PORTS OF ENTRY AND CLEARANCE ON THE MURRAY.

HIS Excellency the Governor in Council having been pleased to appoint the following places to be Ports of Entry and Clearance, under the 9th clause of *The Customs Act, 1857*, and to define the boundaries of such ports, as follows:—

Cowana.—From the boundary of South Australia, on the 141st meridian of longitude, to Chalker Creek.

Narung.—From the place last mentioned to a point opposite to the junction of the Wakool River with the River Murray.

Swan Hill.—From the place last mentioned to Gunbower Creek.

Echuca.—From the place last mentioned to the Broken Creek.

Wahgunyah.—From the place last mentioned to Indigo Creek.

Belvoir.—From the place last mentioned to the junction of the Mitta-mitta Creek with the River Murray.

Notice is hereby given that masters of all vessels arriving at any such ports must in all respects comply with the provisions of the Customs Laws. They should report their arrival to the Customs Officers stationed respectively at Cowana, Narung, Swan Hill, Echuca, Wahgunyah, and Belvoir, who are empowered to enter and clear all vessels trading with such places.

Goods intended for introduction into Victoria, *via* or across the River Murray, must be landed at one of the places named, and in the presence or with the approval of the officers of customs respectively stationed thereat.

[CIRCULAR.]

Downing street,
15th February, 1859.

SIR,—I have received the Queen's commands to inform you that it is Her Majesty's wish to mark in some distinctive manner the service of the Crown in the colonies, as being in every respect on an equality with that of the mother country. Her Majesty has been, therefore, graciously pleased to confer on Her Majesty's civil servants in the colonies the right to wear

the civil uniform prescribed for Her Majesty's servants in Great Britain, under the following regulations:—

The uniform of the first class will be worn by the Governors of Canada, Jamaica, New South Wales, Tasmania, South Australia, Victoria, New Zealand, Ceylon, Mauritius, Malta, the Cape of Good Hope, British Guiana, and the Governors-in-Chief of the Windward and Leeward Islands, and by the Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands.

The second class will be worn by the governors of colonies not comprised in the foregoing list, and by lieutenant-governors. The existing military uniform of governors and lieutenant-governors of the two classes before named is retained, and may be worn according to the option of the officer. The colonial uniform of a grade beneath that of a governor is abolished, except in cases hereinafter mentioned. Officers administering the government of colonies, not holding the rank of lieutenant-governor, are to wear the civil uniform of the third class, and this class is assigned to such members of "executive councils" and councils of government as hold office under the Crown.

As it is impossible in this country to specify in detail the offices to which this privilege can be assigned, I have to instruct you to transmit to me with as little delay as possible, and confidentially, the offices to which you think it should be extended.

In colonies having responsible governments this class will include only the members of the provincial or colonial cabinet. In other colonies the governors will select those officers having seats at the chief council of the colony, or holding positions which may be considered equivalent in rank to those officers of which colonial cabinets are composed.

Colonial servants not having a seat in the cabinet, and heads of principal departments in other colonies, such as colonial secretaries, treasurers, auditors-general, and officers of same degree, not members of executive council or councils of government, shall be entitled to wear the uniform of the fourth class.

The chief assistants in principal departments, and the heads of subordinate departments, will wear the uniform of the fifth class.

In the two last classes a certain latitude will be allowed to governors in their recommendations of officers, it being borne in mind that in a case coming strictly within the foregoing regulations, no permission is to be given to wear the uniform of those two classes, nor is any promise to be made without reference to this office.

With regard to governors and lieutenant-governors and officers administering governments, the permission comes in force from the date of this despatch. In the case of colonial cabinets and of offices strictly analogous in other colonies, i.e., office holders, members of the principal council in the colony, the permission likewise is granted from the same date, but in cases where the right to a uniform is not clear to the mind of a governor the permission is suspended for the decision of the Secretary of State.

Colonists who may on any former occasion have held an office to which the uniform may be allowed under the present despatch, will be entitled to assume it on notifying their wish to the governor, who will transmit their names to the Secretary of State.

It must be strictly understood that no colonial functionary, whatever his rank, shall be entitled to this uniform in virtue of any office not held directly or indirectly under the Crown. No elective councillor, not an officeholder, can have any claim to an official dress exclusively reserved for the service of the Crown.

Colonists, however, who have hitherto been allowed to wear the old colonial uniform may still wear it; and you may confer the right of wearing that uniform on such magistrates and local officers as you may consider of a position corresponding to that of a deputy-lieutenant in this country.

The official regulation issued by the Lord Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household with regard to civil uniforms is herewith transmitted [with original]. It will therein appear that there are two distinct dresses, one called the full dress, the other the levee dress; the former worn only at the Queen's drawing-rooms and state occasions in this country. This being very expensive, and the occasions upon which it could be worn being very rare, it is presumed that the levee dress only would be preferred for colonial use.

Srs.—Referring to the Circular Despatch which was addressed to you on the 15th February, 1863, on the subject of Official Uniforms, I have to acquaint you that the question has recently been brought under consideration by a late member of the Executive Council of New South Wales, whether he was still entitled to wear the uniform which, under the terms of that circular, he had been permitted to wear while holding office.

I submitted that question to the Lord Chamberlain, and requested to receive such a decision as might be applicable to the present and to other cases of a similar nature.

I have to acquaint you that his lordship has intimated to me that no person is entitled to wear the uniform of any office after his resignation of that office without the consent of the Queen.

