THE KEILOR ROAD DISTRICT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intitled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him shall seem meet, as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portion of the county of Bourke hereinafter defined shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:—

Commencing at a point in the centre of the Saltwater River due south of the western boundary of section VII., parish of

Doutta Galla; thence north to the said boundary, being a portion of the western boundary of the municipality of Essendon; thence north and east by the western and part of the northern boundary of the said municipality to the centre of the Deep Creek road; thence north-westerly by the centre of the said road to a point where it is intersected by the northern boundary of section VII., parish of Ballamarine; thence east by the northern boundaries of sections VII., VIII., and IX. of the said parish to the north-west angle of portion B, section XXVIII., in the parish of Maryborough; thence west, south, and east by the northern, western, and southern boundaries of the said parish to the centre of a one-chain road which forms the northern boundaries of sections VI., VII., XI. and X. of the said parish, and continuing by that road eastward to a point in the western boundary of section XXII., parish of Dousta Galla; thence north to the centre of the Saltwater River; thence easterly by the Saltwater River to the commencing point.—(63/78.)

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Keilor Road District."

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-third day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and in the twenty-sixth year of Her Majesty's reign.

The daily average of mortality in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of January was 14.29, against 12.93 in the previous month. The total number of deaths was 433, as against 401 in January, 1862, 450 in January, 1861, and 407 in January, 1860. The mean mortality of the month for the last four years was thus 425.

The mean temperature during the month was 68.2°, against 68° in January, 1862, against 67.2° in January, 1861, and against 68.7° in January, 1860. The highest point (104.6°) reached by the thermometer was at 3 p.m. on the 8th, and the lowest (59.1°) at 4 and 5 a.m. on the 18th. The greatest daily range of temperature (47.3°) was on the 7th, from a maximum 99.0° to a minimum 51.7°, and the least (3.7°) was on the 20th, from a maximum 63.5° to a minimum 59.8°. The mean daily range was 22.8°. The mean height of the barometer was 29.820 in., against 29.737 in. for the same month in 1862, against 29.798 in. for that in 1861, and against 29.827 in. for that in 1860. The greatest pressure (30.074 in.) was at 9 p.m. on the 17th, and at 8 a.m. on the 30th, and the least (29.353 in.) at 5 a.m. on the 25th; the daily range for the month thus being 7.21 in.

The mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality, for the first four weeks in January, were as follow:—

Of the 433 deaths which occurred during the month, 245, or about 55 per cent., were of males, and 188, or 45 per cent., were of females; 282, or 64 per cent., were of children under five, and 161, or 36 per cent., were of persons beyond that age. In the previous month, the proportions of persons dying before and after attaining their fifth year were respectively 66 and 34 per cent.

As many as 25 deaths occurred on the 9th, 22 on the 22nd, and 19 on the 3rd, 8th, and 10th. The day of least mortality was the 23rd, on which only 7 deaths were recorded.

The oldest persons who died during the month were three females, whose ages were respectively 105, 91, and 81 years. The deaths in each case were referred to old age.

The violent deaths numbered 26, and are thus accounted for:—Seven persons, all males, were drowned, one suicidally, viz., a gentleman aged 65 years, and six accidentally, viz., a seaman of 25 years at Williamstown, a boatman of 42 years in Hobson's Bay, a person of age unknown at Richmond, two boys of 10 and 7 years in the Yarra, and one of 5 years at Richmond. Five

deaths occurred from burning, viz., a boy of 16 years, another of 3 years, two females each aged 17 years, and another female of 36 years, the latter being intoxicated at the time. Two girls, aged respectively 7 and 2 years, died of scalds. A male aged 54, said to have been formerly a captain in the 16th regiment, died of a gunshot wound self-inflicted. A farm laborer 40 years of age died of concussion of the brain. A blacksmith aged 25, a laborer aged 37, and another laborer aged 50, were accidentally killed (manner not stated). A man of 33 years old was poisoned by an overdose of opium. A man of 32 years poisoned himself. A stonecutter aged 35 died of traumatic tetanus. A laborer aged 55 committed suicide by hanging. An infant was found dead in the cemetery, another was suffocated in its birth, and a third died of want of proper attention at birth.

