COMMON INCREASED.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the United Common hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE UNITED TOWN AND FARMERS' COMMON OF EUROA (mentioned in a Proclamation bearing date the fifteenth day of September, 1862) shall be and the same is hereby increased by adding thereto the unappropriated Crown lands within the town boundary of Euroa.—(63.G.375.)

UNITED COMMONS.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that where there are two or more neighboring commons the Governor in Council may proclaim that the same shall be a common under the name of "The United Town and Gold Field [or, as the case may be] Common, of" for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that each of the neighboring commons hereinafter mentioned shall respectively be a United Common, under the following names, that is to say:—

THE UNITED FARMERS' COMMON OF LITTLE RIVER AND DUCK PONDS shall comprise the Farmers' Commons described under those names respectively in a Proclamation bearing date the fourth day of March, 1861, and shall be for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either of the said commons.—(63.H.515.)

THE UNITED MUNICIPAL AND GOLD FIELD COMMON OF ST. ARNAUD shall comprise the Municipal Common of St. Arnaud, described in a Proclamation bearing date the sixth day of October, 1862, and the Gold Field Common of St. Arnaud, described in a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-eighth day

of January, 1861, and shall be for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either of the said commons.— (62.E.11739.)

MINING OPERATIONS AUTHORISED UNDER THE MARKET RESERVE AT CRESWICK.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-sixth day of January, 1863.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted, that nothing thereinbefore contained shall authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy for mining purposes any Crown land which shall have been exempted by the Governor in Council from the operations of mining, or which shall have been applied to any public use or purpose, or be lawfully and *bona fide* used as a yard, garden or orchard, or for any race or dam, or for any house, outhouse, shed or other building, or to cut or remove from any such Crown land any trees growing thereon, or to cut or construct any race or dam through or upon any such Crown land; but

nevertheless it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy under such miners' rights, and also to cut and construct races and dams, for the purposes aforesaid, through or upon any Crown lands which may have been so exempted or applied as aforesaid, subject to such conditions and restrictions as the Governor in Council shall impose: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order authorise holders of miners' rights to prosecute mining operations under the land reserved for a market between Victoria street and Raglan street, in the town of Creswick, subject to the conditions and restrictions hereinafter prescribed, that is to say:—

1. The mining operations shall be conducted in such a manner as not to interfere with the purpose for which the reserve was made.
2. The surface of the ground shall not be occupied for the purpose of residence, and no tents or huts shall be erected thereon.
3. The workings shall be open at all reasonable hours to the inspection of any mining surveyor or other authorised officer.
4. On ceasing to mine the miners shall fill up all shafts and excavations made by them, remove all debris, clay, and gravel, as well as all buildings erected by them, and leave the surface of the ground in as good a condition as before the commencement of mining operations.
5. All instructions given by the mining surveyor or other authorised officer, relative to the mode of timbering or otherwise protecting the ground, shall be complied with by the miners.
6. All miners who shall take up claims on this reserve shall, prior to commencing mining operations, deposit in the hands of the warden of the district the sum of Fifty pounds, as a guarantee that they will observe and fulfil these conditions, and this sum shall be held by the warden until the miners who have made such deposit shall relinquish the claim held by them. If the conditions be fulfilled, then and in such case the whole sum shall be returned to the depositors, but if any of the conditions be not fulfilled, the whole of the said sum shall be forfeited, and the cost of repairing any damage done to the reserve shall be defrayed out of the moneys so forfeited.
7. In case any person so mining shall in any way violate the above conditions it shall not be lawful for him any longer to mine upon any claim upon or within such lands.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

TEMPORARY LIGHTHOUSE ON POINT LONSDALE, PORT PHILLIP.

Fixed red and green.

MASTERS of vessels and others navigating the entrance of Port Phillip are hereby informed that in order to warn vessels of their approach to the recently discovered dangers (notice of which appeared in the *Gazette* of the 22nd of December, 1862, No. 148) and the Point Lonsdale Rock, at the entrance to Port Phillip, a temporary fixed harbor light will, on and after the evening of the 19th instant, be exhibited from a site close to the tidal flagstaff on Point Lonsdale.

This light will be colored *green* to seaward, and *red* towards the harbor and Point Nepean.

Vessels inward or outward bound, when they have the green light full in view, will be outside of these dangers, and when they have the red light full in view, they will be inside of these dangers. The blending of the two colors when seen from a vessel will indicate that she is in the vicinity of these dangers.

The Point Lonsdale Light will only illuminate an arc of about fifty degrees of the horizon, and be visible, the green light at a distance of about four miles, the red light about seven miles, within the following bearings:—

Green light, from about N. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. to N. W. by N.
Red light, from about W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. to N. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.
The bearings are magnetic, and are given from the ship, not from the lights.

MUNICIPALITY OF EAGLEHAWK.

