FIVE THOUSAND POUNDS REWARD FOR THE DISCOVERY OF A WORKABLE GOLD FIELD IN WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

NOMINATIONS TO NAVAL CADETSHIPS.

THE accompanying Despatches and Regulations relating to Naval Cadetships, which the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have placed at the disposal of the Secretary of State for the Colonies in favor of candidates recommended by the Governors of the principal Australian Colonies (previously published in the Government Gazette of 20th January and 16th March, 1860), are now re-published for general information.

SIR,—I have much pleasure in informing you that the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have been pleased, at my recommendation, to place at the disposal of the Secretary of State annually some Nominations to Naval Cadetships in favor of candidates recommended to the Secretary of State for this purpose by the Governors of the principal Australian Colonies. The number of such nominations which can be conceded is necessarily very limited, but it will enable me to present to you in each year one nomination to be made in favor of any candidate who may appear to you fully eligible for introduction into Her Majesty's Naval Service.

NAVAL CADETS.

(The following Regulations will come into operation in regard to persons nominated to Naval Cadetships on or after the 1st of April, 1860.)

I. No person will be nominated to a cadetship in the Royal Navy, who shall be under 12 or above 14 years of age at the time of his first examination.

of his first examination.*

II. Every candidate, on obtaining a nomination, will be required to pass an examination at the Royal Naval College at Portsmouth, within three months of nomination. In the special cases of nominations granted to the sons of natives of Her Majesty's colonies, a candidate will be allowed to pass a pretiminary examination on board the Flag or Senior Officer's ship on the station; but such examination must be passed in strict accordance with these regulations, and should the candidate be found qualified, it will still be necessary that he should be sent to England, to be entered on board a training ship where he will be subject to the same regulations as other cadets.

III. The candidate must be produce a certificate of birth, or declaration thereof made before a magistrate.

IV. The candidate must be in good health and fit for the service, that is, free from impediment of speech, defect of vision, rupture, or other physical inefficiency.

Candidates will be required-

1. To write English correctly from dictation, and in a legible hand.

To read, translate, and parse an easy passage from Latin
or from some Foreign Living Language.
 N.B.—The aid of a dictionary will be allowed for these
translations.

And to have a satisfactory knowledge of-

MUNICIPALITY OF BEECHWORTH.

BYE-LAW NO. 36.—TO REPEAL BYE-LAW NO. 1, AND MAKE OTHER PROVISION FOR REGULATING BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF BEECHWORTH.

COUNCIL OF BEECHWORTH.

WHEREAS a bye-law, No. 1, was made by the municipal council of Beechworth to regulate by means of standing orders their proceedings, and such bye-law was assented to by His Excellency the Officer administering the Government of this colony, with the advice of the Executive Council, and was duly gazetted on the 30th December, 1856: And whereas it has become desirable to repeal the same, and to pass another bye-law in lieu thereof: Be it and it is hereby enacted by the municipal council of Beechworth, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of this colony, the said bye-law No. 1 shall be and is hereby rescinded and repealed, and this present one shall be in force in place thereof, and the proceedings and business of the said municipal council shall be conducted according to the following regulations, which shall be and be called the "Standing Orders" of the said council, namely:—

CHAPTER I.

- CHAPTER I.

 1. Meetings of council.—The ordinary or general meetings of the council shall be open to the public, but any councillor present at same may require the withdrawal of all strangers until it shall have been decided by the council whether or not the discussion of the particular question proposed to be considered take place with open doors or not. The chairman may, however, at any time, in the event of strangers present being in the least disorderly, order their withdrawal, and may take such further action as he may think fit for the repression of such conduct. such conduct.
- 2. Members of the council shall at all meetings thereof designate each other by their official titles of chairman and councillor respectively; but any councillor (not being the chairman of the council) occupying the chair shall be addressed by name as councillor.
- 3. The general meetings of the council shall be convened for such days as the council may from time to time appoint, by two clear days' notice sent or given to each councillor by the town
- clerk.

