## INCORPORATION OF MARYBOROUGH HOSPITAL.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-fourth day of October, 1864.

PRESENT:

Mr. McCulloch	His Excellency the Governor	Mr. Grant

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for Hospitals and Charitable Institutions*, it is amongst other things enacted, that any institution established for the cure of disease, or for the relief of diseased, aged, incurable, or destitute persons, and supported in whole or in part by the voluntary contributions of not less than fifty persons, each of whom shall have paid not less than One pound per annum or Twenty pounds in one donation, may be incorporated as thereafter mentioned, and all persons who shall have paid as aforesaid shall be deemed contributors within the meaning of the said Act; and it is also enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than twenty-five of the said persons praying that such institution may be incorporated, to cause the substance or prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition signed by an equal or greater number of such persons shall have been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication) the Governor in Council may declare the contributors for the time being to such institution to be and they shall thereupon become and continue a body politic and corporate by the style and title named in the Order in Council, and shall have perpetual succession and a common seal: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by not less than twenty-five contributors to the Maryborough Hospital, praying that the said institution may be incorporated: And whereas the substance or prayer of the said petition has been published in the *Government Gazette*, and no counter-petition has been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order declare the contributors to the said institution to be a body politic and corporate in accordance with the provisions of the said Act in manner following, that is to say:—

The contributors for the time being to the institution called and known as the Maryborough Hospital, situate in the borough of Maryborough, are hereby declared to be a body politic and corporate by the style and title of "The Maryborough Hospital."

And the Honorable James McCulloch, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

## DISTRICT FOR BEER LICENSES.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Wines, Beer, and Spirit Sale Statute*, 1864, it is amongst other things enacted that a beer license shall authorise the licensee to sell and dispose of, not earlier than Six o'clock in the morning nor later than Eight o'clock in the evening, any ale or beer to be drunk in the house or on the premises described in such license, except in the city of Melbourne or town of Geelong, or in any borough, and if the pre-

mises described in such license be subsequently to the granting of such license brought within any borough, such license shall expire at the end of the then current year; provided that upon the application by the council of any borough the Governor in Council may by proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare the whole or any part of such borough a district wherein beer licenses may be granted, and may on a like application revoke any such proclamation: And whereas the council of the borough of Chiltern has made application that the whole of the said borough may be declared a district under the proviso of the Act above recited: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power conferred by the above-recited Act, do by this my Proclamation declare the whole of the borough of Chiltern to be a district wherein Beer Licenses may be granted.

#### UNION UNDER THE WEIGHTS AND MEASURES STATUTE, 1864.

##### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, called *The Weights and Measures Statute, 1864*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council, at the request of and pursuant to any agreement made by the councils or boards of any two or more of any adjoining boroughs, shires, and road districts, may proclaim such boroughs, shires, and districts to be a "union" for the purposes of the said Act, and by such proclamation fix the proportion in which the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act shall be borne by the several bodies corporate of such boroughs, shires, or districts: And whereas the council of the borough of Ararat and the council of the shire of Ararat have requested that the said borough and shire may be proclaimed a "union," and that the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act may be borne, in the proportions of one-half by the borough of Ararat, and one-half by the shire of Ararat: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do proclaim the borough of Ararat and the shire of Ararat to be a "union" for the purposes of the said Act, and do fix the proportion in which the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act shall be borne by the councils of the said borough and shire, as follows:—

One-half by the council of the borough of Ararat, and one-half by the council of the shire of Ararat.

