BURNT CREEK GOLD FIELDS COMMON.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to proclaim that any Crown lands in the vicinity of any gold field shall be a common for the use of all holders of miners' rights, business licenses, and carriers' licenses, and other residents on such gold field, and every such holder or other resident shall, from the time of such proclamation, be entitled to depasture his horses and cattle on such common, subject to rules and regulations hereafter to be made, and such common shall be called a "Gold Fields Common;" and it is also enacted, that it shall be lawful for the mining board of the mining district within which such Gold Fields Common shall be included, with the consent of the Governor in Council, to make rules and regulations for determining how many horses and cattle every holder of a miner's right, business license, or carrier's license, or other resident on a gold field, shall be entitled to depasture on any Gold Fields Common: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that the Crown lands in the vicinity of the gold field hereinafter mentioned, comprised within the area the description whereof is subjoined to the name of such gold field, shall (save and except the lands hereinafter declared to be a gold field) be a GOLD FIELDS COMMON within the meaning of the said Act, for the use of all holders of miners' rights, business licenses, carriers' licenses, and other residents on

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such gold field: And I do further proclaim, with the advice aforesaid, that the portions of Crown lands within such area, upon which mining or digging for gold is or shall be actually carried on now or at any time hereafter, shall be Gold Fields within the meaning of the said Act, and in the vicinity of which Gold Fields Commons may be proclaimed:—

BURNT CREEK GOLD FIELD COMMON.—Commencing at a point due east of the north-east angle of Dunolly Gold Field Common; thence west eighty-eight chains, more or less, to the said north-east angle of Dunolly Gold Field Common; thence by said common south one hundred and forty chains, more or less; thence west sixty-eight chains, more or less; thence south one hundred and twenty chains, more or less; thence west one hundred and eighty chains, more or less, to a point on the south boundary of Dunolly Gold Field Common; thence south ninety-six chains; thence east three hundred and forty chains, more or less, to a point due south of the commencing point; thence north three hundred and forty chains, more or less, to the point of commencement. Deducting from above described area the land rendered useless by mining operations and that alienated, approximate area available for common, 5000 acres.—(62.F.1767.)

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this seventeenth day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and in the twenty-fifth year of Her Majesty's reign.

LANDS TEMPORARILY RESERVED FROM SALE.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the power in him vested in this behalf by the Act 24 Victoria No. 117, has temporarily reserved from sale the lands hereinafter described, viz:—

CASTLE DONNINGTON (SWAN HILL)—SITE FOR PUBLIC BUILDINGS AT CASTLE DONNINGTON (pursuant to Order of 10th March, 1862).—Five acres, county unnamed, at Swan Hill, being block 10, in the township of Castle Donnington: Commencing at the south-west angle of block 10, being a point bearing N. 69° E. one chain fifty links from the south-east angle of block 2; bounded on the south by McCraw street, bearing N. 69° E. five chains; on the east by a line bearing N. 21° W. ten chains; on the north by McAllen street, bearing S. 69° W. five chains; and on the west by Curlewis street, bearing S. 21° E. ten chains to the point of commencement.—(62.F.982.)

REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF FEBRUARY, 1862.

ACTUAL Daily Mortality of persons of both sexes under and over five years of age in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, embracing a radius of ten miles, and including the Statistical Sub-districts of Melbourne Proper, East Melbourne, North Melbourne and Carlton, Fitz Roy Municipality, East Collingwood, Richmond, Jika-jika parish (exclusive of North Melbourne, Collingwood, and Richmond), South Yarra and Prahran, Emerald Hill and Sandridge, St. Kilda and Brighton, Doutta Galla and Keilor, Boroondara and Heidelberg, Cut-paw-paw parish, and the shipping in Hobson's Bay; also, the Temperature in the shade at Melbourne, deduced from the mean of twenty-four hourly observations taken at the Flagstaff Observatory on each day during the month of February, 1862:—

The number of deaths occurring in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of February was 335, being 28 less than in February, 1861, but 29 more than in February, 1860, the mortality thus being about equal to the mean of the same month in the two previous years. On comparing the daily average, 11.96, with that of the two months immediately preceding, an improvement of 1 death per day is indicated as regards January, but as regards December, 1861, an increased mortality of 1.57 deaths daily.

