WHEREAS by The Local Government Act, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time, if it shall seem fit, to add to any district not divided into subdivisions, or to any subdivision, or separately to two or more subdivisions of a district so divided, any portion of the colony actually adjoining to such district or subdivision, as the case may be, and not lying within the limits of the city of Melbourne or town of Geelong, or of any municipal or road district; and every such portion so added shall thereupon become and be part of such first-mentioned district to all intents and purposes, and of the subdivision, if any, to which the same shall have been added: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the tenth day of December, 1860, the boundaries of the Franklin and Yandoit road district were altered and defined as therein mentioned: And whereas it has seemed fit to the Governor in Council to make an addition to, the said district by the extension of its southern boundary: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the said addition to the Franklin and Yandoit road district by the extension of its southern boundary, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, and do hereby re-define the whole of the said road district added to as aforesaid, in manner following, that is to say:—

Commencing at a point one chain east of the south-east angle of portion 6 of section viii. of the parish of Wombat; and

thence by a line bearing north along the west boundaries of portions 4 and 3 of section vII. of the said parish; thence northwards to the south side of block 19, in the parish of Holcombe; thence westerly along the south boundary of the said block 19 to the centre line of Middleton's Creek; thence northerly along the centre line of Middleton's Creek to a point north of the northern extremity of block 2 of the said parish of Holcombe, the boundary line thus far being conterminus with the west boundary of the Glenlyon road district; thence further on the cast by a line bearing north to a point on the south boundary of the parish of Fryers; thence west by the said boundary to the south-west angle of the said parish of Fryers; thence on the north east angle of the parish of Yandoit; thence on the north and west b; the north and west boundaries of the parish of Yandoit, and the west boundary of the Parish of Franklin continued south to the centre line of the Glengower or McLachlan's Creek; thence southwards by the centre line of the said creek and by the eastern boundary of the Creswick road district to the south-east angle of the borough of Daylesford; thence by a line north to the south-east angle of the south, and part of the north boundaries of the said borough; thence west, north, and east by the south, the west, and part of the north boundaries of the said borough to the commencing point—(63.2432.)

W HEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the twenty-fifth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, initiuted, An Act to amend and consolidate the laws for the protection of the Fisheries of Victoria, it is amongst other things enacted that if any person shall set, lay down, use, or fish with any kind of net in the Yarra Yarra, Plenty, Werribee, or Saltwater Rivers, in the colony of Victoria, or in any or either of their respective tributaries, or in any other river, lake, creek, stream, or pond, to which the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, shall, by proclamation duly published in the Government Gazette, extend the provisions of the 11th clause of the said Act, he shall forfeit such net, and also such sum not exceeding Ten pounds, as the convicting justice shall think fit: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby extend the above-recited provisions of the said Act, because thereof, to Lake Boloke, and the creeks running thereinto and therefrom, and the Mordialloc Creek and its embouchure.

RULES OF THE No. 2 CORPS OF THE BALLARAT VOLUNTEER
RANGERS.

1. The corps shall be styled "The 2nd Ballarat Volunteer
Rangers," and every member shall be subject to the following

1. The corps shall be styled "The 2nd Ballarat Volunteer Rangers," and every member shall be subject to the following rules.

2. The monthly subscriptions shall be One shilling (1s.), payable on the first day of each month.

3. No member shall wear the regulation uniform, as adopted by the corps, unless on duty or by permission of the officer commanding the corps.

4. Any member baving any complaint to make against any other member of the corps, whether commissioned officer, non-commissioned officer, or private, shall make the complaint in writing to the captain of his company, by whom it shall be placed in the hands of the commanding officer, who shall decide what action shall be taken in the matter.

5. Any member desiring leave of absence exceeding twenty-eight (28) days, shall apply in writing for such leave of absence to the officer in command of the corps, shall return his rife and accountements into store properly cleaned and in good repair, and shall leave his address. All members changing their permanent address shall give notice of the same in writing to the secretary within fourteen (14) days of the same, under a penalty of Two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.).

6. Should occasion require the corps to be called together on any emergency, any member having obtained leave of absence shall hasten at once to headquarters, and consider his leave of absence cancelled.

7. Members shall be accountable for the good and serviceable order of their arms and accourrements, clothing, &c., and shall make good any damage thereto occasioned by negligence.

8. - 4. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

SCHEDULE B, REFERRED TO IN THIS ORDER.

Manner in which the Streets, Courts, and Alleys enumerated in Schedule A, referred to in this Order, are ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved, kerbed, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered.

The natural soil is to be reduced or made up as the case may require, so that the longitudinal section of the whole street, court, or alley shall in no part have an inclination of less than one (1) in eighty (80), and where practicable the entire length is to form one incline.

In laying on any stuff it is to be spread in layers of not more than one foot thick.

than one foot thick.

The transverse section of the street, court, or alley (where the water-channels are on the sides) is to show a roadway whose crown shall be one inch above the kerbs of the footways, and the fall from the crown to the water-channels shall not be less than one (1) in twenty-five (25).

Each street, court, or alley shall have a bluestone pitched water-channel, either at each of its sides or in its centre, of sufficient capacity to meet the required drainage for the same, the width of said channel or channels in no instance to be less than two (2) feet.

The pitchers to be nine (9) inches wide, and from six (6) to nine (9) inches deep, and from nine (9) to fourteen (14) inches long, with upright sides set in sand, and well rammed down to such section as the city surveyor may direct.

On either side of the roadway there is to be, where practicable, a footpath not more than three (3) feet wide, and these are to be separated from the roadway by a neatly dressed bluestone kerb from two (2) to four (4) feet long, six (6) inches wide, and fifteen (15) inches deep.

The footways are to be covered with a coat of gravel three (3) inches thick, and the surface is to fall towards the channel at the rate of one (1) in ten (10).

The roadway is to be covered with a coat of clean bluestone metal, 2½ inch gauge, nine (9) inches deep in the centre, and six (6) inches deep on the sides, and this, when necessary, covered over with a coat of good loam, two (2) inches thick, and rolled with corporation iron roller.

Whenever private entrances lead from the streets, courts, or alleys, they are to be paved to the full width (of building line) with bluestone pitchers, similar to those used in the channels.

All entrances from adjoining street shall be pitched and kerbed either with four (4) inch bluestone cubes or nine (9) inch pitchers, as the city surveyor may direct, the sides being well supported with eight (8) inch stone kerbing.