It will therefore be necessary that those members of the Government who desire to retain that privilege, should upon their resignation request through you Her Majesty's permission to do so.

I take this opportunity of informing you that I hope before long to be able to communicate to you some general decision with regard to the extension of the permission to wear the uniform. That decision has been suspended in some degree from the delay in receiving from some colonies the necessary answers to the previous Circular.

[CIRCULAR.]

Srs.—In my predecessor's circular despatch of the 14th July, 1860, you were informed that no person was entitled to wear the uniform of any colonial office after having ceased to hold that office, unless with the consent of the Queen, which consent, however, might be applied for through the Governor.

It has recently happened that applications of this kind have been made, not through the Governor, but directly through the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and in some cases by officers who, while in Her Majesty's service, had not acquired the right to wear the uniform to which their application referred.

I have now been informed by the Lord Chamberlain, that the Queen is averse in principle to the continuance of the civil uniform generally beyond the tenure of office, and that it is Her Majesty's wish that all such applications from colonial officers should proceed in the first instance from the Governors of Colonies only; those cases alone being recommended for Her Majesty's sanction where length or merit of service would appear to render it desirable that the privilege should be continued. I am further to instruct you, that no officer should be recommended for the privilege of wearing any uniform which was not attached to his office during the tenure of it. You will be guided strictly by these decisions in any recommendation which you may make on this subject on behalf of any colonial officer.

HORSHAM GAOL.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS a certain building has been erected at the public expense, at Horsham, as and for a lock-up for police purposes: And whereas it is deemed expedient to proclaim such building to be a gaol within the meaning of an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the said colony, passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders*, and of another Act passed in the seventeenth year of the same reign, intituled, *An Act to amend an Act, intituled, "An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders:"* Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Acts, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim, declare, and notify that all buildings, erections, and premises situate in the position hereinafter described, erected, built, or maintained at the public expense, as and for a police lock-up at Horsham, are and shall be deemed to be a public gaol within the meaning and in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, that is to say:—

HORSHAM GAOL.—Comprising all buildings, erections, and premises on the following site, viz.:—Two roods, county unnamed (Wimmera district), parish of Horsham, being allotment 1, block 7, township of Horsham: Commencing at the south-west angle of block 7; bounded on the south by Splatt street, bearing east two chains; on the east by part of allotment 3, bearing north two chains fifty links; on the north by allotment 2, bearing west two chains; and on the west by Firebrace street, bearing south two chains fifty links to the point of commencement. The bearings true meridian.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twelfth day of September, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in the twenty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign.

PILOT BOARD REGULATIONS.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to cancel all rules and regulations of the Pilot Board hitherto in force, and to approve of the publication in their stead of the following Amended Rules and Regulations made by the Board, in conformity with the Act 17 Victoria No. 28, sec. 12.

By virtue of the authority vested in the Pilot Board of Victoria by section 12, Act 28 of 17 Victoria, the following rules for the regulation of the Pilot Service have been adopted:—

1. *Meeting of the board.*—The Pilot Board shall meet once in every month for the transaction of general business, but the president may convene a special meeting at any intermediate time in the event of such being necessary.

2. *Secretary.*—The executive duties of the Pilot Board shall be performed by the secretary, who, in all cases of doubt, must apply for instructions to the president, or in his absence to a member of the board.

3. *Transmission of moneys by H.M. Customs.*—All moneys received for pilotage shall be transmitted to the president by the Collector of H.M. Customs on or before the 12th of each month, accompanied by a tabular statement containing each vessel's name, tonnage, date of entrance inwards and clearance outwards, and amount of pilotage collected.

4. *Receipt and payment of moneys to bank.*—All other moneys received under the act shall be paid by the secretary, on the day received, into such bank as the board may from time to time determine.

5. *Accounts.*—All monthly accounts shall be made up by the secretary and balanced by the 20th of each month, and laid before the board at its next general meeting.

6. *Mode of payment of all moneys.*—All payments duly authorised by the board shall be made by cheque signed by the president, or acting chairman of the board, and one member, who shall also compare them with the books, see that they correspond, and initial the latter; and the amount of all such payments shall be entered in the minutes of the day's proceedings, as also the cash balance at the bank in that day.

7. *Deposit of securities.*—All debentures, deeds, and money securities, shall be deposited by the secretary in the name of the Pilot Board of Victoria in such bank as the board may from time to time determine.

8. *Withdrawal of deposits.*—No debentures or money securities shall be withdrawn from the bank without a written order addressed to the manager of the bank, signed by the president and one member of the board.

9. *Quarterly audit of accounts.*—The board shall at the first meeting after every quarter audit and verify the books and cash balances at the bank.

10. *Duties of secretary.*—The secretary will have all papers and documents under his charge. He shall make out all accounts, and keep the books in such form as may be prescribed by the board, and place cash and bank books, and exemption certificate books, upon the table for inspection every board day.

11. *Division and classification of pilots.*—The pilots shall be divided into three classes, sea, harbor, and river or bar pilots; the first and second classes to pilot vessels of all descriptions, and the third to pilot vessels in rivers or channels where their services are required.

12. *Receipt of earnings.*—Each pilot shall receive his individual earnings, subject to such proportionate reduction towards the support of the pilot establishment as the board may direct; and it shall be distinctly understood that no pilot shall receive any pilotage or detention money, which shall only be paid at the Custom House or to some duly appointed officer of H.M. Customs.

