## VICTORIAN RAILWAY DEBENTURES, PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST PAYABLE IN THE COLONY.

**S**EALD Tenders will be received at this office until Noon on Tuesday, the 3rd November, for the whole or any part of Victorian Railway Debentures to the amount of £200,000. The debentures to be issued are dated 1st October, 1860, and are in sums of £100, £50, £25, and £10.

A deposit of five (5) per cent. on the amount of each tender, in cash, bank draft, or marked cheque, must be enclosed with the tender.

Tenders must state the amount or rate per cent. offered, exclusive of accrued interest, also the number and description of debentures required.

Tenders are to be endorsed as follows:—"Tenders for Victorian Railway Debentures."

Tenders will be opened, in the presence of the tenderers, on the 3rd of November at Noon, in the Executive Council Chamber, Treasury, Spring street, Melbourne.

The debentures will be deliverable to the successful tenderers within fourteen (14) days from the date on which the tenders are opened, and are redeemable in twenty-five (25) years from their respective dates.

The debentures bear interest at the rate of six (6) per cent. per annum, secured on the consolidated revenue of the colony, which will be payable in Melbourne on the 1st of April and 1st of October in each year.

The Government will not necessarily accept any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known on the day following that on which the tenders are opened.

## IMMIGRATION REGULATIONS.

**T**HE Governor in Council has been pleased to make the following Regulations for the conduct of Emigration to Victoria, for the nomination of Immigrants by persons resident therein, and for the introduction of persons skilled in special industries, that is to say, the manufacture of wine or oil, the drying or preservation of fruit, the culture and manufacture of tobacco.

These regulations will take effect on the following dates:—No. 1, on and after 1st January, 1864; Nos. 2 and 3, on and after 1st October, 1863.

## No. I.

### REGULATIONS FOR THE SELECTION OF EMIGRANTS IN THE UNITED KINGDOM.

1. The only persons eligible for free passages will be single females under the age of 35 who have been accustomed to domestic service, who can produce certificates of good characters satisfactory to Her Majesty's Emigration Commissioners, and are free from any mental or bodily infirmity.

2. Her Majesty's Emigration Commissioners should arrange for the selection and despatch of as nearly as possible One hundred and fifty females per month, and no ship shall contain more than Fifty of these immigrants, exclusive of others nominated in the colony.

3. The expenses of conveyance to the port of embarkation, as well as the cost of the passage, will be defrayed by the Government; each emigrant will, however, be required to pay One pound, in order that the Government may provide the necessary bedding and mess utensils.

## REGULATIONS FOR THE NOMINATION OF EMIGRANTS IN VICTORIA.

## No. I.—NOMINATION REGULATIONS.

1. Persons resident in Victoria desirous of bringing their relatives and friends from the United Kingdom to Victoria, may apply to the officer named in clause 3 for "Passage Warrants," which will be granted under the conditions mentioned in these regulations.

2. The persons to be nominated shall be British subjects, of sound mind, in good health, and of good character, provided they are not excluded by clause 14.

3. All applications shall be made in accordance with Form A hereunto attached, which may be obtained at any Post Office or Police Station throughout the colony, in addition to the offices mentioned in this clause. This form, with the necessary particulars carefully inserted, should be sent to the Immigration Agent, Melbourne, or to one of the following officers:—

4. Upon receipt of this form correctly filled up, the officer concerned will inform the applicant verbally, if present, or by Form B, if absent, of the amount required to be paid. So soon as the amount mentioned shall have been paid to the Assistant Immigration Agent, or Receiver and Paymaster, or Postmaster (as the case may be), the money, or a Treasury receipt for it, is to be sent to the Immigration Agent in Melbourne, with the application form (marked C). The Immigration Agent will then transmit Passage Warrants for the persons nominated, either to the office at which the money was paid, or to such address as the nominator may request. The Passage Warrant must be sent by the nominator to his friends in the United Kingdom.

