ONE HUNDRED POUNDS REWARD.

FREE PARDON TO AN ACCOMPLICE.

WHEREAS about a quarter past Ten o'clock on the night of Friday, the 20th of June last, the dwelling of William Wales, at the Reservoir, Maryborough, was entered by three armed men, one of whom immediately fired at and dangerously wounded one William Quin, and the two others presented pistols at the proprietor (one firing over his head), at the same time demanding money and some gold which they said they know he had purchased: Notice is hereby given that a reward of One hundred pounds will be paid for such information as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of the offenders.

His Excellency the Governor will also extend Her Majesty's free pardon to such one of the offenders as will give the required information, provided the informant was not the man who fired at William Quin aforesaid.

PARTICULARS.

The property stolen consisted of £9 in cash, about one ounce of gold, and five pairs of elastic-sided boots.

The first man (supposed to be one West) was about 28 years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, of medium build, with sandy hair and whiskers worn round the chin, small moustache, and a boil on the right side of the face; he wore a brown tweed coat, mole-skin trousers, blue cloth cap, and a mask over his face.

The second man was of about the same age and height as the first, slight built, and with face blackened; he wore a grey tweed coat and black bell-topper hat.

The third man, not otherwise described, had a veil over his face, and wore a white deerstalker hat.

Each man carried two single-barrelled pistols.

MELBOURNE SEWERAGE AND WATER SUPPLY.

BYE-LAW OF THE BOARD OF LAND AND WORKS.

THE Board of Land and Works doth hereby, pursuant to and in exercise and execution of the powers and authorities conferred on such board by *The Melbourne Sewerage and Water Act* and *The Melbourne Sewerage and Water Amendment Act*, and the Act of the Parliament of Victoria numbered 90, or some of such Acts, repeal and annul so much of the eighth branch or class of rates or charges of the eighth of the bye-laws of the said board, made and passed and approved of on the 20th day of June, 1862, as provides that the owners or occupiers mentioned in the said eighth branch shall be subject to such special rate as may be agreed upon between them and the Board of Land and Works, and the said board doth hereby declare as a bye-law that such owners or occupiers shall consume by meter.

The foregoing bye-law was made and passed by the Board of Land and Works, and the seal of the said Board of Land and Works was hereunto affixed the second day of July, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the presence of

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

II.—VICINITY OF SANDHURST.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, sealed with the municipal seal of Sandhurst, and signed by forty-three householders, purporting to be the majority resident within an area adjoining to the municipal district of Sandhurst, containing an average of thirty-six resident householders for each square mile of such contiguous area, praying that their locality may be united with and form part of the said municipal district.

The petitioners state they are householders, and constitute the majority of residents within an area outside of but adjacent to the south-eastern boundary of the municipal district of Sandhurst, containing an average of thirty-six resident householders for each square mile thereof, and that they are desirous of being included within the said municipal district.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore pray that your Excellency will be pleased to declare, by proclamation, the locality within which they reside to be united with and form part of the Sandhurst municipality, by the following general description as defined and set forth in the accompanying plan:—Commencing at Harney's post at south-east angle of the municipal boundary, by a line about forty-one and one-quarter chains to south-westerly boundary of allotment 51 of section C, Golden Gully; thence by southerly boundary of said allotment to its south-easterly angle; and thence by a line about one hundred and sixteen and a half chains to south-east angle of allotment 113 H; and thence by a line about seventy-two chains to Casey post, at the boundary of Quarry Hill annexation."

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT:

EAGLEHAWK, ETC.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by two hundred and seventy-seven householders resident at and near Eaglehawk, in the Sandhurst division of the Sandhurst Mining District, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners set forth that a public meeting, convened by notice duly advertised in the Sandhurst and other local journals, was held at the Camp Hotel, on the 20th of May, 1862, and that a resolution was passed thereat that it is advisable that a municipal district should be proclaimed, to include within its bounds Ironbark from the western boundary of the Sandhurst municipality, Long and California Gullies, Eaglehawk, Sailors' and Peg-leg Gullies, Myers' Flat, and the vicinity of those places respectively.

