## ACT OF PARLIAMENT LEFT TO ITS OPERATION.

No. 162.—An Act to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of Thirty-six thousand pounds to the service of the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and the sum of Five hundred thousand pounds to the service of the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three. ONE HUNDRED POUNDS REWARD.—FREE PARDON TO AN ACCOMPLICE.

## MARYBOROUGH MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAW.—(13th June, 1863.)

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Maryborough, begun and holden at Maryborough, in the said district, on the 13th day of June, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

### MARYBOROUGH MINING BOARD BYE-LAW.

Protection to claimholders in wet alluvial workings.—Claimholders employed in procuring timber for the sinking of their shaft or shafts in their claim or claims shall be held to be in lawful possession of such claim or claims during the time occupied in procuring such timber, provided that the time so occupied does not exceed (10) ten days, or while engaged in the erection of a whim for baling water from any such claim or claims, provided the erection of such whim does not occupy more than (21) twenty-one days, except in cases where a longer absence is specially provided for under the bye-laws of this board.

The undersigned members of the said mining board concurred in making the foregoing bye-law.

## COMMONS.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by The Land Act, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the lands hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

DANDENONG TOWN COMMON (described, amongst others, in a Proclamation bearing date the eighteenth day of February, 1861) shall be and the same is hereby increased by adding thereto about three hundred acres, being the unappropriated Crown lands within the town boundary of Dandenong.—(63.H.2909.)

JONES'S CREEK GOLD FIELDS COMMON (described in a Proclamation bearing date the thirtieth day of July, 1861) shall be and the same is hereby abolished; and the land hereinafter described shall from henceforth constitute the said common, that is to say:—County and parish unnamed: Commencing at a point on the main line of road from Maryborough to New-bridge where the new bridge crosses Jones's Creek; thence by a straight line bearing west two hundred and eighty chains, more or less; thence by a straight line bearing north one hun-

dred and twenty chains, more or less; thence by a straight line bearing east one hundred and sixty chains, more or less; thence by a straight line bearing about S. 61° E. one hundred and seventy chains, more or less, to the before-mentioned road, and by that road south-westerly about forty-five chains to the point of commencement: Available area, about 3000 acres.—(63.G.3325.)

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this fifteenth day of June, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and in the twenty-sixth year of Her Majesty's reign.

## WEDDERBURNE GOLD FIELD COMMON.

THE following are the Rules and Regulations for the proper management of the abovenamed common, as agreed to by the managers:—

1. All holders of miners' rights, business licenses, carriers' licenses, and other residents on this gold field, shall be entitled to take precedence in right to graze cattle upon the abovementioned common. 9. All unbranded goats found on this common after 1st July, 1863, will be destroyed. Persons entitled to commonage will be allowed six goats to run free, the excess over that number up to twenty to be charged as hereinafter mentioned, and in no case shall any one person be allowed to depasture more than twenty goats on this common.

10. The following fees shall be paid half-yearly in advance, on the 1st day of July and on the 1st day of January in each year; the first payment to be made on the 1st day of July, 1863; such payments respectively to be made to the managers or any person they may appoint for that purpose:—
