COMMISSION OF ENQUIRY ON MINING AFFAIRS.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen,
Defender of the Faith :

To our trusty and well-beloved the Honorable JOHN BASSON HUMFFRAY, M.P.; FREDERICK MCCOY, F.G.S.L.,
and Professor of Natural Science in the University of Melbourne; and CRAWFORD MOLLISON, Warden
of the Gold Field at Sandhurst, in our Colony of Victoria, Esquire,

GREETING :

WHEREAS the Governor of our Colony of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof,
has deemed it expedient that a Commission should forthwith issue to enquire into and report upon,
Firstly, The character and approximate extent of our Mineral Resources; Secondly, The best mode of developing
the same; Thirdly, Mining Jurisprudence generally, with a view to the amendment and consolidation of the
Mining Laws and Leasing Regulations, (a) The propriety of Selling Auriferous Lands within certain defined
areas, also the proper conditions for Mining on Private Property, (b) The classification and codification of the
Mining Board Bye-laws, (c) The best mode of defining the Rights and Privileges of the Miners, and as to the
desirability of granting generally larger Areas for Mining and Residence purposes with a better Tenure than
is provided under the existing Bye-laws, (d) and also defining the Powers and Duties of the Wardens, Mining
Surveyors, and Registrars; Fourthly, The necessity for and the proper organization of a distinct Mining
Department in the Government under the charge of a Responsible Minister; Fifthly, The desirability and
practicability of establishing a School of Mines in connection with the Mining Museum; Sixthly, To enquire
generally into the present Condition and Prospects of the Mining Interests of Victoria: Now know ye, that
We, reposing great trust and confidence in your knowledge and ability, have authorised and appointed, and by
these presents do authorise and appoint, you, John Basson Humffray, Frederick McCoy, and Crawford Mollison,
to be Commissioners for the purpose aforesaid: And for the better effecting the purpose of this Commission,
We do give and grant you power and authority to call before you such persons as you shall judge likely to
afford you any information upon the subject of this Commission, and to enquire of and concerning the
premises by all other lawful means and ways whatsoever: And this Commission shall continue in full force
and virtue, and you, the said Commissioners, may from time to time, and at any place or places, proceed in the
execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein contained, although the enquiry be not regularly
continued from time to time by adjournment: And lastly, that you do, with as little delay as possible, report
to us, under your hands and seals, your opinion resulting from the said enquiry of the matter and things set
forth in this our Commission. In testimony whereof We have caused these our Letters to be made Patent,
and the Seal of our said Colony to be hereunto affixed.

Witness our trusty and well-beloved SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most
Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of our Colony of
Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, at Melbourne, this eighth day of July, One thousand
eight hundred and sixty-two, and in the twenty-sixth year of our reign.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

VICINITY OF GISBORNE.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by fifty-seven householders, purporting to be the majority resident within an area adjoining to the municipal district of Gisborne, containing an average of thirty-six resident householders for each square mile of such contiguous area, praying that their locality may be united with and form part of the said municipal district.

The petitioners state that they are householders resident upon lands outside of and adjacent to the municipality of Gisborne, and that they constitute a majority of the residents within an area surrounding the said municipality containing an average of thirty-six resident householders for each square mile, which area they are desirous should be annexed to and form part of the said municipality.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

Your petitioners therefore pray that your Excellency will be pleased to declare by Proclamation the respective localities within which we reside be united with and form part of the said municipality of Gisborne, by the following general description, as defined and set forth on the plan [which accompanied the petition], viz:—Commencing at a line from the south-east corner of block xxx. on the Mount Alexander road, running north two miles forty chains to the north-east corner of section 1, known as Todd's paddock; then running west one mile twenty chains to the south-east corner of that part of Early's allotment known as New Gisborne; then north fifteen chains to the south side of the railway line; then along the railway line eighteen chains to the section of the west boundary of allotment 17, known as Hurst's paddock, with the Mount Alexander Railway; then along the west boundary of Hurst's paddock south twenty chains to the north-east corner of the Racecourse paddock; then west twenty-four chains along the Racecourse boundary; then south-west along the same boundary twenty-five chains to the Mount Alexander road; then south along the Mount Alexander road forty-five chains to the section of the west boundary of block xxxiv. with the main Mount Alexander road; then due south along the west boundary of section 34 one mile sixty-four chains to the south-west corner of section 1, known as the Gisborne town common; then due east one mile sixty chains to the south-east corner of section xxx., the starting point.*