 4. The chairman shall at any time, upon receipt of a requisition signed by three members of council, setting forth the objects for which they wish a special meeting to be held, cause such a meeting to be convened by two days notice, stating the object of the meeting; and at such meeting only the matters referred to in the requisition shall be entertained.

 5. Adjournments.—The council shall have power to adjourn their ordinary meetings from time to time, any such adjournnot being for more than fourteen days from the last day of meeting.

 6. Time of commencing business.—At all meetings of council the business shall commence so soon as a legal quorum is present after the time for which the meetings are respectively convened, and should a quorum not be present at the expiration of twenty minutes after that time, such circumstance shall be noted (together with the names of the members present) in the council's minute book, and the meeting shall lapse.

 7. Records of proceedings.—Minutes shall be taken of the proceedings at all meetings of the council, and fairly entered into a book to be provided for that purpose, and shall be open to the inspection of all persons on the ratepayers' roll free of charge.

- 8. Order of business.—The order of business at all general meetings of council shall be as follows:—

9. As to petitions.—The only way of approaching the council shall be by petition or memorial, presented by some councillor; and every petition, memorial, or communication (other than the ordinary received correspondence) shall be in writing (not printed or lithographed); and upon its presentation, no debate shall take place thereon until notice of motion has been given; and the only question which shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation shall be (and this only upon the motion of some councillor), that it be received, or be referred to a committee to be death with of for their consideration and report, or that it be taken into consideration with any order of the day to which such petition may refer; and the councillor presenting such petition, &c., must confine his remarks to a statement of the names of the persons from whom it comes, the number of signatures, and the reading the prayer of the petition.

nation of signatures, and the reading the prayer of the petition.

10. Proceeding with motions.—No motion of which notice has been given shall be proceeded with, but shall lapse, unless the councillor in whose name it stands, or some other councillor authorised by him in writing, be present to proceed with the same when called upon.

11. Business paper.—This shall be prepared and lie in the office of the town clerk two days previous to each ordinary meeting of council.

12. Resolutions, how rescinded.—No motion, the effect of which if carried would be to rescind any previous resolution of the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year in which such previous resolution was passed (unless a call of the whole council has been duly made for that purpose); and no motion for rescinding any resolution whatever of the council shall if lost be again entertained during the same municipal year.

shall if lost be again entertained during the same municipal year.

13. Bye-laws.—No bye-law shall be finally passed nor adopted until at least the next general meeting of council subsequent to that at which it is proposed; and every such bye-law shall in the interim be open to inspection, in the town clerk's office, free of charge, by any person on the ratepapers' roll of the municipality.

14. Addresses.—No motion relative to any address or petition, &c., from the council shall be entertained unless accompanied by the draft of the proposed address or petition, &c.

15. The mover of any special committee, or of any motion which may be referred to a special committee, shall (pro hac vice) be a member of such committee.

CHAPTER II .- Order of Debate.

CHAPTER II.—Order of Debate.

16. Chairman to decide points of order.—The presiding chairman's ruling or decision shall be final on all questions or points of order and practice, and he shall state or give the same (when called upon to do so) without comment or argument.

17. Motions and amendments.—The mover of any motion or amendment shall rise and address the chair, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall resume his seat until the councilor raising the point of order shall have been heard and the question of order disposed of by the chairman, whose decision shall be final, when he (the said original speaker) shall proceed with the subject.

18. The mover of either an original motion or amendment must state the nature of same, and have it seconded before addressing the council in support thereof, and must hand in same in writing, duly signed, to the town clerk, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder and afterwards the result thereof, i.e. "carried," "lost," or "lapsed," and shall carefully preserve such original manuscript in his office; and no motion, when seconded, shall be withdrawn without leave of the council.

19. Seconding motions and enforcement of standing orders.—No motion or amendment shall be entertained or discussed unless seconded. Any one councillor may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the council by simply drawing the chairman's attention to its infringement.