#### COMMONS.

##### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase and alter the commons respectively hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

GISBORNE AND BULLENGAROOK FARMERS' COMMON.—The farmers' common described in a Proclamation bearing date the thirteenth day of May, 1861, as situate at Gisborne and Bullen-

garook, is hereby increased by adding thereto the land hereafter described, viz.:—One thousand four hundred acres, more or less, county of Bourke: Commencing at the north-west angle of portion 1, parish of Bullengarook; thence westerly by the western branch of the Saltwater River to a point thereon bearing north from the south-east angle of portion 21, parish aforesaid; thence south to the north boundary of said allotment 21; thence by part of said north boundary of 21 easterly to the present common; thence north-easterly by the present common to the south boundary of portion 6, parish aforesaid; thence north-westerly and north-easterly by part of the south side of portion 6 and the western side of portions 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, and 1, to the point of commencement: being the unappropriated lands within the area described, as shown on plan deposited in the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(64.J.9167.)

OMELO GOLD FIELD COMMON.—The gold field common described, amongst others, in a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-eighth day of January, 1861, as situate at Omeo, is hereby abolished, and the area hereafter described shall be and constitute the Omeo gold field common, viz.:—Acres, more or less: Commencing at the junction of Wilson's Creek with Livingstone street; thence by Wilson's Creek bearing south-easterly about one hundred and forty-five chains in a straight line to a water-hole on said creek; thence by a line bearing S. 10° W. one hundred and fifty chains, more or less, to Day's Creek, by Day's Creek south-easterly about sixty-five chains in a straight line to its junction with a small creek; thence by a line bearing S. 26° 20' E. one hundred chains, more or less, to Camping Ground Creek, by that creek southerly seventy chains, more or less, to the junction of the two head branches; thence by a line bearing N. 71° W. one hundred and eighteen chains; thence N. 39° W. one hundred and ninety chains to the junction of Dry Hill Creek with Livingstone Creek; and by the last-named creek northerly to the point of commencement: deducting from above-described area all sold or otherwise legally appropriated land, as shown on plan deposited in Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(64.L.8228.)

##### PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS the building erected at the public expense in the Royal Park, Melbourne, and known as the Powder Magazine, is now being fitted up for the temporary reception of male lunatics, and it is expedient to proclaim such building to be a gaol within the meaning of an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the said colony, passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders*, and of another Act passed in the seventeenth year of the same reign, intitled, *An Act to amend an Act intitled "An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders"*: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Acts, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim, declare, and notify that the building erected in the Royal Park at Melbourne as aforesaid, and all erections, buildings, and premises appertaining thereto, are and shall be deemed to be a Public Gaol within the meaning and in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts.

**REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT OF THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER, AND FOR THE QUARTER ENDING 30TH SEPTEMBER, 1864.**

A lower mortality prevailed in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of September, 1864, than that which obtained in any one of the four previous Septembers. The mean temperature and mean atmospheric pressure were within a fraction of an average of the same elements during the corresponding month of five successive years.

The deaths of males and females amounted respectively to 63 and 37 per cent. of the total mortality. The deaths of children under five amounted to 38 per cent. of the total. This latter proportion was 33 per cent. in September, 1863, 43 per cent. in September, 1862, 40 per cent. in September, 1861, and 53 per cent. in September, 1860.

The 5th of the month was the day of highest mortality, and the 11th that of the lowest. On those days respectively 12 deaths and 1 death occurred.

Two octogenarians died during the month, viz., a female, aged 84, of typhus, and a male, aged 82, of old age.

Five deaths from drowning occurred during the month, viz. :—A carrier, aged 61, at Kew; a male, aged 40, in Hobson's Bay; a seaman, aged 33, in the Yarra; a boy, aged 10, whilst bathing in the railway swamp; and a girl, aged 3, at Brighton. The first of these deaths was known to have been suicidal, the remainder are believed to have been accidental. Two children, one of a year and the other of 24 weeks old, died of scalds; an infant, aged six weeks, was accidentally suffocated; a seaman, aged 48, died from the effects of a fall.

Twenty-nine deaths occurred in the Melbourne Hospital, 5 in the Benevolent Asylum, 9 in the Yarra Bend Asylum, 2 in the Lying-in Hospital, 4 in the Immigrant's Home, 1 in the Melbourne Gaol, 1 in the Pentridge Stockade, and 1 in the Industrial School, making a total of 52 deaths in public institutions, or 25 per cent. of the whole mortality of the month.

