WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the twenty-third day of July, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, a certain building called and known as the Police Lock-up, situate at Maryborough, was declared to be and constitute a gaol, prison, and house of correction, within the meaning of the Act passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, initiated, An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal, of Offenders: And whereas it is expedient to discontinue the use of the said premises for the confinement of prisoners under sentence: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of

the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the Proclamation hereinbefore mentioned, and do hereby notify that the said promises shall cease to be a gaol, prison, and house of correction.

WHEREAS by The Land Act, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the lands' hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the above recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majosty, intituled, An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to split any mining district as thereinbefore mentioned into any number of divisions, and to define the limits and boundaries thereof respectively, and also to determine the number of members of the mining board of such district which shall be elected within and for every such division, and from time to time to alter any such division and the limits and boundaries thereof, and to vary the number of members which shall be elected within and for every such division, but, so that the total number of members elected for such district shall in no case exceed or be less than ten. And whereas it is expedient to abolish the existing divisions of the mining district of Beechworth, and to subdivide the said district into the divisions hereimafter described. Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order abolish the existing divisions of the mining district of Beechworth, and doth split the said mining district into the divisions hereimafter named and described, that is to say:

BEECHWORTH MINING DIVISION. — Commencing at the source of Clear Creek; thence by the western water-shed of

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, intituled, An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria (18 Victoria No. 15), it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act, to make byelaws for the "regulation and licensim of public earriers, carters, water-drawers, and public vehicles, the restraining noisome and offensive trades, and the general good rule and government of such municipal council for the district of Daylesford, from and after this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor in Council, as required by the provisions of the said Act—

1. That no vehicle of any description whatsoever, excepting stage coaches running long distances, shall carry passengers for hire within the municipal boundary, unless the same be duly licensed and registered, and the vehicle, harness, and horses used in drawing the same be in a fit condition for public use, with the number of such license and the number of passengers that the same is allowed to carry conspicuously and legibly painted thereon, and the driver a sober and competent man.

2. That the number of passengers to be conveyed in each vehicle at any one time shall be determined by the said council upon the report of their inspector, and no greater number of passengers than the number so determined on shall at any one and the same time be carried in such vehicle on any pretence whatever, but children in arms shall not be counted as passengers.

That the owner or owners of all public vehicles carrying passengers for hire shall register their names and addresses at the municipal chamber, and shall submit the vehicle required to be licensed to the inspection of the council or their town inspector, and such council shall on approval issue a license in the form of schedule hereunto annexed, such license to continue in force for one year from the date thereof.

4. That the owner or owners of any licensed vehicle changing his or their place of abode shall immediately give notice in writing thereof to the town clerk, and shall at the same time produce his license, who shall endorse thereon the particulars of such change.

5. That any owner selling a licensed vehicle shall give notice thereof to the town clerk at the municipal chamber within three days of the sale thereof, and in default shall be subject to the penalty imposed by this bye-law; and any purchaser of such vehicle using the same for hire must have his name endorsed on the license of such vehicle by the town clerk, and in default shall be subject to the penalty imposed on the owner of a vehicle plying without a license.

6. That every owner of any cart or dray used for hire within the said municipal district shall register his name and place of abode in the municipal chamber, and shall thereupon receive a license on which shall be written his name or place of abode, the number of his license, and the public places which from time to time the council may appoint as stands for public carters, such license to continue in force for one year from the date theroof, and such owner shall have the number of his license with his name legibly painted and conspicuously affixed to the right or off side of the cart or dray: Provided always that in case the owner shall have more than one cart or dray plying for hire, he shall take out a license for each and every such cart or dray in the same manner as though they belonged to different o

such cart or dray in the same manner as though they belonged to different owners.

7. Be it further ordered and directed that every public water-carter plying within the said municipal district shall register his name and place of abode in the municipal chamber, and pay the same amount as hereinbefore ordered that public carters shall do, and shall thereupon receive a license on which shall be written or printed his name or place of abode, and the number of the license, which number and owner's name must be legibly painted and conspicuously affixed to each water-cart, and further, every public water-carter shall have the word "water-cart" and the number of his license legibly painted and affixed in a manner conspicuous to passers by and the public on the outside of his residence or the premises where the said water-cart is placed at night; and further be it ordered, that the better to guard against accidents by fire, that the owners of all public water-carts shall keep such water-carts constantly loaded with water-darts; shall keep such water-carts constantly loaded with water-during the night, and also, if called upon by this council or any officer duly authorised by the council, shall with all due dilligence and to the best of their ability supply water for the extinguishing of any fire that may occur on property within this municipal district; and any water-carter who shall fail, without reasonable cause, to keep his water-cart so loaded, or refuse or neglect to supply water to fires when called upon as aforesaid, shall be lable to the penalty herein imposed.

8. It shall be lawful for the municipal treasurer to pay out of the municipal funds such rewards to the wa-er-carters who shall supply the first and second loads of water, and such amounts to those supply may are after the second load, in all cases of fire in the municipality, as the council shall from time to time direct.

Printed forms of tender may be obtained from the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne, or from the officer in charge of police at each station, by whom also any information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

DEPUTATION.

On 19th June, a deputation, consisting of Councillors Milvain and Tyson, waited upon the Hon. Commissioner of Railways and Roads with reference to the action taken by Government in excepting a portion of the parish boundary road from the jurisdiction of the council, for the purpose of erecting a check toll-gate thereon.

At the request of the hon. commissioner, the deputation caused a written report to be forwarded to his office, which ultimately resulted in a favorable reply thereto, stating, "As the collection of tolls had been discontinued upon the road in question, there was nothing to prevent the council from expending money thereon, and consequently the revocation of the proclamation excepting the same from the council's jurisdiction was unnecessary."
