## INJURY TO TELEGRAPH APPARATUS.

### TWENTY-FIVE POUNDS REWARD.

WHEREAS much injury has recently been done to the insulations, wires, and exterior fixtures and fittings of the Electric Telegraph lines in various parts of the colony, by some evil-disposed persons, in consequence of which the working of the communication has been frequently affected: It is hereby notified that a reward of Twenty-five pounds will be paid to any person (not being the offender himself) who will furnish such reliable evidence as may secure the conviction of the offenders. And the public generally are hereby cautioned, that any person or persons breaking, destroying, or in any way injuring the wires, insulators, posts, or other fittings or fixtures of the Electric Telegraph, will render themselves liable to punishment, as provided by the Act 17th Victoria No. 22, section 9, as follows:—

"Any person who shall injure, molest, or destroy any of the said wires, cords, insulators, posts, piers, abutments, apparatus, works, or lines of communication, or any part thereof, or the material or property relating thereto, or in any way disturb, obstruct, or interrupt the free use or working of any such line of communication, or any works incidental to or connected therewith, or shall obstruct, hinder, or prevent the forming, constructing, completing, and maintaining any such line of communication, or any part thereof, shall, on conviction, forfeit a sum not less than Five pounds, nor more than One hundred pounds, or be imprisoned, with hard labor, for any period not exceeding six calendar months, at the discretion of the justices adjudicating."

# MINING OPERATIONS AUTHORISED WITHIN THE CAMP RESERVE AT RUSHWORTH.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-third day of March, 1863.

## PRESENT:

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted, that nothing thereinbefore contained shall authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy for mining purposes any Crown land which shall have been exempted by the Governor in Council from the operations of mining, or which shall have been applied to any public use or purpose, or be lawfully and *bona fide* used as a yard, garden, or orchard, or for any race or dam, or for any house, outhouse, shed, or other building, or to cut or remove from any such Crown land any trees growing thereon, or to cut or construct any race or dam through or upon any such Crown land; but nevertheless it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy under such miners' rights, and also to cut and construct races and dams, for the purposes aforesaid, through or upon any Crown lands which may have been so exempted or applied as aforesaid, subject to such conditions and restrictions as the Governor in Council shall impose: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order authorise holders of miners' rights to prosecute mining operations on the portion of the Police Camp Reserve at Rushworth, comprised within the following boundaries, viz.:—Commencing at the north-western angle of the said reserve, and bounded on the north-west by a line bearing N. 65° 20' E. four chains fifty-five links; on the east by a line bearing S. 1° 48' W. three chains sixty-two links; on the south-east by a line bearing S. 66° 52' W. two chains ninety-eight links; and on the south-west by a line bearing N. 24° 40' W. three chains nineteen links, more or less, to the point of commencement, subject to the conditions and restrictions hereinafter prescribed, that is to say:—

1. The mining operations shall be conducted in such a manner as not to interfere with the purpose for which the reserve was made.
2. The surface of the ground shall not be occupied for the purpose of residence, and no tents or huts shall be erected thereon.
3. The miners shall not interfere with or injure the trees in the reserve.
4. The workings shall be open at all reasonable hours to the inspection of any mining surveyor or other authorised officer.
5. The ground occupied by the miners shall be securely fenced, and means of ingress and egress provided, so as not to interfere with the reserve in the occupation of the police.
6. On ceasing to mine, the miners shall fill up all shafts and excavations made by them, remove all debris, clay, and gravel, as well as all fences and buildings erected by them, and leave the surface of the ground in as good a condition as before the commencement of mining operations.
7. All instructions given by the mining surveyor or other authorised officer, relative to the mode of timbering or otherwise protecting the ground, shall be complied with by the miners.
8. All miners who shall take up claims on this portion of the said reserve shall, prior to commencing mining operations, deposit in the hands of the warden of the district the sum of Thirty pounds, as a guarantee that they will observe and fulfil these conditions; and this sum shall be held by the warden until the miners who have made such deposit shall relinquish the claim held by them. If the conditions be fulfilled, then and in such case the whole sum shall be returned to the depositors; but if any of the conditions be not fulfilled, the whole of the said sum shall be forfeited, and the cost of repairing any damage done to the reserve shall be defrayed out of the moneys so forfeited.