**A BILL FOR THE INCORPORATION OF THE RESPECTIVE INHABITANTS OF THE RESPECTIVE TOWNS OF SANDHURST, BALLARAT, BALLARAT EAST, AND CASTLEMAINE, FOR CERTAIN PURPOSES.**

**NOTICE** is hereby given that application is intended to be made in the next session of the Parliament of Victoria, for leave to bring in a Bill, intituled, A Bill for Incorporating the respective inhabitants of the several towns of Sandhurst, Ballarat, Ballarat East, and Castlemaine, for all or some of the purposes following, namely:—

For the constitution of the above respective boroughs into towns, for determining the qualification of the burgesses thereof respectively, and to incorporate such burgesses.

For regulating the qualification, election of mayor and councillors, and their respective terms of office; the election and qualification of assessors and auditors, and for regulating the proceedings of the council and election of mayors, and defining their powers and determining their remuneration.

For regulation of disputed elections of mayors or councillors, and the business and proceedings of the councils.

For the appointment, removal, and salaries of officers generally herein, and regulating their several duties and hours of duty, and mode of keeping, balancing, and auditing accounts.

To erect toll-bars within the said towns, to collect tolls, and to fix and regulate the amounts thereof from time to time and exemptions, the appointment of collectors and other officers, and the appropriation of revenue derivable therefrom; and prevent the erection of any other tolls within three miles of the boundaries of the respective towns, without the consent of the council of such town.

To levy rates, general and special, including water and lighting rates, with the necessary powers to enter upon property for the purpose of valuing the same.

To effect loans on mortgage of general and special rates or general revenue, and to regulate the mode of repayment, and for the formation of a reserve fund, and the investing thereof.

For powers to take or lease land for permanent and other public works, and to let public lands.

To provide for sewerage, lights, drainage, water supply, erection of markets and abattoirs, pounds, baths, and wash-houses, appointment of poundkeepers and fixing of fees, and the general regulation thereof, and for any of the above or other public authorised purposes to enter upon private property.

The construction and maintenance of streets, public ways, and water-courses and drains, erection of bridges, and providing pleasure grounds, libraries, nurseries, and places of public resort or recreation; hospitals, asylums, and other buildings or places for charitable purposes, and to expend public funds in public rejoicings.

To expend municipal funds in constructing works outside the town boundary in connection with other local bodies or public companies, and in contribution to public charitable institutions outside the town boundary.

To expend funds in carrying out the various powers specified in this bill.

For appointing proper officers to receive licensing and registration fees and fines, under the Act number 227, and also from hawkers, auctioneers, and pawnbrokers, to go to the general revenue of the respective towns.

To fill in low lands at owners' expense, after due notice given to such owners to fill in such lands.

To compel owners to pay half cost of flagging footpaths, and to proclaim as highways such private streets or ways as shall be made to the satisfaction of any such council, and erecting and repairing bridges.

To enable the respective councils of the respective towns to enter into contracts for lighting, and for any public authorised works within the said towns respectively, and to preserve to such towns respectively any contracts entered into.

To enable the respective councils of the respective towns to sue for and recover all arrears of rates, and to sue for and recover all rates to be levied under this proposed Act, without prejudice to the recovery of rates due and in arrear before the passing of such Act.

To enable the mayors and magistrates of the respective towns to hear and adjudicate as justices of the peace in all such matters as may be brought before them as such justices, notwithstanding that such mayors and magistrates are ratepayers or members of the respective corporations, and to enable such mayors and magistrates to hear appeals from any valuation or rating.

To confirm in the councils of the said respective towns all the privileges, liabilities, and property now existing or held by the respective borough councils or corporations.

To repeal, so far as may be necessary, the Municipal Institutions Act, 1864, in respect of the above-mentioned several towns.