5. The following sums shall be in all instances paid by the nominator in advance, in respect to intending emigrants of the various classes, prior to the issue of the Passage Warrants:—

6. The Passage Warrant will entitle the person or persons named therein, except unprotected single females, to be conveyed to Melbourne from the port mentioned in such warrant, by a ship to be named by the contractors within one month of the receipt by them (the contractors) of a request for a passage in terms of such warrant; but unless a nominee shall leave the United Kingdom within nine months from the date of his warrant, such warrant will not be recognized.

7. Warrants will be payable in the following manner:—One moiety payable in England upon Her Majesty's Emigration Commissioners being satisfied that the immigrants named therein have departed; the remaining moiety within ten days after the arrival of the immigrants, provided that the conditions of the contract have been, in all respects, faithfully performed, and a schedule of the warrants certified by the Immigration Agent accordingly.

8. Masters of ships arriving in this colony with immigrants introduced under these regulations, shall furnish to the Immigration Officer boarding a list showing the number and names of such immigrants, who shall then be produced with their warrants by the master, for identification, and if found to correspond with the description upon the warrant, such warrant shall be endorsed by the said Immigration Officer.

9. Passage Warrants shall not be issued for children under fifteen years of age, unless on an undertaking that they shall be accompanied by some suitable person who will take charge of them during the voyage.

10. No person should, upon any account, send any money to any officer specified in clause 3, unless he shall previously have received Form B, directing him to do so.

11. Should the persons specified in the Passage Warrant decline or be unable to emigrate, the money paid towards their passages will not be refunded to the nominator, but unless the nominator requires the Passage Warrant to be made non-transferable, the nominee, having first obtained the consent of Her Majesty's Emigration Commissioners, may by endorsement transfer such warrant. Should the nominee be dead, or a warrant returned not availed of, such Passage Warrant may be exchanged upon application to the Immigration Agent in Melbourne.

12. If the nominator wilfully misrepresent particulars or neglect to furnish full information respecting the persons nominated, or if the transferor wilfully misrepresent particulars, or neglect to furnish full information respecting the person to whom he proposes to transfer the Passage Warrant, or if any person known by the nominator to be under indenture, or any person disqualified by these regulations be nominated, then the Commissioner of Trade and Customs or Her Majesty's Emigration Commissioners may cancel the said Passage Warrant, and the deposit shall be forfeited; or if the nominee or transferee may have been introduced into Victoria previous to the disqualification being discovered, the nominator shall be held liable to refund the amount paid by the Government in respect to such Passage Warrant.

13. No single females will be permitted to be conveyed in any ships except in accordance with the Queen's Order in Council, dated 3rd February, 1863, unless accompanied by relatives or a family of friends.

14. No Passage Warrant shall be issued, and no transfer of any warrant will be permitted, in favor of or to any person who has already been in Victoria, or who may be either lunatic, idiotic, deaf, dumb, blind, or infirm.

15. No immigrant will be received into the Immigration Depot except those introduced entirely at the public expense and single females, who may be maintained during seven days at the expense of the contractors, and any subsequent period at that of the nominator unless they hire for domestic service. All nominators, therefore, are strictly enjoined to make provision for the reception of their nominees immediately on their arrival, as they, except the single females, will not be allowed to remain on board ship for more than seven days from the date thereof.

## No. III.

## REGULATIONS FOR THE INTRODUCTION OF PERSONS SKILLED IN SPECIAL INDUSTRIES.

Passage Certificates, entitling to a passage from Liverpool or London, will be issued to residents in Victoria, for the introduction of persons with their families (if married) "skilled in the production of wine or oil, and in the drying or preservation of fruit, &c.," upon the following conditions:—

Application to be made in writing to the Immigration Agent, specifying the number and description of persons proposed for introduction, the place from whence they are to be selected, the kind of business in which they are skilled, naming the applicants' agent; a bond with one surety, in the form annexed, must be executed, and payment of a similar deposit as is required in respect to nominations under Regulations No. II., must be made.

No application will, however, be entertained except on the special approval of the Commissioner of Trade and Customs.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS certain premises have been erected at the public expense, at Avoca, as and for a lock-up for police purposes: And whereas it is deemed expedient to proclaim such premises to be a gaol, within the meaning of an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the said colony, passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders*: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the said premises, called and known as the Police Lock-up, situated at Avoca aforesaid, as and to be a public gaol within the meaning of the said Act.