20. Speaking on moving or seconding a motion.—The mover of any motion shall be the first to speak to it after its being seconded, but any councillor merely seconding a motion without remark shall not be held to have spoken to same.

21. Priority in speaking.—If two or more councillors rise at the same time to speak, the chairman shall decide who is entitled to priority.

22. Speaking twice on same subject.—No councillor shall speak two or the same question, except by the way of explanation, or in reply upon any original motion or amendment of which

zz. Speaking twice on sume sugget.—No continuor smart speak twice on the same question, except by the way of explanation, or in reply upon any original motion or amendment of which he was the mover, and immediately after the reply, the amend-

ment or original motion, as the case may be, shall be at once

put to the vote.

23. Amendments, how allowed.—One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost one other can be moved before the original motion is put to the vote. In the event, however, of an amendment being carried, the original motion shall be deemed rejected, and the amendment so carried shall take the place of such original motion, and on it one amendment can then be moved but no more.

24. Disorderly conduct.—No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion nor impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.

25. No councillor shall be allowed to continue a statement relative to any previous action or words of another councillor after the veracity of such statement shall have been decided by the councillor referred to.

26. Any councillor making use of an expression capable of being offensively applied to any other councillor, shall immediately, upon being required by the chairman so to do, withdraw such expression and make a satisfactory apology to the council.

27. In the event of any such conduct as last mentioned, or other disorderly behavior on the part of a councillor, the chairman shall call upon such councillor by name to withdraw, and upon his withdrawal (after having been first heard in explanation life he so desires) the council shall at one take the case into consideration. Amendments, how allowed.—One amendment only shall be

28. Any councillor may require the town clerk to take down any particular words used by another councillor immediately upon their being used.

29. Production of documents.—Any member may of right require the production of any documents of the council bearing upon the question or business then under discussion, but no question can be entertained or discussion allowed upon any previous action of the council.

30. Questions, how superseded.—Any question before the council may be superseded.—

1st. By the adjournment of the council, on the motion of a councillor "That the council do now adjourn."
2nd. By the previous question, viz., "That this question be now put," being proposed and negatived.

31. Questions, how to be put.—The chairman shall, in taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the votes of the councillors, if a division be called for, shall be entered in the minutes.

32. Manner of voting on a division.—The council shall vote by a show of hands, excepting in cases of elections, when the voting shall be by each councillor writing the name of the person he wishes to vote for on a card and signing his own name to it and handing it in to the presiding chairman for the time being; but no unsigned card shall be received, and all such voting cards shall be preserved by the town clerk for at least twelve months.

33. Adjournments.—No discussion shall be allowed upon any motion for the adjournment of the council, but such motion shall, immediately upon being seconded, be put from the chair, and in the event of its being negatived, the consideration of the subject then under discussion shall be resumed, or the next on the business paper be proceeded with (or any other that may be allowed precedence) before it shall be competent for a further motion for adjournment to be entertained; but should a motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of on the business paper of the day shall take precedence of all else under "orders of the day" at the next meeting of council.

34. Committee of the whole.—For the consideration of any matter requiring a discussion of details, it shall be competent for the council to resolve itself into a committee of the whole, and in such committee the standing orders shall be observed, except the rule limiting the number of times each councillor may speak.

35. Committee of the whole interrupted for want of a quorum.—The discussion of such committee on a future day (on motion upon notice), and the discussion of such committee on a future day (on motion u

resumed at the following council meeting at the point at which it was so interrupted.

37. Protests.—Any councillor may record his protest against any resolution of the council on giving notice of his intention so to do immediately upon the adoption of such resolution, and by handing in such protest (specifying his reasons for recording it), in writing under his own hand, to the town clerk, at least twenty-four hours before the next meeting of council, when the same shall be duly entered upon the council's minutes of the day on which the resolution was passed: Provided always that such protest may be afterwards expunged, if declared by a majority of the council not to be in accordance with truth, or not to be in its terms respectful to the council.