Sixty-eight deaths, or rather over 15 per cent. of the entire mortality, took place in public or charitable institutions, as follows:—Melbourne Hospital, 44; Benevolent Asylum, 9; Immigrants' Home, 6; Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 4; Lying-in-Hospital, 2; New Military Barracks, 2; Western Gaol, 1.

Of the 282 deaths of children under five years of age, 150, or 53 per cent., were of males, and 132, or 47 per cent., of females; 192 were under one year old, 73 between one and two, 11 between two and three, 3 between three and four, and 3 between four and five years.

Of the 161 deaths of persons over five years of age, 95, or 59 per cent., were of males, and 66, or 41 per cent., of females; 10 were between five and ten years, 6 between ten and fifteen, 9 between fifteen and twenty, 11 between twenty and twenty-five, 26 between twenty-five and thirty, 15 between thirty and thirty-five, 16 between thirty-five and forty, 23 between forty and forty-five, 10 between forty-five and fifty, 9 between fifty and fifty-five, 10 between fifty-five and sixty, 4 between sixty and sixty-five, 4 between sixty-five and seventy, 2 between seventy and seventy-five, 5 of seventy-five years and upwards, and one whose age was unspecified.

BYE-LAW No. 12.—A BYE-LAW FOR THE PRESERVATION OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND THE SUPPRESSION OF NUISANCES CAUSED BY THE OVERFLOW OR SOAKAGE OF WATER-CLOSETS AND CESSPOOLS.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the preservation of the public health and the suppression of nuisances: Be it therefore enacted and directed by the municipal council of Clunes, that the owner or occupier of any house or premises shall not allow the contents of any water-closet, privy, or cesspool, to overflow or soak therefrom so as to be a nuisance or injurious to the health of the inhabitants, after written notice from the local inspector of nuisances to such owner or occupier to abate the same. Any person guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall forfeit and pay a penalty or sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 12, made by the municipal council of Clunes, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 23rd of February, 1863.

MUNICIPALITY OF EAGLEHAWK.

BYE-LAW No. 7.—TO REGULATE THE ERECTION OF SHADES OR AWNINGS, AND PREVENT ANY OBSTRUCTION UPON, OVER, OR ACROSS THE FOOTPATHS IN THE STREETS OF EAGLEHAWK.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is stated, amongst other things, that the council of any municipal district shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, paths, and public thoroughfares, and shall make such bye-laws for carrying out these objects as shall to such council seem fit: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Eaglehawk, that no person or persons shall erect or cause to be erected any shade, awning, or other obstruction over, upon, or across any footpaths in the streets of Eaglehawk municipality, without having first obtained the consent, in writing, of the said municipal council to such erection. And be it further ordered and directed by the authority aforesaid, that every such shade, awning, or obstruction; when such consent to the erection of the same shall have been obtained, shall be erected with the upright posts or pillars thereof at a distance of not less than eleven feet from the boundary line of such street or streets; and that no plate, rafter, or tie of any such shade or awning, or other obstruction, shall be of a less height above the surface of such footpaths than seven feet in the clear to the underside of such rafter, plate, or tie. And be it further ordered and directed, that it shall be lawful for the said council to direct and require the removal of any shade, awning, or other obstruction erected across, over, or upon any public footpaths of the said municipality, except the same be in strict accordance with the foregoing directions, whether such shade, awning, or other obstruction shall have been erected prior to the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor or subsequently thereto; and it shall be further lawful for the said council to give notice to remove any such shade, awning, or other obstruction, by means of the surveyor or other officer of such council, by giving seven days' notice to any owner or occupier by whom or for whom such shade, awning, or other obstruction shall have been erected. And any person guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 7, made by the municipal council of Eaglehawk, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 23rd of February, 1863.

