THE ROYAL ASSENT TO THE ALIENS ACT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Constitution Statute* it is amongst other things enacted, that the provisions of the Act of the fourteenth year of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-nine, and of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy-six, *For the Government of New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land*, which relate to the giving and withholding of Her Majesty's assent to Bills, and the reservation of Bills for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon, and the instructions to be conveyed to governors for their guidance in relation to the matters aforesaid, and the disallowance of Bills by Her Majesty, shall apply to Bills to be passed by the Legislative Council and Assembly constituted under the *Constitution Act of Victoria* and the now-reciting Statute, and by any other legislative body or bodies which may at any time hereafter be substituted for the present Legislative Council and Assembly: And whereas the Bill hereinafter mentioned was reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon: And whereas by an Order of the Queen in Council, made on the ninth day of January in the present year, a copy whereof is hereto appended, Her Majesty has been pleased to assent to the said Bill: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, in pursuance of the provisions of the aforesaid Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, do by this my Proclamation signify that the Bill intituled *An Act to amend the Law relating to Aliens*, reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon upon the eighteenth day of June, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, has been laid before Her Majesty in Council, and that Her Majesty has been pleased to assent to the same.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this tenth day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and in the twenty-sixth year of Her Majesty's reign.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, entitled, *An Act for the Government of New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land*, it is amongst other things enacted, that no Bill which shall be reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon shall have any force or authority within the colony of New South Wales until the Governor of the said colony shall signify, either by speech or message to the Legislative Council of the said colony or by proclamation as therein aforesaid, that such Bill has been laid before Her Majesty in Council, and that Her Majesty has been pleased to assent to the same: And whereas by another Act passed in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, entitled, *An Act for the better Government of Her Majesty's Australian Colonies*, it was provided, among other things, that the provisions of the said former Act, concerning the reservation of Bills for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon, should apply to and be in force in the colony of Victoria: And whereas the said provisions were maintained in force as regards Bills passed by the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of the said colony by a subsequent Act passed in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of the reign of Her said Majesty, entitled, *An Act to enable Her Majesty to assent to a Bill as amended of the Legislature of Victoria to establish a Constitution in and for the Colony of Victoria*: And whereas the Governor of the said colony of Victoria reserved a certain Bill passed by the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of the said colony, entitled, *An Act to amend the Law relating to Aliens*, for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon: And whereas the said Bill so reserved as aforesaid has been laid before Her Majesty in Council, and it is expedient that the said Bill should be assented to by Her Majesty: Now therefore Her Majesty, in pursuance of the said Acts, and in exercise of the powers thereby reserved to Her Majesty as aforesaid, doth by this present Order, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, declare Her assent to the said Bill.

And the Most Noble the Duke of Newcastle, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the seventeenth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, *An Act to amend the Law relating to Post Offices*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to make arrangements with the constituted authorities in separate colonies for the transmission, through the medium of the Post Office, of money between any separate colony and Victoria, by order or otherwise, and for the delivery and payment of the same; the accounting for all money which shall be due and owing to any colony on account of such arrangements for the transmission of any balance thereon; to make such rules and regulations; to defray such discounts and exchanges as may be necessary; and to establish such rates of payment as seem fit in such behalf respectively: And whereas by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, *An Act to enable the Postmaster General to issue Money Orders in the Colony of Victoria*, it is further, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make such regulations as shall be needed relating to money orders, and to the persons by or through whom, and to the restrictions as to number and amount under which money orders shall be issued, and to the places where all money orders issued shall be payable; and to the length of time during which money orders shall be current, and after which they shall become void; and to the managing of credits, accounts, and other matters and things necessary to be forwarded, transmitted, or managed in reference to money orders; and relating to every other matter or thing necessary to be regulated or done for perfecting a system whereby the public may be enabled promptly and safely to remit small sums of money to all parts through the Post Office:

Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that, on and after the first day of April now next ensuing, money orders may and shall be issued at all post offices in the colony of Victoria to which the money order system is now or may hereafter be extended on such post offices in New South Wales as the Government of that colony shall from time to time notify as post offices at which such money orders can be made payable.

That on and after the date above mentioned all money orders drawn in New South Wales, by postmasters and others duly authorised in that behalf, on the post offices in Victoria at which money order business is transacted, shall be payable under the money order regulations in force.

That the amount of premium to be charged on all money orders issued in the colony of Victoria on New South Wales shall be as follows:—

For any sum not exceeding £5 ... One shilling.
Ditto above £5 and not exceeding £10 ... Two shillings.

That the largest amount for which any money order shall be issued in Victoria on New South Wales shall be (£10) Ten pounds.