(CHAPPER III — Committees

CHAPTER III.—Committees.

38. Standing committees.—There shall at least be two permanent committees of the council, to be elected annually at the meeting of council next after the annual election of chairman of council; the council, however, having power at any time to fill up occasional vacancies in either, viz.:—

The public works committee, consisting of five councillors, three to form a quorum; and
The finance committee, consisting of three councillors, two to form a quorum.

39. Functions of committees.—The public works committee shall take cognizance of such matters and in such manner as the council may direct, having power, however, to report to the council upon any matter that they deem it advisable otherwise to notice or enquire into.

The finance committee shall receive and examine all municipal accounts before they are presented to the council, to whom that committee shall then forward them, with a report embodying a recommendation for their payment or otherwise.

40. Chairman of committees.—Immediately after each annual election of chairman of council, some other councillor (not being such chairman nor the honorary municipal treasurer), shall be elected by the council as chairman of committees, and it shall be his duty when so elected to preside whenever the council goes into committee of the whole, and also at all meetings of the permanent committees of the council, and to bring up their reports and introduce same to the council, and to bring up their reports and introduce same to the council, that the council shall have power to fill any vacancy in this post that may occur from death, resignation, or any other cause, any such interim election being however only for the time previous to the then next annual election of chairman of committees.

41. Special committees.—No special committee shall consist of less than five members, three to form a quorum; and the councillor upon whose motion any special committee is appointed shall be the chairman thereof.

42. Convening committees.—The town clerk shall (in manner as may seem desirable), convene such meetings of committees as the respective chairmen may direct.

43. Absence of quorum at committees.—Unless a quorum shall be present within twenty minutes for the time for which a meeting of committee is called, such meetings of which he shall have been notified shall cease to be a member of such committee, and such circumstance shall be reported by the chairman of the committee to be council at its next meeting.

45. Vacancies.—The council shall, if it thinks fit, discharge any member, at his own request, from serving upon a committee; and all vacancies from what cause soever, as they occur, shall be filled up by the council.

46. Questions, how to be decided.—All questions arising in committee

CHAPTER IV .- Miscellaneous Regulations.

48. Appointment of treasurer.—Immediately after each annual election of chairman of council and chairman of committees the

48. Appointment of treasurer.—Immediately after each annual election of chairman of council and chairman of committees the council shall proceed to elect some other councillor (not being either of these officers) as honorary municipal treasurer, and shall be at liberty to fill up any vacancy occurring in that office from death, resignation, or otherwise; the councillor, however, so elected to fill any such vacancy shall only hold office until the next annual election of treasurer.

49. Financial statement.—At the first meeting of council in every month the honorary municipal treasurer shall report the state of the council's account in the bank, and within two months from his election as treasurer lay before the council a financial statement showing the estimated probable receipts and expenditure of the council for the current municipal year; and upon the adoption by the council of his said statement, and of a resolution affirming the rate to be levied for each year, he shall bring up a bye-law for the enforcement of such rate.

50. Payment, how to be made.—All moneys received shall be lodged to the credit of the "Becchworth Corporation," in the bank, and all disbursements on behalf of the corporation shall be paid by cheques drawn on their account in the joint names of the honorary municipal treasurer for the time being and the town clerk; but before any disbursement can be made of the corporation funds the said honorary municipal treasurer must receive from under the hand of the chairman of council a warrant to the following effect, which shall be a sufficient voucher for the auditors:—

Call of the council.—It shall be competent for any councillor at any time to move (without previous notice) for a call of the council to take into consideration any particular subject or question at the next or any subsequent meeting, and in the event of such motion being carried, the object for which the call is made shall be notified to each councillor when the meeting for which the call is made is being convened, and it shall also be entered in the business paper for such meeting; and any councillor not in attendance when the subject or question for which the call was made comes under consideration, or not in attendance at the voting upon such subject or question, or any amendment thereof (whether of adjournment or otherwise), shall be liable to a penalty of One pound, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council.

