation and roadways in Mollison street, Water street, Sheepwash road, McIvor road, Kennedy street, McCrae street, Arnold street, Mundy street extension, Williamson street extension, McLaren street, Forest street, and High street B.

Kerbing and channelling in McIvor road, McCrae street, Dowling street, Rowan street, Forest street, Bernal street. Flagging Pall Mall and High street.

Bridge, &c., over creek at View Point. Additions to lock-up, graveling roads, &c., clearing dead timber in reserve, improvement to cattle yards, manure pits, with other minor works, and the general maintenance of existing works, at a total cost of £6655 4s. 6d.

The expenditure for lighting, sweeping, prevention of fires, and for the board of health has amounted to £1448 4s. 10d. for the half-year.

**BYE-LAWS PASSED.**

No. 32. For further regulation of Sandhurst Market.—Not assented to.

No. 33. For striking a rate of One shilling in the pound for the year 1861.

**FINANCE.**

The sum of £4051 8s. 4d. has been received from the Government as grant-in-aid, making a total for the current year of £6012 18s. 9d.; and £1500 has also been paid by the Road and Bridge's Department towards the construction of the new channel, culvert, &c., at View Point.

A special grant, for expenditure on public gardens, of £150 has also been received. At the commencement of the half-year, in consequence of decreased value of farming produce, &c., the council reduced the tariff of market and weighbridge tolls about 30 per cent., but they are happy to state without reducing the gross amount of income, which has not only been maintained but increased.

The income from the cattle market and abattoirs, the council are happy to state, has exceeded their expectations. It was thought that, at the commencement, the receipts could not meet the expenditure, but the accounts show a favorable balance of about £100 for the half-year after paying all expenses.

**MISCELLANEOUS.**

At the request of the Commissioners for the Victorian Exhibition, and contributions to the forthcoming International Exhibition in London, the council undertook to forward contributions from Sandhurst, which it appeared would otherwise not be represented.

In October the district was honored by a visit from His Excellency the Governor, and the council deemed it their duty to make such arrangements for the reception of His Excellency as loyalty and the dignity of the town required.

**ELECTIONS.**

On the 3rd September, Councillor Casey resigned the chairmanship of the council, and Councillor Strickland was elected chairman in his place.

In December, Dr. Cruickshank was elected health officer for the municipality—a salary of £50 per annum being attached to the office.

Mr. Williams, who was a councillor at the commencement of the half-year, having resigned, Councillor Lowe was elected in his room, on the 14th September, without opposition.

Mr. Tufts was appointed town surveyor on the 22nd July. The balance sheet contains in detail the various works carried on in the district.

The statistics of the municipality were forwarded to the Exhibition, and the half-yearly health reports have been duly prepared.

The Newtown and Chilwell Council have been reminded that it would be necessary to make arrangements for the appropriation of the tolls at their new bridge, and that council replied they were prepared to do so ere the bridge was opened.

Application was made to Government to lay off the junction of the Germantown and Colac roads. The Government, in declining, left it to the council to do it themselves out of the toll fund.

A deputation to the Government, and considerable correspondence has been taken, with regard to the Mount Pleasant and Lower Barrabool road. The council originally asked permission to appropriate a portion of the toll fund to the improvement of the Mount Pleasant road. This was declined on the ground that the lower road was the proclaimed main road. The council then asked that the upper road might be proclaimed the main road. The subject is still under consideration.

An application has been made for an additional grant of land, adjoining the Queen's Garden, for the purpose of a zoological garden.

The use of the council room has been granted to various ministers for holding religious service on Sundays.

Councillor Mackenzie has attended, in Melbourne, at meetings of the Municipal Conference Committee.

The Conewarre Road Board have granted permission to the council to use their quarry to procure stone for the roads.

A petition was presented to the honorable the Legislative Assembly, praying for the speedy completion of the Geelong and Ballarat Railway.

Bye-law No. 20, for making an assessment and imposing a rate, has been sanctioned and duly gazetted, and the rate is now being collected.

Amended rules and regulations, determining the number of cattle or horses each inhabitant is allowed to turn out on the common, have also been approved of and gazetted.
