## THE CIRCUIT COURTS OF VICTORIA DURING THE YEAR 1863.

**WHEREAS** by an Act passed in the fifteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better administration of Justice in the Colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor of the said colony, by any orders to be by him, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, from time to time made and proclaimed, to define the limits of districts within and the times at which circuit courts shall be holden in the said colony, and the said limits and times to alter and vary as he shall, with the advice aforesaid, deem necessary: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order define and appoint the times at which the several circuit courts of Victoria shall be holden during the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three to be as follow, that is to say:—

Friday the twenty-third day of October.

**At CASTLEMAINE, on—**

Saturday the twenty-first day of February.

Tuesday the seventeenth day of February.

#### REQUISITIONS.

##### XVI.

Requisitions are to be addressed to the Government Storekeeper upon the authorised form (No. 1), and are to be rendered as follows, viz.:

Stores, on or before the 1st January, 1st April, 1st July, and 1st October, respectively.

Fuel and light, on the dates specified for stores.  
Articles for building and manufacturing purposes, from time to time, as required. The requisitionist must, however, give timely notice of his requirements.

Forage, in the Melbourne district, on the 25th of each month for the ensuing month.

Forage, required for consumption at stations in the country districts, at such times as the season of the year, the rates of transport, and the amount of storage accommodation at the stations may render advisable. All such requisitions, however, to be rendered on the 25th of each month.

All heads of departments are expressly enjoined to transmit their quarterly applications in due time. No supplies will be furnished until fourteen days after the receipt of the requisition.

## REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER, 1862.

ACTUAL Daily Mortality of persons of both sexes under and over five years of age in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, embracing a radius of ten miles, and including the Statistical Sub-districts of Melbourne Proper, East Melbourne, North Melbourne and Carlton, Fitz Roy Municipality, East Collingwood, Richmond, Jika-jika parish (exclusive of North Melbourne, Collingwood, and Richmond), South Yarra and Prahran, Emerald Hill and Sandridge, St. Kilda and Brighton, Doutta Galla and Keilor, Boroondara and Heidelberg, Cut-paw-paw parish, and the shipping in Hobson's Bay; also, the Temperature in the shade at Melbourne, deduced from the mean of twenty-four hourly observations taken at the Flagstaff Observatory on each day during the month of November, 1862:—

The daily average of mortality in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of November was 8.10, as against 6.26 in the previous month. The total number of deaths was 243, as against 189 in November, 1861, 503 in November, 1860, and 271 in November, 1859. The mean for the last four years was thus 301, or 58 deaths in excess of those in the month under review.

The mean temperature of the month, as registered at the Melbourne Observatory, was 64°, against 60.4° for November, 1861, against 60.5° for November, 1860, and against 61.2° for November, 1859. The highest temperature (97.5°) was experienced at 2 p.m. on the 17th, and the lowest (43.4°) at 5 a.m. on the 13th; the range for the month thus being 54.1°. The greatest range (46.1°) was on the 14th, from a maximum 96.3° to a minimum 50.2°; and the least (1.4°) on the 27th, from a maximum 70.5° to a minimum 69.1°; the mean daily range being 26.8°. The barometer reached its highest point during the month (30.186 in.) at 9 and 10 a.m. on the 15th, and its lowest (29.377 in.) at 11 a.m. on the 14th; the range of pressure for the month thus being .809 in. The mean pressure for the month was 29.857 in., against 29.901 in. for November, 1861, and against 29.83 in. for November, 1860.

The mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality for the first four weeks in November, were as follow:—

The 243 deaths which occurred during the month were thus divided, males 137, females 106, or 56 and 44 per cent. respectively; children under five years 134, persons over that age 109, or 55 and 45 per cent. respectively. This is the only month of the last six in which the mortality at the younger division of life has exceeded that at the older; such a result must, however, be expected throughout the summer months.

On the 19th 16 deaths took place, 15 on the 22nd, and 13 on the 14th and 26th respectively. The days of lowest mortality were the 1st and 3rd, 2 deaths only having been returned for each of those days.