13. *Certified statement of pilots' expenses.*—A duly certified written statement shall be furnished by each pilot to the board on or before the 10th of each month, in such form as the board may direct, of all expenses incurred by him during the preceding month in connexion with the pilot service, pilots' boats and vessels, &c., accompanied by vouchers, in such form as the board may direct.

14. *Pilots may work in companies.*—Pilots may work in companies, and each company shall have the privilege of piloting outwards all vessels it may have piloted inwards, unless sufficient reason should be shown by the master to the contrary; and on due application being made for an outward pilot by any such vessel, and the inward pilot not available for appointment, the pilot first on turn of the same company shall be appointed to her; and should there be no pilot belonging to such company at the station, or should the vessel requiring a pilot not belong to any company, the pilot first on turn of any company shall be appointed. Pilots so appointed are immediately to repair on board, and are not to leave the vessel without the written permission of the master, unless in cases of severe illness; but should she not be ready, the pilot must obtain a written statement to that effect from the master or officer in charge, and immediately report himself at the pilot office as eligible for appointment to another vessel.

15. *Companies to provide vessels, &c.*—Each company of pilots shall provide its own vessels, boats, &c.

16. *Approval and licenses of pilot vessels and boats.*—All vessels and boats employed in the pilotage service shall be previously approved and licensed by the pilot board, who may at its discretion appoint and remove masters and officers of such vessels and boats.

17. *Distinguishing characteristics of vessels.*—Every pilot vessel or boat shall be distinguished by the following characteristics, that is to say:—

1. Each vessel or boat shall be painted upwards from the water line (with the exception of such name or numbers as are hereinafter mentioned), a light stone-color.

2. On the stern, the name of the vessel or boat, and the port to which she belongs, painted in black letters, at least one inch broad and three inches long; and on each bow the number in figures of such vessel or boat, also painted black.

3. On her mainsail the number of her license painted in conspicuous black figures.

4. When aloft, a flag at the masthead, or on a sprit or staff, or in some equally conspicuous situation, shall be shown; such flag to be of large dimensions compared with the size of the vessel carrying the same, and to be of two colors, the upper horizontal half white, and the other horizontal half red.

5. It shall be the duty of the masters of the vessels for the time being, to attend to the following particulars:—

First, That the boat or vessel possesses all the above characteristics. Secondly, That the aforesaid flag be kept clean and distinct, so as to be easily discerned at a proper distance. Thirdly, That the names and numbers before mentioned are not at any time concealed. Fourthly, That a bright light be kept exhibited in the fore rigging between sunset and sunrise, and a flash light shown in the waist every half hour during the same period. Fifthly, That his vessel be kept in thorough repair, and in every way fit for service; a special report being made by him to the board every three months, as to the condition of hull, boats, sails, &c.; and Lastly, that a log be kept by the mate in duplicate of all occurrences on board, and such log to be kept in conformity with the instructions of the Board, the duplicate being transmitted to the secretary to the board at the end of each month, duly signed by the master and mate.

18. *Station of the pilot vessels.*—All pilots and pilot vessels shall be stationed at such place within the limits of their licenses, as the Pilot Board may from time to time determine.

19. *Vessels to be furnished with signals.*—Each pilot vessel shall be always furnished with such signals, signal-books, and means of making signals as the board may from time to time determine.

20. *Nearest vessel to be attended to first.*—Pilots shall offer their services to the vessel nearest them having a pilot signal flying, unless another vessel is observed running into danger, in which case every exertion shall be made to board and assist the latter vessel.

21. *Pilots to assist vessels in distress.*—Pilots shall at all times, by every means in their power, aid and assist vessels in distress.

22. *Pilots not to refuse to act.*—No pilot shall neglect, delay, or refuse to act, unless disqualified by illness, in which latter case a report shall at once be made to the board, accompanied by a certificate from a duly qualified medical practitioner.

23. *Lead lines and steering gear to be examined.*—Pilots shall at all times, when they take charge of a vessel, see that the lead lines in use be properly marked and adapted for service, and that the lead be kept properly hove when under weigh, and also that the steering apparatus be in order.

24. *Duties of pilots in charge of inward-bound vessels.*—Every pilot who shall be employed to pilot or conduct a vessel into any port shall take the same her draft of water, admitting to such anchorage or wharf as the master or other person in charge (subject to the orders of the harbor master) shall require, or so near thereto as he can safely get, and there moor the vessel in a proper situation.

25. *Her Majesty's vessels and mail packets to have preference.*—Pilots are to bear in mind that Her Majesty's vessels, and mail packets regularly employed in such service, shall always obtain the preference over other vessels, unless such other vessels shall be in danger and in urgent need of assistance.

26. *Duty of sea pilot to ascertain final destination of vessel before mooring.*—The sea pilot, before anchoring any vessel in Hobson's Bay, shall ascertain from the master whether he intends having the vessel taken alongside any of the wharfs or piers, or moored in the inner harbor, as the vessel's final destination; if so, he shall not leave the vessel until she has been properly moored in the berth determined on by the master, except the vessel has to break bulk, or should have gunpowder on board to discharge, in which case he shall anchor her in such berth as may be in accordance with the rules of the port.

27. *Duty of sea pilot when vessel is bound outwards.*—The sea-pilot shall also, as a general rule, pilot all ships proceeding to the outer anchorage, also ships bound direct to sea, from the berth they occupy at any pier or wharf, or from any berth in the inner harbor.