In case any person so mining shall in any way violate the above conditions, it shall not be lawful for him any longer to mine upon any claim upon or within such lands.

And the Honorable George Samuel Evans, LL.D., shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

# THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF AVOCA ALTERED.

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the sixteenth day of December, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, the Municipal District of Avoca was altered in compliance with the prayer of a petition of the householders resident within the area therein described: And whereas the district defined in the said Proclamation has been found not to coincide accurately with the district petitioned for as aforesaid, and it is expedient again to alter the said Municipal District: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke so much of the said Proclamation as purports to describe the boundaries of the said municipal district, and with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby declare that the said Municipal

District of Avoca shall be and consist of the area comprised within the boundaries and limits hereinafter described, that is to say:—

Commencing at the north-east angle of allotment 1, section A 3; thence south to the south-east angle of allotment 30, section 1 A; thence west to the south-west angle of allotment 7, section 6 A; thence north to the north-west angle of allotment 3, section 5 A, all in the parish of Avoca; thence east by the north boundaries of allotments 3 and 4 of section 5 A to the north-east angle of allotment 4; thence north by the east side of allotment 1, section 5 A, to the north-east angle thereof; thence east 1 chain (crossing a road); thence by a line bearing S. 73° 30' E. 59 chains to the west side of the main road from Moonambel to Avoca; thence by that side of the main road bearing S. 54° E. 13½ chains, more or less, crossing the Avoca River; thence crossing said road easterly to an angle on the west boundary of allotment 6, section B, being the eastern side of the road leading to Natta Yallock; thence by that side of lastnamed road northerly 6 chains 50 links to the north-west angle of allotment 6 of section B; thence east to the point of commencement.

Commencing at a point on the Yarriambiack Creek where it is intersected by the northern boundary of the Kewell Run; thence eastwards by the northern boundary of the said run to a point where it joins the Sheep Hills Run; thence along the south-western boundary of that run until it joins the Kirkwood Run; thence by the north-western and north-eastern boundary of the Kirkwood Run to the northern boundary of Rich Avon West Run; thence by the eastern boundary of the said run to the Avon River; thence southerly by the said river to the south-west angle of the Rich Avon East Run; thence easterly and northerly along the southern and eastern boundaries of the Rich Avon East Run to the western boundary of the Swanwater North Run; thence by the western boundary of the Swanwater North Run to the north-west angle of the Conoor Run; thence south and east by the western and southern boundaries of the Conoor Run to the centre of the Avoca River; thence northerly by the centre of the Avoca River to its junction with the Lalbert Creek; thence northerly by the centre of the Lalbert Creek to the southern shore of Lake Lalbert; thence west to the southern shore of Lake Coorong; thence southerly by the Yarriambiack Creek.—(63.236.)

The rate of mortality per diem in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of February was 9.97, against 14.29 in the previous month. The total number of deaths was 279, against 335 in February, 1862, against 363 in February, 1861, and against 306 in February, 1860. The mean mortality of the month during the last four years was therefore 321, or 24 deaths more than in the month under review.

The mean temperature of the month was 66.1° against 66.7, 65°, and 65.4° for the corresponding months in the three preceding years. The highest point reached by the thermometer (104°) was at 1 p.m. on the 2nd, and the lowest (50.7°) at 4 a.m. on the 10th. The greatest range of temperature (43.9°) was on the 1st, from a maximum of 103.9° to a minimum of 60°, and the least (3.8°) was on the 18th, from a maximum of 64.2° to a minimum of 61.4°, the range between the highest and lowest of the month was 42.3°, and the mean daily range 17.5°. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.839 in. against 29.814 in. in February, 1862, against 29.693 in. in February, 1861, and against 29.919 in. in February, 1860. The highest point attained by the barometer (30.143 in.) was at 10 a.m. on the 10th, and the lowest (29.506 in.) at 3 a.m. on the 17th, the range for the month thus being .637 in.

The mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality, for the four weeks in February, were as follow:—

Of the 279 deaths which took place in February, 164, or nearly 59 per cent., were of males, and 115, or rather more than 41 per cent., of females, 174, or about 62 per cent., were of children under five years of age, and 105, or about 38 per cent., were of persons beyond that age. In the previous month these latter proportions were respectively 64 and 36 per cent.

As many as 25 persons died on the 2nd; 15, 14, and 13 were the next highest numbers, and occurred respectively on the 27th, 14th, and 3rd.

The oldest persons who died during the month were one male and one female, their respective ages being 81 and 78, the death of the former was referred to old age and that of the latter to bronchitis.

The deaths resulting from violent or external causes numbered 11, and were thus described:—Four persons, all males, were drowned, one suicidally, viz., a carver and gilder aged 46 years, and three accidentally, viz., a laborer, aged 26, in the Yarra; a bricklayer, aged 28, also in the Yarra; and a mariner, aged 26, at Sandridge. At Collingwood a male infant, 20 weeks old, died from an overdose of opium. Three persons died of fracture of the skull, viz., a groom, 43 years old; a shoemaker, aged 31 years; and a male infant, aged 7 weeks; at the Victorian Railways, a minor, aged 27 years, was accidentally killed; at the Melbourne Gaol, a laborer, aged 28 years, was judicially hanged. At Richmond, a law clerk, aged 40 years, died of asphyxia. At Collingwood, a boy, four years old, was accidentally killed. A female, aged 55 years, committed suicide by inflicting wounds in her arm. And at St. Kilda, a laborer, aged 56 years, died in consequence of a fall from a horse.

Thirty-nine deaths, or 14 per cent. of the total mortality, occurred in public or charitable institutions, namely:—Melbourne Hospital, 21; Benevolent Asylum, 1; Gaol, 1; Immigrants' Home, 8; Lunatic Asylum, 3; Wesleyan Immigrants' Home, 1; Lying-in Hospital, 1.

Of the 174 deaths of children under five years of age, 95, or about 55 per cent., were of males, and 79, or 45 per cent., were of females; 110 were under one year old, 51 were between one and two years, 7 between two and three, 4 between three and four, and 2 between four and five years.

Of the 105 deaths of persons over five years of age, 69, or nearly 66 per cent., were of males, and 36, or about 34 per cent., were of females; 6 were between five and ten years, 4 between fifteen and twenty, 5 between twenty and twenty-five, 19 between twenty-five and thirty, 11 between thirty and thirty-five, 9 between thirty-five and forty, 12 between forty and forty-five, 8 between forty-five and fifty, 10 between fifty and fifty-five, 5 between fifty-five and sixty, 7 between sixty and sixty-five, 5 between sixty-five and seventy, 2 between seventy and seventy-five, and 2 above seventy-five years of age.

