TIME SIGNAL AT PORT PHILLIP HEADS.

IT is hereby notified that, on and after the 1st May proximo, a time signal will be given daily (Sundays excepted), by means of a black ball working on the topmast of the flagstaff at Shortland's Bluff.

The signal will correspond to One o'clock p.m., mean time, as corrected at the Astronomical Observatory, Williamstown.

The ball will be hoisted to the full height at five minutes before One, and will drop at One o'clock precisely.
In the event of imperfection or incorrectness occurring on any occasion, in giving the signal, the No. 2 flag pendant (Marryatt's code) will be immediately shown, and kept flying at the mast head for fifteen (15) minutes.

PROCLAMATION.

By JAMES A. R. MENZIES, Esq., Superintendent of the Province of Southland.

WHEREAS His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to delegate to the Superintendent of the Province of Southland certain powers under the *Diseased Cattle Act, 1861*; and whereas by proclamations dated on the 10th and 26th days December, 1861, respectively, published in the *Southland Pro-*

vincial Government Gazette, it is amongst other things declared that the inspector of cattle in the Province of Southland, under the provisions of the said Act, shall not be authorised to grant a certificate to land in the Province of Southland cattle coming from Tasmania; and whereas it is expedient to revoke this provision and make other provision in lieu thereof:

Now therefore I, the said Superintendent, in virtue of the power in me vested, do hereby proclaim that the inspector of cattle is hereby authorised to grant certificates to land in the Province of Southland, cattle coming from Tasmania; always provided that such cattle shall be free from the disease called pleuro-pneumonia, and that the owner or person in charge of such cattle shall have previously given to such inspector satisfactory proof that the cattle sought to be landed were bred in Tasmania, or were depastured in Tasmania for six consecutive months prior to their last embarkation from thence.

REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF MARCH, AND FOR THE QUARTER ENDING 31st MARCH, 1863.

ACTUAL Daily Mortality of persons of both sexes under and over five years of age in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, embracing a radius of ten miles, and including the Statistical Sub-districts of Melbourne Proper, East Melbourne, North Melbourne and Carlton, Fitz Roy Municipality, East Collingwood, Richmond, Joka-jika parish (exclusive of North Melbourne, Collingwood, and Richmond), South Yarra and Prahran, Emerald Hill and Sandridge, St. Kilda and Brighton, Doutta Galla and Keilor, Boroondara and Heidelberg, Cut-paw-paw parish, and the shipping in Hobson's Bay; also, the Temperature in the shade at Melbourne, deduced from the mean of twenty-four hourly observations taken at the Flagstaff Observatory on each day during the month of March, 1863:—

The mortality of Melbourne and suburbs, together with the mean temperature in the shade, and the mean atmospheric pressure during the month of March for the last four years, were as follow:—

The mean number of deaths in the month during four years was 324, the mean temperature 65.8°, and the mean atmospheric pressure 29.905 inches. The mortality of the month this year was therefore unusually low, while the mean temperature and the mean atmospheric pressure were about the average.

Fifty-six per cent. of the deaths occurring during the month were of males, and 44 per cent. were of females. 67 per cent. were of children who had not attained their fifth year. In March, 1863, 58 per cent. were under five years of age; 65 per cent. in March, 1861, and 61 per cent. in March, 1860.

On the 14th 16 deaths occurred, 14 on the 28th, and 13 on the 10th, 29th, and 31st. These were the days of highest mortality. The lowest were the 1st and 12th; on each of which only 4 deaths were recorded.

A man died of apoplexy during the month at the advanced age of 103 years, and another of asthma at 82 years. The oldest female was 77 years of age, and died of disease of the heart.