28. *Harbor pilots.*—The harbor pilots shall take charge of such vessels, on their arrival, as from having gunpowder on board, or from other reasons, may not be prepared to go to their final destination; and on receiving orders from the master or officer in charge shall berth and moor the same in such situation in the inner harbor as the master or such officer may direct, subject to the regulations of the port. He shall also remove all vessels in the inner harbor not included in the sea pilots' duty.

29. *Pilots to report the name of vessels on arrival upwards in report book in office.*—Pilots shall, immediately on their vessels being moored after arrival inwards, fill up and sign their reports in a book to be kept open at the Pilot Office for that purpose, and also report in writing, for the information of the board, any extraordinary circumstances that may have occurred on board while under his charge.

30. *Pilots to demand to see clearance when outward bound.*—Pilots shall, before taking charge of a vessel outward bound, demand a sight of the clearance from the Customs, in order to see if the certificate of pilotage be duly endorsed thereon; and should such fail to be the case, immediate intimation shall be given to that effect at the Pilot Office.

31. *Pilots to relinquish charge of one ship for another, if required.*—No pilot having taken pilotage charge of a vessel afterwards proving not to be ready shall refuse to take any other

vessel, if ready, and waiting for a pilot, on his being required to do so by proper authority.

32. *Pilots not to interfere when passengers.*—Should a pilot at any time be taking a passage on board a vessel he shall not in any way interfere with or make comments on the proceedings of the pilot in charge of such vessel, unless his advice or opinion be specially requested by such pilot in charge, or unless circumstances render such interference necessary, and then only at the written request of the master.

33. *Certificate of pilotage to be filed in Pilot Office.*—A certificate of pilotage, duly signed by the master of each vessel piloted, shall, immediately on her arrival, be forwarded or delivered by the pilot to the secretary to the board, at the Pilot Office; and all pilots shall be particularly careful in seeing that it is mentioned in the certificate whether it be inside or outside pilotage, and also whether the services of a steam tug have been rendered, and to what extent.

34. *Pilots as passengers to have precedence.*—A pilot arriving at either station as passenger shall be in turn before any pilots that may have brought ships in on that day, and no pilot in pilotage charge of a vessel shall interfere with or offer any obstruction to pilots obtaining passages in such vessel.

35. *Pilots to notify usual place of abode.*—Pilots shall keep the board informed, in writing, of their usual place of abode.

36. *Pilots not to absent themselves from port, &c.*—Pilots shall not absent themselves from the port for which they are licensed, without the written sanction of the board.

37. *Pilots not to form combinations.* (16 Victoria No. 17).—Pilot shall not form any insubordinate or illegal combination, nor attempt to prevent other pilots or persons in the pilot service under the control of the board, from doing their duty.

38. *Not to lend their licenses.*—No pilot shall lend his license to any person under any pretence whatever.

39. *Pilots to enter into a bond.*—All pilots shall enter into an approved bond for the sum of One hundred pounds sterling, for the due and faithful discharge of their duties, and the due observance of these rules.

40. *Mode of making complaints regarding the pilot service.* *President to call special meeting if necessary.*—All complaints by or against any one connected with the pilot service, must be forwarded in writing to the president of the Pilot Board within seven days of the occurrence of the same, otherwise such complaint shall not be entertained unless at the discretion of the board. The president shall, on any complaint being made to him in accordance with this rule, if the subject requires immediate investigation, call a special meeting of the board, giving the various persons connected with the case due notice to appear at such meeting.

41. *Pilots and others in service to obey summons of the board.*—All persons in the pilot service shall appear before the board on receiving notice so to do, and abide by the decision given in all matters relating to the pilot service, subject, however, to the right of appeal allowed by Act of Council No. 23, 17 Victoria, sec. 12.

42. *Mode of payment of witnesses.*—The expenses of witnesses summoned by the board to give evidence upon cases connected with the pilot service (not having reference to the preceding rules), shall be borne out of the reserved fund in such proportions as the board may determine.

43. *Uniform.*—All pilots, when on duty, shall wear such uniform as the board may direct.

44. *Pilots to observe all port regulations.*—Pilots shall strictly observe all port regulations, and prevent by all means in their power any infringement of the same, on board any vessel they may be in charge of.

45. *Pilots to note and report alterations in sea and land marks, &c., &c.*—The licensed pilots of Port Phillip shall be particularly careful in noting and reporting to the Chief Harbor Master any alterations in the position of any beacons, buoy, sea or land marks, or of any shoals within the limit of their license, as also the existence of any new shoal, sunken wreck, or other obstruction likely to impede the navigation of the waters and channels of the port by vessels, boats, &c.; and they are to embrace every available opportunity of examining by soundings and cross bearings all channels as far as the limits named in their licenses may extend.

46. *Furnish periodical reports of state of channels, &c.*—Pilots shall furnish a written report every three months to the Chief Harbor Master of the state of all channels, and sea and land marks, as may have fallen under their observation.

47. *Method to be adopted in reporting accidents to vessels.*—Pilots shall, immediately after any vessel may have sustained damage, met with any accident, or got on shore while in their charge, furnish a clear and explicit report of the same, such report to state the cause, in the pilot's opinion, of such damage, accident, or grounding; time of occurrence thereof; bearings of the nearest known object; means used to get the vessel afloat; state of wind, weather, and tide; length of time the vessel lay on the ground; such report to be submitted to the master or officer in charge for his remarks and counter signature, and forwarded at once to the Pilot Office, whether so remarked on or countersigned or not.

