## INJURY TO TELEGRAPH APPARATUS.

### TWENTY-FIVE POUNDS REWARD.

WHEREAS much injury has recently been done to the insulations, wires, and exterior fixtures and fittings of the Electric Telegraph lines in various parts of the colony, by some evil-disposed persons, in consequence of which the working of the communication has been frequently affected: It is hereby notified that a reward of Twenty-five pounds will be paid to any person (not being the offender himself) who will furnish such reliable evidence as may secure the conviction of the offenders. And the public generally are hereby cautioned, that any person or persons breaking, destroying, or in any way injuring the wires, insulators, posts, or other fittings or fixtures of the Electric Telegraph, will render themselves liable to punishment, as provided by the Act 17th Victoria No. 22, section 9, as follows:—

"Any person who shall injure, molest, or destroy any of the said wires, cords, insulators, posts, piers, abutments, apparatus, works, or lines of communication, or any part thereof, or the material or property relating thereto, or in any way disturb, obstruct, or interrupt the free use or working of any such line of communication, or any works incidental to or connected therewith, or shall obstruct, hinder, or prevent the forming, constructing, completing, and maintaining any such line of communication, or any part thereof, shall, on conviction, forfeit a sum not less than Five pounds, nor more than One hundred pounds, or be imprisoned, with hard labor, for any period not exceeding six calendar months, at the discretion of the justices adjudicating."

SIR,—The establishment of Queensland as a separate colony, and the consequent introduction of a fresh claimant to share in the privilege of nominating from time to time to a cadetship in Her Majesty's Naval Service, obliges me to re-distribute amongst the several Australian colonies the limited number of nominations which are placed at my disposal for the purpose by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. Hitherto I have been enabled to present to Victoria a nomination annually, but I regret that for the future it will not be in my power to place a nomination at your disposal more frequently than three times in each period of four years.

You will be at liberty to nominate in the years 1863-4 and 5, but I must request you to forego the privilege in 1866, and again in 1870, and in each succeeding fourth year thereafter so long as the present rule subsists.

# WINCHESTER AND GRAVELEY'S DISTILLING APPARATUS.

THE accompanying Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, permitting the use on board passenger ships of Winchester and Graveley's Distilling Apparatus, as well as that of Dr. Normandy, is published for general information.

# PRESENT:

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by *The Passengers Act*, 1855, it is amongst other things enacted, that before any passenger ship shall be cleared out the emigration officer at the port of clearance shall satisfy himself that there is on board a sufficient quantity of pure water, carried in tanks or casks, to secure throughout the intended voyage the issue of three quarts daily to each statute adult, for the use of the passengers, exclusive of the quantity required for cooking:

And whereas it is also enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by any Order in Council, to prescribe such rules and regulations as to Her Majesty may seem fit, for permitting the use on board passenger ships of an apparatus for distilling water, and for defining in such case the quantity of fresh water to be carried in tanks or casks for the passengers, and such Order in Council from time to time to alter, amend, and revoke as occasion may require:

And whereas Her Majesty, by Orders in Council dated respectively the sixth day of May, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and the thirteenth day of May, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, prescribed certain rules for permitting the use on board passenger ships propelled by steam engines of a certain power, and on board passenger ships propelled by sails, of a certain apparatus for distilling fresh water from salt water:

And whereas it is expedient to repeal the said Order in Council that relates to passenger ships propelled by sails, and to issue in lieu thereof the Order hereinafter contained:

Now therefore Her Majesty doth, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in pursuance and in exercise of the

authority vested in Her by the said *Passengers Act*, 1855, hereby repeal the said Order in Council of the thirteenth day of May, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and order as follows:—

Any passenger ship propelled by sails only, or by steam engines of less power than is sufficient, without the aid of sails, to propel the ship at the rate of five statute miles an hour, may be cleared out and proceed on her voyage, having on board, in tanks or casks, only half the quantity of pure water required by the said Act to be carried for the use of the passengers, provided the following conditions be observed, that is to say:—

1. That there be on board such ship an efficient apparatus for distilling fresh water from salt water, of the description commonly known either as Normandy's patent or Winchester and Graveley's patent.

2. That the owners, charterers, or master of such ship, before clearance, lodge with such emigration officer a certificate from the engineer or surveyor of the Board of Trade, or from some other competent person to be named by such emigration officer, declaring that within seven days immediately preceding the date of such certificate the apparatus has been examined by him, and is then in good working condition, and stating the number of imperial gallons of pure fresh water which it is capable of producing every twenty-four hours; and further declaring that the apparatus on board is either Normandy's or Winchester and Graveley's patent, as the case may be.

3. That in every case such emigration officer shall be satisfied that the number of gallons of pure water which the apparatus is so certified to be capable of producing is not less than the whole number of persons about to proceed on the intended voyage of such ship, that is to say, the whole number of cabin passengers, passengers, and crew.

4. That there is rated on the ship's articles, and that there is on board the ship, some person or persons who, to the satisfaction of the said emigration officer, shall be competent for the proper management and repair of such distilling apparatus. And to prevent all doubts on the construction of this Order in Council, it is hereby further ordered that the terms "passenger ship," "emigration officer," "statute adult," and "master," shall herein have the same significations as are assigned to them respectively in the said *Passengers Act*, 1855.

And the Most Noble the Duke of Newcastle, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The petitioners state that they constitute a majority of the residents in an area containing thirty-six resident householders for each square mile thereof, which is outside of and adjacent to the southern and western boundary of the municipality of Ballaarat, and that they are desirous that their locality should be included within the said municipality, the council of which is also desirous of the proposed annexation.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore pray that your Excellency will be pleased to declare by a Proclamation the locality within which they reside to be united with and form part of the Ballaarat municipality, by the following general description as defined and set forth in the plan accompanying this petition, viz.:—Commencing at the north-west angle of the Botanic Garden Reserve; thence by a line bearing west twenty-seven and a half chains; thence by a line bearing south two miles three chains and forty links to the north-east angle of allotment twelve of section one,\* parish of Cardigan; thence east one mile and one chain and fifty links to the north-east angle of allotment four, section three, parish of Cardigan; thence south by the eastern boundary of said allotment four, section three, forty-six chains sixty links; thence by a line bearing east to the River Yarrowee; thence northerly by the River Yarrowee to the southern boundary of the municipal district of Ballaarat; thence by the southern and western boundaries of the municipal district of Ballaarat to the commencing point."