To enable the respective councils of the said respective towns to make bye-laws for the following objects or purposes, that is to say:—

1. For the regulation of their own proceedings.
2. Appointment and defining powers of permanent committees.
3. Collection of rates.



4. Conduct of elections of mayors and councillors, and of public meetings of burgesses and ratepayers.
  5. Prevention and extinguishing of fires.
  6. Definition and suppression of nuisances and houses of ill-fame, and to prevent the introduction and provide for the destruction of rats and other vermin.
  7. Compelling residents to keep their premises free from offensive or unwholesome matters.
  8. Regulation and licensing of porters, public carriers, carters, water-drawers, and water-carriers, boatmen, ferries, and public vehicles, and the drivers and conductors thereof, at such charges as may be deemed advisable.
  9. Regulating the times and places for killing and sale of butchers' meat.
  10. Establishment, regulation, and licensing of slaughter-houses, and appointment of inspectors thereof, and for fixing the rates and dues to be charged for slaughtering.
  11. Establishment and regulation of markets, market-dues, weighing-machines, fares, and sales.
  12. Preservation of public decency and public health, and directing the prosecutions of persons offending against this or any other bye-law.
  13. Restraining of noisome and offensive trades.
  14. Making regulations relating to buildings so as to provide for the public safety, and the licensing of builders.
  15. To regulate the width of streets on which houses may be built.
  16. To regulate the fencing of unoccupied lands.
  17. Construction of verandahs, or shades, or awnings over public footpaths.
  18. Impounding of stray cattle found on the streets or ways.
  19. Extension of streets within their bounds through crown lands.
  20. Compelling owners of property on which dangerous excavations or water-holes exist, to fill, fence, or otherwise protect the same.
  21. To adopt by bye-law such clauses of the Melbourne Building Act as any council may deem advisable.
  22. Construction of crossings for vehicles over footpaths.
  23. For regulating or prohibiting cellar-openings on street footpaths, and erection of water-troughs in street by private persons.

#### BOROUGH OF WANGARATTA.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—FOR REGULATING BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF WANGARATTA.

WHEREAS by *The Municipal Corporations Act, 1863*, the Council of the Borough of Wangaratta is empowered to pass bye-laws providing for the management of the affairs of the council: Now the said council, in pursuance of the powers aforesaid, do hereby, with the consent of His Excellency the Governor of the colony of Victoria, order and enact—

1. *Minutes*.—The first business at each meeting of the council shall be to confirm the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereon except as to the accuracy thereof.

2. *Order of business*.—After the confirmation of the minutes, the order of business shall be as follows, or as near thereto as may be practicable, but for the greater convenience of the council at any particular meeting thereof it may be altered by resolution to that effect:—

1. Reading copies of letters sent by order of the council.
2. Reading letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
3. Reception and reading petitions and memorials.
4. Reading and ordering on reports of permanent committees.
5. Reading and ordering on reports of special committees.
6. Reading and ordering on reports of deputations.

7. Orders of the day, including subjects arising from proceedings of former meetings.

8. Motions of which previous notice has been given.

3. *Council to be communicated with by petition.*—Every communication addressed to the council shall be in the form of a petition or memorial, and shall be in writing, and must be signed by at least one person on every skin or sheet on which it is written. Every petition shall be presented by one of the members of the council, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded. On the presentation of the petition no debate shall take place thereon until notice has been given in the usual manner; and the only questions that shall be entertained on its being presented shall be that the petition be received, or that it be referred to a committee, or that it be taken into consideration with any order of the day to which such petition may refer; and every member presenting a petition to the council shall confine his remarks to a statement of the names of the persons from whom it comes, the number of signatures attached to it, and the reading of the prayer of the petition.

4. *Presentation of reports.*—No report of a committee shall be considered nor adopted on its presentation, nor until due notice thereof shall be given, nor shall any debate be allowed thereon except as to its being received, or, if thought necessary, printed for distribution among the members of council.

