## NOTICE TO MARINERS.—HOKIANGA RIVER.

Masters of Vessels and others navigating the Hokianga River are hereby informed that on and after the 1st day of March proximo, the following will be the code of signals for taking Hokianga Bar and entering the river:—

1. Signals.—From the signal-staff on the South Head the following signals will be made—

No. 1. Blue peter—Keep to sea; bar is not fit to take.  
No. 2. Red flag—Take the bar; there is no danger.

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No. 3. Blue with white cross—Ebb tide; bar not fit.  
No. 4. White—First quarter flood.

When these flags are understood, they should be answered from the ship by a pendant or flag, where best seen. The pilot will be at the entrance of the Heads in his boat, but seldom outside the bar.

2. If a vessel is too far to the north for entering, a white square will be hoisted on the south yard-arm; and if too far to the south, it will be hoisted on the north yard-arm. Vessels to be particularly guided by the hoisting of the white square at the yard-arms, and that direction. No vessel shall take the bar until the flagstaff bears E. ½ N.

**MINING OPERATIONS AUTHORISED UNDER THE BOTANICAL GARDEN RESERVE AT BALLAARAT.**

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted, that nothing thereinbefore contained shall authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy for mining purposes any Crown land which shall have been exempted by the Governor in Council from the operations of mining, or which shall have been applied to any public use or purpose, or be lawfully and *bona fide* used as a yard, garden, or orchard, or for any race or dam, or for any house, outhouse, shed, or other building, or to cut or remove from any such Crown land any trees growing thereon, or to cut or construct any race or dam through or upon any such Crown land; but nevertheless it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy under such miners' rights, and also to cut and construct races and dams, for the purposes aforesaid, through or upon any Crown lands which may have been so exempted or applied as aforesaid, subject to such conditions and restrictions as the Governor in Council shall impose: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order authorise holders of miners' rights to prosecute mining operations under the land reserved for Botanical Gardens, adjacent to Yuille's Swamp at Ballaarat, subject to the conditions and restrictions hereinafter prescribed, that is to say:—

1. The surface of the ground shall not be broken, and it shall not be occupied for the purposes of residence, nor shall any tent or building be erected thereon, nor any tailings, or sludge, or any refuse whatsoever be allowed to flow into or accumulate upon the reserve or flow into or mix with the water of Yuille's Swamp or the channels leading thereto.

2. The mining operations shall be conducted in such a manner as not to interfere with the purposes for which the reserve was made.

3. The drives shall be properly supported so as to prevent any subsidence of the ground; and these and all other workings connected therewith shall be open at all times to the inspection of the mining surveyor, or other authorised officer, who may stop the workings, if in his opinion they are conducted in such a manner as to lead to injury to the reserve.

4. If any person mining under the said reserve shall violate any of these conditions, it shall not be lawful for him any longer to hold any claim or prosecute any mining operations upon or within such lands.

**DEPOSITS UNDER REGULATIONS RELATING TO LEASES OF AURIFEROUS AND MINERAL LANDS, AND TO WATER-RIGHT LICENSES.**

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has approved of the following regulations, viz:—

Clerks of petty sessions and wardens' clerks who receive deposits of money under existing or future regulations relating to the leasing of auriferous and mineral lands, and to the granting of licenses for the use of water-rights, shall forward monthly to the Office of Mines a statement in form A. annexed hereto.

Receipts for such deposits, whether paid by applicants or objectors, shall be given in the form contained in the schedules attached to the said regulations.

Books containing sets of printed receipts shall be supplied to the said clerks for the special purposes abovementioned.

No receipts other than such printed receipts shall be given either to applicants or objectors under any circumstances whatsoever.

Persons paying deposits shall be required to sign their names on the counterpart or block of such receipts, or, if unable to write, shall make their marks thereon in the presence of some person who shall sign his name in testimony of the payment being made, such person not being the clerk who receives the deposit.