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

ENLARGEMENT OF RICHMOND.

MUNICIPALITY OF CHEWTON.

BYE-LAW No. 8.—A BYE-LAW FOR LICENSING AND REGULATING THE SLAUGHTER OF SMALL CATTLE WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is rendered competent for the council of any municipal district to pass bye-laws for (inter alia) regulating the killing of butchers' meat and the suppression of nuisances: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the council of the municipal district of Chewton, that all butchers whose premises shall have been suitably prepared and properly paved for purposes of slaughtering, so that in the judgment of the council, after the report of the inspector or other officer, the said premises are found to be in a fit and proper state, be granted a license, and permitted to kill sheep and lambs, swine, and goats; provided that all such persons shall receive or cause to be received the blood into tubs or other suitable vessels or receptacles, together with all offal or other offensive matter, and remove the same or cause it to be removed from such premises at least once in every twenty-four hours. And for the purpose of better carrying out the provisions of this bye-law, such premises shall be registered at the municipal or town clerk's offices, and shall at all times be open to the inspection of the council or their duly appointed inspector or other officer. And be it also ordered and enacted, that written notice of application for such license and registration shall be given to the town clerk at least eight days before the same be granted, made, and entered, and be exhibited at his offices or the town hall; and that the said licenses and registrations shall issue and be made on the first Monday of any month, or upon such other day as the council may hereafter appoint. And any butcher who shall kill any sheep or lamb, swine, or goat without being duly licensed and registered as aforesaid (except the *bond fide* servants of the butcher), or whose premises shall not be kept and maintained inoffensive and in order, as above required, or who shall neglect or refuse to comply with any of the regulations of this bye-law, shall, for any such neglect or breach thereof, be subject to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds sterling, and such penalty shall and may be awarded, measured, recovered, and distributed by summary process before any two or more justices of the peace having jurisdiction within the said municipal district of Chewton.—[62 W.3590.]

BYE-LAW No. 9.—A BYE-LAW FOR PROHIBITING THE DEPOSIT OF NIGHT-SOIL OR OTHER OFFENSIVE MATTER EXCEPT IN SOME PUBLIC DEPOT, AND FOR THE PROHIBITING OF BOILING DOWN OR BURNING OF OFFAL OR OTHER OFFENSIVE MATTER WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to pass any bye-law with the view to the preservation of the public health: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Chewton, that no person shall deposit or put, or caused to be deposited, placed, or put, any night-soil, offal, or other offensive matter upon any of the unenclosed lands, or upon any public road or way, or in any creek, or in any mining shaft, paddock, or waterhole within the boundaries of the municipality, excepting in some public depot appointed by the council to be the receptacle of such night-soil, manure, offal, or offensive refuse; nor shall any person or persons burn or boil down, or cause to be burned or boiled down, any offal or offensive refuse within the boundaries of the municipality. And any person proved guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds sterling, the same to be awarded, measured, recovered, and distributed by summary process before any two or more justices of the peace having jurisdiction within the said municipal district of Chewton.—[62 W.4142.]

BYE-LAW No. 11.—TO ENABLE THE CHAIRMAN OR ANY THREE COUNCILLORS TO CONVENE THE COUNCIL ON SPECIAL OCCASIONS.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the council of the municipal district of Chewton, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, it shall and may be lawful for the chairman (or any three councillors, and he or they shall have the power (in cases which to him or them shall appear urgent and of special emergency) to convene a meeting of this council at any reasonable time, after twelve hours' notice of such meeting shall have been given to each councillor, or left at his usual place of abode.—[62 W.4187.]