The oldest persons who died during the month were a man aged 82, of pneumonia; a female aged 75, and another aged 78, of old age.

The violent deaths recorded may be thus described:—A laborer, aged 17, was scalded to death; a boy of 7 years of age was drowned in the City baths; two women, whose ages were respectively 21 and 51, were found drowned, the one in the Yarra and the other in the sea at Brighton; a farmer, aged 45, died of fracture of the thigh a man of 57 of injury to the arm, and a boy of 13 of injuries received from a fall; a clerk, aged 40, died of poison; 3 infants were suffocated in bed, and 1 from want of timely assistance at birth.

Forty-six, or nearly 19 per cent. of the total number of deaths, took place in public or charitable institutions, as follows:—Melbourne Hospital, 32; Benevolent Asylum, 3; Lunatic Asylum, 3; Lying-in Hospital, 2; Immigrants' Home, 2; Pentridge Stockade, 1; Western Gaol, 3; Hulk *Success*, 1.

The following table shows the number of persons of all ages according to the last census, the number of deaths of persons under and over five years of age, the total at all ages, and the number of deaths to every 1000 of the population during the month of November, 1862, in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, and in each of the sub-districts of which it is composed:—

Of the 134 deaths of children under five years of age, the sexes were nearly equal, 66 having been of males, and 68 of females; 107 were under one year old, 15 between one and two, 7 between two and three, 4 between three and four, and 1 between four and five years.

Of the 109 deaths of persons over five years of age, 71, or about 65 per cent., were of males, and 38, or about 35 per cent., of females; 6 were between five and ten years, 7 between ten and fifteen, 4 between fifteen and twenty, 9 between twenty and twenty-five, 10 between twenty-five and thirty, 13 between thirty and thirty-five, 9 between thirty-five and forty, 9 between forty and forty-five, 10 between forty-five and fifty, 15 between fifty and fifty-five, 4 between fifty-five and sixty, 3 between sixty and sixty-five, 2 between sixty-five and seventy, 3 between seventy and seventy-five, and 5 of upwards of seventy-five.

As compared with October, an increase has taken place in deaths from zymotic diseases, principally in consequence of the prevalence of diarrhoea and dysentery, from which complaints alone 47 deaths resulted. Most deaths, however, were due to local diseases, which also showed an increase upon the numbers of the previous month.

## MUNICIPALITY OF ST. ARNAUD.

BYE-LAW No. 8.—TO REPEAL BYE-LAW No. 7, AND MAKE OTHER PROVISIONS FOR CONDUCTING PUBLIC MEETINGS OF THE RATEPAYERS AND ELECTIONS OF MEMBERS OF COUNCIL, AND FOR REGULATING THE PROCEEDINGS AT THE ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is rendered competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings, the conducting of elections and public meetings of the ratepayers, the determining the validity of disputed elections, &c.: And whereas a bye-law (No. 7) was made by the municipal council of St. Arnaud for regulating, conducting, and determining the above-mentioned subjects, and was assented to by His Excellency the Governor: And whereas it has been found desirable to repeal the aforesaid bye-law: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of St. Arnaud, that the said bye-law No. 7 be and is hereby repealed, and the following substituted:—

1. That at all public meetings of the ratepayers, in the absence of the chairman, the senior councillor then present shall preside.

2. That in any polling place no person other than the chairman, the town clerk or his deputy, the scrutineers or electors who shall for the time being be tendering their votes, shall be entitled to be present; and it is hereby provided, that it shall always be lawful for the chairman, the town clerk, or his deputy, to summon to his assistance in such compartment or room any member or members of the police force, for the purpose of preserving the public peace, quelling any breach thereof that may have arisen, and for removing out of such room any person or persons who may be obstructing the polling, or wilfully violating any of the provisions of this section of this bye-law.