Any person guilty of the neglect or breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding Five pounds.

OXLEY ROAD DISTRICT.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE OXLEY DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.

ORDINARY meetings shall be held at the Emu Hotel, Oxley, at Six (6) o'clock p.m. on every alternate Saturday, for the next three months; thenceforth according as the board may deem expedient.

2. Special meetings may be called at any time by order of the chairman, or of three members of the board, addressed to the secretary in writing, giving three clear days' notice, and specifying the business to be considered.

3. Five members shall form a quorum.

4. Business shall commence as soon as a quorum is present.

5. Meetings shall lapse if a quorum be not present within half an hour of the time appointed for the holding of the meeting.

No. 21.—MARCH 3, 1863.—3.

6. The secretary shall enter in the minute book the names of the members present at every such lapsed meeting.

7. Conduct of business at ordinary meetings shall be—first the reading and confirming the minutes of former meeting, upon which no discussion, except as to accuracy, shall be allowed; then correspondence, reports, and petitions, shall be dealt with, and notices of motion for future meetings received; and finally the special business of the day shall be considered.

8. Members must stand when speaking, and address the chairman.

9. No member shall be interrupted except by a call to order.

10. No member shall speak more than twice on any motion or amendment, except in reply or personal explanation.

11. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind a motion already passed, shall be entertained during the current year, unless a call of a special meeting of the whole board shall have been made for that purpose.

12. The ruling of the chairman shall be final on all points of order and practice.

13. No election to any office at the disposal of the board shall be made until eight clear days' notice shall have been given by advertisement in one or more of the local papers, calling for applications from qualified persons.

14. Contracts shall be made by tender, and shall be duly advertised in one or more of the local papers.

15. Tenders shall be deposited in the tender-box, at the office of the road board, and shall be opened by the chairman of the meeting held for the consideration of the same.

16. Contracts shall be prepared at the expense of the contractor, and signed on behalf of the board by the chairman and other two members of the board.

17. Every contractor shall deposit with the board satisfactory security for the fulfilment of his contract, and also ten per centum on the value of the work contracted for, which shall be returned to him on the satisfactory completion of his contract.

18. Contractors may receive, from time to time, any sum not exceeding seventy-five per cent. on the value of the work actually completed under the contract.

19. All payments shall be made by cheque only, signed by the chairman and two other members of the board; and no payment shall be made unless the account has been passed at a meeting of the board.

20. The bank account shall be kept at the Bank of New South Wales, Wangaratta.

21. The collector shall pay into that bank, to the credit of the board, all moneys within one week of the time of receiving them, and shall furnish the board fortnightly with a detailed statement of the same in writing.

BUCKLAND ROAD DISTRICT.

BYE-LAWS, 1863.—TO REGULATE THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE BUCKLAND DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.

THE business of the board shall be conducted with open doors.

2. The regular meetings of the board shall be held at the office of the board on the first Friday of every month, at One o'clock in the afternoon. The business to commence as soon as a quorum of five is present, but should a quorum of five not be present at the expiration of one hour after the time appointed for meeting, the same shall be entered with a note of the members present in the minute book, and the meeting shall lapse.

3. Members absent two consecutive meetings shall be fined One pound sterling, and an additional One pound for each other consecutive meeting they may be absent, unless detained by illness or other insurmountable obstacle.

4. Special meetings may be summoned at any time by the secretary, upon his receiving a written requisition signed by two members, stating the matter to be brought forward at such meeting, provided he shall give to each member notice thereof, by post or otherwise, three clear days before such meeting.

5. At every regular meeting of the board the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting for confirmation the minutes of any preceding meetings; and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes then confirmed shall be signed by the chairman for the time being.

