## NOTIFICATION IN REGARD TO SMALL-POX.

THE Central Board of Health having received information of the prevalence of Small-pox in London and several other places in England in constant communication with this colony, deem it expedient to call public attention to the possibility of the introduction of this disease, and to the importance of taking the precaution against its spread, which is to be obtained by the general practice of vaccination.

The Board have before them the most conclusive evidence that one vaccination in childhood does not afford protection to the individual from small-pox in after life, and they are therefore of opinion, that in order to obtain ordinary security, every person in the colony, young and old, should be re-vaccinated.

The Board earnestly trust that they will obtain the co-operation of the general public, the medical profession, and the authorities charged with the conservancy of the public health, in this important matter, not only in recommending the re-vaccination of adults and children, but also in inducing the more general practice of infantile vaccination, which the Board fear has, notwithstanding the provisions of the Compulsory Vaccination Act, been much neglected.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.  
SALE (NO. II.)

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and sixty-one landholders and householders resident at Sale, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state their conviction that necessity exists for the erection of Sale into a municipal district as tending to its improvement and good government, and that a public meeting was held at Sale on the 6th of April last, at which meeting it was unanimously resolved as follows:—"That the important and growing interests of Sale imperatively call for local self-government; that the meeting views with apprehension the probability of Sale being included in a district council, and desires respectfully to represent to your Excellency that its formation into a municipality is the course best adapted to its interests and circumstances."

The petitioners further state that Sale is the most populous town in Gipps Land, that its buildings are increasing, while its

streets remain in their primitive state, and are during the winter months almost impassable, and that business is then conducted under circumstances adverse to the prosperity of the town and suburbs.

They add that the sites of the new Government Offices, Court House, and Gaol, are in streets not under the control of the district engineer; that the area comprised in the district prayed for does not exceed nine square miles, in which no point is distant six miles from any other; and that it contains a population of not less than 300 householders.

And the petitioners pray as follows, viz.:-

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that the area contained within the following boundaries may be proclaimed as the 'Sale Municipal District,' viz.:-Bounded on the north by a one-chain road commencing at the north-west corner of suburban allotment No. 74, parish of Sale, and bearing east one hundred and eighty chains; on the east by a one-chain road, bearing south one hundred and eighty-seven chains to Flooding Creek; on the south by Flooding Creek; and on the west by Flooding Creek to the south-west corner of allotment 74; and by the western boundary of lot 74, bearing north eight chains to the point of commencement."

REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF MAY, 1863.

The mean number of deaths in the month during four years was 299, the mean temperature 53.5°, and the mean atmospheric pressure 29.896 inches. The mortality of the month this year was therefore slightly above the average, but not more so than is proportionate to the increase of the population.

The proportions of males and females dying were 51 and 49 per cent., and of persons under and over five years of age, 52 and 48 per cent. respectively. In May, 1863, the former proportions were respectively 59 and 41 per cent., and the latter 54 and 46 per cent.

Twenty deaths occurred on the 1st, seventeen on the 26th, sixteen on the 7th, and fifteen on the 6th and 10th. These were the days of highest mortality. Only two deaths, both of persons over five years of age, were recorded on the 29th.

Deaths of persons at advanced periods of life were rather numerous during the month. One nonagenarian, a female aged 98, died of bronchitis. Two octogenarians, both males, aged respectively 83 and 84 years, died, the former of apoplexy and the latter of bronchitis. A male aged 77 died of heart disease, and a female at the same age died of old age. Another female, aged 76, also died of old age.

The deaths from external causes occurred as follows:-Five persons were accidentally drowned, viz., a watchman aged 50 at the Australian wharf, a gentleman aged 39 at the Queen's wharf, a girl of 7 years old in the Yarra, a man aged 35 at Sandridge,

and a child a year old at Templestowe. A female aged 62 was killed by a train on the Hobson's Bay railway, a horsebreaker aged 20 by a kick from a horse, a lighterman aged 37 by falling into the hold of a schooner, a cabman aged 30 by a blow from the shaft of his cab, a stockdriver aged 26 by a fall from a horse, and a gentleman aged 35 by a tree falling on him. Three infants were accidentally suffocated. A hawker aged 45 died in the hospital of alcoholic poisoning. A child 1½ years old was poisoned by an overdose of opium, and another of 2 years old was accidentally poisoned in a manner not stated. A girl 5 years old was accidentally burned to death. A male aged 36 died of self-inflicted wounds in the thigh and breast, and a laborer aged 45 hung himself in the watchhouse. A hawker aged 45 died in the watchhouse of cold and exposure. A body was found in a drain on the St. Kilda road; no further particulars given.