## THE UNITED TOWN AND GOLD FIELD COMMON OF MALDON ALTERED.

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act*, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby alter the common hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE UNITED TOWN AND GOLD FIELD COMMON OF MALDON (described in two several Proclamations bearing date respectively the twenty-eighth day of January and the third day

of June, 1861, and united by a Proclamation bearing date the nineteenth day of January, 1863) is hereby altered by adding thereto the land hereafter described as No. I., and by deducting from the said common the land hereafter described as No. II., viz:—

No. I. Area added to the United Town and Gold Field Common for Maldon (in lieu of an equal area deducted therefrom):— One thousand five hundred and sixty acres, more or less, being the following allotments in the parishes of Maldon and Baringhup, viz.: Allotments 2, 3, 4, and 5 of section 1A; 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 of section 8, parish of Maldon; allotments 5, 6, and 14 of section 1A, Baringhup, and allotments 12 and 13 of section E, parish of Baringhup; as shown on plan deposited in Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.

No. II. Area deducted from the United Town and Gold Field Common for Maldon (in lieu of an equal area added thereto):— One thousand five hundred and sixty acres, more or less, being the unappropriated Crown lands comprised within the following described area: Commencing at the north-east angle of allotment 2, section 3, parish of Maldon; thence east to the boundary between the parishes of Maldon and Walmer; thence south by that boundary to the south-east angle of portion 6; thence west one hundred and eleven chains thirty-five links; thence north ten chains; thence west eighteen chains; thence north nineteen chains twenty-seven links to the south-east angle of allotment 4 of section 4, Maldon; thence west to the south-west angle of allotment 4, section 3; thence north to the point of commencement.—(63.G.8245.)

MUNICIPALITY OF AMHERST.

BYE-LAW No. 23.—A BYE-LAW FOR THE PREVENTION OF FIRES.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the prevention of fires: And whereas property is greatly endangered by the ignition of soot and other accumulations in chimneys and flues not being properly swept and cleansed: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Amherst, that the occupier of any premises in the said municipal district shall keep the chimneys or flues of such premises from becoming foul. Any person or persons guilty of the neglect of this bye-law shall forfeit and pay, on conviction before two or more justices of the peace, a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 23, made by the municipal council of Amherst, has been assented to by the Governor in Council, on the 21st day of September, 1863.

MUNICIPALITY OF BELFAST.

BYE-LAW No. 28.—FOR THE ERECTION OF TOLL-BARS WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL BOUNDARIES.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is in clause 29 of the said Act provided that it shall be competent for every municipal council to establish tolls, rates, and dues upon any road within the jurisdiction of such council: And whereas it is considered necessary that toll-gates should be erected on the Rosebrook road, Mount Napier road, Yambuk road, and Hummocks road, within the jurisdiction and under the control of the municipal council, and that a toll should be levied on all waggons, drays, carts, gigs, or other vehicles, and on all horses, cattle, sheep, or pigs passing through the said toll-gates, according to the scale set forth in the annexed schedule A: Be it therefore enacted by the said council, that after the sanction of His Excellency the Governor in Council is obtained, a toll-bar or bars may be erected as before stated, and the tolls set forth in the said schedule A be levied thereat.

No person or persons shall in any manner evade or attempt to evade, or aid, assist, or abet any person or persons in evading or attempting to evade, the payment of any toll authorised by this bye-law; and any person guilty of the neglect or breach of this bye-law shall, upon conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10.

And whereas it is expedient that certain parties should necessarily be exempted from payment of tolls: Be it therefore enacted, that no toll shall be demanded or taken by virtue of this bye-law of or from any person in Her Majesty's service, or

in the employment or service of Government, being in the discharge of his duty, or of or from any person in the employment of the municipal council, or of or from any person going to or returning from any place of public worship, or any funeral, or of or from any minister of religion, or of or from any vehicle laden with manure, or on any return vehicle having a ticket for the day, or of or from any person or persons going to or from the town common for the purpose of taking cattle or other stock to or from the same, or on account of any cattle or other stock the property of any ratepayer going to depasture or returning from depasturing upon the said town common.