## MUNICIPALITY OF EAGLEHAWK.

## BYE-LAW No. 1.—BYE-LAW TO REGULATE BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF EAGLEHAWK.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, section 20, it is enacted that "It shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings, the collection of their rates, the conducting of elections and public meetings of the ratepayers, the determining the validity of disputed elections, the prevention and extinguishing of fires, the suppression of nuisances and houses of ill-fame, compelling residents to keep their premises free from offensive or unwholesome matters, the regulation and licensing of porters, public carriers, carters, water drawers, and public vehicles, regulating the killing and sale of butchers' meat, the establishment of slaughter-houses, the regulation of markets, market dues, fairs and sales, the preservation of public decency and public health, the restraining noisome and offensive trades, and the general good rule and government of such municipal district;" such bye-laws to have force and effect under the 33rd section of the said Act, upon the assent of the Governor of the said colony having been obtained thereto under his hand:

Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Eaglehawk, that from and after the date of the Governor's assent hereto, the proceedings and business of the said council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be deemed and called the Standing Orders of the said council, until repealed or altered, that is to say:—

## CHAP. 1.—ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS.

1. *Sittings open to public.*—That the sittings of this council shall on all ordinary occasions be open to the public, but a majority of the council may require the exclusion of strangers while the opinion of the council is taken whether the question shall be discussed with closed doors.

2. *If no quorum in twenty minutes meetings to lapse.*—At all meetings of the council business shall commence as soon as the legal quorum is present, but should a quorum not be present at the expiration of twenty minutes, such circumstance shall be noted, with the names of the members present, in the minute book, and such meeting shall lapse.

3. *Minutes.*—The first business at each meeting of the council shall be to confirm the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereupon except as to the accuracy thereof.

4. *Correspondence, petitions, and reports.*—After the confirmation of the minutes the order of the business shall be as follows:—

1. Reading copies of letters sent by order of the council.
2. Letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
3. Petitions and memorials.
4. Ordering on reports of permanent committees.
5. Ordering on reports of special committees.
6. Ordering on reports of deputations.
7. Orders of the day, including subjects arising from proceedings of former meetings.
8. Motions of which previous notice has been given.
9. New business.

5. *Communications in writing.*—All communications by letter intended for the council shall be made and addressed to the town clerk; and all petitions, memorials, contracts, and tenders shall be addressed to the chairman and council, under cover to the town clerk, endorsed Petition, Contract, or Tender, as the case may be.

6. *Notice of motions to be given.*—No motion shall be decided on at any meeting of council unless notice in writing, signed by the councillor proposing, shall have been given at the previous meeting of council; nor shall any report of committee be decided on unless similar notice be given, unless in committee of the whole council, or unless the whole council be present.

7. *Orders of the day.*—The order of the day shall include all business of which due notice has been given, and all matters arising out of former meetings of council.

8. *Member giving notice to be present when put.*—No notice entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called on in order.

9. *Bye-laws to be open for inspection.*—No bye-law shall be decided on without due notice (as in cases of motions), and a copy of any proposed bye-law shall be open in the council chamber for the inspection of all ratepayers, free of charge, or of any person duly qualified to vote at elections under the Act.

10. *Business in order of notice.*—All business shall be considered in the order in which notice thereof was given.

11. *Committees to report at every general meeting.*—All permanent committees shall bring up a report at every general meeting of the council, and all committees appointed for special purposes shall bring up a progress report at meeting of council next after the appointment of such committee.

## CHAP. 2.—ORDER OF DEBATE.

1. *Members to rise when speaking, calling to order, &c.*—Any member upon proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the chairman; and no member shall be interrupted unless by a call to order, when he shall sit down; the member calling to order shall then be heard, and the question decided before the subject is resumed, or any other business entered upon.

2. *How amendments to be put.*—Motions may be withdrawn.—Any councillor rising to propose an amendment, or to make any

proposition to the council, must state the nature of the same before addressing the council in support thereof; and any member may withdraw a resolution proposed by him previous to its being put to the vote.

3. *Motions to be in writing.*—No proposition shall be entertained unless in writing, and when seconded, handed to the clerk.

4. *Member having moved or seconded, held to have spoken to same.*—Any member moving or seconding any motion or amendment, shall be held to have spoken on that question.

5. *Pre-audience.*—If more than one councillor rise at the same time, the chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to pre-audience.

6. *Member not to speak twice unless to explain.*—No councillor shall speak twice on the same question unless by way of explanation merely, or in reply as the mover of an original motion, or upon any amendment; after such explanation or reply the question shall be forthwith put to the vote.

7. *Digression, imputation, or personal reflection.*—No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion, or impute motives to any other councillor; and all personal reflections shall be deemed highly disorderly.