BYE-LAW No. 6.—FOR REGULATING AND LICENSING PUBLIC WATER CARRIERS.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for regulating and licensing public water carriers: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Eaglehawk, that every water carrier plying within the said municipal district shall register his name and place of abode in the municipal office, and shall thereupon receive a license, on which shall be written or printed his name and place of abode, the number of the license, and also the rewards and amounts which the council shall agree to pay to water carriers supplying water in case of fire. The number of the license and owner's name must be legibly painted and conspicuously affixed to each water cart; and further, every public water carter shall have the words "water cart" and the number of his license legibly painted and affixed, in a manner conspicuous to passers by and the public, on the outside of his residence or the premises where the said water cart is kept at night. And further be it ordered, the better to guard against accidents by fire, that the owners of all public water carts shall keep their water carts constantly loaded with water during the night, and also, if called upon by any officer duly authorised by the council, shall, to the best of their ability, supply water for the extinguishing of any fire that may occur on property within the municipal boundary; and any person who shall commit any neglect or breach thereof of this bye-law, shall, on conviction before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding five pounds.

And be it further ordered, that it shall be lawful for the treasurer of this municipal council to pay out of the municipal funds, as rewards to water carters who shall supply the first, second, and third loads of water in all cases of fire within the municipality, the following sums:—

To the water carter supplying the first load of water, Two pounds.

To the water carter supplying the second load of water, One pound.

To the water carter supplying the third load of water, Ten shillings.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 6, made by the municipal council of Eaglehawk, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted that the municipal council of any such municipal district (aforesaid) shall annually, within three months after the election of the chairman of such council, cause an estimate to be made of the probable amount which will be required for the then current year, in addition to any tolls, rates, or dues which may have been levied or authorised to be levied within the said district, to carry on the fencing, making, or repairing of any roads, wharves, piers, or other public works within the said district, and any other expenses necessary in carrying into effect the provisions of this Act, and shall raise the amount so estimated by an assessment of all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district according to its fair average annual value: Be it therefore enacted, that the probable amount which will be required for the current year, exclusive of the application to public works of any legislative grant to the municipality, will be Three thousand eight hundred and forty-three pounds, the computed amount of annual assessment being Seventy-six thousand eight hundred and sixty pounds, and that a rate for the current year of 1863 of One shilling in the pound on the revised assessed annual value of rateable property within the limits of the municipal district of East Collingwood be imposed and levied, and be due and payable on the first day of January, 1863.

MUNICIPALITY OF ESSENDON AND FLEMINGTON.

BYE-LAW No. 5.—FOR PROHIBITING DAMAGE TO THE FOOTPATHS AND WATERCOURSES AND REGULATING THE FORMATION OF CROSSINGS OVER FOOTPATHS AND WATERCOURSES.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, be it enacted that every municipal council shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, paths, and public thoroughfares, and shall and may make bye-laws for carrying out these objects: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Essendon and Flemington, with the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of Victoria:—

1. No person or persons shall ride, drive, or lead any horse, or beast, nor shall drive or wheel any carriage, cart, barrow, or other vehicle upon or across any of the public footpaths within the district, nor in any way damage or cause to be damaged the said footpaths or any of them, nor in any way damage or cause to be damaged the public watercourses or any of them.

2. Every owner or occupier of any gateway, yard, lane, or private road or way, to which access by horses, beasts, carriages, or other vehicles can be obtained only by riding, driving, leading, or wheeling upon or across any of the said public footpaths or watercourses, who shall make and maintain such crossing or crossings over the said public footpaths and watercourses, or any of them, as may be necessary for approach and access to any such gateway, yard, lane, private road or way in the manner hereinafter described, at the expense of such owner or occupier and under the superintendence of the municipal surveyor or other officer of the council in this behalf, shall be allowed to use such crossing without being liable to the penalty hereinafter provided.

3. In streets where a stone or wood kerb may hereafter be laid, every such crossing as aforesaid, where required, shall be paved with stone or metalled with broken stone, or gravelled the whole width of the footpath from the building line to the water-channel. In cases where the water-channel is not paved a wooden bridge may be placed across the channel in the manner hereinafter provided.

4. In streets where a footpath and water-channel are or may hereafter be formed, and where no kerbing is laid, the channel must be formed with stone paving or broken metal, or coarse gravel, or suitable wooden bridges must be provided and fixed over the water-channel so as to leave a free passage for the water underneath such bridges, which may project into the

public roadway not more than four feet from the edge of the footpath.

5. The owners or occupiers of any buildings or property shall not cause or suffer any water to be discharged on to or over any public footpaths, but such owners or occupiers, or any of them, may make and maintain such drains leading through and under the adjoining path as shall be necessary to discharge the water from such buildings or property into the public water-channels, at the expense of such owners or occupiers, under the superintendence aforesaid, and with the consent of the municipal council first had and obtained, without being liable to the penalty hereinafter mentioned.

6. Any person or persons guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds (£10).

The foregoing Bye-law No. 5, made by the municipal council of Essendon and Flemington, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF MALDON.