#### NORTH HARROW ROAD DISTRICT. RULES to regulate the Proceedings of the North Harrow District Road Board.

##### ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS.

1. The business of the board shall be conducted on all occasions with open doors.
2. The board shall sit and commence business on the first Tuesday in each month, so soon after Twelve o'clock noon as there are a sufficient number of members in attendance to constitute a quorum; but if at the expiry of half an hour from the time specified in the circular there is not a quorum present, the meeting shall stand adjourned to the following Tuesday, and three members shall form a quorum.
3. At all meetings of the board when there is not three members present, or when the board is counted out, such circumstance, together with the names of the members there present, shall be recorded in the minute book.
4. The minutes of any preceding meeting, not previously confirmed, shall be read as the first business at all meetings of the board, in order to their confirmation; and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon, except as to their accuracy as a record of their proceedings.
5. At all meetings of the board the reading of correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, and bringing up of reports of committees, shall have precedence of the regular business.
6. Every communication addressed to the board shall be in proper form, and presented by one of its members, or the secretary, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.
7. On the presentation of a petition, no debate shall take place thereon; and the only question that shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation shall be that the petition be received and taken into consideration after the orders of the day, or at any future meeting, or if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.
8. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the board, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration. Any member of the board may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable, in the form of notice of motion; no such motion, however, shall be decided on at any meeting of the board unless notice thereof shall have been given to the secretary, in writing, by the member bringing it forward at the meeting previous to that in which the same shall be taken into consideration.
9. No notice of motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called in order. Notices of motion not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.
10. No bye-law shall be finally passed or adopted at the meeting at which it shall have been first proposed, nor until the next meeting.
11. No motion proposing any petition, address, bye-law, or standing order shall be entertained, unless the mover shall submit therewith a draft of such petition, bye-law, or standing order.
12. The mover of any motion which may be referred to a committee shall be a member of such committee.
13. Special meetings shall be summoned at any time by the secretary, upon receiving a requisition signed by two members, stating the matter to be discussed at such meeting.
14. No special meeting shall be held unless the secretary shall have given notice thereof, either *visd voce* or by post, five clear days before such meeting.

##### ORDER OF DEBATE.

15. The presiding chairman's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument.
16. Every motion or amendment shall be entered in the minutes, with the name of the mover and seconder, and on a division thereon the votes shall be recorded.
17. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost another may be moved before the original is put to the vote.
18. Any member proposing a motion or amendment, or if speaking on any matter, must rise and address the chairman. No member when speaking shall be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down, in which case the member calling to order shall be heard thereon in preference to any other; and the question of order shall be disposed of by the chairman before the subject is resumed or any other matter entered upon.
19. All questions before the board shall be decided by open voting unless a motion for any particular question is made and carried that it shall be by ballot.
20. No discussion will be allowed on any matter of adjournment of the board, but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the board.
21. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the board, shall be entertained during the same year, unless a call of the whole board has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the board which shall have been negatived by the board shall be again entertained during the same year.
22. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same motion or amendment, except by way of explanation, or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last proposed; and the chairman shall, without waiting for the interposition of the board, call to order any member proceeding to speak a third time on the same motion or amendment.

23. Any member moving or seconding any motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken on that motion or amendment.

#### CONTRACTS.

24. All contracts in value above £10 shall be made by tender, advertised not less than twice in the *Portland Guardian* and *Hamilton Spectator*, also by printed notice at the Police Office; each tender shall be addressed to the chairman, and not opened until the appointed time. The respective amounts, together with the names of the parties tendering, to be entered in every case on the minutes of the board; and when tenders are accepted a contract bond shall be entered into, signed by the contractor, and by two members of the board, one of whom shall be the chairman of the board, or in his absence the chairman of the meeting at which such tender is accepted; and the expense of preparing such bond shall in all cases be borne by the person or persons giving the same.

25. No officer or member of the board shall have any pecuniary interest, either directly or indirectly, in any contract under the board.

#### PAYMENTS OF MONEY.

26. All payments shall be made by cheque, signed by the chairman and one other member of the board, and countersigned by the secretary, and no such cheques shall be given unless they be passed at a regular meeting of the board.

#### LOCAL ASSESSMENT.

27. In all cases it shall be considered sufficient for the collector to apply once for payment of any amount due on the assessment roll, and in the event of any such amount not being paid to him, a notice shall be left, stating that unless the amount be paid to the collector of the board before the expiration of one month from the date thereof, legal proceedings will be taken for the recovery.

28. The collector shall pay into the treasurer's hands all moneys collected, immediately after such collection.

29. The treasurer shall place all money received from the collector to the credit of the board, in the Bank of Victoria, Hamilton.

30. The collector and treasurer shall present their accounts at each meeting of the board.