8. *Chairman's decision final.*—The decision of the chairman for the time being shall be final on all questions of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument.

9. *Chairman to rise when speaking.*—The chairman for the time being shall rise when addressing the council.

10. *Offensive expressions.*—Any councillor who shall use expressions capable of being offensively applied to any other councillor, shall, if required by the council, withdraw such expressions, and make a satisfactory apology to the council.

11. *Clerk to note down expression if required.*—Any councillor may require the clerk of the council to take down any particular expressions immediately on their being used.

12. *Production of documents.*—Any councillor may demand the production of any of the books or documents of the council bearing on the question under consideration, and the same shall be produced forthwith by the officer or other person having the custody of the same.

13. *Number and order of amendments.*—One amendment shall be discussed at one time, and if lost another shall be moved before the original question shall be put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried, it shall be competent to any member to move one other amendment thereon, but no more.

14. *How questions to be put.*—The chairman shall, in taking the decision of the council on any question under discussion, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative, and the votes of all councillors shall be entered in the minutes.

15. *Voting.*—The council shall vote by ayes and nays, except in cases of elections. (See chap. 3, par. 2.)

16. *Adjournments.*—No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment, but if the question be decided in the negative the next motion or order of the day shall be considered before the question of adjournment shall be again entertained.

17. *Protests.*—Any councillor who shall forthwith after the passing of any resolution give notice of his intention so to do, may record his protest, in writing, against the decision of the council, at any time before the commencement of the next meeting of the council.

18. *Motion to rescind—Call of council.*—No motion, the effect of which would be to rescind any previous resolution of the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council shall be made for the purpose.

19. *Reconsideration of motion carried.*—Any member of council voting in the majority on any motion may, after the same shall have been carried, move a reconsideration of the vote, provided no other business has been gone into; and such motion may be discussed, and if carried acted upon, anything in this bye-law to the contrary notwithstanding.

20. *Chairman on committees to be chairman thereof.*—The chairman of the council, when appointed on any committee, shall be chairman thereof; and the standing orders of the council shall be observed in all committees, except as to the number of times limited for speaking, or as to councillors rising to address the chairman, or the chairman rising to address the committee.

21. *Corporation seal.*—The clerk of the council shall have charge of the common seal of the corporation, and shall be responsible for the same, and verify each impression by his signature, and shall not affix the same to any document without the order of a majority of the council.

## CHAP. 3.—ELECTIONS.

1. *Election of officers.*—No election to any office at the disposal of the council, except that of chairman of the council, shall take place until five days' notice shall have been given in one or more local newspapers, inviting applications for the same, and the salary attached to such office shall in all cases be fixed for the municipal year preceding the election.

2. *Voting for members.*—At all such elections the voting shall be by cards provided for the purpose, on which the voter shall write the name of the candidate he supports, and sign his own; and the town clerk shall preserve the same as a record.

3. *Officers' sureties.*—No councillor shall be received as surety for any officer, nor shall any auditor or other officer become surety for any other employé of the council, nor for the due performance of any work to be done for the council; and in all cases when security shall be required, the expense of and about preparing the necessary documents shall be borne by the party giving the same.

4. Any one or more of the standing orders may be suspended, *pro tem.*, in case of emergency, with the consent of a majority of

two-thirds of the whole council; and any person guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall, on conviction, pay a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

*The foregoing Bye-law No. 1, made by the municipal council of Eaglehawk, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.*

#### MUNICIPALITY OF EAGLEHAWK.

BYE-LAW No. 2.—FOR REGULATING THE SLAUGHTERING OF SMALL CATTLE WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF EAGLEHAWK.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to pass bye-laws regulating the killing and sale of butchers' meat: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Eaglehawk, that all butchers whose premises shall have been suitably prepared and properly paved for the purpose of slaughtering, shall be permitted to kill sheep, lambs, swine, or goats: Provided that all such persons shall receive or cause to be received, the blood into tubs, together with all offal or other offensive matter, and remove the same, or cause it to be removed, from such premises, at least once in every twenty-four hours.

That all such premises be registered at the office of the town clerk, and the same premises shall always be open to the inspection of the municipal council, their inspector, or other officer.

That no butcher or his servant shall kill any sheep, lambs, swine, or goats, except upon premises registered as aforesaid.