The foregoing Bye-laws, Nos. 8, 9, and 11, made by the municipal council of Chewton, have been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF ST. ARNAUD.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—TO REGULATE BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF ST. ARNAUD.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the municipal council of any municipal district established under the same to make bye-laws for the regulation of their proceedings: And whereas by a proclamation dated 12th August, 1861, the district of St. Arnaud was proclaimed a municipal district, under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of St. Arnaud, that from and after this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the business of the said council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be called the standing orders of the said council, that is to say:—

CHAP. I.—Order of Proceedings.

1. *Sittings of council.*—The council shall meet every alternate Wednesday to transact public business; such meetings shall be open to the public, but a majority may require the exclusion of strangers during the discussion of any particular question; minutes shall be taken of their proceedings; which shall at all reasonable hours be open for the inspection of ratepayers.

2. *Members, how designated.*—The members, at meetings of the council, shall address each other by their official titles, namely, that of chairman and councillor.

3. *Special meetings.*—The chairman or any three councillors shall at any time have power to call a special meeting of the council, by written instructions to the town clerk, provided that the notice be given of the business proposed to be transacted at least twenty-four hours before such meeting is appointed to be held.

4. *Time of commencing business.*—The chairman shall take the chair at the appointed hour, or as soon after as a quorum is present; but should the chairman be absent when a quorum is assembled, the council may elect a temporary chairman; and in case a quorum shall not be present within twenty minutes from the appointed time of meeting, then the meeting shall lapse; and such circumstances, together with the names of the members present, shall be entered in the minute book.

5. *First business of council.*—The first business of each meeting of the council shall be to confirm the minutes of the previous meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereupon except as to the accuracy thereof.

6. *Order of proceedings.*—At all ordinary meetings of the council, the reading of correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, the presentation by members of the council of petitions and memorials, and the bringing up of the reports of committees, shall have precedence of all motions; and all reports of committees shall be considered or adopted on their presentation.

7. *Orders of the day.*—The orders of the day shall be all matters arising out of proceedings of former meetings of the council, any business the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration, any business of which any member or members may have given notice of motion in writing, signed by such member at the previous meeting, and such notices shall be taken into consideration in the order in which they shall have been given.

8. *Discussion on memorials, &c., presented to council.*—On the presentation of any communication, petition, or memorial, no debate shall take place thereon until notice has been given in the usual manner; and the only question that shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation shall be that, on the motion of any councillor, it shall be received or be referred to a committee for their consideration and report.

9. *Communications, &c., how to be presented.*—Every memorial, petition, or communication addressed to the council shall be in proper form, and be presented by one of the members of the council, and such member shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.

10. *Debates on motions in absence of mover.*—No motion of which any member shall have given notice shall be proceeded with, unless such member, or some other member authorized by him, in writing, be present; and all notices not so proceeded with shall lapse.

11. *Accounts must be submitted to finance committee.*—All accounts shall be referred to the finance committee, to be examined and reported on, and no accounts shall be paid unless passed by the finance committee.

12. *Accounts, how to be paid.*—All accounts shall be paid by cheques, signed by two councillors countersigned by the town clerk.

CHAP. II.—Order of Debate.

1. *Call to order in debate.*—Any member, when proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the chairman, and no member shall be interrupted unless by a call to order, when he shall sit down; the member calling to order shall then be heard upon such point of order, and the question decided before the subject is resumed or any other business entered upon.

2. *Questions once before council to be withdrawn only by permission.*—No question once brought before the council shall be withdrawn without leave, and no discussion shall be permitted on any motion until the same be seconded.

3. *Pre-audience.*—If more than one councillor rise, the chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to pre-audience.

