TREATY WITH THE UNITED STATES FOR SUPPRESSING THE AFRICAN SLAVE TRADE.

THE annexed copies of a Treaty between Her Majesty and the United States of America, for the suppression of the African Slave Trade, and of an additional Article thereto, are published for general information.

TREATY BETWEEN HER MAJESTY AND THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, FOR THE SUPPRESSION OF THE AFRICAN SLAVE TRADE.

SIGNED AT WASHINGTON, 7TH APRIL, 1862.

[Ratifications exchanged at London, 20th May, 1862.]

HER MAJESTY the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the United States of America, being desirous to render more effectual the means hitherto adopted for the suppression of the slave trade carried on upon the coast of Africa, have deemed it expedient to conclude a treaty for that purpose, and have named as their plenipotentiaries, that is to say:—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honorable Richard Bickerton Pemell Lord Lyons, a peer of Her United Kingdom, a Knight Grand Cross of Her Most Honorable Order of the Bath, and Her Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States of America;

And the President of the United States of America, William H. Seward, Secretary of State;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following articles:—

ARTICLE I.

The two high contracting parties mutually consent that those ships of their respective navies which shall be provided with special instructions for that purpose, as hereinafter mentioned, may visit such merchant vessels of the two nations as may, upon reasonable grounds, be suspected of being engaged in the African slave trade, or of having been fitted out for that purpose, or of having, during the voyage on which they are met by the said cruisers, been engaged in the African slave trade, contrary to the provisions of this treaty; and that such cruisers may detain and send or carry away, such vessels, in order that they may be brought to trial in the manner hereinafter agreed upon.

In order to fix the reciprocal right of search in such a manner as shall be adapted to the attainment of the object of this treaty, and at the same time avoid doubts, disputes, and complaints, the said right of search shall be understood in the manner and according to the rules following:—

First. It shall never be exercised except by vessels of war, authorised expressly for that object, according to the stipulations of this treaty.

Secondly. The right of search shall in no case be exercised with respect to a vessel of the navy of either of the two powers, but shall be exercised only as regards merchant vessels; and it shall not be exercised by a vessel of war of either contracting party within the limits of a settlement or port, nor within the territorial waters of the other party.

Thirdly. Whenever a merchant vessel is searched by a ship of war, the commander of the said ship shall, in the act of so doing, exhibit to the commander of the merchant vessel the special instructions by which he is duly authorised to search; and shall deliver to such commander a certificate signed by himself, stating his rank in the naval service of his country, and the name of the vessel he commands, and also declaring that the only object of the search is to ascertain whether the vessel is employed in the African slave trade, or is fitted up for the said trade. When the search is made by an officer of the cruiser who is not the commander, such officer shall exhibit to the captain of the merchant vessel a copy of the before-mentioned special instructions, signed by the commander of the cruiser; and he shall in like manner deliver a certificate signed by himself, stating his rank in the navy, the name of the commander by whose orders he proceeds to make the search, that of the cruiser in which he sails, and the object of the search as above described. If it appears from the search that the papers of the vessel are in regular order, and that it is employed on lawful objects, the officer shall enter in the log-book of the vessel that the search has been made in pursuance of the aforesaid special instructions; and the vessel shall be left at liberty to pursue its voyage. The rank of the officer who makes the search must not be less than that of lieutenant in the navy, unless the command, either by reason of death or other cause, is at the time held by an officer of inferior rank.

Fourthly. The reciprocal right of search and detention shall be exercised only within the distance of two hundred miles from the coast of Africa, and to the southward of the thirty-second parallel of north latitude, and within thirty leagues from the coast of the Island of Cuba.

ARTICLE II.

In order to regulate the mode of carrying the provisions of the preceding article into execution, it is agreed:—

First. That all the ships of the navies of the two nations which shall be hereafter employed to prevent the African slave trade shall be furnished by their respective Governments with a copy of the present treaty, of the instructions for the mixed courts thereto, marked A, and of the regulations for the mixed courts of justice annexed thereto, marked B, which annexes respectively shall be considered as integral parts of the present treaty.

Secondly. That each of the high contracting parties shall, from time to time, communicate to the other the names of the several ships furnished with such instructions, the force of each, and their names of the several commanders. The said commanders shall hold the rank of captain in the navy, or at least that of lieutenant: it being nevertheless understood that the instructions originally issued to an officer holding the rank of lieutenant of the navy, or other superior rank, shall, in case of his death or temporary absence, be sufficient to authorise the officer on whom the command of the vessel has devolved to make the search, although such officer may not hold the aforesaid rank in the service.

Thirdly. That if at any time the commander of a cruiser of either of the two nations shall suspect that any merchant vessel under the escort or convoy of any ship or ships of war of the other nation carries negroes on board, or has been engaged in the African slave trade, or is fitted out for the purpose thereof, the commander of the cruiser shall communicate his suspicions to the commander of the convoy, who, accompanied by the commander of the cruiser, shall proceed to the search of the suspected vessel; and in case the suspicions appear well-founded, according to the tenor of this treaty, then the said vessel shall be conducted or sent to one of the places where the mixed courts of justice are stationed, in order that it may there be adjudicated upon.

Fourthly. It is further mutually agreed, that the commanders of the ships of the two navies, respectively, who shall be employed on this service, shall adhere strictly to the exact tenor of the aforesaid instructions.

ARTICLE III.

As the two preceding articles are entirely reciprocal, the two high contracting parties engage mutually to make good any losses which their respective subjects or citizens may incur by an arbitrary and illegal detention of their vessels; it being understood that this indemnity shall be borne by the government whose cruiser shall have been guilty of such arbitrary and illegal detention; and that the search and detention of vessels specified in the first article of this treaty, shall be effected only by ships which may form part of the two navies, respectively, and by such of those ships only as are provided with the special instructions annexed to the present treaty, in pursuance of the provisions thereof. The indemnification for the damages of which this article treats shall be paid within the term of one year, reckoning from the day in which the mixed court of justice pronounces its sentence.

ARTICLE IV.

In order to bring to adjudication, with as little delay and inconvenience as possible, the vessels which may be detained according to the tenor of the first article of this treaty, there shall be established, as soon as may be practicable, three mixed courts of justice, formed of an equal number of individuals of the two nations, named for this purpose by their respective governments. These courts shall reside: one at Sierra Leone, one at the Cape of Good Hope, and one at New York.

But each of the two high contracting parties reserves to itself the right of changing, at its pleasure, the place of residence of the court or courts held within its own territories.

These courts shall judge the causes submitted to them according to the provisions of the present treaty, and according to the regulations and instructions which are annexed to the present treaty, and which are considered an integral part thereof; and there shall be no appeal from their decision.

ARTICLE V.

In case the commanding officer of any ships of the navies of either country, duly commissioned according to the provisions of the first article of this treaty, shall deviate in any respect from the stipulations of the said treaty, or from the instructions annexed to it, the Government which shall conceive itself to be wronged thereby shall be entitled to demand reparation; and in such case the Government to which such commanding officer may belong binds itself to cause enquiry to be made into the subject of the complaint, and to inflict upon the said officer a punishment proportioned to any wilful transgression which he may be proved to have committed.