The mean temperature of the month, as recorded at the Flagstaff Observatory, was 66.7°, against 65° in February, 1861, and against 65.4° in February, 1860. The highest point reached by the thermometer (86.7°) was on the 23rd, at 4 p.m., and the lowest (51°) was on the 27th, at 5 a.m. The greatest range of temperature (36.5°) was on the 23rd, from a maximum of 96.7° to a minimum of 60.2°, and the least (6.3°) was on the 5th, from a maximum of 67.4° to a minimum of 61.1°; the range between the highest and lowest of the month being 45.7°, and the mean daily range 18.4°. The mean atmospheric pressure during the month was 29.814 in., against 29.693 in. in February, 1861, and against 29.919 in. in February, 1860. The highest point reached by the barometer (30.077 in.) was at 8 and 9 a.m. on the 19th, and the lowest (29.479 in.) was at 4 p.m. on the 11th. The range for the month thus being .598 in.

The mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality for the four weeks in February, were as follow:—

Of males and females respectively, the number of deaths and their proportions to the total mortality were, of the former 194 or 58 per cent., and of the latter 141 or 42 per cent. The deaths of children under five exceeded those of persons above that age by 103, the numbers being respectively 65 and 35 per cent. In the previous month the same proportions were 68 and 32 per cent. In February, 1861, 68 per cent., and in February, 1860, 66 per cent. of the deaths were of children under five years of age.

The days of greatest mortality were the 10th and the 14th, on each of which 17 deaths occurred. In February, 1861, 21 deaths took place on one day, 20 on another, and 18 on each of two others, but in February, 1860, no higher number than 14 deaths were recorded as occurring on any one day.

Only one person of a more advanced longevity than 75 years died during the month, viz., a male of 79 years old of diarrhoea.

Fifteen violent deaths were recorded during the month, of which 14 were of males and only 1 of a female. 12 were set down as the result of accidents or negligence, and 3 were attributed to suicide. Of the former, 3 persons, viz., a settler aged 44, a laborer of 22, and a boy of 5 years of age, were drowned. In two cases, that of a shopkeeper aged 56 and that of a laborer aged 26, death resulted from injury to the leg, the manner of that injury not being stated in either case. A farmer also died from an injury to the arm, no further particulars being given. A man of 60 years of age, described as a vagrant, and a child of two years old, died of scalds. A laborer of 27 and an infant a week old died of suffocation (manner not stated). An innkeeper aged 45 died from the effects of a fracture of the skull, and an infant of 5 weeks old from convulsions, supervening on a fall.

The suicidal deaths were, that of a carter of 60 years old by drowning, that of a lunatic aged 24 by hanging, and that of the female above mentioned 38 years of age by poison.

The death of a male 24 years old, from sunstroke, was recorded during the month.

Forty-one deaths, or about an eighth of the total number, occurred in charitable or public institutions, and are thus accounted for:—Melbourne Hospital, 30; Immigrants' Home,* 1; Lunatic Asylum, 4; Benevolent Asylum, 4; Prince's Bridge Barracks, 1; Hulk *Success*, 1.

* In the report for January, owing to a slight inadvertence, two deaths, which occurred in the Immigration Hospital, were included with those of the Immigrants' Home. The total number of deaths occurring in the latter valuable institution in January, should have been 7 instead of 9 as was there stated.

The following table shows the number of persons of all ages according to the last census, the number of deaths of persons under and over five years of age, the total at all ages, and the number of deaths to every 1000 of the population during the month of February, in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, and in each of the sub-districts of which it is composed:—

Note.—The population of the different sub-districts according to the recent census is given subject to future revision, but it is believed that when finally corrected the figures will not differ materially from the above.

Of the 219 children under five years of age that died during the month, 126, or 58 per cent., were males, and 93, or 42 per cent., females; 136 were under one year old, 65 between one and two years, 12 between two and three, 1 between three and four, and 5 between four and five years.

Of the 116 deaths which took place among persons of five years of age and upwards, 68, or 59 per cent., were males, 48, or 41 per cent., were females; 8 were between five and ten years, 2 between fifteen and twenty, 7 between twenty and twenty-five, 16 between twenty-five and thirty, 18 between thirty and thirty-five, 19 between thirty-five and forty, 13 between forty and forty-five, 8 between forty-five and fifty, 7 between fifty and fifty-five, 7 between fifty-five and sixty, 3 between sixty and sixty-five, 4 between sixty-five and seventy, 3 between seventy and seventy-five, and 1 above seventy-five years of age.