4. *Number of times councillor may speak.*—No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, unless by way of explanation only, or in reply as the mover of an original motion, or upon any amendment, and after such explanation or reply the question shall be forthwith put to the vote; but councillors merely seconding any motion shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

5. *Chairman's decision final in questions of order or practice.*—The presiding chairman, when called upon to decide on points of order or practice, shall state the standing order, rule, or practice which he deems applicable to the case, without discussion or comment, and his decision shall be final on all questions of order or practice.

6. *Personal reflections considered disorderly.*—No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion or impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.

7. *Clerk to note particular expressions if required.*—Any councillor may require the town clerk to take down in writing any expressions immediately on their being used.

8. *Amendments, mode of discussion, number, &c.*—One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost another amendment may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote; and upon any amendment being carried the original motion shall be deemed to be rejected, and the amendment so carried shall take the position of the original motion, and on it one amendment can be made and no more.

Documents may be produced if required.—Any councillor may demand the production of any paper or document relating to the subject under discussion.

9. *Mode of putting the question.*—The presiding chairman shall, in taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative; and the votes of all members (if a division shall be called for) shall be entered in the minute book.

10. *Rescinding of motion in the same year.*—No motion, the effect of which would rescind any motion previously carried, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council be duly made for the purpose.

11. *Motions for adjournment.*—No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment; but if the question be decided in the negative, the motion then under discussion, or the next motion or order of the day shall be considered before the question of adjournment shall be again entertained; but if the motion of adjournment be carried, any business left undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the council.

12. *Chairman to rise when addressing council.*—The presiding chairman shall rise when addressing the council.

13. *Councillors may protest against decision on certain conditions.*—Any councillor may record his protest against any decision of the council, provided the same be done in writing, and presented not later than the next meeting; notice of such intention, however, must be given on the adoption of the resolution.

CHAP. III.—Committees.

1. *Permanent committees.*—There shall be three permanent committees of the council, to be called the public works committee, the finance committee, and the legislative committee, which shall be chosen annually at the meeting of the council next after the annual election of chairman.

2. *Finance committee to consist of three members.*—The finance committee shall consist of three councillors, and two shall form a quorum.

3. *Public works committee to consist of whole council.*—The public works committee shall consist of the whole council, three of whom shall form a quorum.

4. *Legislative committee to consist of three members.*—The legislative committee shall consist of three councillors, and two shall form a quorum.

5. *Town clerk to convene meetings of committees.*—The town clerk shall convene every committee within seven days of its first appointment, and at any time by order of the council, or the written order of the chairman, or of any two members of such committee.

6. *Chairman of council to be member of committees.*—The chairman shall be ex officio a member of all committees, and each committee shall choose its own chairman. When special committees are appointed, the member proposing such committee shall be chairman thereof.

7. *Observance of standing orders in committees.*—The standing orders of council shall be observed in committees, except the number of times limited for speaking.

8. *Finance committee may spend Two pounds per week.*—The finance committee shall be at liberty, without the express order of the council, to authorise disbursements for current expenses, to an amount not exceeding Two pounds in any one week, and shall report the same to the council at its next sitting.

CHAP. IV.—Miscellaneous Regulations.

1. *Call of council: penalty for non-attendance.*—For the consideration of any bye-law, or for the raising or appropriating of moneys or the objects contemplated in standing order, Chap. 2, No. 10, it shall be competent for any member, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council; and if such motion be carried, seven clear days' previous notice thereof and of the object of the same in writing shall be given or sent by the town clerk to each member; and any member not in attendance when such order of the day or motion comes under consideration, or not in attendance at the voting upon such question or any amendment thereof, whether of adjournment or otherwise, shall be liable to the penalty hereinafter stated, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council.