And the Honorable Gen. Samuel Evans, LL.D., Her Majesty's Postmaster General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that nothing in the said Act contained shall authorise the interference by any municipal council constituted under the said Act with any public place or building of what description soever, not erected or constructed by such municipal council, that may be excepted from the jurisdiction of such municipal council by any Proclamation made or to be made by the Lieutenant Governor: And whereas it is deemed expedient to except the premises hereinafter mentioned from the jurisdiction of the council of the municipal district of Richmond: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, do by this my Proclamation, with the advice of the Executive Council, except from the jurisdiction of the municipal council of Richmond the following premises, situate and being within the said municipal district, that is to say:—

The drill-room used by the Richmond Battery of the Royal Victoria Volunteer Artillery Regiment.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-third day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and in the twenty-sixth year of Her Majesty's reign.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

REPORTED SLAVE-TRADING ON THE WEST COAST OF SOUTH AMERICA.

THE subjoined translation of a Despatch from the Government of Chili to the Consul for Chili, at Melbourne, is published for general information.

It is requested that any persons in possession of information on the subject referred to in the Despatch will have the goodness to communicate the same to the Consul for Chili.

Santiago, 30th October, 1862.

It has become known to Government, through the medium of the British Legation, that a ship called the *David Thomas*, assumed to be a Chilian, has attracted, by stratagem, about 200 savages, inhabitants of the island of Penrhyn, and from thence has conveyed them to Callao, where they have been sold as slaves. At the same time it appears the vessel hoisted on its passage the Chilian flag, changing it for another on arrival at Callao.

Through the same channel, the Government has been subsequently made aware that several vessels, among which are two Chilians, named *Bella Margarita* and *Eliza Mason*, were getting ready to proceed to the abovenamed island with a similar intent to the *David Thomas*, attracted, no doubt, by the remunerative although odious profits that are supposed to have been realized by the lastnamed vessel.

The Government, desiring to be made acquainted with the probability of such statements, has directed me to address you, and to request that you will spare no means to ascertain the truth of such reports, and that you will communicate to me whatever information you have collected on the subject.

At the same time, you are requested to adopt all such means as are at your disposal, in the sphere of your consular agency, to prevent the abovenamed vessels from attaining their object by succeeding in this traffic, which is opposed to the laws of our country and to those of humanity.

No. 28. To impose a rate of 1s. 6d. in the pound for the current year, ending 10th day of September, 1863.

No. 29. For the regulation of nightmen and carters.

No. 30. For the prevention of persons lighting fires in the open air, within the municipality.

No. 31. For the preservation of the public health and the suppression of nuisances caused by the overflow or leakage of water-closets or cesspools. For the better regulation of lodging-houses.

MEMORIALS.

A memorial to His Excellency the Governor, urging the desirability of changing the date of the financial year of the Government from January to July.

A memorial to His Excellency the Governor, praying that the *Real Property Act* might be carried out in its integrity, as at present in operation in South Australia.

A memorial to the Honorable the Chief Secretary, praying for the introduction of a Bill to the Legislature, as early as possible, to regulate mining on private property.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The following public works have been carried out during the past half-year:—

1. The construction of 15 chains of kerbing and channelling in High and Main streets, together with formation and graveling the footpath, and pitching rights-of-way.

2. Sloping the cutting in High street for a length of 54 chains.
 3. Formation of 7 chains of Templeton street, towards German Reef.
 4. Formation and gravelling 26 chains of footpath in High street, between Francis street and Adair street.
 5. Cutting 5 chains of drain in Hospital street.
 6. Construction and laying down five box shutes for draining the footpaths in various places.
 7. Construction of a bridge on the road to Parkins Reef.
 8. Formation and gravelling of 4 chains of footpath and construction of a footbridge in Francis street.
 9. Forming and metalling 4 chains and construction of culvert in Peg Leg Gully.
- Together with the repairs of roads in various parts of the municipality, where most urgently required.

WATER SUPPLY.

The Government having requested the council to act as agents in expending the sum of £1500 on the Maldon Reservoir, it was decided to agree to such proposal, and, in consequence, the council entered into contracts, which consist of increasing the reservoir, cutting catchment race, and laying pipes from reservoir to Wheelhouse's premises, opposite Spring street. An attempt has also been made at considerable cost to stop the leak known to exist, but without effect.

The above contracts will be completed within one month from the present date; already 33 chains of race have been cut, and 900 yards of earthwork have been excavated, and the repairs of the embankment completed.

The council regrets that the sum placed at its disposal will have been expended without the leak being stopped; and as the report of the town surveyor states that the water escapes through the rock, a further sum of about £700 will be required in order to thoroughly puddle the entire bottom of the excavation.

An application will be made to the Government for such further sum as will render the reservoir thoroughly watertight, and strong hopes are entertained that the application will be favorably considered, as, without the steps suggested are taken, the reservoir cannot be of any permanent benefit to the inhabitants.