48. *Pilot to be in possession of his license, copy of rules, &c., and produce the same if required.*—Every pilot shall be in possession of his license, of a copy of all rules of the service, and of the port regulations; and shall produce the same for reference, if required so to do, by the master of any vessel of which such pilot may assume charge.

49. *Method of appointing pilots.*—When the Pilot Board may consider that additional pilots are required for the service, notice shall be inserted in the *Government Gazette*, and two daily papers, calling for persons considering themselves qualified to act as such to forward to the board a written statement of their

intention to apply for a license, accompanied with certificates of character; when, if such be deemed satisfactory by the board, a day will be appointed for examination into the fitness of all such candidates, at which examination one or more senior pilots shall always be present.

50. *Behavior of pilots, 16 Victoria No. 92, sec. 16.*—To be suspended on being charged with misconduct.—Pilots shall at all times observe strict sobriety and civility; and if charged with use of unbecoming or improper language, or any misconduct affecting the character of the service, or shall through negligence, incapacity, or unskillfulness, occasion injury to any vessel he may be in charge of, or to any other vessel, shall be immediately suspended by the president, or in his absence by a member of the board, pending an investigation into the case at the next meeting of the board.

51. *Pilots to protect revenue.*—Pilots, and all persons employed in the pilot service, shall by all lawful means in their power endeavor to prevent any infringement of the revenue, or Customs Act, by any person whatsoever, and should any breach of such laws come under their notice or observation they shall immediately give information thereof to the nearest officer of Her Majesty's Customs.

REGULATIONS UNDER WHICH CERTIFICATES OF COMPETENCY WILL BE GIVEN TO PERSONS TO ACT AS PILOTS OF SHIPS THEY COMMAND, WITHIN THE PORTS OF VICTORIA.

1. All persons desirous of obtaining an exemption certificate must produce properly attested testimonials of character, of sobriety, experience, ability, and good conduct on board ship.

2. On application to the Pilot Board, or at any of the custom houses in the colony, candidates for a certificate of competency can be supplied with a form, which they will be required to fill up, and lodge with the foregoing testimonials in the hands of the secretary.

3. The Pilot Board, upon being satisfied that such applicant is fit to act as pilot, may, on the receipt of Twenty pounds, grant a certificate authorizing him to pilot the vessel therein specified, to, from, and within any port mentioned in the said certificate, without incurring any penalties for non-employment of a licensed pilot; provided such ship be owned and registered in this or some other Australian colony, and be then on a voyage from, and bound to some port in Australia.

4. All certificates hereafter granted shall be in force for a year only, or until the first return of the master to Port Phillip after its expiration, unless the same be renewed, which may be done from time to time by endorsement under the hands of one member of the board, countersigned by the secretary.

5. In the event of any master taking command of a larger ship than that mentioned in any certificate granted after this date, it shall be necessary for such master to pass any further examination that may be considered expedient by the Pilot Board to prove his competency to navigate such ship.

The mortality of August, 1864, was rather below an average of the same month extending over five years. The mean temperature was about equal to the average of the same period. The mean atmospheric pressure was nearly a tenth of an inch lower than the average.

Deaths of males amounted to 56 per cent., those of females to 44 per cent. of the total. Only 34 per cent. of the deaths were of children under five, a lower proportion than has been known to obtain in any previous month. In August, 1863, the mortality of children under five was 38 per cent. of the total; in August, 1862, it was 43 per cent.; in August, 1861, it was 49 per cent.; and in August, 1860, it was also 49 per cent.

Ten deaths was the maximum, and three deaths the minimum, of daily mortality recorded. The former number occurred on four days, and the latter on three.

The oldest male who died during the month was one aged 77, of mortification; the oldest female was aged 84, and died of pneumonia; another female, aged 79, died of old age.

The number of violent deaths which took place was thirteen, of these three were caused by drowning, viz.:—A boy of 15 in the Yarra, a boy of 10 at Williamstown, and a girl of 9 at Keilor. Four were of suffocation, viz.:—A male of 63 and another of 22, while engaged in illicit distillation; a female aged 27, while drunk; and an infant shortly after birth. A male aged 45 was killed by a cart passing over him; a male patient in the Yarra Bend, aged 35, died of a fractured skull; a male, aged 35, committed suicide by hanging; a male aged 40, another male aged 45, and another aged 55, were executed.

The number of deaths which occurred in public institutions was 62, or 29 per cent. of the whole number recorded, viz.:—32 in the Melbourne Hospital, 6 in the Benevolent Asylum, 14 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 4 in the Immigrants' Home, 1 in the Lying-in Hospital, 1 in the Roman Catholic Orphan Asylum, 3 in the Melbourne Gaol, and 1 in the Collingwood Stockade.

Of the 73 children who died under the age of five years, 38, or 52 per cent., were males, and 35, or 48 per cent., were females; 37 were under one year of age, 19 were between one and two years, 4 were between two and three, 8 were between three and four, and 5 were between four and five.