That it shall not be lawful for any butcher or his servant to kill any sheep, lambs, swine, or goats, on premises distinct and apart, except all such premises are severally registered as though they belonged to different owners and persons.

That written notice of application for such registration shall be given to the town clerk, and be exhibited at his office at least eight days before the same be granted, made, and entered.

That any person guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF EAGLEHAWK.

BYE-LAW No. 10.—A BYE-LAW TO REGULATE THE CONDUCTING OF THE ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act may make bye-laws for the conducting of elections: And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 29th day of July, 1862, the district of Eaglehawk was duly established a municipal district under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Eaglehawk, that from and after this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency, as required by the provisions of the said Act:—

1. That it shall be lawful for the chairman of the municipal council, upon a vote of the council to such effect, to appoint under his hand and seal such and so many persons as to the council may seem necessary, to act as deputy chairmen or deputy clerks in lieu of the town clerk, and to appoint such and so many places within the municipal district as may seem to the said council necessary to be polling places.

2. If at any election a poll shall be demanded in the manner and form required by the said Act, the chairman shall cause to be provided at the polling place or places a sufficient number of stalls or compartments, together with ink and pens or pencils for the purpose of enabling the electors to mark the voting papers as hereinafter provided; in which polling place or places no person other than the chairman, the town clerk or his deputy, the several candidates, and their respective scrutineers, and the electors who shall for the time be tendering their votes, shall be entitled to be present.

3. The chairman shall cause to be provided for the purpose of such election a locked-up box or boxes, of which he shall keep the key or keys, with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the voting papers, and which box or boxes shall stand upon the table in front of the chairman, town clerk, or his deputy, from whom each elector shall receive a voting paper in the form in the schedule hereunto annexed, and shall thereupon retire to a stall or compartment provided for that purpose, and there strike out the names of such candidates as he does not intend to vote for, and deposit the same in the ballot box in the presence of the chairman, town clerk, or his deputy, and scrutineers; and in case such elector shall be unable to read, or be blind, he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall thereupon mark or strike out the names of such candidates as such elector shall designate; and no elector shall take out of such polling place any such voting paper either before or after he has marked the same.

4. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint, by writing under his hand, to be delivered to the chairman, town clerk, or

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his deputy, at any time before Eight o'clock in the morning of the polling day, one scrutineer, to be present on his behalf in the polling place or places.

5. It shall be lawful for the chairman, or for any candidate or scrutineer, to put to any person, before he shall have received his voting paper, the following questions only:—

1. What is your name and surname?
2. Are you of the age of twenty-one years?
3. Are you a ratepayer on the ratepayers' roll of the municipal district of Eaglehawk?
4. Have you already voted at this election?

6. At every election, it shall be the duty of the chairman, town clerk, or his deputy, to provide himself with the ratepayers' roll, or a true copy thereof, and as each elector comes forward to demand his voting paper to see whether the name of such elector appears upon the roll as a ratepayer within the meaning of the said Act, and as each elector deposits his voting paper within the ballot box to mark off such elector's name as having voted at such election.

7. In case the voting paper as of any person shall have been received, and any other person shall afterwards demand his voting paper, as of the same person, the chairman, when such person shall purpose to deposit his paper in the ballot box, shall refuse to allow the same to be put therein, but shall receive and keep the same apart; and at the close of the election, if it shall appear to the chairman that such elector has not already voted at such election, such vote shall be added to the number already polled, but if otherwise, such vote shall not be allowed.

8. At Four o'clock p.m. the poll shall close; and as soon after as conveniently may be, the chairman, in the presence of the scrutineers, shall count the number of votes polled for each candidate, one or more of whom, but not all, shall, by the state of the poll and the number of members to be elected, be entitled to be declared elected by the chairman.

9. And any person or persons guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law, on being convicted thereof, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

The ballot paper so marked is to be dropped by him into the ballot-box.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF RICHMOND.

BYE-LAW No. 17.—REGULATING THE DRIVING OF CATTLE INTO OR THROUGH THE TOWNSHIP OF RICHMOND.

BE it enacted by the municipal council of Richmond, in pursuance of the powers in them vested by the provisions of the 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, that no cattle intended for slaughter shall pass through the municipal district of Richmond or be driven into or through the said district of Richmond excepting between the hours of Nine of the o'clock in the evening and Seven of the clock in the morning, from the 1st day of September to the 1st day of April; and between Seven of the clock in the evening and Eight of the clock in the morning, from the 1st day of April to the 1st day of September in each year.