6. After the confirmation of the minutes the order of business shall be as follows, or as near thereto as may be practicable:—

1. Reading copies of letters sent.
2. Reading letters received and considering and ordering thereon.
3. Reception and reading of petitions.
4. Reading and ordering on reports of permanent committees.
5. Reading and ordering on reports of special committees.
6. Orders of the day.
7. Motions of which previous notice shall have been given.

7. All petitions or memorials addressed to the board must be presented by one of its members, who shall be responsible for its being in proper form and respectfully worded.

8. On a petition or memorial being presented to the board, no debate on the subject matter therein contained shall take place thereon until it shall have lain on the table for one week, and until a notice of motion given by the member who presented it, that it be considered at the next meeting of the board; and the only question that shall be entertained shall be that the petition or memorial be received, and, if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.

9. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the board, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration. Any member of the board may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable in the form of a notice of motion. No such motion, however, shall be decided on at any meeting of the board unless notice thereof shall have been given to the secretary, in writing, by the member bringing it forward at the meeting previous to that in which the same shall be taken into consideration.

10. No motion entered on the business paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called for, and notices not proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.

11. It shall be competent for any member, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole board to rescind any motion which has already passed the board during the same official year, and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given by the secretary to each member of the board, by post or otherwise, of the day for which such call is made.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

12. Every member, including the chairman, shall stand up while addressing the board.

13. The presiding chairman's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument.

14. Every motion and amendment shall be entered on the minutes, with the names of the mover and seconder, and on a division thereon the votes shall be recorded.

15. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote. But upon any amendment being carried, it shall be competent for any member to move one other amendment, but no more.

16. All questions before the board shall be decided by open voting.

17. No discussion will be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the board, but if on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the board.

18. No motion, the effects of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion that has already passed the board, shall be entertained during the same year, unless a call of the whole board shall have been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the board that shall have been negatived by the board shall be again entertained during the same year.

19. Any member who shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other member, shall be requested by the chairman to withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology to the board.

20. Any member may require the secretary to take down any particular words used by a member, immediately on the same being used.

21. Any member of the board may enter his protest against any resolution of the board. Notice of intention to protest must, however, be given in every case on the adoption of the resolution to be protested against; and the protest, signed by the member or members protesting, and specifying the reason for protesting, must be entered before the next regular meeting of the board by the protesting member or members in a book to be kept for that purpose in the secretary's office.

22. Notices of motion may be dispensed with in cases of emergency, provided not more than three members be absent at such board meeting.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

23. No election to any office at the disposal of the board shall take place until six clear days' public notice shall have been given by advertisement, inviting applications from candidates properly qualified.

CONTRACTS.

24. All contracts shall be made by tender, and advertised for as the board shall direct. Tenders shall be addressed to the chairman, and only opened at the time of their consideration by the board; the respective amounts, together with the names of the parties tendering, to be entered in every case on the minutes of the board. When tenders shall have been accepted for an amount exceeding the sum of fifty pounds sterling, a contract bond shall be entered into, signed by the contractor and two sureties, and by two members of the board, one of whom shall be the chairman of the board, or in his absence, the chairman of the meeting at which such tender shall have been accepted; and the expenses (if any) of preparing such bond shall in all cases be borne by the person or persons giving the same.

25. No officer or member of the board shall have any pecuniary interest, either directly or indirectly, in any contract under the board.

PAYMENT OF MONEYS.

26. All payments shall be made by cheque, signed by the chairman and one other member of the board, and countersigned by the secretary; and no such cheques shall be given unless at a regular meeting of the board.

LOCAL ASSESSMENT.

27. In all cases it shall be considered sufficient for the collector to call once for payment of any amount due on the assessment roll, and in the event of any such amount not being paid to him, a notice shall be left stating that unless the amount be paid before the expiration of one month from the date thereof, legal proceedings will be taken for its recovery.

28. The collector shall once a week at least pay into such bank as the board shall direct, to the credit of such board, all moneys received by him from time to time, and at the same time furnish the secretary with an account of such moneys.

29. The collector and treasurer shall present their accounts at each regular meeting of the board.