The petitioners represent that the creation of a local body having control over the roads and means of communication has been long felt as evidently necessary, and that to supply this want the Marong Road Board District was created in 1861, the result of which has been antagonism between the agricultural and mining interests of the locality and the election of two boards, one sitting at Lockwood, the agricultural centre of the district, and the other sitting at Eaglehawk, the mining centre of the district.

They further represent that an overwhelming majority of the inhabitants of the Marong Road District are engaged in and depend upon mining pursuits, and are resident within the mining area, and that about seven-eighths of the house property in the road district are situate in the last-mentioned area, which contains over 500 persons, occupying tenements of the clear value of One hundred pounds each, viz., about 75 at Ironbark, about 100 in Long Gully, about 85 in California Gully, and about 250 at Eaglehawk and in Sailors' and Peg-leg Gullies.

They state, also, that no two points in the proposed municipal district are distant more than six miles from each other, and that it does not contain more than nine square miles.

They state, moreover, that they are liable to be sued at law for taxes by the Marong Road Board sitting at Lockwood, which the petitioners are advised is illegally constituted, and at which the inhabitants of the mining area are altogether unrepresented; and that, while the greater portion of the taxation falls on the inhabitants within the mining area, it will be expended for the most part on localities where agricultural interests prevail.

They state, lastly, that they are owners or occupiers of tenements situate within the boundaries of the proposed municipality, of the clear value of One hundred pounds.

And the petitioners pray as follows, viz.:

"Your memorialists therefore pray that your Excellency may be pleased to declare that a municipality shall be constituted, pursuant and subject to the statute 18 Victoria No. 15, and the other statutes in that case made and provided, to include within its boundaries the land lying and being within the boundaries following (that is to say):—Commencing at the Sullivan post of the Sandhurst municipal boundary; thence south fifty-nine degrees forty minutes west eighty-two chains; thence north thirteen degrees thirty minutes east one hundred and fifteen chains; thence north twenty-three degrees forty minutes west ninety-two chains; thence north sixty-six degrees west one hundred and nine chains; thence north fifty-three degrees west

one hundred and four chains; thence north twenty degrees east thirty-two chains; thence north eighty-nine degrees twenty minutes east one hundred and forty-four chains; thence north seventy-five degrees forty minutes east fifty-two chains; thence south fifty-eight degrees east two hundred and ten chains; thence south twenty-four degrees forty-five minutes west eighty-seven chains; thence south thirty-three degrees thirty minutes west seventy-three chains; thence south forty-seven degrees forty minutes west fifty-four chains to the commencing point aforesaid, be the said admeasurements and bearings more or less."

They represent that with respect to roads and public works they have no interests in common with the inhabitants beyond the southern boundary of the Brighton special survey, and that they have forwarded a memorial to the Commissioner of Railways and Roads against being included in the road district above mentioned.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.
RUTHERGLEN.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and fifty-seven householders resident in the township of Rutherglen, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that they are householders residing in the township of Rutherglen, and that it is the centre of a large and important mining and agricultural district, the population of which, according to the census returns, is over four thousand.

They further state that the town contains more than three hundred householders; that the buildings are for the most part well and substantially constructed; and that, at the earnest wish of the townspeople, the township has been recently surveyed by the Government, for the purpose of selling the land; but that, as at present there exist no means by which local improvements can be effected otherwise than by private enterprise, the streets and roadways are unformed, and in winter partially impassable.

They therefore believe that the establishment of a municipality will greatly conduce to the prosperity and permanent welfare of the town, and suggest the following municipal boundaries, viz.:—"Commencing from a point sixty-seven chains south-east of allotment No. 4, section 20, parish of Carlyle, bearing thence due west one mile; bearing thence due north two miles to a Government road; bearing thence east one mile; and thence south two miles to the commencing point."

They further state that the western boundary of the township [municipal district] of Richmond commences at the eastern side or alignment of the Punt road and Hoddle street, and that the municipal council have no power to expend their funds on the said road and street and the footpaths thereof, which are beyond their jurisdiction, and that consequently the footpaths and water-tables on the eastern side of the said road and street are in many places in a filthy, dangerous, and almost impassable state; from an accumulation of mud and stagnant water, the latter too being highly injurious to the health of the inhabitants.

They state lastly that the extension of the district in the manner they propose will enable the municipal council to apply a portion of the rates to the maintenance, formation, and repairs of the said road, street, and footpaths, and relieve the inhabitants of the east side of the said road and street from their present anomalous position.