Seventeen deaths were the result of violent or accidental causes, and occurred thus:—Two seamen aged respectively 33 and 35, and a ship's apprentice aged 17, were drowned in Hobson's Bay. A laborer, aged 40, and a gold miner, aged 28, were drowned in the Yarra River; and a female patient at the Lunatic Asylum was drowned in a bath. Three infants were accidentally suffocated, one at 5 weeks old in bed, one at 19 days old with a piece of meat, and one at 6 weeks old in a manner not stated. A shepherd, 55 years old, died from the effects of poison, and an infant, 5 weeks old, died at Malvern, from the supposed effects of a poisonous bite. A female, aged 27 years, died of burns, and a girl, aged 3 years, of scalds. A laborer, aged 38, died in consequence of his leg being amputated. A sea cook, aged 30, died of accidental rupture of the intestines. A sea captain, aged 65, was found dead in a house, and a publican of 30 years old was accidentally killed (no particulars given).

Fifty-seven deaths, or nearly 20 per cent. of the total mortality, occurred in charitable or public institutions, namely:—Melbourne Hospital, 34; Benevolent Asylum, 4; Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 8; Immigrants' Home, 5; Orphan Asylum, Emerald Hill, 1; Lying-in Hospital, 3; Gaol, 1; Immigration Hospital, 1.

Of the 164 deaths of children under five years of age, 88, or nearly 60 per cent., were of males, and 76, or about 40 per cent. were of females; 104 were under one year old, 33 were between one and two years, 15 were between two and three, 6 between three and four, and 6 between four and five years.

Of the 123 deaths of persons beyond five years of age, 74, or about 65 per cent., were of males, and 49, or 35 per cent., were of females; 5 were between five and ten years, 8 between ten and fifteen, 4 between fifteen and twenty, 6 between twenty and twenty-five, 24 between twenty-five and thirty, 24 between thirty and thirty-five, 10 between thirty-five and forty, 10 between forty and forty-five, 12 between forty-five and fifty, 4 between fifty and fifty-five, 6 between fifty-five and sixty, 6 between sixty and sixty-five, 3 between sixty-five and seventy, 2 between seventy and seventy-five, and 4 of seventy-five years and upwards.

In January and February most deaths resulted from zymotic diseases, but in March the mortality from these was below that from local diseases. The former class only caused 80 deaths in that month, whilst 90 deaths were occasioned by the latter.

The number of deaths which occurred throughout the district of Melbourne and suburbs during the quarter terminating 31st March, 1863, amounted to 1009, against 1076 in the corresponding quarter of 1862, against 1169 in the corresponding quarter of 1861, and against 1066 in the corresponding quarter of 1860.

The deaths which took place in the various sub-districts were in the following proportions to their populations, as ascertained by the last census:—Melbourne Proper, 239 deaths, or 10'06 in a thousand; East Melbourne, 5 deaths, or 2'48 in a thousand; North Melbourne and Carlton, 145 deaths, or 8'63 in a thousand; Fitz Roy Municipality, 76 deaths, or 6'44 in a thousand; East Collingwood, 101 deaths, or 7'98 in a thousand; Richmond, 74 deaths, or 6'52 in a thousand; Joka-joka parish (remainder of), 61 deaths, or 7'43 in a thousand; South Yarra and Prahran, 94 deaths, or 7'29 in a thousand; Emerald Hill and Sandridge, 68 deaths, or 5'48 in a thousand; St. Kilda and Brighton, 57 deaths, or 5'08 in a thousand; Doutta Galla and Keilor, 20 deaths, or 6'48 in a thousand; Boroondara and Heidelberg, 26 deaths, or 4'55 in a thousand; Cut-paw-paw parish, 37 deaths, or 6'09 in a thousand; shipping in Hobson's Bay, 6 deaths, or 3'43 in a thousand; or in the entire district of Melbourne and suburbs, 7'21 to every thousand of its inhabitants.