2. *Councillors not to have pecuniary interest in contracts, or be security for any officer of council.*—No member of the council shall have, directly or indirectly, any share or interest in any contract or employment or other work in connection with the council, nor shall he be accepted as surety for any officer or employé of the council, or for any contract with the council; and in all cases where security shall be required, the expense of preparing the same shall be borne by the party giving the same.

3. *Plans and specifications of proposed works to be open to inspection of ratepayers.*—All plans and specifications for the formation of any street or portion thereof shall be laid before the council at least six days prior to the same being considered and ordered upon, and be open for inspection by any ratepayer during that time.

4. *Town clerk to have charge of seal, and all books, &c.*—The town clerk shall have charge of the common seal of the corporation, and shall be responsible for the same, and shall verify each impression by his signature, and shall not affix the same to any document without the express order of the council; and shall also have charge of all books, papers, plans and other documents the property of the council, which shall be open at all reasonable hours during the day, to the inspection of any councillor, who shall be at liberty to take copies of the same or any of them; but under no circumstances shall he permit any such book, paper, plan or other document to be removed from his custody without the express order of the chairman or the council.

5. *Suspension of standing orders.*—Any one or more of the standing orders may be suspended *pro tem.*, with the consent of a majority of the council.

6. *Penalty for breach of any clause.*—Any person or persons committing or causing to be committed any neglect or breach of any clause in this bye-law, shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 1, made by the municipal council of St. Arnaud, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, No. 16, intituled, *An Act to amend an Act intituled An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is thereby enacted, that no toll, rate, or due shall be imposed by the council of any municipal district, save by bye-law subject to the assent of the Governor as in said recited Act mentioned: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council for the district of Williamstown, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor as required by the provisions of the said Act, the hereinmentioned rate of One shilling and threepence in the pound shall be and be taken to be the rate of the assessment of all property in houses and lands within the limits of the municipal district of Williamstown for the current year ending the 7th April, 1863, to be and remain in force until a new rate be made by the municipal council for the district of Williamstown, as required by the provisions of the 18 Victoria No. 15, sec. 33.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 52, made by the municipal council of Williamstown, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

WOODEND GENERAL CEMETERY.

RULES and Regulations of Woodend General Cemetery.

- The burial ground will be open daily to the public from sunrise to sunset.
- All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.
- By the eighth section of the Act, any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees, under these rules, and upon payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons, and his or their representatives for ever.
- Application for such permission to be made to the trustees. A certificate of permission will be granted to the party applying on payment of the charges in schedule A.
- The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on a certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relations and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.
- The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, if required, at a uniform rate of (see schedule A); but parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the trustees; and in case interment is to be made

in any private grave or vault, the consent (in writing) of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

7. Orders for interment to be given to the sexton (or other person appointed by the trustees) seven working hours prior to the hour fixed for the funeral, if not, an extra charge will be made (see schedule A).

8. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones must be kept in repair and proper condition by and at the expense of the owners.

9. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave must be bricked up, and covered with a slab or stone, slate, iron, or brick, to the satisfaction of the trustees.

10. The plans of all monuments, tombstones, and fences to be submitted to the trustees for approval.

11. Any person wantonly and wilfully destroying, or doing, or causing to be done, any damage to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant in the cemetery, is guilty of a misdemeanor, and, being convicted thereof, is liable to a penalty of Twenty pounds or three months' imprisonment, as prescribed by the 14th section of the Act 17 Victoria No. 12.

12. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for interments will be from Eight o'clock a.m. to Six o'clock p.m. in the month of September to April inclusive, and from Eight o'clock a.m. to Four o'clock p.m. in the other four months, except on Sundays, when the usual and only hours for funerals will be from Two to Five o'clock p.m. throughout the year.

13. No servant or other person employed by, or engaged in any duty on behalf of, the trustees, will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

14. A plan of the cemetery and a register will be kept, and may be inspected at the charges set forth in schedule A.

15. The name, age, denomination, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of deceased, must be stated at the time of giving the order for interment.

16. The trustees reserve to themselves the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.
