PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.
QUEENSLIFF.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and eighty-five householders resident at and near Queenscliff, in the county of Grant, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that they are householders resident within the area hereinafter described, and delineated on a plan which accompanied the petition, and that they desire that such area should be declared a municipal district, viz.:- "Commencing on the shore of Bass's Straits at a point where intersected by the west boundary line of the Battery Reserve, in the parish of Payrit, in the county of Grant; thence along the shore of Bass's Straits to Point Lonsdale; thence along the shore of Lonsdale Bay to Shortland's Bluff; thence along the shore of Port Phillip Bay to Swan Point; thence round Swan Island and along the southern shore of Swan Bay, including Rabbit Island, to the north-east angle of allotment 1, block 3, in the said parish; thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the commencing point; the last-mentioned line being the southern boundary of the Indented Heads road district."

Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the District, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue, either to the public service or the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. It will be competent for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, or for the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to that effect, it being understood that such notice only can be given from the first day of a month, and provided that no such notice can be given before the 30th June, 1863.

BACCHUS MARSH FARMERS' COMMON.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE BACCHUS MARSH FARMERS' COMMON.

NO person shall be entitled to the use of the common unless they occupy or hold not less than ten acres within five miles of the boundary of the said common.

2. The number of cattle belonging to one person or firm not to exceed forty head or fifteen horses, and in no case will more than one head of cattle be allowed to each acre of cultivation, or one horse to two acres, except the common be not sufficiently stocked, in which case special arrangements can be made, and a lesser number than this be insisted upon at any time.

3. All cattle sent to the common shall have the owner or owners' brand distinct, and shall be delivered to the herdsman, with an order from one or two of the managers; he shall then sign and enter the same in his book, and shall then brand with the common brand; should any parties wish to remove their cattle (except working bullocks or milkers), to give notice to the herdsman in writing at least twenty-four hours previous to removal.

4. Any person found depasturing more cattle than he is entitled to by his license, the managers will have the power of cancelling his license.

5. That any commoner or other person found disturbing cattle or horses depasturing on the common, shall be dealt with according to law.

6. In no case will either bull or entire horse be allowed on the common without the consent of all the managers.

7. The herdsman shall be required immediately to report to the managers the slightest indication of disease in any of the cattle under his charge. Notice thereof shall be given to the owner, and if not removed off the said common within twelve hours, he shall be considered a trespasser, and dealt with under the 129th clause of the Land Act.

8. All persons applying for a license to depasture will be required to fill up a form, obtainable from either of the managers or herdsman, setting forth the number of acres he has under cultivation, and, if required, to make a declaration before a justice of the peace.

9. The fees for all cattle over six months old will be Three shillings per head, payable quarterly in advance; Five shillings for horses; and for all sheep over six months old, One shilling per head.

10. That the year shall commence on the first day of February and end on the thirty-first day of January.

11. It will be the herdsman's duty to see all cattle under his charge once every twenty-four hours, and should any be missing to inform the owners on the day following.

12. Should the fees collected be insufficient to pay expenses connected with the management, an additional charge will be made upon each commoner in fair proportion, and each license granted will be under the condition that he can be sued for the same before any justice of the peace.

13. That the herdsman must be accountable to the commoners for any loss they may sustain by having their cattle impounded when strayed off the common, and the herdsman will receive as fees Sixpence per head for every head impounded by him trespassing on said common, having first obtained the sanction of one or more of the managers to impound the same.

14. Should the managers at any time consider the herdsman incompetent or neglectful they can discharge him without notice, and he can have no claim upon them for compensation whatever.

15. A portion of the common shall be set apart for sheep, and any trespassing beyond such boundary shall be considered as trespassers; all sheep to be herded by the owners. No residence allowed on the common by license or otherwise, and all cattle must be *bona fide* property of the licensee.

16. Commoners desirous of depasturing cattle or horses that are strange to the district or unmanageable, the owners shall herd the same at their own cost until the herdsman deem them sufficiently quiet to be left with the herd.

17. That all fees received from the common shall be paid into the Bacchus Marsh Bank monthly, and all payments shall be made by cheque, signed by two or more of the managers.

18. The managers shall pay the herdsman out of the common fund, and the residue (if any) shall be expended in the district in works most beneficial.

19. The managers do not hold themselves responsible for any neglect or irregularity of the herdsman, and can alter or amend these rules when considered necessary.