Any person guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall, upon conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds: Provided that nothing herein contained shall be held to extend to milch cows milked in the township, or to oxen in yoke.

Printed forms of tender may be obtained from the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne, or from the officer in charge of police at each station, by whom also any information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

The tenders for each station will be accepted or rejected separately.

Tenders may be for either of the supplies required, oats, bran, hay, or straw only, and if all be included in one tender, it will be accepted for one article only if advisable.

As much forage as the storage will accommodate will be drawn at a time for the convenience of contractors.

The price must be per ton for hay and straw, and per bushel for oats and bran, including delivery at the stations and all charges; bags to be returned when empty.

The net weight only after deducting the tare is to be charged.

No tender will be entertained unless accompanied by a certificate from two responsible persons that they are willing to become bound as sureties for the due fulfilment of the contract in one-third the estimated cost of the entire supply at the station tendered for; and in the event of the tender being accepted, the bond must be executed within twenty days, failing which the contract may be again advertised or another tender accepted.

The names and addresses of the tenderers and of their proposed sureties must be stated at full length.

All tenders must be enclosed in a separate envelope, marked, "Tender for \_\_\_\_\_" (as the case may be), and deposited in the box at the Government Stores, King street, or if sent by post they must be addressed to the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known by *Gazette* notice and by letter to accepted tenderers.

CONDITIONS.

- The hay to be eaten, good, sound, and sweet; the straw to be wheaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats (colonial grown) and bran to be sound and sweet and of the best description.
- The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in schedule being, however, only approximative, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will not, however, exceed during the whole year 50 per cent. of the estimated quarterly consumption.
- The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.
- The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.
- Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the District, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.
- Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.
- In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.
- If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.
- When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue either to the public service or the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. **SANDHURST MUNICIPALITY.**

**FOURTEENTH** Half-yearly Report, 11th July, 1862, to 10th January, 1863.

**PUBLIC WORKS.**

The works completed during the half-year or now in progress are—formation and roadways in Forest lane, Wattle lane, Upper Forest street, McIvor road, Myers street, Court House road, Poplar street, Charleston road, Pantou street, and Short street extension.

Kerb and channelling part of Myrtle street; new culverts High street, Myers street, Bernal street, and Water street; and lengthening eight culverts in portion C.

Additional slaughter-house and stock-yards at the Cattle Market, and purchase of branch-yards at the White Hills.

Planting trees, levelling, sowing, and other works in the reserve; maintenance of Botanic Gardens, with minor works, and maintenance of works generally, at a total cost of £3623 13s. 8d.

The expenditure for lighting, sweeping, prevention of fire, and for the board of health, has amounted to £1393 15s. 11d.

The sum of £320 7s. 6d. has also been expended in laying water mains in Mitchell street and View place, the amount to be repaid by the Bendigo Water Works Company.

**BYE-LAWS PASSED.**

No. 38. Fixing the assessment and striking a rate of 1s. in the pound for the year 1862.

No. 39. For the further regulation of the Sandhurst Market.

**FINANCE.**

The assessment of the municipality and annexations comprise 3307 properties, and amount to £141,841, on which a rate of One shilling in the pound has been struck.

The sum of £1969 has been received from the Government as grant-in-aid, making a total for the current year of £3472 only.

The income from the Cattle Market leaves a surplus over the entire expenditure of £201 5s. 8d., or about 17½ per cent. per annum on the capital invested.

**MISCELLANEOUS.**

The districts of Long Gully, Ironbark, and Golden Gully, were on the 16th August proclaimed as annexed to the municipality. The area within the municipal boundaries has been nearly doubled, and contains now about 7500 acres, making this much the most extensive municipal district in Victoria.

In compliance with the generally expressed wish of the ratepayers, the council took steps to celebrate the opening of the railway from Melbourne to Sandhurst in a manner worthy of the occasion and befitting the importance of the town.

In conjunction with the municipal council of Inglewood, a tramway between the two towns has been projected. A survey has been made, and a grant of land has been promised by the Government, and the council are sanguine that the work will be carried out to the great advantage of both towns.