"Your petitioners humbly hope that your Excellency and the Executive Council may in your wisdom deem it expedient to exercise the powers given to you by the 4th section of the before-mentioned Act [18 Victoria No. 15], and the Act of the 18th Victoria No. 32, by proclaiming the extension of the western boundary of the township [municipal district] of Richmond so as to include a moiety of the Punt road and Hoddle street, commencing at a point on the edge of the Yarra River thirty-three feet west from the present boundary of Richmond, and running in a straight and northerly direction to the intersection of Waterloo place and Hoddle street; and then commencing at a point forty-nine feet six inches west from the present boundary in Hoddle street, and running in a straight and northerly direction to the intersection of Hoddle street and Victoria street east, thereby including a moiety of the said road and street, as shown upon the sketch marked upon the margin of the petition."

AVOCA DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.

A BYE-LAW TO REGULATE THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE AVOCA DISTRICT ROAD BOARD, PASSED BY THE BOARD THE 23TH FEBRUARY, 1862.

CHAP. I.—Order of Proceedings.

THAT the business of the Avoca District Road Board be conducted with open doors, but if at any time interruption is caused by persons present who are not members of the board, the chairman shall request them to withdraw.

2. No business shall be transacted without a quorum, and if at the expiration of thirty minutes after the time of meeting there be no quorum, the meeting shall be adjourned, and such circumstance, and the names of the members present, recorded in the minutes.

3. The first business of each meeting of the board shall be to confirm the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereon except as to the accuracy thereof.

4. At all meetings of the board the reading of correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, the presentation of petitions and the bringing up of reports of committees, shall have precedence of all motions.

5. On the presentation of petitions no debate shall take place thereon until notice has been given in the usual manner, and the only question that may be entertained on presentation shall be that the petition be received, and if necessary that it be referred to a committee.

6. No motion shall be decided on at any meeting of the board unless notice in writing, signed by the member proposing the same, shall have been given at the previous meeting of the board; nor shall any reports of committees be decided on unless similar notice be given, unless in committee of the whole board, or the whole board be present.

7. The order of the day shall include all business of which due notice has been given and all matters arising out of former meetings of the board.

8. Notices of motion shall come on after the order of the day, when only the member giving notice may speak, and only in explanation of the motion.

9. Any motion entered on the notice paper, and the member having given notice of the same being absent and no other member deputed to bring forward such motion when the business is called in order, such motion shall be struck out of the paper.

10. The mover of any motion which may be referred to any committee shall be *pro hac vice* a member of such committee.

11. All communications intended for the board shall be addressed to the secretary, and all petitions and memorials shall be addressed to the chairman and board under cover to the secretary.

12. No bye-law shall be adopted at any meeting without due notice, as in cases of motion, and a copy of such bye-law shall in the interim remain open in the secretary's office for the inspection of ratepayers free of charge.

CHAP. II.—Order of Debate.

1. Any member of the board proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the chairman, and no member when speaking shall be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down, and the member calling to order shall be heard thereon, and the question of order decided before the subject is resumed or any other business entered upon.

2. Any member proposing a motion or amendment shall put it in form in writing, and shall sign and deliver the same to the secretary, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder, and no motion or amendment so made shall be withdrawn without leave of the board.

3. Any member proposing a motion or amendment shall state the nature of it before addressing the board thereon.

4. No member shall speak twice on the same question, except by way of explanation or in reply, as the mover of any original motion or amendment, and after such explanation or reply the question shall be forthwith put to the vote.

5. If more than one member rise at one time the chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to precedence.

6. No member shall digress from the subject-matter of the question under discussion, or impute improper motives, and all personal reflections shall be deemed highly disorderly.

7. Any member who shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively, or which may be construed as offensive to any other member, shall, if required by the board, withdraw such expression, and make an apology satisfactory to the board.

8. Any member may require the secretary to take down any particular words used by a member immediately on the same being used.

9. The chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case, without argument or comment, and his decision as to what is order or explanation shall be final.

10. The chairman shall arise when addressing the board in discussion of any question.

11. Any member may require the production of any of the documents of the board relating to the subject of discussion.

12. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, and upon the adoption of any amendment the original motion shall be held to be rejected, and the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.