ARTICLE VI.

It is hereby further mutually agreed, that every British or American merchant vessel which shall be searched by virtue of the present treaty, may lawfully be detained and sent or brought before the mixed courts of justice established in pursuance of the provisions thereof, if in her equipment there shall be found any of the things hereinafter mentioned, namely:—

1st. Hatches with open gratings, instead of the close hatches which are usual in merchant vessels.

2nd. Divisions or bulk-heads in the hold or on deck, in greater number than are necessary for vessels engaged in lawful trade.

3rd. Spare plank, fitted for laying down as a second or slave deck.

4th. Shackles, bolts, or handcuffs.

5th. A larger quantity of water in casks or in tanks than is requisite for the consumption of the crew of the vessel as a merchant vessel.

6th. An extraordinary number of water-casks, or of other vessels for holding liquid; unless the master shall produce a certificate from the custom house at the place from which he cleared outwards, stating that a sufficient security had been given by the owners of such vessel that such extra quantity of casks or of other vessels, should be used only to hold palm oil, or for other purposes of lawful commerce.

7th. A greater number of mess-tubs or kids than requisite for the use of the crew of the vessel as a merchant vessel.

8th. A boiler or other cooking apparatus of an unusual size, and larger, or capable of being made larger, than requisite for the use of the crew of the vessel as a merchant vessel; or more than one boiler, or other cooking apparatus, of the ordinary size.

9th. An extraordinary quantity of rice, of the flour of Brazil, of manioc or cassada, commonly called farinha, of maize, or of Indian corn, or of any other article of food whatever, beyond the probable wants of the crew; unless such rice, flour, farinha, maize, Indian corn, or other article of food be entered on the manifest as part of the cargo for trade.

10th. A quantity of mats or matting greater than is necessary for the use of the crew of the vessel as a merchant vessel; unless such mats or matting be entered on the manifest as part of the cargo for trade.

If it be proved that any one or more of the articles above specified is or are on board, or have been on board during the voyage in which the vessel was captured, that fact shall be considered as *prima facie* evidence that the vessel was employed in the African slave trade, and she shall in consequence be condemned and declared lawful prize; unless the master or owners shall furnish clear and incontrovertible evidence, proving to the satisfaction of the mixed court of justice, that at the time of her detention or capture the vessel was employed in a lawful undertaking, and that such of the different articles above specified as were found on board at the time of detention, or as may have been embarked during the voyage on which she was engaged when captured, were indispensable for the lawful object of her voyage.

ARTICLE VII.

If any one of the articles specified in the preceding article as grounds for condemnation should be found on board a merchant vessel, or should be proved to have been on board of her during the voyage on which she was captured, no compensation for losses, damages, or expenses consequent upon the detention of such vessel shall in any case be granted either to the master, the owner, or any other person interested in the equipment or in the lading, even though she should not be condemned by the mixed court of justice.

ARTICLE VIII.

It is agreed between the two high contracting parties, that in all cases in which a vessel shall be detained under this treaty, by their respective cruisers, as having been engaged in the African slave trade, or as having been fitted out for the purposes thereof, and shall consequently be adjudged and condemned by one of the mixed courts of justice to be established as aforesaid, the said vessel shall, immediately after its condemnation, be broken up entirely, and shall be sold in separate parts, after having been so broken up; unless either of the two governments should wish to purchase her for the use of its navy at a price to be fixed by a competent person chosen for that purpose by the mixed court of justice; in which case the Government whose cruiser shall have detained the condemned vessel shall have the first option of purchase.

ARTICLE IX.

The captain, master, pilot, and crew of any vessel condemned by the mixed courts of justice, shall be punished according to the laws of the country to which such vessel belongs, as shall also the owner or owners, and the persons interested in her equipment or cargo, unless they prove that they had no participation in the enterprise.

For this purpose, the two high contracting parties agree that, in so far as it may not be attended with grievous expense and inconvenience, the master and crew of any vessel which may be condemned by a sentence of one of the mixed courts of justice, as well as any other persons found on board the vessel, shall be sent and delivered up to the jurisdiction of the nation under whose flag the condemned vessel was sailing at the time of capture; and that the witnesses and proofs necessary to establish the guilt of such master, crew, or other persons, shall also be sent with them.

The same course shall be pursued with regard to subjects or citizens of either contracting party who may be found by a cruiser of the other on board a vessel of any third power, or on board a vessel sailing without flag or papers, which may be condemned by any competent court for having engaged in the African slave trade.

ARTICLE X.

The negroes who are found on board of a vessel condemned by the mixed courts of justice, in conformity with the stipulations of this treaty, shall be placed at the disposal of the Government whose cruiser has made the capture; they shall be immediately set at liberty and shall remain free, the Government to whom they have been delivered guaranteeing their liberty.

ARTICLE XI.

The acts or instruments annexed to this treaty, and which it is mutually agreed shall form an integral part thereof, are as follows:

(A.) Instructions for the ships of the navies of both nations destined to prevent the African slave trade.

(B.) Regulations for the mixed courts of justice.

ARTICLE XII.

The present treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications thereof shall be exchanged at London in six months from this date, or sooner if possible. It shall continue and remain in full force for the term of ten years from the day of exchange of the ratifications, and further, until the end of one year after either of the contracting parties shall have given notice to the other of its intention to terminate the same; each of the contracting parties reserving to itself the right of giving such notice to the other at the end of the said term of ten years. And it is hereby agreed between them, that on the expiration of one year after such notice shall have been received by either from the other party, this treaty shall altogether cease and determine.

In witness whereof the respective plenipotentiaries have signed the present treaty, and have thereunto affixed the seal of their arms.

Done at Washington, the seventh day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

ANNEX (A) TO THE TREATY BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, FOR THE SUPPRESSION OF THE AFRICAN SLAVE TRADE, SIGNED AT WASHINGTON ON THE 7TH DAY OF APRIL, 1862.

Instructions for the Ships of the British and United States Navies employed to prevent the African Slave Trade.

ARTICLE I.

The commander of any ship belonging to the British or United States' navy, which shall be furnished with these instructions, shall have a right to search and detain any British or United States' merchant vessel which shall be actually engaged, or suspected to be engaged, in the African slave trade, or to be fitted out for the purposes thereof, or to have been engaged in such trade during the voyage in which she may be met with by such ship of the British or United States' navy; and such commander shall thereupon bring on board such merchant vessel (save in the case provided for in Article V. of these instructions), as soon as possible, for judgment, before one of the three mixed courts of justice established in virtue of Article IV. of the said treaty, that is to say:—

If the vessel shall be detained on the coast of Africa, she shall be brought before that one of the two mixed courts of justice to be established at the Cape of Good Hope and at Sierra Leone which may be nearest to the place of detention, or which the captor, on his own responsibility, may think can be soonest reached from such place.

If the vessel shall be detained on the coast of the Island of Cuba, she shall be brought before the mixed court of justice at New York.

ARTICLE II.

