MINING OPERATIONS AUTHORISED UNDER THE POLICE PADDOCK AT TARADALE.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the eighteenth day of March, 1863.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor
Mr. Johnston Dr. Evans
Mr. Anderson

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted, that nothing thereinbefore contained shall authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy for mining purposes any Crown land which shall have been exempted by the Governor in Council from the operations of mining, or which shall have been applied to any public use or purpose, or be lawfully and *bona fide* used as a yard, garden, or orchard, or for any race or dam, or for any house, outhouse, shed, or other building, or to cut or remove from any such Crown land any trees growing thereon, or to cut or construct any race or dam through or upon any such Crown land; but nevertheless it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy under such miners' rights, and also to cut and construct races and dams, for the purposes aforesaid, through or upon any Crown lands which may have been so exempted or applied as aforesaid, subject to such conditions and restrictions as the Governor in Council shall impose: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order authorise holders of miners' rights to prosecute mining operations under the land known as the

Police Paddock at Taradale, subject to the conditions and restrictions hereinafter prescribed, that is to say:-

1. The mining operations shall be conducted in such a manner as not to interfere with the purpose for which the reserve was made.
2. The surface of the ground, shall not be occupied for the purpose of residence, and no tents or huts shall be erected thereon.
3. The workings shall be open at all reasonable hours to the inspection of any mining surveyor or other authorised officer.
4. Substantial fences shall be erected around all shafts, tunnels, or other excavations made by the miners; and on ceasing to mine they shall fill up all such shafts, tunnels, or other excavations made by them, remove all debris, clay, and gravel, as well as all buildings erected by them, and leave the surface of the ground in as good a condition as before the commencement of mining operations.
5. All instructions given by the mining surveyor or other authorised officer, relative to the mode of timbering or otherwise protecting the ground, shall be complied with by the miners.
6. All miners who shall take up claims on this reserve shall, prior to commencing operations, deposit in the hands of the warden of the district the sum of Ten pounds as a guarantee that they will observe and fulfil these conditions, and this sum shall be held by the warden until the miners who have made such deposit shall relinquish the claim held by them. If the conditions be fulfilled, then and in such case the whole sum shall be returned to the depositors, but if any of the conditions be not fulfilled the whole of the said sum shall be forfeited, and the cost of repairing any damage done to the reserve shall be defrayed out of the moneys so forfeited.
7. In case any person so mining shall in any way violate the above conditions it shall not be lawful for him any longer to mine upon any claim upon or within such lands.

And the Honorable George Samuel Evans, LL.D., shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

GOLD FIELDS COMMONS.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act*, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the lands hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:-

BOWMAN'S FOREST GOLD FIELD COMMON, described, amongst others, in a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-second day of December, 1862, shall be and the same is hereby abolished; and the area the boundaries and limits whereof are herein described shall be and constitute Bowman's Forest Gold Field Common aforesaid, that is to say:-Commencing at a point bearing east fifty-four chains sixty-seven links from the south-east angle of allotment 5, section 9, parish of Murrumbidgee; thence north to the Burgoogee Creek, by that creek westerly to a point due north of the south-east angle of allotment 5, section 9; thence south to a point forty-three chains south of the said south-east angle of allotment 5 of section 9; thence east fifty-four chains sixty-seven links; thence north forty-three chains to the point of commencement. Area, about 1800 acres, inclusive of the land rendered useless by mining operations.—(63.H.438.)

MOLIAGUL GOLD FIELD COMMON, described, amongst others, in a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-eighth day of January, 1861, shall be and the same is hereby abolished; and the area the boundaries and limits whereof are herein described shall be and constitute Moliagul Gold Field Common aforesaid, that is to say:-Containing 2300 acres of land, exclusive of appropriated lands: Commencing at the south-west angle of the town reserve of Moliagul; thence by a south line about sixty-six and a half chains to the north boundary of the Inkerman Gold Field Common; thence by that boundary one hundred chains east; thence north one hundred and eighty-six chains; thence west about two hundred and eighteen chains to the surveyed road to Jericho; thence south-easterly and easterly by that road to the west boundary of the town reserve; and thence by that boundary south to the commencing point. The bearings refer to the magnetic meridian.—(62.E.11736.)

ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAW SUPPLEMENTARY TO THE BYE-LAW REGULATING ALLUVIAL MINING IN THE PLEASANT CREEK AND BARKLY DIVISIONS OF THE ARARAT MINING DISTRICT, DATED 17TH NOVEMBER, 1862, AND GAZETTED 6TH JANUARY, 1863.—
 [10th March, 1863.]

At a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Ararat, begun and holden at the mining board room, Ararat, in the said district, on the tenth day of March, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

- 1. Spare ground and oversized claims.**—Any miner may measure the surface area of any claim, and should there be too much ground therein, may take possession of any portion of such ground not exceeding sixty (60) feet in length on whichever side of such claim he may prefer, provided the superficial area does not exceed the quantity allowed for one man.
- 2. Marking off and shepherding claims.**—On the day on which any claim shall be taken possession of not less than one-half the shareholders must remain thereon for two (2) consecutive hours between Nine a.m. and Noon, and on every succeeding day each share in such claim must be represented as aforesaid until bottomed. No share or interest in any claim being shepherded shall under any circumstances become liable to forfeiture unless through absence from such claim during the hours specified above.
- 3. Repeal clause.**—On and after the date on which this bye-law shall come into operation clauses 7 and 8 of the bye-law regulating alluvial mining in the Pleasant Creek and Barkly divisions of the Ararat mining district, bearing date 17th November, 1862, and gazetted 6th January, 1863, shall be and are hereby repealed.

MUNICIPALITY OF EMERALD HILL.

BYE-LAW No. 39.—To enable the Municipal Council of Emerald Hill to elect Managers of the Emerald Hill Municipal Common, to fix the time and manner of their election, and to remove such Managers and elect others in their stead.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, power is given to the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the conducting of elections: And whereas by an Act of His Excellency the Govern-

nor and Parliament of Victoria, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to the Sale and Occupation of Crown Lands*, 25 Victoria No. 145, section 69, it is declared that the municipal council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town or municipal common is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-laws prescribe, three persons to be managers of such town or municipal common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers and elect others in their stead: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Emerald Hill, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the election of managers of the municipal common shall be held and conducted at the time and in the manner following, viz.:-

1. That the election for the appointment of managers of the Emerald Hill municipal common shall be held annually at the second regular meeting of the council in each municipal year, viz., in July, and that the election of such managers for the unexpired portion of the current municipal year shall be held at the second regular meeting of the council after the publication in the *Government Gazette* of this bye-law.

2. That at such meeting or at any subsequent meeting of the council appointed for such purpose, any member of the council may propose the names of the same number of persons to be managers of such common as there are vacancies to be filled up; and in the event of there being more persons proposed than there are vacancies, the voting shall be on cards provided for the purpose, on which the voter shall write the name or names of the candidate or candidates he supports, and sign his own; the result of such election shall be entered in the minutes of the day, and the voting cards shall be kept in the town clerk's office for twelve months as a record.

3. That when any one or more vacancies occur through the death, resignation, or removal by the council of any manager or managers during his or their term of office, the council shall, as speedily as possible, elect in the same manner a person or persons to fill such vacancy or vacancies as is hereinbefore mentioned.

4. Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, it shall be lawful for the said council, instead of proceeding to the nomination and election of managers as aforesaid, to adjourn any such meeting from time to time as they may think proper, and the election taking place at any such adjourned meeting shall be equally valid.