The persons beyond five years of age who died during the month numbered 140, of whom 81, or nearly 58 per cent. were males, and 59, or about 42 per cent. were females; 12 were between five and ten years of age, 4 were between ten and fifteen, 5 were between fifteen and twenty, 7 were between twenty and twenty-five, 16 were between twenty-five and thirty, 17 were between thirty and thirty-five, 18 were between thirty-five and forty, 15 were between forty and forty-five, 14 were between forty-five and fifty, 9 were between fifty and fifty-five, 9 were between fifty-five and sixty, 11 were between sixty and sixty-five, 3 were between seventy and seventy-five, and 3 were seventy-five and upwards.

ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAW No. 3.—RELATING TO THE OCCUPATION OF SITES UNDER BUSINESS LICENSES AND UNDER MINER'S RIGHTS FOR RESIDENCE IN THE ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.—(13th September, 1864.)

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Ararat, begun and holden at the mining board room, Ararat, in the said district, on the thirteenth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, it is ordained by the said board, as follows, that is to say:—

1. The mining registrar shall, when requested in writing by any six (6) or more holders of business licenses, survey and mark out a line of street for occupation under business licenses.
2. The frontage of a business site to any such street shall not exceed thirty-six (36) feet, the depth shall be one hundred and fifty (150) feet, except in the case of corner sites, the depth of which shall not in any case exceed seventy-five (75) feet.
3. A block of neutral ground shall be left between each site occupied under a business license, which shall not have less than twelve (12) feet frontage to the street.
4. No street shall be marked out within a quarter of a mile of any quartz reefs in actual work, or which have not been abandoned for a longer period than six (6) months.
5. All streets shall be surveyed and laid out in straight lines, and as nearly as possible at right angles to each other.
6. All applicants for sites surveyed by the mining registrar shall draw lots for the priority of choice, unless the applicants or any of them have previously erected buildings thereon, in which case such applicants shall be left in possession of the sites they occupy, or unless the applicants can agree mutually without such drawing of lots.

A fee of Ten (10) shillings shall be paid to the registrar by each applicant for the survey of a street if such number of applicants be under twenty (20), and of Six (6) shillings by each applicant if the number exceed twenty (20). Additional sites may be taken up in any street after the first applicants have been satisfied, on payment of Three (3) shillings by each applicant. A registry of all sites taken up subsequently to the passing of this bye-law must be kept by the registrar without further cost to the selector than hereinbefore mentioned. After obtaining any site by ballot or selection, the occupant thereof must, within ten (10) days, commence to erect a building thereon, or the site will be forfeitable.

8. A holder of a business license may take up and occupy any site outside surveyed streets, the area of which does not exceed twenty (20) perches, on any Crown lands within the Ararat Mining District, provided the same are not reserved for roads or other public purposes or within a quarter of a mile of any quartz reef in actual work.

9. No site shall be occupied in any surveyed street by any other than a holder of a business license or person privileged under the Golds Fields Act No. 32, except in the case of a holder of a miner's right located in such street previous to such survey, or when a business site has ceased to be occupied for business purposes for at least three (3) months, in which case a registry of the business site must be made with the registrar, on payment of the sum of One (1) shilling.

10. Any holder of a miner's right shall be entitled to hold, for the purposes of residence, an area of ground not exceeding twenty (20) perches; such area may be occupied on any Crown lands within the Ararat Mining District not reserved for roads or other public purposes.

11. Any miner may be absent from his residence area without forfeiting the same, by registering it with the mining registrar and paying a fee of One (1) shilling.

Bye-law No. XI. of the 11th October, 1858, regulating the occupation of sites under business licenses, and under miners' rights, for residence, is hereby repealed (but without prejudice to any right or title obtained thereunder).

The undersigned members of the said mining board concurred in making the foregoing bye-law.

Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender, and every tender will be taken to include the entire service as called for.

Every tender must bear the *bond fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Persons tendering are requested to state whether they propose to convey the mails on horseback or in a carriage; in the latter case, they are to state the description of vehicle they intend to use and the number of horses by which it is to be drawn.

It is particularly requested that the tenders for each service may be written on separate forms, and that the number of the service may be plainly endorsed on the outside of the cover.

MISCELLANEOUS.

SHIRE OF COLAC.

A COPY OF THE BYE-LAWS OF THE COUNCIL OF THE SHIRE OF COLAC.

THE ordinary meetings of the council shall be held at the office of the council, on the second Saturday of every month, at ten o'clock in the forenoon; but should a quorum not be present at the expiration of one hour after the time appointed for meeting no business shall be transacted at the meeting, and the names of all councillors present shall be recorded in the minute book by the secretary.

2. At every ordinary meeting of the council the first business thereof shall be the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting for confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of proceedings.

3. At all meetings of the council, the reading, considering, and ordering upon correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, the receiving and reading of petitions and memorials, bringing up of reports of committees and of officers, and ordering payment of accounts, shall have precedence of regular business.

4. Any petition or memorial addressed to the council must be presented by a councillor, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded, and no debate shall take place thereon except as to its being received and taken into consideration after the orders of the day, or at any future meeting, or if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.

5. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, all business of which due notice has been given, and any subject which the president may think fit to bring under consideration.

6. All notices of motions shall be given to the secretary in writing at least seven clear days before the day appointed for the meeting at which such business is to be considered. Provided that for all motions for revocation or alteration of any previous business, or order of the council, the secretary shall have ten clear days.

7. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the councillor who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called on. Notices not proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.

