PROCLAMATION

By JAMES A. R. MENZIES, Esq., Superintendent of the Province of Southland.

WHEREAS His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to delegate, under the *Diseased Cattle Act*, 1861, to the Superintendent of the Province of Southland the several powers vested in the Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act, subject to the regulations contained in the Order in Council of 1st October, 1861:

And whereas by a Proclamation given under my hand, dated 26th October, 1861, it was amongst other things declared that the Inspector was thereby prohibited from granting a certificate to land any cattle imported from the Colony of Victoria: And whereas it is expedient to make further provision in that behalf:

Now therefore I, the said Superintendent, in virtue of the powers vested in me, do hereby proclaim that the Inspector of Cattle under the said Act shall not be authorized to grant a certificate to land in the Province of Southland cattle coming from any of the Australian colonies, namely, Queensland, New South Wales (excepting as hereinafter mentioned), Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia, and Tasmania, from the date hereof: Provided that cattle arriving in the Province of Southland from the port of Newcastle, in a vessel which shall have put to sea with the same on or before the 21th of December current (and which shall not thereafter have touched at the same, or at any other port, until her arrival at a port within the Province of Southland), shall, under the provisions of subsection *d*, section 4, of the said Act, be permitted to land upon the quarantine ground, as the same has been defined in the Proclamation of 26th October, 1861, aforesaid, there to remain until the said Inspector shall permit the same to be removed from thence.

FARMERS' COMMON AT CODRINGTON, ETC.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, upon the petition of not less than ten occupiers of not less than five hundred acres of adjacent purchased land, to proclaim that any Crown lands within five miles of such purchased land (the area of such Crown lands not being more than three times the area of the purchased land) shall be a common for the use of such occupiers of the said purchased land as shall cultivate at least one-fourth of his or their purchased land, and every such common shall be called a "Farmers' Common," provided that nothing in the now reciting section shall be deemed or taken to prevent any such lands from being sold under the said Act upon the application of persons desirous of purchasing the same; and it is also enacted, that the Governor in Council shall have full power from time to time to make any rules and regulations for imposing any conditions or limitations on the exercise of the right of common upon any Farmers' Common: And whereas the occupiers of purchased land at or near the locality hereinafter mentioned have petitioned for a Farmers' Common in accordance with the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the Crown lands hereinafter described to be a FARMERS' COMMON for the use of the occupiers of purchased land within the meaning and intent and subject to the provisions of the said Act, and also under and subject to such conditions or limitations on the exercise of the right of common as are or may be prescribed, that is to say:—

FARMERS' COMMON FOR AGRICULTURISTS AT CODRINGTON, ETC., County of Villiers.—Extent about 12,000 acres: Being all the unappropriated Crown land between the Shaw and Eumerralla Rivers, south of a line commencing at the north-west angle of allotment 5, parish of Yambuk, bearing west about nine miles to the Eumerralla River aforesaid, as shown by plan deposited in the Public Lands Office, Melbourne.—(G.L.C.10186.)

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* to declare the rates of tolls to be collected by any district road board, and such rates and tolls from time to time to vary and alter, and any such Proclamation to revoke; and it is also enacted that in case any district road board shall deem it advisable that money should be raised by tolls, it shall be lawful for such board, subject to the approval of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to cause from time to time such and so many toll-bars, toll-gates, and toll-houses to be erected and built in and upon the roads within their respective road districts at such places as to each board shall seem fit, and in like manner to cause such toll-bars, toll-gates, and toll-houses to be removed, or built, or placed on other parts of the said roads, and to direct tolls to be paid for all animals and vehicles passing or repassing through such toll-bars, toll-gates, or toll-houses at a rate not exceeding the rates to be declared as aforesaid, and such rates from time to time to reduce or raise to any amount not exceeding the rates to be so declared: Provided that no toll shall be taken at any such toll-bar, toll-gate, or toll-house, until a list of the tolls payable thereat shall have been publicly notified in the *Government Gazette* at least one month previously: And whereas the Creswick District Road Board deem it advisable that money should be raised by tolls on roads within their district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare and proclaim that the Creswick District Road Board may direct tolls to be paid for all animals and vehicles passing or repassing through or by any toll-bars, toll-gates, or toll-houses, now or hereafter erected or built by the said board in or upon the roads within

the Creswick Road District, at rates not exceeding the rates hereinafter declared, that is to say:—

MUNICIPALITY OF CARISBROOK.

BYE-LAW No. 28.—FOR LICENSING AND REGULATING THE SLAUGHTERING OF SMALL CATTLE WITHIN THE TOWN OF CARISBROOK.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria, No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to pass bye-laws for the preservation of public health, the suppression of nuisances, and the regulation of slaughter-houses: And whereas it is necessary and expedient for the preservation of the public health of Carisbrook to prevent the nuisances arising from improperly constructed slaughter-houses and butchers' yards: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Carisbrook, from and after the date when this bye-law shall have received the assent of His Excellency the Governor in Council, that all butchers or other persons whose premises shall have been suitably prepared and properly paved for the purpose of slaughtering, so that in the judgment of the council, after the report of the inspector or other officer, the premises are found to be in a fit and proper state, shall be granted a license and permitted to kill sheep, lambs, or swine; provided that all such persons shall receive or cause to be received the blood into tubs, together with all offal or other offensive matter, and remove the same or cause it to be removed from such premises at least once in every twenty-four hours.