3. The chairman shall cause to be provided for the purpose of such election a locked up box, of which he shall keep the key, with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the voting papers, and which box shall stand in front of the chairman; and each elector shall receive from the chairman, a voting paper in the form in the schedule herunto annexed, and shall, thereupon, retire to a compartment or stall provided for that purpose, and there strike out the name or names of such candidate or candidates for whom he does not intend to vote, and deposit the same in the ballot-box in the presence of the chairman, town clerk, or his deputy, and scrutineers; and in case such elector shall be unable to read, or be blind, he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall thereupon mark or strike out the names or name of such candidates or candidate, as such elector shall designate; and no elector shall take out of such polling place any such voting paper, either before or after he has marked the same.

4. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint by writing under his hand, to be delivered to the chairman at any time before eight o'clock in the morning of the day of polling, one scrutineer, to be present on his behalf, in the polling place.

5. The chairman may put to any person, before he shall have received his voting paper, the following questions:—

1. What is your name and surname?
2. Are you twenty-one years of age?
3. Are you a ratepayer on the ratepayers' roll of the municipal district of St. Arnaud.

6. At every election it shall be the duty of the town clerk or his deputy to provide himself with a ratepayers' roll, and as each elector comes forward to demand his voting paper to see whether the name of such elector appears upon the roll as a ratepayer, within the meaning of the Municipal Act, and as each elector deposits his voting paper within the ballot-box to mark off such electors' name as having voted at such election.

7. In case the voting paper as of any person shall have been received, and any other person shall afterwards demand his voting paper as of the same person, the chairman, when such person shall propose to deposit his voting paper in the ballot-box, shall refuse to allow the same to be put therein, but shall receive and keep the same apart, and at the close of the election decide whether such person has already voted or not; and if it shall appear to the chairman that such person has not already voted at such election, such vote shall be added to the number already polled; but if otherwise such vote shall not be allowed.

8. At the close of the poll, or as soon after as conveniently may be, the chairman, in the presence of the town clerk or his deputy and the scrutineers, shall count the number of votes polled for each candidate, and upon ascertaining the result shall make the same publicly known, and cause to be affixed a notice thereof in one or more places of public resort; and the chairman shall then, in the presence of the town clerk, or his deputy, and the scrutineers, seal up all the voting papers given during the election, and safely preserve them for at least six months among the records of the council.

9. The chairman of the council shall be annually elected in the following manner. At the first meeting of the council after the annual election, the senior councillor then present shall take the chair at the hour appointed for such meeting, provided the whole council be present, otherwise, at the expiration of half-an-hour thereafter; and the council shall proceed upon open voting, upon motion, as usual, to elect a chairman for the current year; and the councillor in whose favor the show of hands shall be declared by the acting chairman to be the chairman of the council for the current year, and shall take the chair accordingly.

10. If the result of voting for chairman should be that the highest number of votes is held equally by two or more councillors, then another voting shall take place for those councillors only having such equality of votes until a majority is recorded.

11. Upon the resignation or disqualification of the chairman of the council, at the next meeting of the council thereafter, the senior councillor then present shall take the chair *pro tem.*

and immediately after the confirmation of the minutes of the last meeting shall proceed to the election of a chairman of council for the residue of the municipal year in a manner prescribed by this bye-law.

12. In determining the seniority of a councillor for the purpose of this bye-law, it shall be understood to mean that councillor who shall have held office for the longest period without re-election; but in the event of two or more councillors being equal in this respect, then that councillor of the number who polled the most votes when elected shall be deemed to be the senior councillor; if it should further happen that two or more of the beforementioned councillors had an equality of votes at the time of election, then lots shall be drawn between such councillors having such equality of votes for the position of seniority.

13. Any person or persons committing, or causing to be committed, any breach or neglect of this bye-law, shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

## MUNICIPALITY OF RICHMOND.

BYE-LAW No. 19.—A BYE-LAW FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF SLAUGHTER-HOUSES WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF RICHMOND.

WHEREAS it is expedient to prevent the injury to the public health arising from the practice of slaughtering within the municipal district of Richmond, and to establish slaughter-houses in and for the municipal district of Richmond: And whereas buildings and other conveniences suitable for the purposes of slaughtering have been erected and provided within the said district, upon a piece of land situate along the western side of the Government road called "Burnley street," and commencing at a point in the western side line of said road six and one-quarter chains south of its intersection by the Melbourne Railway; thence by a line bearing south seven and a half chains; thence by a line bearing west ten chains; thence by a line bearing north seven and one-half chains; thence by a line bearing east ten chains into the starting point: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of said district, that from after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of the colony of Victoria, as required by law, the said buildings and premises shall be and the same are hereby established as and for slaughter-houses for the said district.