52. Election of officers.—No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until six clear days notice has been given in a local newspaper inviting applications for the same, and the salary or other remuneration of such office shall in all cases (except when the office is to be let by

tender) be fixed before proceeding to the election; and at all such elections the voting shall be by each councillor signing his own voting paper or card, after first inserting the name of the person he supports. No other can be received, and the town clerk shall preserve the same as a record.

53. Contracts.—No councillor shall have directly or indirectly

Contracts.—No councillor shall have directly or indirectly by himself or his partner any share or interest in any contract or employment with or by the council (except as a shareholder in some public company or corporation with which the council may contract for the supply of gas or water or for other public purposes), nor shall any councillor be received as surety for any officer, nor shall any councillor, auditor, or other officer become security for any contractor or other person employed with or by the council.

54. Corporate seal.—The town clerk shall have the custody of the common seal of the municipality and be responsible for the same, and every impression thereof shall be verified by his signature. He shall notaffix it to any corporate document without the express minute of the council; but in case of powers of attorney or other legal documents not relating to the corporation, but which require to be verified before the chairman, by declaration or otherwise, the said seal shall and may be affixed by the town clerk to the chairman's certificate, upon receipt of a fee of Ten shillings and sixpence for each attestation, to go to the general revenue of the corporation.

55. In all cases not hereinbefore provided for resort shall be had to the rules, forms, and usages of Parliament so far as the same are applicable to the proceedings of this council.

56. Suspension of standing orders.—Any one or more of these standing orders may be suspended pro tem. in case of emergency, with the consent of a majority of the council, except standing order No. 12 and 56.

57. Penalty for breach of standing orders.—The neglect or breach of any of the forgoing clauses in this bye-law shall subject the persons so offending to a penalty not exceeding Twenty shillings in respect of each clause or standing order offended against or neglected, and the chairman of the council for the time being shall initiate and prosecute all proceedings for the enforcement of such penalties.

BYE-LAW NO. 34.—FOR LEVYING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND FOR THE MUNICIPAL YEAR ENDING 12TH FEBRUARY, 1863.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria, a council of any municipal district is authorised and required to assess all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district (except property belonging to Her Majesty), according to its fair average annual value, and to impose a rate on all such properties for the current year: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Brunswick, that all the several properties within the limits of the said municipal district shall be assessed for the year 1862 according to the several amounts of annual value respectively affixed to the same in the assessment roll, confirmed by the bench of magistrates on Monday, 3rd February, 1862, and amounting to a total sum of Twenty-five thousand seven hundred and ninety-one pounds; and also that a rate of One shilling in the pound of said annual value is hereby imposed on all the said properties for the year 1862, the first moiety thereof to be due and payable on the 2nd day of January, and the second moiety thereof on the 2nd day of January, and the second moiety thereof on the 2nd day of July, 1862.

Bye-Law No. 1.—Standing Eules and Olders Made and Adopted by the Board.

THE business of the board shall be conducted on all occasions with open doors.

2. The board shall commence business so soon after the time appointed as there is a sufficient number of members in attendance to constitute a quorum, but should a quorum not be present at the expiration of half an hour after the said time appointed for meeting, the same shall be entered, with a note of the members present, in the minute book, and such meeting shall lapse.

3. That special meetings shall be summoned at any time by the chairman, upon receiving a written requisition signed by three members, stating the matter to be discussed at such

three members, stating the matter to be discussed at such meeting.

4. That the first business at all meetings of the board shall be the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting, in order to their confirmation, and that no discussion shall be allowed thereupon except as to their accuracy.

5. The reading of correspondence, presentation of petitions by members, and bringing up reports, shall have precedence of the regular business at all meetings of the board.

6. Every communication addressed to the board shall be in proper form, and presented by one of its members, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.

7. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the board, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under the notice of the board.

8. Notices of motion shall be given in writing to the secretary

8. Notices of motion shall be given in writing to the secretary of the board, at the meeting previous to the making of the same, and all such notices shall be considered in the order in which

and all such notices shall be considered in the order in they were given.