That all such premises shall be registered at the office of the town clerk, and the same premises shall always be open to the inspection of the municipal council or their inspector or other officer. That no butcher or other person as aforesaid shall kill any sheep, lambs, or swine, except upon premises registered as aforesaid, and without being duly licensed, except such butcher or other person be the *bona fide* servant of a duly licensed person.

That it shall not be lawful for any licensed butcher or other person to kill any sheep, lambs, or swine, on premises distinct and apart, except all such premises are severally registered, and a license be taken out to slaughter on each of such premises, as though they belonged to different owners and persons.

That written notice of application for such license and registration shall be given to the town clerk at least eight days before the same be granted, made, and entered, and be exhibited at his office, and that the said license and registration shall issue and be made on the first Thursday in every month, or upon such other day as the council may appoint.

That any person guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 28, made by the municipal council of Carisbrook, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

BYE-LAW No. 27.—FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A TOLL UPON THE ROAD LEADING TO THE QUEEN'S BRIDGE, AND FOR THE COLLECTION OF SUCH TOLL.

WHEREAS by the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it was, amongst other things enacted, that it should be competent for the council of any municipal district, whenever it should appear necessary, to establish tolls upon any road within the jurisdiction and under the control of such council, and to erect toll-gates, toll-bars, or other works necessary for the collection of such tolls, and to make such bye-laws for the proper collection and management of such tolls as to such municipal council should seem meet: And whereas by the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, 19 Victoria No. 16, intituled, *An Act to amend an Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it was, amongst other things enacted, that notwithstanding anything in the said first-recited Act no toll should be imposed by the council of any municipal district, save by bye-law subject

to the assent of the Governor, as in the first-recited Act mentioned.

And whereas the municipal council of Newtown and Chilwell is desirous of establishing a toll upon a road within the jurisdiction and under the control of such council, and leading to the Queen's Bridge, and of erecting a toll-bar or other work necessary for the collection of such toll: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Newtown and Chilwell, that from and after this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the said council may establish a toll within the said municipal district upon the road aforesaid, and may erect a toll-bar or other work necessary for the collection of such toll; and be it further enacted that the following shall be the rate of tolls to be paid for all animals or vehicles passing or repassing through the said toll-bar:—

No person shall in any manner evade or attempt to evade the payment of the said toll, or shall fraudulently or forcibly pass through or by the said toll-bar, or shall do any other act whatsoever in order or with intent to evade the payment of any such toll, or whereby the same shall or may be evaded.

Any person or persons committing or causing to be committed a breach of any of the provisions of this bye-law, shall, on conviction before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding £5.

No toll shall be demanded or taken by virtue of this bye-law of or from any person in Her Majesty's service, or in the employment and service of Government, being in the discharge of his duty, or of any person in the employment of the municipal council, or of or from any person going to or returning from any place of public worship, or any funeral, or of or from any minister of religion, or any return vehicle having a ticket for the day.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 27, made by the municipal council of Newtown and Chilwell, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

ELECTIONS.

On 26th September, 1861, Messrs. E. H. Dunn (by 175 votes), Alex. Rogers (by 172 votes), and James Shackell (by 156 votes), were elected to fill the places of Councillors J. S. Clarke, Wm. Witt, and E. H. Dunn, retiring by rotation. And on 27th September, Councillor George Briscoe Kerferd, J.P., was again unanimously elected chairman of council.

WATER SUPPLY.

The council are steadily pursuing their endeavors to bring their proposed Beechworth Waterworks into speedy operation, and the ratepayers may rest assured that no exertion will be spared to accomplish that object as one that must prove of such incalculable benefit to this municipality and district, by the great inducements it will offer for the settlement of an increased and permanent population on the extensive surrounding gold field.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The council having, upon favorable terms to the municipality, leased the public recreation ground to Mr. H. C. Batchelor, for three years as a grazing paddock, have, in anticipation of the revenue therefrom, expended that amount upon a contract for effecting the clearance of the entire reserve (sixty-three acres), which, when completed, will really render the place available for the recreation purposes for which it was intended. The public garden reserve is likewise being greatly improved, the council having, after much difficulty, again obtained from the Government, through the perseverance of their town agent, B. Cowderoy, Esq., a grant of £100 towards such work.

The above improvements, together with the necessary repairs to roads and streets, have, as in late previous half-years, been principally effected by day labor, and small contracts under the supervision of the town clerk.

No. 3.—JANUARY 10, 1862.—7.

The council have undertaken the improvement (for the Government) of the road between Beechworth and Stanley, and having entrusted the works to Mr. Superintendent Dalziel upon the same terms as last year, they are glad to learn that the same, as carried out, are giving satisfaction to the inhabitants of both towns.

BYE-LAWS.

The council passed a bye-law for the suppression of the daily increasing goat nuisance, but it was denied the Government's approval, although precisely similar (word for word) to those sanctioned for other municipalities, thus showing a want of impartiality and system, against which this is not the first time the council have had to complain.

MISCELLANEOUS.

At the request of the commissioners of the Victorian Exhibition of 1861, the council, in August last, caused to be compiled in detail the statistics of this municipality from its establishment, and had the same engrossed on vellum for display with other similar documents from other municipalities of the colony, in the Victorian Exhibition of this year, and subsequently in the London International Exhibition of 1862.

FINANCE.