Whenever a ship of either of the two navies, duly authorized as aforesaid, shall meet a merchant vessel liable to be searched under the provisions of the said treaty, the search shall be conducted with the courtesy and consideration which ought to be observed between allied and friendly nations; and the search shall, in all cases, be made by an officer holding a rank not lower than that of lieutenant in the navy; or by the officer who at the time shall be second in command of the ship by which such search is made.

ARTICLE III.

The commander of any ship of the two navies, duly authorized as aforesaid, who may detain any merchant vessel in pursuance of the tenor of the present instructions, shall leave on board the vessel so detained, the master, the mate or boatswain, and two or three, at least, of the crew; the whole of the negroes, if any; and all the cargo. The captor shall, at the time of detention, draw up, in writing, a declaration, which shall exhibit the state in which he found the detained vessel; such declaration shall be signed by himself, and shall be given in or sent, together with the captured vessel, to the mixed court of justice before which such vessel shall be carried or sent for adjudication. He shall deliver to the master of the detained vessel a signed and certified list of the papers found on board the same, as well as a certificate of the number of negroes found on board at the moment of detention.

In the declaration which the captor is hereby required to make, as well as in the certified list of the papers seized, and in the certificate of the number of negroes found on board the detained vessel, he shall insert his own name and surname, the name of the capturing ship, and the latitude and longitude of the place where the detention shall have been made.

The officer in charge of the detained vessel shall, at the time of bringing the vessel's papers into the mixed court of justice, deliver into the court a certificate signed by himself, and verified on oath, stating any changes which have taken place in respect to the vessel, her crew, the negroes, if any, and her cargo, between the period of her detention and the time of delivering such paper.

ARTICLE IV.

If urgent reasons, arising from the length of the voyage, the state of health of the negroes, or any other cause, should require that either the whole or a portion of such negroes should be disembarked before the vessel can arrive at the place at which one of the mixed courts of justice is established, the commander of the capturing ship may take upon himself the responsibility of so disembarking the negroes, provided the necessity of the disembarkation, and the causes thereof, be stated in a certificate in proper form. Such certificate shall be drawn up and entered at the time on the log-book of the detained vessel.

ARTICLE V.

In case any merchant vessel detained in pursuance of the present instructions should prove to be unseaworthy, or in such a condition as not to be taken to one of three ports where the mixed courts of justice are to be established in pursuance of the treaty of this date, the commander of the detaining cruiser may take upon himself the responsibility of abandoning or destroying her, provided the exact causes which made such a step imperative necessary be stated in a certificate verified on oath. Such certificate shall be drawn up and formally executed in duplicate at the time.

In case of the abandonment or destruction of a detained vessel, the master and crew, together with the negroes and papers found on board, and one copy of the sworn certificate mentioned in the preceding paragraph of this article, shall be sent and delivered to the proper mixed court of justice at the earliest possible moment.

The undersigned plenipotentiaries have agreed, in conformity with Article XI. of the treaty signed by them on this day, that the present instructions shall be annexed to the said treaty, and be considered an integral part thereof.

Done at Washington, the seventh day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

ANNEX (B) TO THE TREATY BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, FOR THE ABOLITION OF THE AFRICAN SLAVE TRADE, SIGNED AT WASHINGTON ON THE 7TH DAY OF APRIL, 1862.

Regulations for the Mixed Courts of Justice.

ARTICLE I.

The mixed courts of justice to be established under the provisions of the treaty, of which these regulations are declared to be an integral part, shall be composed in the following manner:

The two high contracting parties shall each name a judge and an arbitrator, who shall be authorized to hear and to decide, without appeal, all cases of capture or detention of vessels which, in pursuance of the stipulations of the aforesaid treaty, shall be brought before them.

The judges and the arbitrators shall, before they enter upon the duties of their office, respectively make oath before the principal magistrate of the place in which such courts shall respectively reside, that they will judge fairly and faithfully; that they will have no preference either for claimant or for captor; and that they will act in all their decisions in pursuance of the stipulations of the aforesaid treaty.

There shall be attached to each of such courts a secretary or registrar, who shall be appointed by the party in whose territories such court shall reside.

Such secretary or registrar shall register all the acts of the court to which he is appointed, and shall, before he enters upon his office, make oath before the court that he will conduct himself with due respect for its authority, and will act with fidelity and impartiality in all matters relating to his office.

The salaries of the judges and arbitrators shall be paid by the governments by whom they are appointed.

The salary of the secretaries or registrars of the two courts to be established in the territories of Great Britain shall be paid by Her Britannic Majesty, and that of the secretary or registrar of the court to be established in the territories of the United States shall be paid by the United States' Government.

Each of the two governments shall defray half of the aggregate amount of the other expenses of such courts.

ARTICLE II.

The expenses incurred by the officer charged with the reception, maintenance, and care of the detained vessel, negroes, and cargo, and with the execution of the sentence, and all disbursements occasioned by bringing a vessel to adjudication, shall, in case of condemnation, be defrayed from the funds arising out of the sale of the materials of the vessel, after the vessel shall have been broken up, of the ship's stores, and of such parts of the cargo as shall consist of merchandize. And in case the proceeds arising out of this sale should not prove sufficient to defray such expenses, the deficiency shall be made good by the government of the country within whose territories the adjudication shall have taken place.

If the detained vessel shall be released, the expenses occasioned by bringing her to adjudication shall be defrayed by the captor, except in the cases specified and otherwise provided for under Article VII. of the treaty to which these regulations form an annex, and under Article VII. of these regulations.

ARTICLE III.

The mixed courts of justice are to decide upon the legality of the detention of such vessels as the cruisers of either nation shall detain, in pursuance of the said treaty.

The said courts shall adjudge, definitively and without appeal, all questions which shall arise out of the capture and detention of such vessels.

The proceedings of the courts shall take place as summarily as possible; and for this purpose the courts are required to decide each case, as far as may be practicable, within the space of twenty days, to be dated from the day on which the detained vessel shall have been brought into the port where the deciding court shall reside.

The final sentence shall not, in any case, be delayed beyond the period of two months, either on account of the absence of witnesses, or for any other cause, except upon the application of any of the parties interested; but in that case, upon such party or parties giving satisfactory security that they will take upon themselves the expense and risks of the delay, the courts may, at their discretion, grant an additional delay, not exceeding four months.

Either party shall be allowed to employ such counsel as he may think fit, to assist him in the conduct of his cause.

All the acts and essential parts of the proceedings of the said courts shall be committed to writing and be placed upon record.

ARTICLE IV.

The form of the process, or mode of proceeding to judgment, shall be as follows:—

The judges appointed by the two governments, respectively, shall in the first place proceed to examine the papers of the detained vessel, and shall take the depositions of the master or commander, and of two or three, at least, of the principal individuals on board of such vessel; and shall also take the declaration on oath of the captor, if it should appear to them necessary to do so, in order to judge and to pronounce whether the said vessel has been justly detained or not, according to the stipulations of the aforesaid treaty, and in order that, according to such judgment, the vessel may be condemned or released. In the event of the two judges not agreeing as to the sentence which they ought to pronounce in any case brought before them, whether with respect to the legality of the detention, or the liability of the vessel to condemnation, or as to the indemnification to be allowed, or as to any other question which may arise out of the said capture; or in case any difference of opinion should arise between them as to the mode of proceeding in the said court, they shall draw by lot the name of one of the two arbitrators so appointed as aforesaid, which arbitrator, after having considered the proceedings which have taken place, shall

consult with the two judges on the case; and the final sentence or decision shall be pronounced conformably to the opinion of the majority of the three.