REGULATIONS MADE BY THE MALDON MUNICIPAL COUNCIL FOR THE PURPOSE OF PREVENTING THE OVER-CROWDING OF LODGING-HOUSES, ETC.

THAT in conformity with the provisions of the Common Lodging-house Act, 18 Victoria No. 8, section 10, the following regulations be made by this council for the purpose of preventing the over-crowding of common lodging-houses, and to provide for the better ventilation of such establishments:—

1. In sleeping apartments in wooden buildings, not lathed and plastered, where there is a fire-place and doors and windows in proportion to the size of the room, a space of three hundred (300) cubic feet shall be allowed for each person.

2. For wooden buildings, lathed and plastered inside, and in brick and stone buildings with a fire-place and doors and windows in proportion to the size of the room, four hundred (400) cubic feet shall be allowed.

3. In all buildings where there is no chimney, five hundred (500) feet shall be allowed.

4. In cases where there is no chimney the inspector shall have power to order proper means for admitting a plentiful supply of fresh air near the bottom of the room, and also for permitting the foul air to escape at the upper part of the room, and no building must be occupied as a sleeping place without this proper amount of ventilation.

Any person or persons neglecting to comply with the foregoing regulations shall for every offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five (5) pounds, and in case of a continuing offence a further penalty of a sum not exceeding Forty (40) shillings for each day during which such offence shall be continued after a written notice from the local authority or his or their officer duly appointed.

The foregoing Regulations relating to Lodging-houses, &c., made by the municipal council of Maldon, have been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF WILLIAMSTOWN.

BYE-LAW No. 53.—TO ENABLE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF WILLIAMSTOWN TO ELECT MANAGERS OF THE WILLIAMSTOWN MUNICIPAL COMMON, TO FIX THE TIME AND MANNER OF THEIR ELECTION, AND TO REMOVE SUCH MANAGERS AND ELECT OTHERS IN THEIR STEAD.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, power is given to the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the conducting of elections: And whereas by an Act of His Excellency the Governor and Parliament of Victoria, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the sale and occupation of Crown Lands*, 25 Victoria No. 145, section 69, it is declared that the municipal council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town or municipal common is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-laws prescribe, three persons to be managers of such town or municipal common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers and elect others in their stead: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Williamstown, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the election of managers of the municipal common shall be held and conducted at the time and in the manner following, viz.:—

1. That the election for the appointment of managers of the Williamstown municipal common shall be held annually at the second regular meeting of the council in each municipal year, viz., in April; and that the election of such managers for the unexpired portion of the current municipal year shall be held at the second regular meeting of the council after the publication in the *Government Gazette* of this bye-law.

2. That at such meeting, or at any subsequent meeting of the council appointed for such purpose, any member of the council may propose the names of the same number of persons to be managers of such common as there are vacancies to be filled up; and in the event of there being more persons proposed than there are vacancies, the voting shall be on cards provided for the purpose, on which the voter shall write the name or names of the candidate or candidates he supports, and sign his own; the result of such election shall be entered in the minutes of the day, and the voting cards shall be kept in the town clerk's office for twelve months, as a record.

3. That when any one or more vacancies occur through the death, resignation, or removal by the council of any manager or managers during his or their term of office, the council shall, as speedily as possible, elect in the same manner a person or persons to fill such vacancy or vacancies as is hereinbefore mentioned.

4. Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, it shall be lawful for the said council, instead of proceeding to the nomination and election of managers as aforesaid, to adjourn any such meeting from time to time as they may think proper, and the election taking place at any such adjourned meeting shall be equally valid.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 53, made by the municipal council of Williamstown, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

The two councils have entered into a contract for the survey of the line, and on the completion of the same a company will be formed to carry out the work. An application to Government for a grant of land was successful, and a promise of a considerable grant has been made.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been passed:—

12. For the expenditure of £300 first instalment of grant-in-aid. Gazetted.

13. For conducting the election of members of the council. Gazetted.

14. For the expenditure of £200, second instalment of grant-in-aid. Gazetted.

15. For compelling the removal of manure and offal to the manure depot. Not yet gazetted.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The public works executed consist of:—

1. The completion of footpaths in Brooke street.
2. The formation of the roadway in Brooke street from north end to Verdon street.

3. The formation of roadway and footpaths in Chancery lane.
4. Cutting a water channel in Grant street, north and south.
5. The formation of the roadway in Brooke street from Verdon street to Heales street.
6. The erection of two bridges in Chancery lane, and a box drain in Brooke street.

The council, in issuing their second half-yearly report, have with deep regret to record a most disastrous fire in the township on the 3rd December, by which nearly one-half, and by far the most important part, of the town was destroyed. At the same time they have much pleasure in bearing testimony to the energy displayed by the inhabitants in repairing as far as possible the damage done by the conflagration, and beg to tender their sincere thanks to the Government and the public who have so liberally responded to the call made on them on behalf of the sufferers.