BYE-LAW No. 20 OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF RICHMOND, FOR THE REGULATION OF THE PUBLIC ABATOIRS OF RICHMOND, AND FOR FIXING THE RATES AND DUES FOR SLAUGHTERING TO BE CHARGED THEREON.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the killing and sale of butchers' meat, and the establishment of slaughter-houses: And whereas public abattoirs having been established within the municipal district of Richmond, it is expedient and necessary that regulations should be made for the use of the same, and that the rates for slaughtering, fees, and dues, to be taken for the use of such abattoirs and appurtenances by parties slaughtering, or causing to be slaughtered, live stock therein should be fixed: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Richmond, that from and after the expiration of twenty days from the date of the *Government Gazette* in which it shall be notified that the said public abattoirs are completed, and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the following rules and regulations shall be observed by, and shall be binding upon, all persons using the public abattoirs of the municipality of Richmond, or resorting thereto, and that the charges hereinafter mentioned shall be the dues to be paid for slaughtering at the said abattoirs.

1. *Time when slaughtering shall be permitted.*—The abattoirs shall be open and slaughtering shall be permitted at all hours of the day and night, except on Sundays for its entire duration, when the whole establishment shall be closed, and no slaughtering or other work shall be carried on therein.

2. *Time allowed for slaughtering certain animals.*—Every person who shall pay to the superintendent of the abattoirs the dues for slaughtering according to the rates hereinafter fixed, shall be entitled to the use of that portion of the abattoirs and of the appurtenances of the same which shall be appointed to him by the superintendent of the abattoirs for the purpose of slaughtering any of the animals which may be lawfully slaughtered therein, for a reasonable time, not exceeding the time hereinafter mentioned, viz.:—

For the killing and dressing of every ox, cow, bull, heifer, or steer, sixty minutes.  
Every calf or head of swine, thirty minutes.  
And every sheep, lamb, or goat, twenty minutes.

3. *Persons using the abattoirs to cleanse the same.*—Every person who shall use the abattoirs, or any portion thereof, shall immediately thereafter remove all offal, filth, and refuse of every description whatsoever which shall remain or result from such use of the abattoirs by him, from the abattoir premises to the pits or places appointed for the reception of such offal, filth, or refuse, and shall cleanse thoroughly, to the satisfaction of the superintendent of the abattoirs, all the portion of the said abattoirs which he shall so use.

4. *Damages to be made good.*—Every person using the abattoirs, or any part of the same, and who shall break, injure, or damage the same, or any part of the same, shall make good the destruction, damage, or injury done by him.

5. *Persons bringing live stock to the abattoirs responsible for the safety thereof.*—Every person who shall bring, convey, or conduct any live stock to the abattoirs for the purpose of slaughter, shall inform the superintendent of the abattoirs of the description and number of the live stock, and the superintendent shall enter the information so tendered to him in a book to be kept by him for that purpose: the succession of entries in such book shall, in case of any question arising, decide the order of priority in which the several persons shall be entitled to the use of the yards, pens, killing houses, or appurtenances of the abattoirs, and if no place shall have been previously appointed for the reception of the live stock of the person so bringing the same, such person shall place such live stock in such portion of the yards, pens, or premises of the said abattoirs as the said superintendent shall direct, and the person so bringing such live stock shall himself be responsible for the safety thereof.

6. *Rates or dues for slaughtering at the abattoirs.*—The slaughtering dues which shall be demanded, received, and taken at the abattoirs by the superintendent or other officer or persons for that purpose appointed by the municipal council of Richmond, shall be as follows, viz.:—

For every ox, cow, bull, heifer, or steer, One shilling.

For every head of swine, One shilling.

For every calf, Sixpence.

For every sheep, lamb, or goat, Twopence.