ARTICLE V.

If the detained vessel shall be restored by the sentence of the court, the vessel and the cargo, in the state in which they shall then be found (with the exception of the negroes found on board, if such negroes shall have been previously disembarked under the provisions of Articles IV. and V. of the instructions annexed to the treaty of this date), shall forthwith be given up to the master or to the person who represents him; and such master or other person may before the same court claim a valuation of the damages which he may have a right to demand. The captor himself, and, in his default, his government, shall remain responsible for the damages to which the master of such vessel, or the owners either of the vessel or of her cargo, may be pronounced to be entitled.

The two high contracting parties bind themselves to pay, within the term of a year from the date of the sentence, the costs and damages which may be awarded by the court; it being mutually agreed that such costs and damages shall be paid by the government of the country of which the captor shall be a subject.

ARTICLE VI.

If the detained vessel shall be condemned, she shall be declared lawful prize, together with her cargo, of whatever description it may be, with the exception of the negroes who shall have been brought on board for the purpose of trade; and the said vessel, subject to the stipulations in the VIIIth article of the treaty of this date, shall, as well as her cargo, be sold by public sale for the profit of the two governments, subject to the payment of the expenses hereinafter mentioned.

The negroes who may not previously have been disembarked shall receive from the court a certificate of emancipation, and shall be delivered over to the government to whom the cruiser which made the capture belongs, in order to be forthwith set at liberty.

ARTICLE VII.

The mixed courts of justice shall also take cognizance of, and shall decide definitively and without appeal, all claims for compensation on account of losses occasioned to vessels and cargoes which shall have been detained under the provisions of this treaty, but which shall not have been condemned as legal prize by the said courts; and in all cases wherein restitution of such vessels and cargoes shall be decreed, save as mentioned in the VIIth article of the treaty to which these regulations form an annex, and in a subsequent part of these regulations, the court shall award to the claimant or claimants, or to his or their lawful attorney or attorneys, for his or their use, a just and complete indemnification for all costs of suit, and for all losses and damages which the owner or owners may have actually sustained by such capture and detention; and it is agreed that the indemnification shall be as follows:—

First. In case of total loss, the claimant or claimants shall be indemnified,—

- (A.) For the ship, her tackle, equipment, and stores.
- (B.) For all freights due and payable.
- (C.) For the value of the cargo of merchandize, if any, deducting all charges and expenses which would have been payable upon the sale of such cargo, including commission of sale.
- (D.) For all other regular charges in such case of total loss.

Secondly. In all other cases (save as hereinafter mentioned) not of total loss, the claimant or claimants shall be indemnified,—

- (A.) For all special damages and expenses occasioned to the ship by the detention, and for loss of freight, when due or payable.
- (B.) For demurrage when due, according to the schedule annexed to the present article.
- (C.) For any deterioration of the cargo.
- (D.) For all premium of insurance on additional risks.

The claimant or claimants shall be entitled to interest at the rate of 5 (five) per cent. per annum on the sum awarded, until such sum is paid by the government to which the capturing ship belongs. The whole amount of such indemnifications shall be calculated in the money of the country to which the detained vessel belongs, and shall be liquidated at the exchange current at the time of the award.

The two high contracting parties, however, have agreed, that if it shall be proved to the satisfaction of the judges of the two nations, and without having recourse to the decision of an arbitrator, that the captor has been led into error by the fault of the master or commander of the detained vessel, the detained vessel, in that case, shall not have the right of receiving, for the time of her detention, the demurrage stipulated by the present article, nor any other compensation for losses, damages, or expenses consequent upon such detention.

ARTICLE VIII.

Neither the judges nor the arbitrators, nor the secretaries or registrars of the mixed courts of justice, shall demand or receive from any of the parties concerned in the cases which shall be brought before such courts, any emolument or gift, under any pretext whatsoever, for the performance of the duties which such judges, arbitrators, and secretaries or registrars, have to perform.

ARTICLE IX.

The two high contracting parties have agreed that, in the event of the death, sickness, absence on leave, or any other legal impediment, of one or more of the judges or arbitrators composing the abovementioned courts respectively, the post of such judge or arbitrator shall be supplied, *ad interim*, in the following manner:

First. On the part of Her Britannic Majesty, and in those courts which shall sit within the possessions of Her said Majesty:—if the vacancy be that of the British judge, his place shall be filled by the British arbitrator; and either in that case, or in case the vacancy be originally that of the British arbitrator, the place of such arbitrator shall be filled by the governor or lieutenant-governor resident in such possession; in his unavoidable absence, by the principal magistrate of the same; or in the unavoidable absence of the principal magistrate, by the secretary of the government; and the said court, so constituted as above, shall sit, and in all cases brought before it for adjudication shall proceed to adjudge the same, and to pass sentence accordingly.

Secondly. On the part of Great Britain, and in that court which shall sit within the territories of the United States of America:—if the vacancy be that of the British judge, his place shall be filled by the British arbitrator; and either in that case, or in case the vacancy be originally that of the British arbitrator, his place shall be filled by the British consul, or in the unavoidable absence of the consul, by the British vice-consul; and in case the vacancy be both of the British judge and of the British arbitrator, then the vacancy of the British judge shall be filled by the British consul, and that of the British arbitrator by the British vice-consul. But if there be no British consul or vice-consul to fill the place of British arbitrator, then the United States' arbitrator shall be called in, in those cases in which the British arbitrator would be called in; and in case the vacancy be both of the British judge and of the British arbitrator, and there be neither British consul or vice-consul to fill, *ad interim*, the vacancies, then the United States' judge and arbitrator shall sit, and in all cases brought before them for adjudication shall proceed to adjudge the same, and pass sentence accordingly.

Thirdly. On the part of the United States, and in that court which shall sit within their territories:—if the vacancy be that of the United States' judge, his place shall be filled by the United States' arbitrator; and either in that case, or in case the vacancy be originally that of the United States' arbitrator, the place of such arbitrator shall be filled by the judge of the United States for the southern district of New York; and the said court, so constituted as above, shall sit, and in all cases brought before them for adjudication shall proceed to adjudge the same, and pass sentence accordingly.