Commencing at the south-east angle of Worrrough section; thence north by the eastern boundary of the said section to its north-east angle; thence further north by a direct line to the south-east angle of Jones's pre-emptive right; thence by the eastern boundary of the said pre-emptive right to the southern boundary of the township reserve of Avenel; thence by the southern, eastern, and northern boundaries of the said reserve to the eastern boundary of section B of the parish of Avenel; thence by

the eastern boundary of the said section to its north-east angle; thence west and south by the northern boundaries of sections B and A and the western boundary of section A of the said parish to Hughes's Creek; thence westerly by Hughes's Creek to the Goulburn River; thence southerly by the said river to the Stony Creek; thence southerly by the Stony Creek to the northern boundary of Banks and Boyd's pre-emptive right; thence west by the northern boundary of the said pre-emptive right and a direct line to a point two miles west of the northern boundary of the said pre-emptive right; thence by a line due south to the Sugar Loaf Creek; thence further south by the Sugar Loaf Creek to a point due north of the south-west angle of the parish of Lowry; thence south to the south-west angle of the said parish; thence westerly by the southern boundary of the said parish to the eastern boundary of the Sydney road; thence northerly by the said boundary of the said road and the road to Tallarook to the Goulburn River; thence easterly to the said river to the commencing point.—(62.2353.)

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of the road district above described shall be "The Seymour Road District."

MUNICIPALITY OF BALLAARAT EAST.

BYE-LAW No. 24.—To EMPOWER THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF BALLAARAT EAST TO REGULATE THE DUTIES OF TOWN CRIER, AND TO PREVENT THE SOUNDING OF BELLS AND OTHER INSTRUMENTS BY UNAUTHORISED PERSONS IN THE PUBLIC THOROUGHFARES IN AN EXCESSIVE MANNER.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, power is given to the council of any municipal district constituted thereby to make bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances: And whereas a nuisance is occasioned by a custom existing within the municipal district of Ballaarat

East, of giving notice of theatrical performances, concerts, balls, lectures, elections, public meetings, auctions, and other sales by the ringing of bells in an excessive manner through the public streets and thoroughfares, to the great annoyance of the inhabitants and passers by; and as it is expedient and necessary that such nuisance should be abated: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of the municipal district of Ballarat East, that from and after the day on which His Excellency the Governor shall have signified his assent hereunto, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons not duly authorised so to do by the municipal council, to ring or sound, or cause to be rung or sounded, any bell, gong, or other noisy instrument, or use any other means for the purpose of congregating persons together at any theatrical performance, concert, ball, lecture, election, public meeting, auction or other sale, or for any other purpose, on any footpath, street, road, or common thoroughfare, or in any position which may cause or be likely to cause accidents by frightening horses or other cattle, or any inconvenience, annoyance, or obstruction to the inhabitants or passers by within the said municipal district, for any of aforesaid or other purposes; and any unauthorised person or persons who shall commit any of the beforenamed acts, shall be deemed guilty of a neglect and breach of this bye-law, and shall, upon conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such act, any sum not exceeding Ten pounds sterling: Provided always that the contents of this bye-law shall not in any way prohibit or be construed to apply to the ringing of bells belonging to churches, chapels, or schools, or to fire companies or brigades for their customary and proper objects, excepting in cases where a wilful false alarm of fire be given, under which exception the provisions of the bye-law shall have full force.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 24, made by the municipal council of Ballarat East, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 27th day of April, 1863.

BE it ordered and directed by the Municipal Council of Warrnambool, in accordance with the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, that from and after this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the owners or occupiers of any building, or of any land where such building, fence, or other obstruction, in any way encroaches on the boundary line of any street, road, or public thoroughfare, within the said municipality, shall remove such building, fence, or other obstruction, back to the surveyed line of such street or streets within fourteen days after receiving notice in writing from the municipal council to the owner or occupier of such building, fence, or other obstruction. And be it further ordered and enacted as aforesaid, that any person committing a breach of or neglecting to comply with the provisions of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding Fifty pounds.

2. All persons neglecting to pay the license fee within fourteen days after expiration of old license will be proceeded against according to section 129 of *Land Act*.

7. Any person having bulls on the common without permission of managers will be subject to a fine of Five pounds for each.

8. The managers will in no case be responsible for the safety of stock, and all stock put on to graze will be at the risk of owners.

9. It is required that each person shall use one distinguishing brand for entry in register, to prevent confusion.

10. In the event of the commons not being stocked so as to pay all necessary expenses, the managers reserve to themselves the power to extend the rights of commoners upon such terms as they may deem expedient.

11. The managers reserve to themselves the power of altering and amending at any time any rules for the management of the abovenamed common.
