PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the lands hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the above-mentioned provisions of the said Act, that is to say:-

LILLICUR AND YALONG FARMERS' COMMON.—The farmers' common described as at Lillieur and Yalong, in a Proclamation bearing date the fourth day of March, 1861, is hereby abolished, and the area herein described shall be and constitute the farmers' common at Lillieur and Yalong aforesaid, viz.:—County of Talbot, parish of Lillieur, extent about 2500 acres: Commencing at a point the south-east angle of allotment 26, section 2; bounded on the west by a line bearing north seventy-five chains to the north-east angle of allotment 20 of section 2; thence by that allotment-bearing west thirty-four chains eighty-one links to the Caralulup Creek; thence by that Creek bearing northerly to the north-west angle of allotment 18 of section 2; thence by that allotment-bearing east thirty chains thirty links to its north-east angle; and thence by a line bearing north twenty-eight chains; on the north by a line bearing east about one hundred and ninety-eight chains to the Amherst Gold Fields Common; on the east by the Amherst Gold Fields Common, bearing south one hundred and twenty-three chains; and on the south by part of allotment 96 and allotments 99 and 93, parish of Caralulup, bearing west about one hundred and ninety-eight chains to the commencing point.—(62.F.10,948.)

SOUTH BARWON MUNICIPAL COMMON.—The municipal common for South Barwon shall comprise all the unappropriated Crown lands within the municipal district of South Barwon, and the common described in a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-ninth day of April, 1861, under the designation of the "Town Common for Belmont."—(63.G.907.)

ATTEMPT AT ARSON.

ONE HUNDRED POUNDS REWARD.—FREE PARDON TO AN ACCOMPLISHER.

WHEREAS about midnight of Thursday, the 16th of April last, an unsuccessful attempt was made to set on fire the store of Messrs. Millar and Anderson, at Daylesford, the prompt discovery of which attempt prevented the destruction of property of great value: And whereas Messrs. BYE-LAW No. 14.—FOR IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND FOR THE CURRENT YEAR ENDING 21st SEPTEMBER, 1863, ON THE ASSESSMENT ROLL OF NINE THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED AND FIFTY-ONE POUNDS NINE SHILLINGS.

W HEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18th Victoria, No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is entitled and empowered to impose a rate on all houses, lands, and tenements, within the limits of such municipal district, according to the fair average annual value thereof, such rate not to exceed the sum of Two shillings in the pound: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Heathcote, that a rate for the current year ending 21st September, 1863, of One shilling in the pound on the annual value of all property in houses, lands, and tenements, within the limits of the municipal district aforesaid, be imposed and levied, and that the said levy become due on and after the 23th day of February, 1863.

CONDITIONS.

1. The hay to be open, good, sound, and sweet; the straw to be wheaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats (colonial grown) and bran to be sound and sweet, and of the best description.

2. The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in schedule being, however, only proximate, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will not, however, exceed during the whole year 50 per cent. of the estimated quarterly consumption.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.

4. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the District, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time, to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue either to the public service or the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of an inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. 