7. *Persons entitled to use certain portions of the abattoirs shall cleanse the same when required.*—If any person shall desire to kill live stock in one particular portion of the abattoirs, under such conditions as to time and otherwise as the said council shall think necessary and prescribe, the superintendent shall, on application from such person, submit to the council the particulars of any such proposal; and if the council shall approve of such appropriation, such person shall, at all times while he shall use such portion of the said abattoirs, keep the same clean and free from offence, whether by accumulation of blood, filth, or otherwise; and shall further, whenever so required by the superintendent of the abattoirs, cleanse, scrape, limewash, or otherwise purify, in such manner as shall be necessary, and as the said superintendent shall direct, the walls, doors, floors, or other parts of the portion of the said abattoirs which he shall be so accustomed and entitled to use; and he shall in all respects comply with the regulations of the municipal council of Richmond for the government of the abattoirs in force for the time being.

8. *Live stock to be supplied with sufficient food and water.*—Every person who shall bring live stock for slaughter to the said abattoirs, and shall permit the same to remain in the yards or pens of the said abattoirs for a longer period than twenty-four hours, shall provide such live stock with sufficient food and water.

9. *Penalty for offences against any of the provisions of this bye-law.*—For every neglect or breach of any of the provisions hereof the offender shall, upon conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

*The foregoing Bye-laws Nos. 19 and 20, made by the municipal council of Richmond, have been assented to by the Governor in Council.*

Printed forms of tender may be obtained from the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne, or from the officer in charge of police at each station, by whom also any information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

The tenders for each station will be accepted or rejected separately.

Tenders may be for either of the supplies required, oats, bran, hay, or straw only, and if all be included in one tender, it will be accepted for one article only if advisable.

As much forage as the storage will accommodate will be drawn at a time for the convenience of contractors.



The price must be per ton for hay and straw, and per bushel for oats and bran, including delivery at the stations and all charges; bags to be returned when empty.

The net weight only after deducting the tare is to be charged.

No tender will be entertained unless accompanied by a certificate from two responsible persons that they are willing to become bound as sureties for the due fulfilment of the contract in one-third the estimated cost of the entire supply at the station tendered for; and in the event of the tender being accepted, this bond must be executed within twenty days, failing which the contract may be again advertised or another tender accepted.

The names and addresses of the tenderers and of their proposed sureties must be stated at full length.

All tenders must be enclosed in a separate envelope, marked, "Tender for ——" (as the case may be), and deposited in the box at the Government Stores, King street, or if sent by post they must be addressed to the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known by *Gazette* notice and by letter to accepted tenderers.

#### CONDITIONS.

1. The hay to be eaten, good, sound, and sweet; the straw to be wheaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats (colonial grown) and bran to be sound and sweet and of the best description.

2. The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in schedule being, however, only approximative, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will not, however, exceed during the whole year 50 per cent. of the estimated quarterly consumption.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.

4. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the pre-cribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the District, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which, it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue either to the public service or the contractor, by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. It will be competent for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, or for the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to that effect, it being understood that such notice only can be given from the first day of a month, and provided that no such notice can be given before the 30th June, 1863.

##### BYE-LAWS.

The only bye-law passed by the council during the half-year has been one for the appropriation of the final balance of the Government grant-in-aid for 1861, together with the total grant received for 1862.—Not yet assented to.

##### WATER SUPPLY.

During the half-year the question of supplying the town with water from the Government reservoir at Bullarook has continually occupied the attention of the council, and been the subject of repeated correspondence with the Government. In July last the Honorable the Commissioner of Public Works promised a sum of £3000 towards the required works; but a legal difficulty has since arisen, which prevents the council from securing the control of the Bullarook Reservoir, in consequence of its being outside the municipal boundary. The Government, however, has promised to overcome this difficulty by inserting a clause in the New Local Government Bill, empowering municipal councils to hold land and construct works outside their districts, and the council has taken steps in the mean time to secure, if possible, the promised Government grant.

## PROPOSED WIDENING OF A PART OF BREAKNECK ROAD, PARISH OF MULGRAVE.