Fourthly. On the part of the United States of America, and in those courts which shall sit within the possessions of Her Britannic Majesty:—if the vacancy be that of the United States' judge, his place shall be filled by the United States' arbitrator; and either in that case, or in case the vacancy be originally that of the United States' arbitrator, his place shall be filled by the United States' consul, or in the unavoidable absence of the consul, by the United States' vice-consul. In case the vacancy be both of the United States' judge and of the United States' arbitrator, then the vacancy of the judge shall be filled by the United States' consul, and that of the United States' arbitrator by the United States' vice-consul. But if there be no United States' consul or vice-consul to fill the place of the United States' arbitrator, then the British arbitrator shall be called in, in those cases in which the United States' arbitrator would be called in; and in case the vacancy be both of the United States' judge and of the United States' arbitrator, and there be neither United States' consul nor vice-consul to fill, *ad interim*, the vacancies, then the British judge and the British arbitrator shall sit, and in all cases brought before them for adjudication shall proceed to adjudge the same, and pass sentence accordingly.

The chief authority of the place in the territories of either high contracting party where the mixed courts of justice shall sit, shall, in the event of a vacancy arising, either of the judge or the arbitrator of the other high contracting party, forthwith give notice of the same by the most expeditious method in his power to the government of that other high contracting party, in order that such vacancy may be supplied at the earliest possible period. And each of the high contracting parties agrees to supply definitively, as soon as possible, the vacancies which may arise in the abovementioned courts from death, or from any other cause whatever.

The undersigned plenipotentiaries have agreed, in conformity with the XIth Article of the Treaty signed by them on this day, that the preceding regulations shall be annexed to the said treaty, and considered on integral part thereof.

Done at Washington, the seventh day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

ADDITIONAL ARTICLE TO THE TREATY SIGNED AT WASHINGTON, 7TH APRIL, 1862, BETWEEN HER BRITANNIC MAJESTY AND THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, FOR THE SUPPRESSION OF THE AFRICAN SLAVE TRADE.

SIGNED AT WASHINGTON, 17TH FEBRUARY, 1863.

[Ratifications exchanged at London, 1st April, 1863.]

WHEREAS by the first article of the treaty between Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the United States of America, for the suppression of the African slave trade, signed at Washington on the 7th of April, 1862, it was stipulated and agreed that those ships of the respective navies of the two high contracting par-

ties which shall be provided with special instructions for that purpose, as thereafter mentioned, may visit such merchant-vessels of the two nations as may, upon reasonable grounds, be suspected of being engaged in the African slave trade, or of having been fitted out for that purpose, or of having, during the voyage on which they are met by the said cruisers, been engaged in the African slave trade contrary to the provisions of the said treaty; and that such cruisers may detain and send or carry away such vessels in order that they may be brought to trial in the manner thereafter agreed upon: And whereas it was by the said article further stipulated and agreed, that the reciprocal right of search and detention should be exercised only within the distance of two hundred miles from the coast of Africa, and to the southward of the thirty-second parallel of north latitude, and within thirty leagues from the coast of the island of Cuba: And whereas the two high contracting parties are desirous of rendering the said treaty still more efficacious for its purpose;—the plenipotentiaries who signed the said treaty have, in virtue of their full powers, agreed that the reciprocal right of visit and detention, as defined in the article aforesaid, may be exercised also within thirty leagues of the island of Madagascar, within thirty leagues of the island of Puerto Rico, and within thirty leagues of the island of San Domingo.

The present additional article shall have the same force and validity as if it had been inserted word for word in the treaty concluded between the two high contracting parties on the 7th of April, 1863, and shall have the same duration as that treaty. It shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London in six months from this date, or sooner, if possible.

In witness whereof the respective plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have thereunto affixed the seal of their arms.

ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAW REGULATING QUARTZ MINING IN THE ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.—[3rd September, 1863.]

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Ararat, begun and holden at the Mining Board Room, Ararat, in the said district, on the third day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, it is ordained by the said board as follows (that is to say):—

1. *Marking off claims.*—All claims must be marked off at each corner by a post, and the boundary lines meeting at each post shall be as near as practicable at right angles to each other; the length of all claims shall be with the course or supposed course of the reef, and all reefs or veins of quartz within the said claims shall be the property of the holders thereof.

2. *Boundary posts.*—The corner posts of all claims shall be at least three (3) feet above the surface and not less than four (4) inches in diameter, they must be firmly fixed in the ground, and kept visible during the working of a claim or while it is held in possession.

3. *Claims to be worked in a bonâ fide manner.*—Not more than four (4) days after a claim has been taken possession of, work must be commenced and continued thereon in a *bonâ fide* manner (except as hereinafter provided). If any shareholder is prevented from working by sickness or urgent business, the

other shareholders, or a majority of them, may have his place supplied by a competent miner, and such shareholder shall be responsible for any reasonable wages to the person so employed; but any share unrepresented after commencement of work for more than forty-eight (48) hours shall be liable to forfeiture.

4. *Prospecting claims.*—Any miner or miners prospecting for or discovering a quartz reef, shall be entitled to hold in length three hundred (300) feet along the course or supposed course of the reef, by a breadth at right angles of eight hundred (800) feet.

5. *Ordinary claims.*—In ordinary claims, each miner shall be entitled to hold in length fifty (50) feet along the course or supposed course of the reef, by a breadth at right angles of six hundred (600) feet, but no ordinary claim shall exceed two hundred (200) feet in length.

6. *Claims to be numbered.*—All claims shall be numbered consecutively on either side from the prospecting claim, which shall be number one (1).

7. *A wall or partition.*—Three (3) feet wide of neutral ground must be left as a wall or partition between claims, until both parties agree to divide or otherwise dispose of the same; always provided that either party shall be at liberty to remove a portion of the said wall, for the purpose of ventilation, and that the quartz so removed shall be the joint property of the said parties.

8. *Penalty for not leaving a wall.*—Where any party neglects to leave the proper width of wall, the same may be deducted from the claim of such party and assigned as a wall.

9. *Oversized claims.*—Any person having marked off a claim larger than he is entitled to, any other person may take possession of the excess on whichever side he may prefer; and should the ground so taken possession of not exceed the extent allowed for one miner, it shall not be necessary to leave a wall between the excess and the claim reduced.

10. *Temporary amalgamation.*—Any number of adjoining claims not exceeding six (6) may be amalgamated temporarily to test the ground in searching for a quartz reef, provided that not less than one (1) miner for every two hundred (200) feet be employed thereon; claims so amalgamated must be worked *bond fide*, and in no case shall less than two (2) men be employed. On discovery of the reef, the amalgamation shall cease.

11. *Permanent amalgamation.*—Any number of adjoining claims not exceeding twelve (12) may be amalgamated permanently by the holders thereof posting near the centre of the claims so amalgamated a notice stating the registered numbers and extent of such claims.

12. *Suspension of work.*—Any miners who have done six (6) consecutive months *bond fide* work on a claim may obtain from the registrar a certificate (in the form of the schedule hereunto appended), authorising suspension of work in said claim for any period not exceeding three (3) months; previous to a subsequent suspension being allowed, six (6) additional consecutive months *bond fide* work must be done on the claim. Seven days prior to the granting of any suspension certificate, the miners requiring such suspension shall post a notice to that effect on some conspicuous part of their claim, which notice shall contain the name of each shareholder, together with the date and number of his miner's right; and unless valid objections be made by the adjoining claimholders within the seven days specified, it shall be lawful for the registrar to grant a certificate for such suspension. No certificate shall be granted if the holders of the greater part of the interest in a claim are opposed thereto. This clause shall not apply to claims amalgamated under clause 10.