5. *Reports to be numbered and signed.*—The reports of each committee shall be numbered in consecutive order, and each report shall be signed by the chairman thereof, or, in his absence, by the chairman for the time being, previous to the presentation of such report to the council. All reports shall be written on paper of a uniform size.

6. *Orders of the day.*—The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration. Any member of the council may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable in the form of a motion, notice of such motion being given at the previous meeting.

7. *Proceeding with motions.*—No motion shall be proceeded with unless the councillor giving notice, or one of the council authorised by him in writing, be present to proceed with the same when called upon.

8. *Notice paper.*—The notice paper shall be prepared by the town clerk, and posted in his office two clear days previous to each ordinary meeting of council.

#### CHAPTER 2.—ORDER OF DEBATE,

9. *Chairman to decide points of order.*—The presiding chairman's ruling or decisions shall be final on all questions or points of order and practice; and he shall state or give the same (when called upon to do so) without comment or argument. Any councillor may, however, require the enforcement of a standing order by simply drawing the chairman's attention to its infringement.

10. *Councillors to rise when speaking, calling to order, &c.*—Any councillor upon proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the chairman; and no councillor shall be interrupted unless by a call to order, when he shall sit down; the councillor calling to order shall then be heard, and the question decided before the subject is resumed, or any other business entered upon.

11. *Motions to be in writing.*—The mover of either an original motion or amendment must state the nature of the same, and have it seconded before addressing the council in support thereof, and must hand same in writing, duly signed, to the town clerk, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder, and afterwards the result thereof, i.e., "carried," "lost," or "lapsed," and shall carefully preserve such original manuscript in his office; and no motion, when seconded, shall be withdrawn without leave of the council.

12. *Speaking on moving or seconding a motion.*—The mover of any motion shall be the first to speak to it after its being seconded, but any councillor nearly seconding a motion without remark shall not be held to have spoken.

13. *Priority of speaking.*—If more than one councillor rise at one time to speak, the chairman shall decide who is entitled to priority.

14. *Speaking twice on the same subject.*—No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, except by way of explanation, or in reply upon any original motion or amendment of which he was the mover; and immediately after the reply, the amendment or original motion, as the case may be, shall be at once put to the vote.

15. *Amendments how allowed.*—One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost one other can be moved before the original motion is put to the vote. In the event, however, of an amendment being carried, the original motion shall be deemed rejected, and the amendment so carried shall take the place of such original motion, and on it one amendment can then be moved but no more.

16. *Disorderly conduct.*—No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion, nor impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.

17. No councillor shall be allowed to continue a statement relative to any previous action or words of another councillor after the veracity of such statement shall have been decided by the councillor referred to.

18. Any councillor making use of any expression capable of being offensively applied to any other councillor, shall immediately, upon being required by the council so to do, withdraw such expression, and make satisfactory apology to the council.

19. In the event of any such conduct as last mentioned, or other disorderly behavior, on the part of a councillor, the chairman shall call upon such councillor by name to withdraw, and upon his withdrawal (after having been first heard in explanation if he so desires) the council shall at once take the case into consideration.

20. Any councillor may require the town-clerk to take down any particular words used by another councillor immediately upon their being used.

21. *Production of documents.*—Any councillor may, of right, demand the production of any documents of the council bearing upon the question or business then under discussion, but no question can be entertained or discussion allowed upon any previous action of the council.

22. *Questions how superseded.*—Any question before the council may be superseded—

1st. By the adjournment of the council on the motion of a councillor, "That the council do now adjourn."

2nd. By the previous question, viz., "That this question be now put," being proposed and negatived.

23. *Questions how to be put.*—The chairman shall, in taking the sense of the council, put the motion first in the affirmative and then in the negative; and the votes of the councillors, if a division be called for, shall be entered in the minutes.

24. *Manner of voting.*—The council shall vote by "Ayes" and "Nays."

