## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

**WHEREAS** by *The Land Act*, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the lands hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the abovesaid provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

**LINTON'S AND BROWN'S GOLD FIELDS COMMON**, described, amongst others, in a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-eighth day of January, 1861, shall be and the same is hereby abolished.—(G3.G.1157.)

**LINTON'S, BROWN'S, SPRINGDALLAH, HAPPY VALLEY, AND LUCKY WOMAN'S GOLD FIELDS COMMON**, is hereby proclaimed, and shall comprise the lands hereinafter described, viz.:—Eight thousand two hundred acres, more or less, county of Grenville: Commencing at the south-west angle of allotment 15 at Smythe's Creek; thence west two hundred and seventy chains, more or less; thence south to the south-east angle of allotment 19, parish of Argyll; thence west to the south-west angle of allotment 12, same parish; thence southerly by the road from Linton's to Pitfield, about two miles in a straight line; thence easterly to a point bearing south from the south-west angle of the common as proclaimed 6th February, 1861; thence north to the south-west angle of common aforesaid; thence east to the Woody Yalak Creek, by that creek northerly to the point of commencement; deducting from abovesaid area all sold or otherwise legally appropriated land.—(G3.G.1157.)

The mean number of deaths in the month during four years was 308, the mean temperature 58°5', and the mean atmospheric pressure 29.987 inches. It will be observed that, notwithstanding the population has increased, the number of deaths in the month under review was below the average of the whole period.

Of the deaths which occurred during the month the proportions were as follow:—Of males 61 per cent., and of females 39 per cent.; of children under five years of age 58 per cent., and of persons over that age 42 per cent. In April, 1862, 53 per cent. of those dying were under five years of age, 58 per cent. in April, 1861, and 61 per cent. in April, 1860.

The days of greatest mortality were the 15th, 28th, and 29th. Fifteen deaths occurred on the two former of those days and fourteen on the latter. On three days during the month, viz., the 6th, 18th, and 25th, only six deaths appear in the returns.

No instance of a person dying at a more advanced age than 75 years occurred during the month.

The deaths from external injuries during the month occurred as follows:—A draper aged 40, and a sailor aged 18, were drowned in the Yarra; a sailor aged 33 was drowned in the Saltwater River; a sailor of 40 years, a boy of 8 years, another of 3 years, and a female cook of 70 years of age, were drowned in Hobson's Bay; a female of 35 years of age died in the Hospital of amputation of the knee joint, and another at 20 years of alcoholic poisoning; a laborer aged 28 was killed by earth falling upon him; a boy 3 years of age died by the impaction of an iron nail in the left bronchial tube, inducing bronchitis and pneumonia; a girl 2 years of age was burned to death at Collingwood; an infant at Brunswick, 10 weeks old, was suffocated by bedclothes being thrown over its face; a male at 33 years of age died at Collingwood of an accident the nature of which was not stated.

Forty-four deaths, or nearly 15 per cent. of the whole number, occurred in public institutions, as follow:—Melbourne Hospital, 29; Benevolent Asylum, 4; Immigrants' Home, 4; Lunatic Asylum, 5; and Military Barracks, 2.

Of the 127 deaths of persons beyond five years of age, 75, or about 59 per cent., were of males, and 52, or about 41 per cent., were of females; 15 were between five and ten years, 6 between ten and fifteen, 7 between fifteen and twenty, 10 between twenty and twenty-five, 13 between twenty-five and thirty, 15 between thirty and thirty-five, 19 between thirty-five and forty, 9 between forty and forty-five, 6 between forty-five and fifty, 7 between fifty and fifty-five, 5 between fifty-five and sixty, 6 between sixty and sixty-five, 6 between sixty-five and seventy, 2 between seventy and seventy-five years, and 1 whose age was not specified.

The total annual value of the property within the municipality, after the hearing of appeals, amounted to £8612, on which a rate of One shilling in the pound has been struck.

#### PUBLIC WORKS.

Fifteen chains of kerbing and channelling in Napier street, twenty-six and a half chains of channelling and a culvert in Alma street, have been completed; forty chains of channelling in Dundas street and thirty chains in McMahon street are also nearly finished.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

A detailed statement of revenue and expenditure since the formation of the municipality was furnished to the commissioners appointed to enquire into the municipal and charitable institutions of Victoria, as also the council's opinion on several subjects for the amendment of the Municipal Act; these views were further supported by deputing the chairman (P. A. Jennings, Esq.) to represent the council at the conference held in Melbourne in January last.

Applications have been renewed for the extension of the telegraph and the holding of a county court and court of mines at St. Arnaud. Although at present unsuccessful in obtaining these concessions, the council confidently expect that their establishment will not be long delayed.