MUNICIPALITY OF BELFAST.

BYE-LAW No. 29.—A BYE-LAW FOR THE PRESERVATION OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH, THE RESTRAINING OF NOISOME OR OFFENSIVE TRADES, AND THE PREVENTION OF NUISANCE ARISING THEREFROM.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the preservation of the public

health, the suppression of nuisances, and the restraining of noisome or offensive trades: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Belfast, that if at any time the trade or business of any person or persons, being the owner or occupier of any candle-house, melting-house, melting-place, or soap-house, or any slaughter-house, or any building or place for boiling offal or blood, or for boiling, burning, or crushing bones, or any manufactory, building, or place used for any trade, business, process, or manufacture causing effluvia, shall be carried on so as to be a nuisance, or cause any effluvia injurious to the health of the inhabitants of the neighborhood, such person or persons shall forthwith, after receiving written notice from the local inspector of nuisances, use the best practicable means for abating such nuisance, or preventing or counteracting such effluvia.

Any person guilty of any breach or neglect of this bye-law shall forfeit and pay a penalty or sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF EMERALD HILL.

**BYE-LAW No. 40.—A BYE-LAW TO ENABLE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF EMERALD HILL TO CLOSE UP STREETS, ROADS, WAYS, AND FOOTPATHS WHEN DEEMED NECESSARY FOR FORMING, METALLING, PAVING, AND REPAIRING THE SAME, ALSO FOR LAYING OF WATER OR GAS PIPES, OR FOR THE TAKING UP AND RELAYING OR REPAIRING THE SAME, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.**

**WHEREAS** by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things provided, that the council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act shall have the care and management of the streets, roads, ways, and footpaths within such municipal district, and shall and may make such bye-laws for carrying out these objects as shall to such council seem fit: And whereas it is expedient to make provision for enabling the municipal council of Emerald Hill to close up streets, roads, ways, and footpaths when deemed necessary for forming, metalling, paving, and repairing the same, also for laying of water or gas pipes, or for the taking up and relaying or repairing the same, and for other purposes: And whereas by a proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 26th day of May, 1855, the district of Emerald Hill was duly established a municipal district under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council for the district of Emerald Hill, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of the colony of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act—

It shall be lawful for the said council to order and direct the closing up or stopping of any street, road, way, or footpath, within the limits of the said municipal district, for the purposes hereinbefore recited, against all traffic, at any time when deemed necessary by the said council, by any suitable barrier or barriers, or by notice, or by notices in writing, at the ends or junction of any such street, road, way, or footpath with any other street, road, way, or footpath, and to continue such barrier or barriers, notice or notices, so long as it may be deemed necessary for the aforesaid purposes that such street, road, way, or footpath, should be so closed up or stopped against traffic; and no person or persons shall take down, break, or remove any such barrier or barriers, notice or notices, as aforesaid, or proceed along any such street, road, way, or footpath, without the consent of the said council being first obtained thereto, with any cart, waggon, carriage, or other vehicle, or with any horse, bullock, or beast of burthen, or cattle, whether attached to any such cart, waggon, carriage, or other vehicle, or not, until such barrier or barriers, notice or notices, shall have been removed by order of the said council.

Any person or persons guilty of neglect or breach of this bye-law shall, upon conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

**BYE-LAW No. 41.—FOR LEVYING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING AND THREEPENCE IN THE POUND FOR THE CURRENT MUNICIPAL YEAR.**

**WHEREAS** by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to levy a rate on the assessment of all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district, according to the fair average annual value thereof, such rate not to exceed the sum of Two shillings in the pound of such value: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal

council of Emerald Hill, that a rate of One shilling and threepence in the pound for the current municipal year be, and the same is, hereby imposed and levied on the assessment of all properties in houses and lands within the limits of the said municipal district, to be due and payable on and after the 30th September, 1863.
