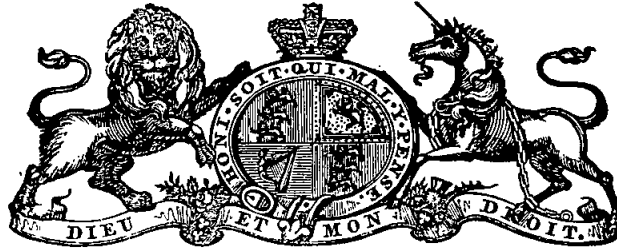

REGULATIONS FOR THE PROTECTION OF FEMALE PASSENGERS IN PRIVATE PASSENGER SHIPS.

THE accompanying Order of the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council, prescribing certain rules and regulations for the protection of female passengers in private passenger ships, is published for general information.

PRESENT:

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the "Passengers Act, 1855," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by any Order in Council, to prescribe such rules and regulations as to Her Majesty may seem fit, for preserving order, promoting health, and securing cleanliness and ventilation on board of passenger ships proceeding from the United Kingdom to any port or place in Her Majesty's possessions abroad; and the said rules and regulations from time to time in like manner to alter amend, and revoke, as occasion may require:

And whereas it is expedient to make provision for preserving order in private passenger ships conveying to the colony of Victoria, in Australia, as many as ten unprotected female passengers:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty doth, by and with the advice of her Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the authority vested in her by the said "Passengers Act, 1855," order, and it is hereby ordered, that in addition to the rules prescribed in the Order in Council dated the twenty-fifth day of February, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, the rules hereinafter contained shall be observed in respect to unprotected female passengers on board such ships as last aforesaid:—

1. In the construction, and for the purposes of this Order in Council, the term "unprotected female passengers" shall signify every female passenger between the ages of twelve and thirty-five, proceeding to the colony of Victoria, by virtue of a passage warrant issued by the Government of that colony, who, if married, shall not be accompanied by her husband, or if unmarried, shall not be accompanied by her father or stepfather, or by a married brother with his wife, or a married sister with her husband, or by an unmarried brother over the age of twenty-five: the terms "passengers," "passenger ship," and "master" shall have the same significations as are assigned to them respectively in the said "Passengers Act, 1855," and words used in the plural number shall import the singular number also, and the converse, unless inconsistent with the context.

2. All unprotected female passengers shall, during the voyage, be berthed in open berths in a compartment in the aftermost part of the upper passenger deck of the ship, effectually divided off by substantial bulkheads from the other portions of such deck; and no single men, or men without their wives, shall be berthed next to the bulkhead dividing off such compartment.

3. The children under twelve years of age of married female passengers, unaccompanied by their husbands, shall be berthed with their mothers.

4. There shall be an entrance to such compartment from the upper deck or poop, exclusively appropriated to the use of such female passengers.

5. There shall be carried on board a matron, to be appointed by the owner or master of the ship, and to be charged with the maintenance of discipline among such female passengers as aforesaid.

6. No unprotected female passenger shall on any account be allowed to act, or shall act as servant or attendant on the surgeon, master, or any of the officers of the ship, or on any male cabin passenger.

7. All intercourse between unprotected female passengers and any of the officers or crew of the ship, or between such females and any of the male passengers (except brothers or brothers-in-law, and in case of unprotected married women, their children), is hereby strictly prohibited.

8. The master of the ship, before sailing, shall, with the approval of the emigration officer at the port of clearance, mark out the portion of the poop or main deck to be assigned for the purpose of exercise to such unprotected female passengers, who, during the voyage, shall keep within the limits so marked out.

9. Before dark, all such female passengers as aforesaid shall go below to their own compartment, and as soon as they are there collected the master shall lock the entrance, and on no account shall any man enter the compartment during the night, except the surgeon in case of illness, or the officers and crew in case of danger to the ship shall render their entrance necessary.

10. If the surgeon is required to attend professionally any of such unprotected female passengers at night, the matron shall accompany and remain with him while he discharges his duties.

11. The master of the ship shall afford to the matron and to the surgeon all the assistance in his power in carrying these regulations into effect.

12. Any person who shall refuse or neglect to obey any of the rules herein contained, or who shall obstruct the surgeon or master of the ship in the execution of any duty hereby imposed on them respectively, or who shall be guilty of insubordinate conduct, shall, on conviction, be liable for each offence to the penalties of fine and imprisonment imposed by the said "Passengers Act, 1855."

13. This Order in Council shall not apply to ships chartered by Her Majesty's Emigration Commissioners.

And the Most Noble the Duke of Newcastle, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the commons hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

CARDIGAN FARMERS' COMMON (described, amongst others, in a Proclamation bearing date the eighteenth day of February, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one) is hereby increased by adding thereto the area hereinafter described, viz.:—One thousand six hundred and fifty acres, more or less, being the unappropriated land within the following described boundaries:—County of Grenville: Commencing at the south-west angle of the present common; thence by said common bearing north two hundred and fifty-four chains, more or less; thence west thirty chains, more or less, to the road from Ballarat to Smythesdale, south-westerly to the south-east angle of the Sago Hill and Campbell's Gully Gold Field Common; thence west to the north-east angle of McLachlan's pre-emptive right; thence by the east boundary thereof to its south-east angle; thence by the north boundary of the Smythesdale Gold Field Common to the north-east angle thereof one hundred and twenty chains, more or less; thence south by the east side of Smythesdale Gold Field Common one hundred and sixty chains, more or less, to a point bearing west from the south-west angle of the present Farmers' Common for Cardigan; thence east to said south-west angle of the last-named common, being the point of commencement.—(63.H.2086.)