Fifty-five deaths, or nearly 18 per cent. of the whole number, occurred in public institutions, as follows:—Melbourne Hospital, 35; Benevolent Asylum, 8; Immigrants' Home, 6; Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 6.

Of the 158 deaths of children under five years of age, 72, or about 45 per cent., were of males, and 86, or 55 per cent., were of females; 84 were under one year, 46 were between one and two years, 15 were between two and three years, 11 were between three and four years, and 2 between four and five years.

Of the 148 deaths of persons beyond five years of age, 83, or about 54 per cent., were of males, and 65, or about 46 per cent., were of females; 13 were between five and ten years, 8 were between ten and fifteen years, 8 were between fifteen and twenty years, 12 were between twenty and twenty-five years, 18 were between twenty-five and thirty years, 15 were between thirty and thirty-five years, 19 were between thirty-five and forty years, 11 were between forty and forty-five years, 7 were between forty-five and fifty years, 6 were between fifty and fifty-five years, 8 were between fifty-five and sixty years, 7 were between sixty and sixty-five years, 5 were between sixty-five and seventy years, 4 were between seventy and seventy-five years, and 7 were over the age of seventy-five years.

Deaths from local diseases have again increased, and in the month under review equalled 41 per cent. of the total mortality. The principal augmentation has been in diseases of the respiratory system. The mortality from zymotic diseases still continues low. An unusually large number of violent deaths took place during the month.

ACTS OF PARLIAMENT LEFT TO THEIR OPERATION.

SANDHURST MINING DISTRICT.

ADDITION TO THE GENERAL BYE-LAW NO. 5 OF THE SANDHURST MINING DISTRICT, RELATIVE TO PERSONS MINING ON TRIBUTE.—[18th June, 1863.]

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Sandhurst, begun and holden at Sandhurst, in the said district, on the eighteenth day of June, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

No claim or portion of a claim shall be declared forfeited, or be deemed to be abandoned, where the same is *bond fide* worked by the number of miners required by the bye-laws now in force on tribute, that is to say, where a portion of the gross or net proceeds of the claim (as the case may be) is returned by the tributor or tributors to the owner or owners of the claim by way of tribute, rent, or royalty. And the owner or owners of such claims shall be deemed to be working the same in a *bond fide* manner as much as if they employed hired workmen for that purpose, and shall enjoy all the rights, privileges, and exemptions contained in the bye-laws now in force.

**MUNICIPALITY OF KYNETON.**

ELEVENTH Report of the Council, for the Half-year ending 10th June, 1863.

Sixteen ordinary and eleven special meetings have been held during the half-year, and four lapsed for want of a quorum. The attendance was as follows:—The Chairman (Councillor Jarrett) attended 21; Councillor Hardie, 22; Councillor McCarthy, 11; Councillor Hargreave, 20; Councillor McKenna, 18; Councillor Barrow, 24; and Councillor McDonald, 16.

Councillor Kelly resigned on the 19th December, and Councillor McDonald was elected in his stead.

The council applied to the Government for a supply of pipes to lay on water for use in case of fires, &c., also for enlarged goods-shed accommodation at the railway station, but in each case without success.

A fresh contract with the gas company has been entered into for lighting the town lamps at a reduction of £2 per lamp on the price of last year.

Bye-laws have been passed "For preservation of the public health and the suppression of nuisances caused by the overflow or soakage of waterclosets and cesspools," and "For levying a rate at 1s. 6d. in the pound for 1863" (which have been gazetted); and one for preventing fires arising from hay, straw, &c., being stacked in the town, is under consideration.

Initiatory steps are being taken for the formation of the municipality and the neighboring road board districts into a shire, under the provisions of the Bill now before Parliament.

The Cattle Market dues were advertised to be let for a year, and Mr. D. Wallace's tender was accepted, but that gentleman has hitherto neglected to take up the contract.

The following public works have been completed or are in progress, viz.:—Ebden street, from Baynton to Piper street, pitched and metalled; new bridge over Post Office Creek, in Ebden street, and road from thence to Cemetery road, pitched and metalled; Wedge street, from Mitchell street to Post Office Creek, and thence to Racecourse road, pitched and metalled; Baynton street, from Wedge street to St. Agnes place, and thence to Rogers and Harper's crossing, formed, and a large portion thereof pitched and metalled; Hutton street, from Mollison street to Ebden street, pitched and metalled; one chain of road made in Jeffreys street; about ten chains of the eastern end of Bodkin street pitched and metalled; pitched crossing near the Junction Hotel; and extra pitching, &c., to Cattle Market. The eastern boundary road has also been repaired, and several other minor works carried out.

Appended is the statement of receipts and expenditure for the period embraced by this report.
