THE HORSHAM ROAD DISTRICT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander, of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet, and as to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portion of the district of the Wimmera hereinafter defined shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:-

Commencing at the most northern point of the River Glenelg; thence by a line north-westerly to a point on the western boundary of the province three miles north-east of Lake Cadmita; thence north by the western boundary of the province to a point sixty-six miles south of the River Murray; thence east to the eastern boundary of the electoral district of the Wimmera; and thence by the eastern and southern boundaries of the electoral district of the Wimmera to the commencing point. And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Horsham Road District."

THE PENTRIDGE ROAD DISTRICT ALTERED.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander, of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the twenty-first day of January, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, the boundaries of "The Pentridge Road District" were defined as therein mentioned: And whereas it is deemed necessary and advisable to alter the boundaries of such district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke so much of the said Proclamation as defines the bound-

aries of the said district; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby proclaim and declare that from henceforth the said Pentridge Road District shall be and comprise so much of the county of Bourke as is included within the area hereinafter described, that is to say:-

Commencing at the south-western angle of section CXXXIII., in the parish of Jika-jika; thence due east to the Merri Creek; thence by that creek to the southern boundary of the village reserve of Pentridge; thence by the southern and eastern boundaries of the said reserve to the south-east angle of section CXLVIII.; thence by the eastern boundary of the said section to its north-east angle; thence due west to the Moonee Ponds; and thence southerly by the said Moonee Ponds to the commencing point.

LAND TO BE PERMANENTLY RESERVED AND GRANTED.

IT is hereby notified, in pursuance of the 87th section of the Act 24 Victoria No. 117, that, upon the expiration of one month from the date hereof, it is the intention of the Governor in Council to permanently reserve the land hereinafter described, and that thereupon the said land will be granted to trustees in accordance with the 5th clause of the said Act, viz.:-

LAND TO BE GRANTED TO THE COLLINGWOOD, FITZ ROY, AND DISTRICT GAS AND COKE COMPANY.—All that piece or parcel of land situate in the parish of Jika-jika, in the county of Bourke, and colony of Victoria, and containing by admeasurement three acres, be the same more or less: Commencing at the point of intersection of the north side of a Government road three chains wide, called Reilly street, with the west side of another Government road, one chain wide, called Smith street; bounded on the south by Reilly street aforesaid, extending west from said point of intersection along Reilly street aforesaid four hundred and twenty-five links; then extending in a line at right angles to the last line bearing north seven hundred and six links, and bounded on the west by Gore street, one chain wide; then extending in a line at right angles to the last line bearing east four hundred and twenty-five links, and bounded on the north by other Government land; then extending in a line at right angles to the last line bearing south seven hundred and six links to the commencing point, and bounded on the east by Smith street aforesaid.—(62.F.978.)

The mortality of Melbourne and suburbs advanced from 322 deaths, or a daily average of 10.39 in December, 1861, to 401 deaths, or a daily average of 12.93 in January, 1862. The latter rate, although high, is less than that of January, 1860, by 27 deaths, and lower than that of January, 1861, by no fewer than 68 deaths.

The mean temperature during the month was 68° against 68.7° in January, 1860, and against 67.2° in January, 1861. The thermometer rose to 105° in the shade on the 13th, and at 3 p.m. on the 14th it reached to 111.2°, which was the maximum of the month. The lowest point reached was 47.8° at 4 a.m. on the 23rd, the range for the month thus being 63.4°. The greatest daily range of temperature (49.8°) was on the 13th, from a maximum of 105° to a minimum of 55.2°, and the least (8.4°) was on the 16th, from a maximum of 65° to a minimum of 56.6°. The mean daily range was 24.24°. The mean height of the barometer during the month was 29.797 in. against 29.827 in. for the same month in 1860, and against 29.798 in. for the same month in 1861. The greatest pressure (30.232 in.) was at 9 a.m. on the 24th, and the least (29.235 in.) was at 8 p.m. on the 21st. The range of pressure for the month thus being .997 in.

The mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality for the first four weeks in January, were as follow:—

Of the 401 deaths which occurred during the month, 219, or rather less than 55 per cent. were of males, and 182, or rather over 45 per cent. were of females. The deaths of children under five exceeded those of persons above that age by 145, the numbers being relatively 273 and 128, and the proportions 68 and 32 per cent. In December the same proportions were respectively 57 and 43 per cent. In January, 1860, they were 73 and 27 per cent., and in January, 1861, they were 71 and 29 per cent. The large number of 28 deaths, 22 of which were of children under five years of age, occurred on the 14th, which was the latter of the two remarkably hot days already alluded to. On the succeeding day, the 15th, 21 deaths also occurred, 14 of which

were of children under five. The next highest numbers occurring on one day were 17 on the 18th, and 16 on the 12th, 13th, 26th, and 29th.