13. *Suspension on the water-level.*—The holders of any claim who first strike the water shall be entitled to receive from the registrar a certificate in the form of the schedule hereunto appended, authorizing suspension of work for three (3) months; but the holders of other claims on the same reef shall only be entitled to suspend work until the three (3) months granted to the first party have expired. Claimholders paying drainage assessment shall be allowed to suspend work until their claims are efficiently drained.

14. *Suspension whilst procuring machinery, &c.*—Claimholders shall be entitled to receive from the registrar a certificate, in the form of the schedule hereunto appended, authorizing suspension of work for procuring, erecting, or repairing of machinery, and in all cases where such work has not been completed in a reasonable time, the claim shall be liable to forfeiture.

15. *Tunnels and tramways.*—Any person cutting a tunnel or laying down a tramway for the greater convenience of working a claim, may hold possession of the same, together with a wall of six (6) feet on each side thereof, provided the same does not impede the working of the claim of any other person or obstruct any road in ordinary use.

16. *Protection to stacked quartz.*—Any person wishing to retain possession of any quartz, may do so for one year by registering the same with the registrar, provided such quartz be stacked in a proper manner upon ground not supposed to be payable for mining purposes. After the expiration of one year, if the owners still desire to retain possession, registration must be renewed every six (6) months.

17. *Sites of dams, &c., proving auriferous.*—When the site occupied by a dam, tunnel, tramway, race, or stacked quartz, shall prove auriferous, it may be mined upon; but any person, before commencing work upon such site, shall compensate the owner for any injury that may be sustained thereby.

18. *Sludge.*—Where machinery is employed, an embankment for the purpose of retaining the sludge must be constructed, except the sludge can be more conveniently carried off by drainage, without injury to any other person.

19. *Roads to be bridged.*—When sludge or water runs across any road in general use, a substantial bridge, not less than four-feet (14) feet in width, must be constructed and kept in repair

by the owners of the claim from which such sludge or water proceeds.

20. *Forfeiture of claims.*—Noncompliance with the provisions of clauses No. three (3), ten (10), eleven (11), and sixteen (16); the obtaining by false representations a certificate from the registrar, authorising suspension of such work; and the non-resumption of work after the expiry of the time allowed for suspension, shall render the claim or interest affected liable to forfeiture.

21. *Non-forfeiture through neglect of hired workmen.*—No registered interest shall be forfeited through neglect on the part of any hired miner employed to represent it, provided that after seven (7) days notice in writing of such neglect to the owner or his agent, the owner's interest be fully represented in conformity with this bye-law.

22. *Penalties for other infringements.*—Any other infringement of this bye-law shall subject the person so offending to the penalty specified in the 126th section of the Gold Fields Act.

23. *Effacing notices or removing posts.*—No person shall efface, alter, remove, or destroy, any notice posted on a claim, or willfully remove the posts thereof.

24. *Plurality of shares.*—Any holder of a miner's right may hold one or more shares in any number of claims, provided the same be represented in accordance with this bye-law by the holder of a miner's right; but no person shall be entitled to mark off more than one claim on any reef until the claim last marked off by him be abandoned or shall have been worked in a *bond fide* manner at least four days.

25. *Registration.*—Any person holding an interest in a claim shall register the same with the registrar; any person neglecting to register such interest shall not be entitled to receive any benefit from the provisions of clauses 12, 13, and 14.

26. *Agent to be appointed.*—Any person holding an interest in a claim shall, in case of absence from the locality, appoint an agent whose acts shall be held as those of his principal, and whose name and address must be registered with the registrar of the division in which such interest is situated.

27. *Scale of fees.*—The scale of fees shall be as follows:—

29. *Repeal clause.*—Bye-law No. 6, of the 10th July, 1860 regulating quartz mining in the Ararat Mining District, is hereby repealed, saving as affects the rights obtained previous to and held at the time of this bye-law coming into operation in so far as such rights relate to the area of claims and the number of men to be employed.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the preservation of the public health, the suppression of nuisances, and the restraining of noisome or offensive trades: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Ararat, that if at any time the trade or business of any person or persons, being the owner or occupier of any candle-house, melting-house, melting-place, or soap-house, or any slaughter-house, or any building or place for boiling offal or blood, or for boiling, burning, or crushing bones, or any manufactory, building, or place used for any trade, business, process, or manufacture causing effluvia, shall be carried on so as to be a nuisance, or cause any effluvia injurious to the health of the inhabitants of the neighborhood, such person or persons shall forthwith, after receiving written notice from the local inspector of nuisances, use the best practicable means for abating such nuisance, or preventing or counteracting such effluvia.

Any person guilty of any breach or neglect of this bye-law shall forfeit and pay a penalty or sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

BYE-LAW No. 34.—FOR MAKING AN ASSESSMENT OF HOUSE AND LAND PROPERTY WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BALLAARAT EAST, AND FOR IMPOSING AND LEVYING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING AND SIXPENCE IN THE POUND THEREON FOR THE MUNICIPAL YEAR ENDING THE FIRST DAY OF JUNE, 1864.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make an annual assessment of all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district according to its fair annual value, and to impose and levy a rate thereon: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Ballarat East, that all the several properties within the said municipal district shall be assessed for the year ending the 1st day of June, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, according to the several amounts of annual value respectively entered against each in the assessment roll or book made by the said council and confirmed by it on the 2nd day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, amounting in the whole (after all appeals against the same have been heard and decided upon by the justices of the peace in petty sessions held at Ballarat East) to a total sum of £79,934, which said assessment has been assented to by the Lieutenant-Governor and is in legal force for the said municipal year and until all rates thereon have been fully paid: And be it also further enacted that the rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound on the said annual value is hereby imposed on all the said properties for the municipal year commencing the 1st day of June, 1863, and ending the 1st day of June, 1864, and payable in equal proportions as follows:—The first moiety thereof to be due and payable on the 30th day of September, 1863, and the second moiety to be due and payable on the 31st day of January, 1864; provided nevertheless that where the total rate for the whole year does not exceed the sum of Twenty shillings, then such rate shall be due and payable in full on the 30th day of September, 1863.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 34, made by the municipal council of Ballarat East, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 14th day of September, 1863.

MUNICIPALITY OF BROWN'S AND SCARSDALE.

BYE-LAW No. 7.—FOR REGULATING THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS OF THE MUNICIPAL COMMON.