8. Every councillor, including the president, shall stand while addressing the council.

9. The president's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice.

10. Every motion or amendment shall be entered on the minutes with the names of the mover and seconder, and on a division, the secretary may be required by any councillor to record the votes.

11. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote, but upon any amendment being carried it shall be competent for any councillor to move one other amendment thereon.

12. Any councillor moving any motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken on that motion or amendment.

13. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, excepting by way of explanation or reply upon an original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of an amendment last proposed; and after the reply, the amendment, or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to vote.

14. Any councillor when proposing a motion or amendment, or if speaking on any matter, shall address the president, and

shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall be silent until the councillor calling to order shall have been heard, and the question of order decided; the councillor in possession of the chair shall then proceed with the subject.

15. Any councillor who shall refuse to obey when ruled out of order, or who shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, and who, if required by the president, shall refuse to withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5, to be imposed by the president.

16. Any councillor may require the secretary to take down any particular words used by a councillor, immediately upon the same being used.

17. All questions before the council shall be decided by show of hands, and the president shall, on taking the vote on any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative; and he may do so as often as may be necessary, to enable him to decide which party has the majority. Provided always, that if at any meeting for the election of president there should be an equality of votes, it shall be decided by lot which of the councillors having an equal number of votes shall be the president.

18. Any councillor may enter his protest against any resolution of the council. Notice of intention to protest must, however, be given in every case on the adoption of the resolution to be protested against; and the protest signed by the councillor or councillors protesting, and specifying the reasons for protesting, shall be entered in the minute book.

19. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the council; but if on the question being put the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment be carried. The business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the council.

20. It shall be competent for any councillor, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any subject, at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof, and of the date for which the order of the day or notice of motion for which such call is made is set down for consideration, shall be given by the secretary to each councillor, and any councillor not in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes on for discussion, or at the voting on such question, or any amendment thereon, shall be fined in the sum of ten shillings, to be imposed by the president, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown.

21. No election to any vacant office at the disposal of the council, the yearly emolument of which shall exceed £50, shall take place until six clear days' public notice shall have been given by advertisement, according to section 170 of Act 16 Victoria No. 176.

22. All tenders shall be addressed to the president, and only opened at the time of their consideration by the council; the respective amounts, together with the names of the parties tendering, to be entered in every case on the minutes of the council. The security in all cases of contract shall be Ten pounds per cent. upon the amount of the contract, paid over by the contractor to the treasurer of the council, which amount shall be deposited in the bank to the guarantee account, and only repaid to the contractor when he obtains his final certificate that the works under such contract are satisfactorily completed. No officer or councillor shall have any pecuniary interest, either directly or indirectly, in any contract under the council.

23. Advances may be made to contractors, at a rate not exceeding 90 per cent. on the inspector's estimate of the value of the work then done.

24. The valuers shall, after having valued the rateable properties in the shire, give notice to the occupants or owners thereof of the amount at which such properties are valued, at least seven days before the day appointed by the council for striking the rate on such valuation for the current year.

25. All payments shall be made by cheque, signed by the president and one other councillor, and countersigned by the secretary, and no such cheque shall be given unless the account for which it is given be passed at an ordinary meeting of the council.

26. In all cases it shall be considered sufficient for the collector to call once for payment of amount due on the assessment roll, and in event of any such amount not being paid to him a notice shall be left stating that unless the amount be paid before the expiration of fourteen days from the date thereof, legal proceedings shall be taken for its recovery. The collector shall, once a week at least, pay to the treasurer of the council all moneys received by him from time to time, and at the same time furnish the secretary with an account of such moneys, and at each ordinary meeting report the same to the council.

27. The secretary shall present a statement of the monetary affairs of the council at each ordinary meeting of the council.

28. Any bye-law may be suspended *pro tem.* in case of emergency, with the consent of the majority of the council present at any meeting.

The above Bye-laws were made by a special order of the council, at a meeting held at the Shire Office, Colac, on Saturday, the tenth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

CITY OF MELBOURNE.

At a meeting of the Council of the city of Melbourne, held in the Council Chamber in the Town Hall, Swanston street, in the said city, on the 29th day of August, 1864, at which were present:—The Right Worshipful the Mayor, Alderman John Thomas Smith, presiding; Aldermen, Richard Eades, Richard Evans Hill, John Harbison, and Michael Keeley; Councillors, William Bayles, John Donovan Brown, Edward Cohen, Joshua Cowell, John Edwards, John George Goldsmith, George Hughes, Charles Edwin Jones, Thomas Kenny, Joseph Story, Samuel Thorp, James Weedow, George Wragge, and William Williams, being more than one-third of the members of the said council, it was resolved and ordered, that whereas by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, 14 Victoria No. 20, intituled, *An Act for regulating the formation, drainage, and repair of streets, courts, and alleys on private property within the city of Melbourne*, it is amongst other things enacted that where any street, court, or alley on private property, in the city of Melbourne, shall not be or shall not have been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired to the satisfaction of the council of the said city, it shall be lawful for the said council at any time, and from time to time, by any order under the hand of the mayor, or town clerk of the said city for the time being respectively, to order that any such street, court, or alley, or any part thereof, shall be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, in such manner and within such time as to the said council may appear expedient; and thereupon the owners of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon such street, court, or alley, on each side thereof, shall, in such manner and within such time as shall be expressed in such order, at their respective costs, charges, and expenses, remove all obstructions, and well and sufficiently pave, flag, macadamise, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete or repair so much of the said street, court, or alley, to the centre thereof, as may be opposite to and co-extensive with their respective tenements, adjoining or abutting on such streets, courts, or alleys respectively.