9. No notice shall be proceeded with unless the member who gave notice of it, or some member authorised by him, be present when the business is called on; and notices not so proceeded with shall be struck out.

10. No bye-law shall be finally passed or adopted at the meeting at which it shall have been first proposed, nor until the next meeting of the board regularly convened; and every such bye-law shall; in the interim, remain open for the inspection of any of the ratepayers, in the office of the board, free of charge.

11. No motion proposing any petition, address, bye-law, or standing order shall be entertained, unless the mover shall submit therewith a draft of such petition, bye-law, or standing order; and the draft so submitted shall in no case be taken into consideration until it shall have been referred to the legislative committee, who shall report thereon; and the mover of every such proposition shall be, pro hac vice, a member of such committee.

lative committee, who shall report thereon; and the never such proposition shall be, pro has vice, a member of such committee.

12. That no payment of any account whatever be made, unless it shall be first approved and ordered by the board.

13. That the secretary shall at every meeting lay before the board a statement of all moneys that have been paid into his hands since the previous meeting of the board, together with the bank book as often as required.

14. That the collector shall not distrain in any case without the order of the board.

15. Any member on proposing a motion or amendment, or of speaking on any matter, must rise and address the chairman. No member when speaking shall be interrupted, unless called to order, when he shall sit down, in which case the member calling to order shall be heard thereon in preference to any other; and the question of order shall be disposed of by the chairman before the subject is resumed, or any other matter entered upon. The chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state his opinion upon the subject, and, if necessary, take the sense of the meeting thereupon. The decision of a majority in such case shall be final.

16. No member shall speak twice upon the same motion or amendment, except by way of explanation, or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last proposed; and the chairman shall, without waiting for the interposition of the board, call to order any member proceeding to speak a second time on the same motion or amendment. After the reply, the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be put to the vote.

17. Any member making a motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken on that motion or amendment.

ment shall be held to have spoken on that motion or amendment.

18. Any member making a motion or amendment shall put it in form, sign it, and deliver it to the secretary, who shall add the name of the seconder; and no motion or amendment shall be withdrawn without leave of the board.

19. No member shall digress from the subject matter of the question under discussion, or impute improper motives to others; and all personal reflections upon any member shall be considered as highly disorderly, and the member making use of such offensive expressions shall make an apology, if required by the board to do so.

20. No motion, the effect of which if carried would be to rescind any notion which has already passed the board, shall be entertained during the current year, unless a call of the whole board has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion which shall have been negatived for resoinding any resolution of the board, shall be again entertained during the current year.

21. No election to any office shall take place until six clear days public notice shall have been given by advertisement in the local newspaper, inviting applications from candidates properly qualified.

22. No member or officer of the board shall be allowed to tender for any work to be done for, or in connection with, this board, or be received as surety for any contractor for such work.

23. Any member may of right require the production of any of the documents of the board relating to the question or matter in discussion.

of the documents of the board relating to the question or matter in discussion.

25. Upon the adoption of any amendment by the board, such amendment shall be held to have quashed the original motion, and for all purposes of subsequent discussion, the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.

26. The chairman shall, in taking the vote on any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative, and then in the negative, and he may do so as often as is necessary to enable him to form and declare his opinion as to which party has the majority.

27. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be moved before the original question is put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried, it shall be competent for any member to move one other amendment upon it but not move. it. but not more.

28. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the board; but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the board.

29. Any member of the board may enter his protest against any resolution of the board, providing that such protest is not inconsistent with the truth or disrespectful to the board; notice of intention to protest must, however, be given in every case, on the adoption of the resolution protested against; and the protest, signed by the member or members protesting, and specifying the reason for protesting, must be entered before the next regular meeting of the board by the protesting member, in a book to be kept for that purpose in the secretary's office, and duly referred to in the minutes of the board, the same to be considered also a part of such minutes.