WHEREAS by the Land Act of 1862 it is amongst other things enacted, that the council of any municipal district, within or in the vicinity of which any town common, within the meaning of the Act of the Parliament of Victoria numbered 117, or any municipal common, is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-law prescribe, three persons to be managers of such municipal common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers and elect others in their stead: And whereas the portions of land comprising the unappropriated Crown lands within and in the vicinity of the municipal district of Brown's and Scarsdale, as indicated on the description published in the *Government Gazette* of the 1st May, 1863 (No. 44), containing in the aggregate about 5600 acres, have been duly proclaimed a municipal common for Brown's and Scarsdale: Be it and it is hereby enacted by the municipal council of Brown's and Scarsdale—

1. That the election for the appointment of managers of the Brown's and Scarsdale Municipal Common shall be held annually at the first general meeting of the council in each municipal year, viz., in August; and that the election of such managers

for the unexpired portion of the current municipal year shall be held at the first general meeting of the council after the publication in the *Government Gazette* of this bye-law; provided nevertheless, that it shall be competent for the council, from time to time, to adjourn such election, upon motion to that effect duly carried; no such adjournment, however, being for a longer period than to the next general meeting of council.

2. That at such elections, should there be more candidates than vacancies, the voting shall be by each councillor signing his own voting paper or card, after first inserting the name or names of the person or persons whom he supports; and such cards or papers shall, after such election, be preserved in the town clerk's office for twelve months as a record. In the event of an equality of votes, the chairman, in addition to his own, shall have a casting vote.

3. That when any one or more vacancies occur through the death, resignation, or removal by the council of any manager or managers during his or their term of office, the council shall, as speedily as possible, elect in the same manner a person or persons to fill such vacancy or vacancies as is hereinbefore mentioned.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 7, made by the municipal council of Brown's and Scarsdale, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 14th day of September, 1863.

BYE-LAW No. 28.—FOR LEVYING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND FOR THE CURRENT MUNICIPAL YEAR 1863-64.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to levy a rate on the assessment of all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district, according to the fair average annual value thereof, such rate not to exceed the sum of Two shillings in the pound of such value: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Dunolly, that a rate of One shilling in the pound for the current municipal year be, and the same is, hereby imposed and levied on the assessment of all properties in houses and lands within the limits of the said municipal district; one moiety thereof to be due and payable on and after the tenth day of November, 1862, and the second on and after the eleventh day January, 1864.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 28, made by the municipal council of Dunolly, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 14th day of September, 1863.

MUNICIPALITY OF ESSENDON AND FLEMINGTON.

BYE-LAW No. 10.—TO REGULATE BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF ESSENDON AND FLEMINGTON.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 13 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, section 26, it is enacted that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings, such bye-laws to have force and effect under the thirty-third section of the said Act, upon the assent of the Governor of the said colony having been

obtained thereto under his hand: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Essendon and Flemington, that, from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of Victoria, the proceedings and business of the said council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be called the Standing Orders of the said council, that is to say:—

CHAPTER I.—ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS.

1. *Sittings of council.*—The sittings of the council shall be held at such times and places as the council may order, notice of such meetings, and of the business proposed to be transacted thereat, being given by the town clerk to every member of the council at least two clear days before the time appointed for such meeting; and such meeting shall be open to the public, but a majority of the council may require the exclusion of strangers during the discussion of any particular question.

2. *Special meetings; time of commencing business.*—The chairman or any three councillors shall have power to call a special meeting of the council by written instructions to the town clerk, provided that the notice be given of the business proposed to be transacted two clear days before such meeting shall be held; and at all meetings of the council the business shall commence as soon as the legal quorum is present, but if at the expiration of thirty minutes after the appointed hour of meeting there should not be a quorum present, no business shall be transacted at such meeting, but a note of the circumstance (with the names of the members present) shall be entered in the minute book.

3. *First business of council.*—The first business at each meeting of the council shall be to confirm the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereupon except as to the accuracy thereof.

4. *Order of proceedings.*—At all ordinary meetings of the council the reading of the correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, the presentation of petitions, and bringing up of reports of committees, shall have precedence of all motions.

5. *Communication to council, how to be written and presented.*—Every communication addressed to the council shall be in proper form and presented by one of its members, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.

6. *Discussions on memorials, &c., presented to council.*—On the presentation of a petition, memorial, or other similar communication, no debate shall take place thereon until notice has been given in the usual manner; and the only question that shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation shall be that it be received, and if necessary that it be referred to a committee.

7. *Orders of the day.*—The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration; any member may however bring forward such business as he may consider advisable in the form of a notice of motion, such notice to be given three clear days previous to that at which the same is to be taken into consideration; all such notices of motion to be considered in the order in which they shall have been given.

8. *Reports of committees.*—No report of a committee shall be considered or adopted on its presentation, unless notice thereof, with digest of its contents, shall have been sent to each councillor with the usual notice paper for an ordinary meeting.

9. *Debates on motions in absence of mover.*—No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called in order. Notices not so proceeded with shall be struck off the paper.

10. *Adoption and inspection of bye-laws.*—No bye-law shall be finally adopted at the meeting at which it shall be first proposed, nor until the next meeting of council; and every such bye-law shall in the interim remain open for the inspection of any of the ratepayers, in the town clerk's office, free of charge.

CHAPTER II.—ORDER OF DEBATE.

11. *Call to order in debate.*—Any member when proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the chairman; and no member shall be interrupted unless by a call to order, when he shall sit down; the member calling to order shall then be heard upon such point of order, and the question decided before the subject is resumed or any other business entered upon.

12. *Councillor proposing motion or amendment to state nature thereof.*—Any member desirous of proposing either an original motion or an amendment, must state the nature of such motion or amendment before addressing the council in support thereof.

13. *Questions once before council to be withdrawn only by permission.*—No question once brought before the council shall be withdrawn without leave of the council, nor shall any motion be entertained by the council until the same be seconded.

14. *Pre-audience.*—If more than one councillor rise at the same time, the chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to pre-audience.

15. *Number of times councillor is permitted to speak.*—No councillor shall speak twice on the same question unless by way of explanation merely, or in reply as the mover of an original motion, or upon any amendment; and after such explanation or reply, the question shall be forthwith put to the vote; but councillors merely seconding any motion shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

16. *Digression from subject and personal reflection considered disorderly.*—No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion or impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.

17. *Chairman's decision to be stated.*—The presiding chairman's decision shall be stated in all questions of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument; but it shall be competent for any councillor proposing a motion which shall have been seconded, and which the chairman may deem out of order, to thereupon move a further resolution that

the opinion of the council be taken in the usual way by show of hands, or otherwise as stated in the standing orders as to the chairman's decision in the matter, such opinion as expressed by the council to be final.

18. *Chairman to rise when addressing council.*—The presiding chairman shall rise when addressing the council.

19. *Offensive expressions, use of.*—Any councillor who shall use expressions capable of being offensively applied to any other councillor, shall, if required by the chairman, withdraw such expressions to the satisfaction of the council.

20. *Clerk to note particular expressions if required.*—Any councillor may require the town clerk to take down any particular expressions immediately on their being used.

21. *Production of documents if required.*—Any councillor may of right demand the production of any documents of the council bearing on the question under discussion, which the town clerk shall produce when called upon.

22. *Amendments, mode of discussion of; number of amendments, &c.*—Only one amendment shall be discussed at one time, and upon the adoption of any amendment the original motion shall be deemed rejected; and the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion; and upon any amendment being carried, it shall be competent for any member to move one other amendment thereon, but not more.