And whereas by the Act of the Parliament of Victoria No. 178, intituled, *An Act to further alter and amend the Laws relating to the City of Melbourne and of the Town of Geelong respectively, and to extend and apply other existing Acts thereto*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the words "tenements adjoining or abutting on such street, court, or alley," where used in the first hereinbefore-recited Act, shall be held and taken to mean all tenements or premises actually abutting upon, and accessible from, and communicating with such street, court, or alley, whether the owners or occupiers thereof have or have not a right to use or do commonly use the same: And that the word "owner," used in the said Act shall apply to and be held to include agent of an owner, but only in so far as to enable such agent to apply to the defrayal of expenses incurred in the formation, drainage, and repair of such street, court, or alley, under the authority hereof, moneys of his principal, of which he shall be in the receipt or possession, accruing from tenements lawfully chargeable for such expenses.

And that the said Act for regulating the formation, drainage, and repair of streets, courts, and alleys on private property within the city of Melbourne, shall extend and apply to the entire limits of the said city:

And that the apportionment of the expenses incurred by the council of the city of Melbourne, in the formation, drainage and repair of every such street, court, or alley, on private property, shall be made proportionate to the extent of the area of the land of each of the several owners which shall be so situated as to have or be capable of obtaining access to such street, court, or alley, at the time of or in consequence of the formation or repair of such street, court, or alley:

And whereas the streets, courts, or alleys, enumerated in the schedule to the order annexed marked A have not been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired to the satisfaction of the council of the city of Melbourne:

Be it now ordered by the council of this the said city, that the streets, courts, or alleys, enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked A, shall within ten days from the date of this order's coming into operation, be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered in such manner as is expressed in the schedule to this order annexed and marked B. And it is hereby notified to the owners respectively of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon the streets, courts, or alleys, enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed marked A, that if they or any of them shall neglect or omit to remove the obstructions, and pave, flag, macadamise, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete and repair the street, court, or alley on which their respective tenements adjoin or abut, in the manner and within the time expressed in this order, then the council of the said city will remove all obstructions in the said streets, courts, or alleys, and pave, flag, macadamise, level, drain, sewer, and otherwise complete or repair the same, or such parts thereof as shall not have been so done pursuant to this order; and will thereupon ascertain, determine, and charge such respective owners with their several proportionate part of the costs, charges, and expenses thereof, according to and co-extensive with their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on said street, court, or alley, proportionate to the extent of the area of the land of each of the several owners so situated as to have or be capable of obtaining access to such street, court, or alley, at the time of or in consequence of the formation or repair of such street, court, or alley, having regard in such apportionment to the state and condition in which the pavement, flagging, macadamising, levelling, draining, and sewerage of such streets, courts, or alleys respectively or any part thereof, shall or may be at the time of making this order.

Made and passed by the council of the city of Melbourne, at the meeting of the said council held on the twenty-ninth day of August, 1864.

SCHEDULE B,

Referred to in this Order.

Manner in which the streets, courts, and alleys, enumerated in in schedule A, referred to in this Order, are ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved, kerbed, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewerod.

The natural soil is to be reduced or made up, as the case may require, so that the longitudinal section of the whole street, court, or alley, shall in no part have an inclination of less than one (1) in eighty (80), and where practicable the entire length is to form one incline.

In laying on any stuff it is to be spread in layers of not more than one foot thick.

The transverse section of the street, court, or alley (where the water-channels are on the sides), is to show a roadway, whose crown shall be one inch above the kerbs of the footways, and the fall from the crown to the water-channels shall not be less than one (1) in twenty-five (25).

Each street, court, or alley, shall have a bluestone pitched water-channel, either at each of its sides or in its centre, of sufficient capacity to meet the required drainage for the same, the width of said channel or channels in no instance to be less than two (2) feet.

The pitchers to be nine (9) inches wide, and from six (6) to nine (9) inches deep, and from nine (9) to fourteen (14) inches long, with upright sides set in sand, and well rammed down to such section as the city surveyor may direct.

The bottom of the channel is to be seven (7) inches below the kerbstones of footpaths.

On either side of the roadway there is to be, where practicable, a footpath not more than three (3) feet wide, and these are to be separated from the roadway by a neatly dressed bluestone kerb from two (2) to four (4) feet long, six (6) inches wide, and fifteen (15) inches deep.

The footways are to be covered with a coat of gravel three (3) inches thick, and the surface is to fall towards the channel at the rate of one (1) in ten (10).

The roadway is to be covered with a coat of clean bluestone metal, 2½ inch gauge, nine (9) inches deep in the centre, and six (6) inches deep on the sides, and this, when necessary, covered over with a coat of good loam two (2) inches thick, and rolled with corporation iron roller.

Whenever private entrances lead from the streets, courts, or alleys, they are to be paved to the full width (of building line) with bluestone pitchers similar to those used in the channels.

All entrances from adjoining street shall be pitched and kerbed either with four (4) inch bluestone cubes or nine (9) inch pitchers, as the city surveyor may direct, the sides being well supported with eight (8) inch stone kerbing.

The whole of the work must be done under the inspection, and subject to the approval, of the city surveyor, who is authorised to order any deviation from these general principles which the peculiarities of any case may require.