13. The chairman shall, in taking the vote on any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative, and then in the negative, and the votes of all the members shall be entered on the minutes.

14. The board shall vote by show of hands, except in cases of election.

15. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the board, but if on the question being put the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed before the question of adjournment be again entertained; but if the motion of adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the board.

16. Any member may enter his protest against any resolution of the board, provided such protest is not inconsistent with truth or disrespectful to the board; notice, however, of such intention must be given on the adoption of the resolution; and a notice in writing, signed by the protesting member, and specifying his reasons for so protesting, must be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose in the secretary's office, the same to be considered as part of the minutes.

17. No motion, the effect of which if carried would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the board, shall be entertained during the same official year, unless a call of the whole board shall have been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the board which shall have been negatived by the board shall be again entertained during the same official year.

CHAP. III.—Elections.

1. No election to any office at the disposal of the board shall take place until four clear days' notice shall have been given in

one or more local newspaper inviting applications from candidates; and the salary for such office shall in all cases be fixed for the official year before proceeding to such election.

2. No member or officer of the board shall be received as surety for any officer appointed by the board, or for any contract or work to be performed or done for the board; and in all cases in which surety for the due and faithful performance of any duty, contract, or work is required, the expense of preparing such security shall be borne by the person or persons giving the same.

3. At all such elections, and on all occasions of taking tenders or contracts, the voting of the board shall be on cards or paper to be provided for the purpose, on which each member shall write the name of the party or candidate he supports, and sign his own name thereto. No other votes shall be taken, and the secretary shall preserve the same as a record. On the votes being so taken, the chairman shall declare the result of such voting.

CHAP. IV.—Miscellaneous Regulations.

1. Every application for appointment or tender for work shall be delivered, sealed, and endorsed outside "Application" or "Tender," stating also the office or work applied or tendered for, and no application or tender shall be received after the time specified in any advertisement inviting the same, and the number received shall be declared by the secretary before they are opened.

2. All contracts, bonds, specifications, or other documents relative to works to be done by or for the road board, shall be brought up and approved by the board before they be signed and executed.

3. For the consideration of any bye-law, or for the raising or appropriating of money, or for the objects contemplated in the standing order, No. 17, chap. 2, it shall be competent for any member, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole board for the consideration of any such subject at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given in the notice paper for the day, or notice of motion for which such call was made, is set down for consideration; and any member not in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes under consideration, or not in attendance at the voting upon such question, or any amendment thereon, whether of adjournment or otherwise, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten shillings, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the board.

4. Any one or more of the standing orders of the board, except No. 17, chap. 2, or No. 1, chap. 4, may be suspended, *pro tempore*, in case of emergency, provided that the majority present vote it necessary.

INVERLEIGH PUBLIC CEMETERY.

RULES and Regulations of the Inverleigh Public Cemetery, under 17 Victoria No. 12.

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the vault or ground is opened.

2. Any person or persons making a vault or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees, under these rules, and upon the payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the tenor of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person and his or their representatives for ever.

3. Application for such permission to be made at the office of the trustees. A certificate of permission, in the form set forth

in schedule B, will be granted to the party applying for such permission, on payment of the charges in schedule A.

4. Orders for interment to be given at the office of the trustees on the previous day between Eight o'clock a.m. and Five o'clock p.m.

5. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug; but parties requiring brick graves or vaults must construct them under the direction of the surveyor to the trustees, or any other person appointed by them for that purpose; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent (in writing) of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

6. The hour fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

7. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from Ten o'clock a.m. to Six o'clock p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from Ten o'clock a.m. to Four o'clock p.m. throughout the rest of the year.

8. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

9. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, or iron.

10. No catacombs or any wooden fencing allowed without first submitting a plan for the approval of the trustees.

11. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, is kept at the office, and may be inspected at the charge set out in the schedule, and registers of all permissions are kept by the secretary.

12. Any person who shall wilfully destroy, or do, or cause to be done, any damage to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant, will be proceeded against as directed by the 14th section of the above-mentioned Act of Council, and is liable to a penalty of Twenty pounds, or at the discretion of the justices to three months' imprisonment, and to the payment of all damages therefor.

13. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these rules and regulations.