The oldest persons who died during the month were, a male at 81 years of age, of disease of the kidneys, and a female aged 77 years, of disease of the heart.

Of the violent deaths which occurred during the month the following are the particulars:—A groom of 70 years of age was killed by a kick from a horse. A medical man 41 years of age, a carpenter 29 years old, and a boy aged 7 years, were accidentally drowned, and a male aged 35 years, occupation unknown, was found in the water and supposed to have been also drowned. A laborer of 40 years, and a boy of 10 years of age, died of fractures of the skull. Four females, two of them being adults aged 40 and 22 years, and two of them children aged 12 and 13 years, died of burns, and two female infants, each of them being two months old, were accidentally suffocated.

The following deaths occurred during the month in charitable institutions:—Melbourne Hospital, 44; Immigrants' Home, 9; Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 5; Benevolent Asylum, 1; Lying-in Hospital, 1: making a total of 60 deaths, or 15 per cent, of the entire number recorded in the month.

Of the 273 children under five years of age who died during the month, 142, or 52 per cent., were males, and 131, or 48 per cent., were females; 186 were under a year old, 65 were between one and two years, 10 between two and three, 6 between three and four and 6 between four and five years.

Of the 128 deaths which occurred to persons above five years of age, 77, or 60 per cent., were of males, and 51, or 40 per cent., of females; 10 were persons between five years and ten, 5 between ten and fifteen, 4 between fifteen and twenty, 11 between twenty and twenty-five, 18 between twenty-five and thirty, 19 between thirty and thirty-five, 12 between thirty-five and forty, 17 between forty and forty-five, 6 between forty-five and fifty, 6 between fifty and fifty-five, 6 between fifty-five and sixty, 5 between sixty and sixty-five, 3 between sixty-five and seventy, 3 between seventy and seventy-five, 2 seventy-five years and upwards, and 1 whose age was not specified.

It will be observed that in this report the diseases are classified upon a different system from that hitherto adopted. This change has been made in order to assimilate the classification with that recently accepted in England, so as to enable comparisons to be readily made between the returns published in Victoria and those which emanate from the Registrar General of England.

On comparing the causes of death in the above table with those given in the report for December, it is seen that the numbers under the zymotic head increased from 70 to 133, and their proportions to the total from 22 to 33 per cent. The deaths from diarrhoea and dysentery alone augmented from 50 to 84, and those from scarlatina and diphtheria increased from 2 to 11. Of rheumatism, which is now classed as a zymotic disease, but which in previous reports was treated as a disease of the organs of locomotion, one death occurred.

In reviewing the deaths from sporadic diseases, it will be observed that of phthisis, which was formerly classified as a disease of the respiratory system, but which now appears under the class constitutional, order tubercular, 35 deaths occurred against 30 in December. It will also be noticed that tabes mesenterica, of which 5 deaths occurred against 6 in December, has been transferred from diseases of the digestive organs to the same class and order as phthisis. Atrophy and debility in infants caused 57 deaths against 48 in December. These causes of death, so common in the summer months, now appear under the class, developmental diseases, order, diseases of nutrition, instead of under diseases of uncertain seat as heretofore. The other diseases do not call for special remark. A little study will serve to make the new classification familiar, and to indicate its superiority over the one previously in use both in England and Victoria.

MUNICIPALITY OF ESSENDON AND FLEMINGTON.

BYE-LAW No. 2.—FOR MAKING AN ASSESSMENT AND IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND FOR THE CURRENT MUNICIPAL YEAR, COMMENCING 27TH DECEMBER, 1861, AND ENDING 27TH DECEMBER, 1862.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is authorised and required to assess all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district (except property belonging to Her Majesty) according to its fair average annual value, and to impose a rate on all such properties for the current municipal year: And whereas the council of the municipal district of Essendon and Flemington has caused a valuation of all rateable property within the said district to be made for the purpose of assessing the same, and which said value, after all objections have been heard, amounts to the sum of Sixteen thousand five hundred and seventy-five pounds twelve shillings and sixpence (£16,575 12s. 6d.): Be it therefore ordered and directed by the said municipal council of Essendon and Flemington, that the said valuation or assessment be confirmed, and that a rate of One shilling in the pound for the current municipal year, commencing 27th December, 1861, and ending 27th December, 1862, on the said annual value of the said respective properties, be and the same is hereby imposed and levied.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 2, made by the municipal council of Essendon and Flemington, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF MALMSBURY.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—A BYE-LAW TO REGULATE, BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS, THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF MALMSBURY.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 16, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, section 26, it is enacted that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Malmsbury, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the proceedings and business of the said council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be called the Standing Orders of the said council.