The following table shows the causes of the deaths of persons of both sexes under and over five years of age, and the proportions per cent. of deaths from each cause, in Melbourne and suburbs, during the month of February, 1862:—




CITY COUNCIL OF MELBOURNE.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, 14 Victoria No. 20, intitled, *An Act for regulating the formation, drainage, and repair of streets, courts, and alleys on private property within the city of Melbourne*, it is amongst other things enacted, that where any street, court or alley, on private property in the city of Melbourne shall not be, or shall not have been, sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired to the satisfaction of the council of the said city, it shall be lawful for the said council at any time, and from time to time, by any order under the hand of the Mayor or Town Clerk of the said city for the time being respectively, to order that any such street, court or alley, or any part thereof, shall be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, in such manner and within such time as to the said council may appear expedient, and thereupon the owners of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon such street, court or alley, on each side thereof, shall in such manner and within such time as shall be expressed in such order, at their respective costs, charges, and expenses, remove all obstructions, and well and sufficiently pave, flag and macadamize, level, drain and sewer, or otherwise complete or repair so much of the said street, court or alley, to the centre thereof, as may be opposite to and co-extensive with their respective tenements, adjoining or abutting on such streets, courts, or alleys respectively:

And whereas the street, court, or alley enumerated in the schedule to the order annexed marked A has not been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, to the satisfaction of the council of the city of Melbourne:

Be it now ordered by the council of this the said city, that the street, court, or alley enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked A, shall within ten days from the date of this order's coming into operation be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, in such manner as is expressed in the schedule to this order annexed, and marked B; and it is hereby notified to the owners respectively of the tenements adjoining or abutting on the street, court, or alley enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked A, that if they or any of them shall neglect or omit to remove the obstructions, and pave, flag, macadamize, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete and repair the street, court, or alley on which their respective tenements adjoin or abut, in the manner and within the time expressed in this order, then the council of the said city will remove all obstructions in the said street, court, or alley, and pave, flag, macadamize, level, drain, sewer, and otherwise complete or repair the same, or such parts thereof as shall not have been so done pursuant to this order, and will thereupon ascertain, determine, and charge such respective owners with their several proportionate part of the costs, charges, and expenses thereof, according to and co-extensive with their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on such street, court, or alley, having regard in such apportionment to the state and condition of the pavement, flagging, macadamizing, levelling, draining, and sewerage in which such street, court, or alley respectively, or any part thereof, shall or may be at the time of making this order.

Manner in which the streets, courts, and alleys enumerated in Schedule A, referred to in this order, are ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered:—

The natural soil is to be reduced or made up, as the case may require, so that the longitudinal section of the whole right-of-way shall in no part have an inclination of less than 1 in 120, and where practicable the entire length is to form one incline. In laying on any stuff it is to spread in layers of not more than 1 foot thick. The transverse section of the right-of-way is to show a roadway whose crown shall be 1 inch above the kerbs of the footways, and in the fall from the crown of the waterchannels is to be at the rate of 1 in 25.

On either side of the roadway there is to be a waterchannel 18 inches wide, consisting of two rows of bluestone pitchers, 9 inches deep and not less than 9 inches by 14 inches on the surface, with upright sides, set in loam and rammed with a rammer weighing 40 lbs., so as to subside 4 inches.

The bottom of the channel is to be 7 inches below the top of the kerbs.

On either side of the roadway there is also to be a footway not more than 3 feet wide, and these are to be separated from the roadway by a red gum plank or korb 10 inches by 3 inches, set on edge and fastened with 5-inch spikes to piles 4 inches by 4 inches of red gum, 3 feet long, driven into the soil.

The footways are to be covered with a coat of gravel 3 inches thick, and the surface is to fall towards the channel at the rate of 1 in 10. The roadway is to be covered with a coat of broken metal, broken to a 2½-inch gauge and laid on 7 inches thick at the channels and 8 inches at the crown, and this, when necessary, is to be covered with a coat of loam 1½ inch thick.

Whenever private entrances lead from the rights-of-way they are to be paved to the full width with bluestone pitchers, in the same manner as the channels. Paving is to be extended from the channels towards the line of houses or fences, so as to cross the entire footway.

The whole of the work must be done under the inspection and subject to the approval of the City Surveyor, who is authorized to order any deviation from these general principles which the particulars of any case may require.