23. *Mode of putting the question.*—The chairman shall, on taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative then in the negative; and the votes of all councillors (if a division be called for) shall be entered in the minutes.

24. *Mode of voting.*—The council shall vote in the following manner, except in cases of elections, viz.: The chairman in putting the resolution shall call upon those members in favor of the motion to stand up, those not in favor to retain their seats. A division list to be recorded at the request of any member on being seconded.

25. *Motion for adjournment.*—No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment, but if the question be decided in the negative, the motion then under discussion, or the next motion or order of the day, shall be considered before the question of adjournment shall be again entertained; but if the motion of adjournment be carried, any business left undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the council.

26. *Councillors may protest against decision on certain conditions.*—Any councillor may record his protest against any decision of the council, provided the same be made before the next meeting of the council (in writing), and be couched in respectful language; notice of such intention, however, must be given on the adoption of the resolution.

27. *Rescinding of motion in same year.*—No motion, the effect of which would be to rescind any previous resolution of the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council be duly made for the purpose.

CHAPTER III.—COMMITTEES.

28. *Permanent committees.*—There shall be three permanent committees of the council, to be called the Public Works Committee, the Finance and Rate Committee, and the Legislative Committee, which shall consist of the whole council; a standing chairman of each of the committees to be chosen at the first meeting of the council after the annual election. When special committees are appointed, the member proposing such committee shall be chairman thereof.

29. *Constitution of committee.*—The council shall be constituted a committee, on the motion of any member of the council to that effect, being duly made, seconded, and carried.

30. *Observance of standing orders in committees.*—The standing orders of the council shall be observed in committees of the whole council, except the rule limiting the number of times of speaking.

31. *Chairman of finance committee at liberty to expend £2 per week.*—The chairman of the finance committee shall be at liberty, without the express order of the council, to authorise disbursements for current expenses to an amount not exceeding two pounds in any one week; and shall report the same to the council at its next sitting.

32. *Reports of committee, form of.*—The chairman of committees shall have their reports fairly written out by the town clerk, on paper of uniform size provided by the council, so as to admit of their being bound up at convenient intervals.

CHAPTER IV.—ELECTIONS.

33. *Election to offices at disposal of council.*—No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until four clear days' notice shall have been given in at least two or more newspapers published in Melbourne or its vicinity, inviting applications for the same, and the salary of such office shall in all cases be fixed before proceeding to the election.

34. *Mode of voting at elections.*—At all such elections the voting shall be (except at that of chairman of the council) on cards or paper to be provided for the purpose, on which the voter shall write the name of the candidate he supports, and subscribe his own name thereto.

35. *Councillors not to have pecuniary interest in contracts, or be security for any officer of council.*—No councillor shall have any direct pecuniary interest (except as shareholder of any public company) in any contract or other work in connection with the council, nor shall be received as surety for any officer, nor shall any officer become security for any other employee of the council, or for any work to be done for the council; and in all cases where security shall be required, the expense of preparing the same shall be borne by the party giving the same.

CHAPTER V.—MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS.

36. *Call of council; penalty for non-attendance.*—For the consideration of any bye-law, or for the raising or appropriating of money, or other objects of importance, it shall be competent for any member, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any such subject at

the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given in the notice paper for the day, when the order of the day, or notice of motion for which such call is made, is set down for consideration; and every member shall be in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes under consideration, and in attendance at the voting upon such question, or any amendment thereof, whether of adjournment or otherwise, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council.

37. *Town clerk to have charge of seal and all books, &c.*—The town clerk of the council shall have charge of the common seal of the corporation, and shall be responsible for the same, and shall verify each impression by his signature, and shall not affix the same to any document without the express order of the council; and shall also have charge of all books, papers, plans or other documents, the property of the council, which shall be open at all reasonable hours during the day to the inspection of any councillor, who shall be at liberty to take copies of the same, or any of them; but under no circumstances shall he permit any such book, paper, plan, or other document to be removed from his custody without the express order of the chairman or the council.

38. *Plans and specifications of proposed works to be open to inspection of ratepayers.*—All plans and specifications for the formation of any street, or portion thereof, shall be laid before the council at least six days prior to the same being considered and ordered upon, and be open for inspection by any ratepayer during that time.

39. *Penalty for breach of bye-law.*—Any person committing any neglect or breach thereof of any clause in this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of Two pounds, which may be recovered and distributed by summary process, before any two or more justices of the peace having jurisdiction within this municipal district.

40. *Suspension of standing orders.*—Any one or more of the standing orders may be suspended *pro tem.* with the consent of a majority of the council.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 10, made by the municipal council of Essendon and Flemington, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 14th day of September, 1863.

MUNICIPALITY OF SMYTHESDALE.

BYE-LAW NO. 15.—FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A TOLL IN BROOKE STREET, NEAR THE NORTHERN BOUNDARY.

BE it ordered and directed by the Municipal Council of Smythesdale, with the assent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria—

1. That on and after the first day of October, 1863, a toll shall be established in Brooke street, near the northern boundary of the said municipality, and that toll-gates, toll-bars, check-bars, or side-bars, and all necessary works for the collection of such toll, shall be erected in Brooke street aforesaid, being a road within the jurisdiction and under the control of the said council.

2. That the tolls specified in the schedule hereunto annexed shall be the tolls payable to the said council in respect of any animal or vehicle passing through the said toll-gate or bars, until such time as said council, with such assent as aforesaid, shall see fit to alter the same.

3. That no person or persons shall fraudulently or forcibly pass, or claim or attempt to pass, said toll-gates or bars without having first paid the tolls named in the schedule hereto annexed; or shall refuse payment, or evade or attempt to evade, or aid, assist, or abet any person or persons in evading or attempting to evade payment, of the tolls payable in respect of any animal or vehicle legally chargeable therewith.

4. That the christian name and surname of the toll-collector, and a list of the tolls for the time being in respect of any animal or vehicle passing through said toll-gates or bars; shall be painted in black letters at least two (2) inches in length on a board with a white ground, which shall be placed in a conspicuous situation in front of the toll-house, or contiguous to side toll-gates or bars; and no such collector shall refuse or neglect to place and keep such board as aforesaid during the time he shall be such collector, nor shall in anywise hinder any person from reading the inscription on such board, or refuse to tell his christian name and surname to any person who shall demand the same, nor shall give a false name, or demand more than the legal toll, or upon the legal toll being paid or tendered shall detain any passenger, nor shall use any abusive language.

5. That it shall be lawful for the said council, from time to time, by public auction or tender, duly advertised in some one or more of the public newspapers, to let and farm out for any term not exceeding twelve months the tolls that may be authorised by said council to be collected at such toll-gates or bars, or to employ such person or persons as may be necessary for the collection of said tolls as to said council shall seem requisite; and such person so employed by said council shall be deemed to be the toll-collector within the meaning hereof.

6. That no tolls shall be demanded or taken by virtue of this bye-law or of from any person in Her Majesty's service, or in the employment or service of the Government, or of or from any person going to or returning from any place of public worship or funeral, or of or from any minister of religion.

7. Any person or persons guilty of a breach or neglect of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds (£10).