THE BARRABOOL ROAD DISTRICT TOLLS.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's Reign, intituled, *An Act for making and improving roads in the colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of Executive Council, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, to declare the rates of tolls to be collected by any district road board, as therein-after mentioned, and such rates and tolls from time to time to vary and alter and any such Proclamation to revoke; and it is also enacted, that in case any district road board shall deem it advisable that moneys should be raised by tolls, it shall be lawful for such board, subject to the approval of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to cause from time to time such and so many toll-bars, toll-gates, and toll-houses to be erected and built in and upon the roads within their respective road districts, at such places as to each board shall seem fit, and in like manner to cause such toll-bars, toll-gates, and toll-houses to be removed or built or placed on other parts of the said roads, and to direct tolls to be paid for all animals and vehicles passing or repassing through such toll-bars, toll-gates, or toll-houses, at a rate not exceeding the rates to be declared as aforesaid, and such rates from time to time to reduce or raise to any amount not exceeding the rates to be so declared: And whereas the Barrabool District Road Board deem it advisable that money should be raised by tolls within the district: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the thirtieth day of April, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty, certain tolls were authorized to be collected on the Colac road within the said district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby declare the rates of tolls hereinafter specified to be the rates of tolls to be collected by the said Barrabool District Road Board, that is to say:—

BEECHWORTH MUNICIPALITY.

THE Thirteenth (13th) Half-yearly Report of the Municipal Council of Beechworth, to the 9th April, 1863.

In accordance with prescribed custom, the council publish a report of their proceedings for the past six months, as follows:—

ELECTIONS.

On the 24th October, 1862, Mr. John Yoxall was elected (by 88 votes) to the seat vacant through the non-attendance of Councillor William Witt.

On the 20th January, 1863, Councillor Henry Littlewood was unanimously elected chairman of committees in the room of Councillor Soulbey.

On the 1st April, 1863, Alexander Keefer, Esq., was duly elected to the seat vacant owing to the resignation of Councillor Soulbey.

On the 21st November, 1862, Messrs. J. D. Fisher, W. H. C. Darvall, and Donald Fletcher were elected managers of the Municipal Common, but resigned on 7th April, 1863, and their successors are not yet elected.

PUBLIC WORKS.

As the most economical method of effecting the necessary repairs and improvements to the streets, &c., of the municipality, the council, on the 12th February, 1863, appointed a "roadman" to carry out same, in the person of Mr. John Rutherford; and, on the same day, appointed him inspector of nuisances (without salary), in the room of Police Sergeant Whelan, who had resigned owing to his removal from this district.

Having got the continuation of Melish street to the Buckland road proclaimed, the council have had it partially cleared and the side channels formed.

This council, in conjunction with that of Chiltern, have obtained the expenditure by the Government of £700 in clearing and otherwise improving the road between Beechworth and Chiltern.

The council are also co-operating with the Upper Murray Navigation League in an endeavor to get the Government to clear the River Murray from Echuca upwards, so that this district may avail itself of the proposed railway extension to that place when carried out.

WATER WORKS.

Owing to the dryness of the season the council have been unable, as yet, to carry out their intention of making water available, by sale, for mining operations.

They had a survey and estimates made with a view to bring water into the township from the Havelock road springs, but, owing to a want of funds, and their consequent application to the Assembly, through Mr. Weekes, M.L.A., not having yet been considered, that work is still in abeyance.

An action has been commenced against the council by Mr. James Parker, the contractor for the dam of the Hurdle Swamp Reservoir, for £1803 8s. 4d., for extras and alleged detention; but as the council have, throughout the affair, been guided by the opinion of their engineer, Francis Bell, Esq., who declines to allow said claim, they are defending the action.

For the same reason they are taking a similar course with regard to an action also entered against them by the Contour Races contractor, J. Brady, for an alleged balance of £489 7s. 6d.

In each of these cases the council made offers for an amicable settlement before incurring the expense of a defence, but they were declined.

In case of further accidents at the reservoir of the water works, the council have procured and placed there two life buoys.

And they have obtained admission into the Melbourne Orphan Asylum for the two youngest orphans of Mr. and Mrs. McLuckie, who met their death at said reservoir by drowning.

FINANCE.

As a further means of economy (in addition to the appointment of a roadman for carrying out all public works, and as honorary inspector of nuisances) the council dispensed with the services of a valuator this year, adopting the previous valuation, and allowing a temporary assistant to the town clerk for carrying out the clerical portion of the work, he himself inspecting the whole of the properties and assessing any additions and alterations on behalf of the council.

The rate for the current year it was found necessary to fix at 1s. 6d. in the pound.

MISCELLANEOUS.

In pursuance of their general desire to further the interests of the public institutions of the town, the council entrusted to the local Acclimatisation Society the expenditure of the municipal vote for the introduction of Murray fish into Lake Kerferd.

And they placed at the disposal of the Agricultural and Horticultural Association the town hall and its reserve for the purposes of their public exhibition.

They also applied to the Government (unfortunately without success) for a grant towards the erection of the proposed Burke Museum in connection with the Beechworth Athenaeum, half the expense of pointing the front of which latter building they have also agreed to bear.

On the 15th November, 1862, they caused the public market to be formally opened, and agreed to forego market dues for the present; and there is no doubt that when the law enables the council to put a stop to the system of hawking, now so generally carried on throughout the town, the benefit of this institution will be more universally felt.

The council have obtained the reservation of a site for public abattoirs at the rear of suburban section C. They have received Crown grants for the botanical garden and town well sites; and they have voted £125 towards the permanent improvement of the public recreation reserve of the municipality, conditionally upon the Jockey and Cricket Clubs giving a similar amount, and upon said reserve being vested solely in the council for the benefit of all sections of the community.