CHAP. I.—Order of Proceeding.

1. That the sittings of this council shall on all ordinary occasions be open to the public; but any councillor may require the exclusion of strangers while the sense of the council is taken as to whether the question proposed shall be discussed with closed doors.
2. The business of the council shall commence with a quorum. If at the expiration of thirty minutes from the time of the meeting there is no quorum, no business shall be transacted, and the names of the councillors present shall be recorded in the minutes.
3. An attendance book shall be kept, and any councillor not being present within half an hour of the time specified for the meeting, such councillor's name shall not be inserted in the attendance book, nor as an attendant at such meeting in the half-yearly report.
4. If the chairman be not present one quarter of an hour after the time appointed for the meeting of the council, a councillor shall be elected to preside as chairman for the time being.
5. At every regular meeting of the council the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting for confirmation the minutes of any preceding meetings, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes, when confirmed, shall be signed by the chairman for the time being.
6. That after the confirmation of the minutes the order of business shall be as follows (unless by special permission of the council for greater convenience):—

Order of Business.

- I. Reading of copies of letters sent by authority of the council.
- II. Reading letters and accounts received, and considering and ordering thereon.
- III. Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
- IV. Reading and ordering on reports of permanent committees.
- V. Reading and ordering on reports of special committees.
- VI. Reading and ordering on reports of deputations.
- VII. Orders of the day, including subjects arising from proceedings of former meetings.
- VIII. Motions of which previous notice has been given.
- IX. Notices of motion.

7. All communications by letter, intended for the council, shall be made and addressed to the town clerk; and all petitions and memorials shall be addressed to the chairman and council under cover to the town clerk.

8. No motion shall be decided on at any meeting of the council unless notice, in writing, signed by the councillor proposing, shall have been given at the previous meeting of the council; nor shall any report of committee be decided on unless similar notice be given, unless in committee of the whole council, or the whole council be present.

9. If in the report of a committee there are distinct recommendations contained, such report shall not be adopted until notice has been given of the several recommendations and the sense of the council taken separately upon each.

10. The order of the day shall include all business of which due notice has been given, and all matters arising out of former meetings of the council.

11. No notice entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the councillor who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called on in order.

12. No bye-law shall be decided on without due notice (as in cases of motions), and copy of proposed bye-laws shall be open in the council chamber for inspection of all ratepayers, free of charge, or of any person duly qualified to vote at elections under the Act.

13. All business shall be considered in the order in which notice thereof was given.

CHAP. II.—Order of Debate.

1. Any councillor, upon proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the chairman, and no councillor shall be interrupted unless by a call to order, when he shall sit down; the member calling to order shall then be heard, and the question decided before the subject is resumed, or any other business entered upon.

2. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, unless by way of explanation merely, or in reply as the mover of an original motion, or upon any amendment; and after such explanation or reply, the question shall forthwith be put to the vote.

3. Any councillor proposing a motion or an amendment must state the nature of it before addressing the council.

4. If more than one councillor rise at one time, the chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to pre-eminence.

5. No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion nor impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.

6. The chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case, without argument or comment, and his decision as to what is order or explanation shall be final.

7. The chairman shall rise when addressing the council in discussion of any question.

8. Any councillor may demand the production of any of the documents of the council relating to the subject under discussion.

9. Only one amendment shall be discussed at one time, and upon the adoption of any amendment the original motion shall be deemed rejected, and the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.

10. The chairman shall, on taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the votes of all councillors shall be entered on the minutes.

11. The council shall vote by show of hands, except in cases of elections.

12. No proposition once brought before the council shall be withdrawn without leave of the council, nor shall any proposition be entertained by the council until the same be seconded.

13. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion of adjournment; but if the question be negatived, the next motion or order of the day shall be considered before the question of adjournment shall be again entertained; provided the motion be carried, any business left undecided shall take precedence at the next meeting of council in its proper order.

14. Any councillor may record his protest against any decision of the council, provided the same be made in writing before the next meeting of the council, and couched in respectful language, and be consistent with truth. Notice of such intention, however, must be given on the adoption of the resolution.

15. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the council which shall have been negatived by the council shall be again entertained during the same municipal year.

16. Notices of motion to come on after the orders of the day, when the councillor giving a notice of motion may read it only, no comments to be made thereon.

17. Any councillor who shall use expressions capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, shall, if required by the council, withdraw such expressions, and make a satisfactory apology to the council.