25. *Adjournments.*—No discussion shall be allowed upon any motion for the adjournment of the council, but such motion shall immediately, upon being seconded, be put from the chair, and, in the event of its being negatived, the consideration of the subject then under discussion shall be resumed, or the next on the business paper proceeded with, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before it shall be competent for a further motion for adjournment to be entertained; but should a motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undispensed of on the business paper of the day shall take precedence of all else under the "orders of the day" at the next meeting of the council.

26. *Protests.*—Any councillor may record his protest against any resolution of the council on giving notice of his intention so to do immediately upon the adoption of such resolution, and by handing in such protest, specifying his reasons for recording it in writing under his own hand, to the town clerk at least twenty-four hours before the next meeting of council, when the same shall be duly entered upon the council's minutes of the day on which the resolution was passed; provided always that such protest may be afterwards expunged if declared by a majority of the council not to be in accordance with truth, or not to be in its terms respectful to the council.

#### CHAPTER 3.—COMMITTEES.

27. *Standing Committees.*—There shall be three permanent committees of the council, to be elected annually at the meeting of the council next after the annual election of mayor of the council; the council, however, having power at any time to fill up occasional vacancies in any, viz.:

The public works committee shall consist of three councillors, two to form a quorum; the finance committee of three councillors, two to form a quorum; and the public health committee of three councillors, two to form a quorum.

28. *Functions of committees.*—The public works committee shall take cognisance of such matters and in such manner as the council may direct, having power, however, to report to the council upon any matter that they may deem it advisable otherwise to notice or enquire into.

29. The finance committee shall receive and examine all municipal accounts before they are presented to the council, to whom that committee shall then forward them, with a report embodying a recommendation for their payment or otherwise.

30. The public health committee shall report on all matters affecting the public health.

31. *Convening committees.*—The town clerk shall (in manner as may seem advisable) convene such meetings of committees as the respective chairmen may direct.

32. *Absence of quorum at committees.*—Unless a quorum be present within twenty minutes from the time for which a meeting of committee is called, such meeting shall lapse; such circumstance and the names of the members who are present being recorded on the minutes.

33. *Absentees disqualified.*—Any member of committees absenting himself from three consecutive meetings of which he shall have been notified, shall cease to be a member of such committee, and such circumstance shall be reported by the town clerk to the council at its next meeting.

#### CHAPTER 4.—MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS.

34. *Financial statement.*—At the first meeting of council in every month the treasurer shall report the state of the council's account in the bank.

35. *Election of officers.*—No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until six clear days' notice has been given in a newspaper circulating in the district, inviting applications for the same; and the maximum salary, or other remuneration of such office, shall in all cases (except where the office is to be let by tender) be fixed before proceeding to the election.

36. *Contracts.*—No councillor shall be received as surety for any officer, nor shall any councillor or officer become security for any contractor or other person employed with or by the council.

37. *Corporate seal.*—The town clerk shall have the custody of the common seal of the borough, and be responsible for the same, and every impression thereof shall be verified by his signature. He shall not affix it to any corporate document without the express minute of the council; but in case of powers of attorney, or other legal documents not relating to the corporation, but which require to be verified before the mayor, by declaration or otherwise, the said seal shall and may be affixed by the town clerk to the mayor's certificate.

38. In all cases not hereinafter provided for resort shall be had to the rules, forms, and usages of Parliament, so far as the same are applicable to the proceedings of this council.

39. *Suspension of standing orders.*—Any one or more of the foregoing standing orders may be suspended *pro tem*, in case of emergency, with the consent of the majority of the council.

40. *Penalty for the breach of the standing orders.*—The neglect or breach of any of the foregoing clauses in this bye-law shall subject the person so offending to a penalty not exceeding Twenty shillings in respect of each clause or standing order offended against or neglected; and the chairman of the council for the time being shall initiate and prosecute all proceedings for the enforcement of such penalties.