18. When in consequence of disorderly conduct the chairman shall call upon any councillor by name, such councillor shall withdraw as soon as he has been heard in explanation; and after such councillor's withdrawal, the council shall at once take the case into consideration.

19. Any councillor may require the town clerk to take down any particular words used by a councillor, immediately upon the same being used.

20. A question may be superseded—1st, by the adjournment of the council, on the motion of a councillor "That the council do now adjourn;" 2nd, by the previous question, viz., "That this question be now put," being proposed and negatived.

21. If a debate on any order of the day, or on a motion, be interrupted by the council being counted out, such order of the day or motion may be restored to the notice paper, and the debate thereupon resumed at the next meeting of council at the point where it was so interrupted.

CHAP. III.—Elections.

1. No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until five clear days' notice shall have been given in one or more of the local newspapers, inviting applications or tenders for the same.

2. At all such elections and on all occasions of taking tenders or contracts, the voting shall be on cards or papers to be provided for the purpose, on which each councillor shall write the name of the party or candidate he supports, and the chairman shall then declare the result of such voting.

3. Every application for appointment or tender for work shall be delivered, sealed, and endorsed outside, "Application" or "Tender," stating also the nature of the office applied for or work tendered for; and no application or tender shall be received after the hour specified in the advertisement, and the number received shall be declared before opening any one of them by the chairman.

4. All contracts, specifications, bonds, or other documents relative to works to be done by or for the municipal council, must be brought up and approved by the council before they be signed and executed.

CHAP. IV.—Miscellaneous Regulations.

1. For the consideration of any bye-law, or for the raising or appropriating of money, or for the objects contemplated in the standing order No. 15, chap. ii., it shall be competent for any councillor, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any such subject at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given in the notice paper of the day, or notice of motion for which call was made, is set down for consideration; and any member not in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes under consideration, or not in attendance at the voting upon such question, or any amendment thereof, whether of adjournment or otherwise, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council.

2. The town clerk shall have the charge of the common seal of the corporation, and shall be responsible for the safe custody and proper use of the same, each impression thereof being duly verified by the signature of that officer.

3. The town clerk shall affix the municipal seal to contracts, bonds, and licenses requiring the same, and to all bye-laws and addresses to the Governor passed by the council; but he shall not affix it to any other municipal document without the authority of the council.

4. The town clerk shall not affix the common seal to any corporate document without the express order of the council, nor unless such document bears the signature of the chairman.

5. Any one or more of the standing orders of the council, except No. 15, chap. ii., and No. 1, chap. iv., may be suspended pro tempore in case of emergency, provided that the majority present deem it necessary.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 1, made by the municipal council of Malmesbury, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF PORTLAND.

BYE-LAW No. 21.—FOR IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND FOR THE YEAR 1862.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to impose a rate on all houses and lands within the limits of such district according to the fair average annual value thereof, such rate not to exceed the sum of two shillings in the pound: Be it therefore enacted by the council for the municipal district of Portland, that a rate for the current year of One shilling in the pound on all rateable property within the limits of the municipal district of Portland be imposed and levied.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 21, made by the municipal council of Portland, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

ARARAT DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.

STANDING ORDERS.

THE business of the board shall be conducted with open doors.

2. The board shall commence business at the time stated in the circular, or as soon after as a quorum shall be present.

3. The presence of five members shall constitute a quorum.

4. If at the expiration of thirty minutes after the time specified in the circular for the meeting of the board there be not a quorum, such meeting shall stand adjourned until the next usual day of meeting, and such circumstance, together with the names of the members present, shall be recorded on the minutes.

5. Special meetings may be called by the chairman, or by any two members, by giving not less than three days' notice to each member of the board; and the business intended to be introduced at such special meeting shall in all cases be stated in such notice. All notices to be given through the secretary.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

6. The first business at all general meetings of the board shall be the reading of the minutes of any preceding meeting not previously confirmed, in order to their confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record.

7. The correspondence to be read.

8. Memorials to be presented.

9. Reports of committees to be read.

10. No discussion shall be allowed upon the correspondence, memorials, or reports, until the orders of the day have been disposed of, and should any correspondence, memorials, or reports remain unconsidered at that meeting, they shall become orders of the day for next meeting.

11. The secretary shall report—

1st. Banker's balance.

2nd. Liabilities incurred.

3rd. Balance in hands of collector.

4th. Amount of rates collected since last meeting.

12. Orders of the day shall include all business left incomplete at a former meeting, and all matters of which due notice has been given, and such orders of the day as arise out of former proceedings shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in the minute-book.

13. When the business arising out of the orders of the day shall have been concluded, notices of motion for the next meeting of the board, containing the name of the proposer and the form of the motion, may be handed to the secretary, which shall be entered by him in a book kept for that purpose.

14. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with, unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called on. Notices not so proceeded with shall be struck out.

15. All notices of motion must be handed to the secretary not less than six days previous to the meeting of the board at which the same shall be taken into consideration; such notices to be stated in the circular calling the meeting, and to take their turn for consideration in the regular order. A member giving notice of any motion may authorise any other member of the board to bring forward the subject on his behalf, in case of sickness or unavoidable absence.

PAYMENTS.

16. All payments shall be made by cheque, signed by the chairman and one other member of the board, and countersigned by the secretary; and no such cheque shall be given unless passed at a regular meeting of the board.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

17. Any member desirous of proposing a motion or amendment, or of discussing any matter under consideration, must rise and address the chairman; and no member when speaking shall be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down, in which case the member calling to order shall be heard thereon in preference to any other speaker, and the question of order shall be disposed of before the subject is resumed or any other subject entered upon.

18. The chairman, in deciding a point of order, shall state the rule applicable to the case, and his decision thereon shall be final.

19. No member may speak to any question after the same shall have been put by the chairman to the meeting.

20. When two or more members rise to speak, the chairman shall call upon the member who, in his opinion, first rose in his place.

21. A member may speak once to any question before the board, and upon any amendment proposed thereto, and upon a question or amendment to be proposed by himself, or upon a question of order arising out of the debate, but not otherwise.

22. A member merely seconding a proposition shall not be held to have spoken upon it, the mover only shall have the right of reply.

23. No member shall digress from the subject under discussion or impute improper motives to others, and all personal reflections upon any member shall be considered as highly disorderly, and any member making use of such offensive expressions, and not explaining or retracting them, shall be censured by the board.

24. Any motion not proceeded with when duly called in the order of business, either by the member giving notice thereof, or some one deputed by him, shall be struck out.

25. Every member giving notice of motion shall read it aloud, and deliver to the secretary a copy of such notice, together with his name and the day for bringing on such notice.

26. Any motion not seconded shall not be further debated, but shall lapse.

27. The mover of any motion may withdraw the same before it is seconded, by permission of the chairman; but should such motion be seconded, such leave can only be given if there be no negative voice.

28. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the board, shall be entertained during the same year, unless a call of the whole board has been duly made for that purpose.

No call shall be made for any day earlier than fourteen days, and notice of such call shall be served at least ten days before the day appointed for such call.

29. As soon as the debate upon a question shall be concluded, the chairman shall put the question distinctly and audibly.

30. The question being put, shall be resolved in the affirmative or negative by a show of hands.

31. A question having been proposed, may be amended by leaving out, substituting, or adding words, and such amendments shall be resolved by a majority of votes.

32. An amendment proposed, but not seconded, will not be entertained.

33. When an amendment has been carried it shall be held to have quashed, and to stand in the place of, the original motion.

34. When the amendment has been lost, the original question shall be put; and, in all cases where the voting is not unanimous, division lists shall be kept by the secretary.

35. No second amendment shall be put until the first shall have been disposed of.

36. Any member may require the secretary to take down any particular words used by a member immediately upon the same being used.

37. The chairman shall, upon taking the vote upon any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative, and he may do so as often as it may be necessary to enable him to declare his opinion from the show of hands as to which party has the majority.

38. The board shall vote in all cases by show of hands, except in the election of officers, in which case the voting shall be by ballot.

39. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the board; but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the board.

40. Members may, of right, require the production of any of the documents of the board which may bear upon the subject under discussion.

41. No member or officer of the board shall be allowed to contract for any work to be done for or in connection with the board, nor be received as security for any contractor for such work, nor for any officer of the board.

42. In the event of any vacancies occurring in the offices at the disposal of the board, no new election shall take place until they shall have been advertised at least twice in the local newspapers.

43. All contracts shall be made by tender, advertised in such manner or in such newspapers as may be directed. Each tender shall be endorsed for the particular work and directed to the chairman. No tender shall be opened except in the presence of the board or of the committee authorised by the board. The respective amount shall be entered on the minutes, and due security be taken for the performance of each contract. Where contract bonds are considered necessary by the board, they shall be signed by the chairman, or the chairman *pro tem.*, and one other member of the board, and also by the contractors and their sureties; the expense of preparing such contract bonds in all cases to be borne by the contractors.

44. Any one or more of the foregoing rules may be suspended *pro tem.* in case of emergency, with the consent of the majority of the board. Any member may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the board not then suspended by simply directing the attention of the chairman to the fact of such being disobeyed.
