EXTENSION OF CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF PART III. OF "THE FISHERIES AND GAME STATUTE, 1864."

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by The Fisheries and Game Statute, 1864, it is amongst other things enacted that for the purposes of Part III. of the said Act the term "game" shall mean and include all birds and other animals mentioned in the fifth schedule to the said Act, and the terms "native game" shall mean and include all birds and other animals mentioned in the sixth schedule to the said Act; provided that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, at any time after the passing of the said Act, by Proclamation, to name any other bird or animal which shall be included in such fifth or sixth schedule respectively, and after the publication of any such Proclamation in the Government Gazette, and the expiration of the period mentioned in such Proclamation for the time of its coming into

operation, the birds or other animals so named shall be deemed and considered as being thenceforward included in such schedule; and it is further enacted that the period of the year during which Part III. of the said Act shall be in operation, as regards all or any of the birds and other animals mentioned in the sixth schedule, shall be from and after the first day of August until the thirtieth day of November in each year, or such other period as the Governor in Council may by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* from time to time direct; and it is also enacted that if any person shall wilfully kill or destroy any native game within the period aforesaid, for the purpose of killing or destroying any native game, such person shall upon conviction forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding the sum of Two pounds, in addition to the sum of Five shillings for each bird or other animal so destroyed: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation name ALL SPECIES OF QUAIL as additions to the birds mentioned in the sixth schedule to the said Act, and to be deemed as included therein from and after the date of the publication of this Proclamation.

And, with the advice aforesaid, I do also hereby extend the period of the year during which Part III. of the said Act shall be in operation, as regards all the birds and other animals mentioned or included in the aforesaid sixth schedule, to the TWENTIETH DAY OF DECEMBER in each year.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this seventh day of November, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in the twenty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign.

A BILL FOR THE INCORPORATION OF THE RESPECTIVE INHABITANTS OF THE RESPECTIVE TOWNS OF SANDHURST, BALLARAT, BALLARAT EAST, AND CASTLEMAINE, FOR CERTAIN PURPOSES.

NOTICE is hereby given that application is intended to be made in the next session of the Parliament of Victoria, for leave to bring in a Bill, intitled, *A Bill for Incorporating the respective inhabitants of the several towns of Sandhurst, Ballarat, Ballarat East, and Castlemaine*, for all or some of the purposes following, namely:—

For the constitution of the above respective boroughs into towns, for determining the qualification of the burgesses thereof respectively, and to incorporate such burgesses.

For regulating the qualification, election of mayor and councillors, and their respective terms of office; the election and qualification of assessors and auditors, and for regulating the proceedings of the council and election of mayors, and defining their powers and determining their remuneration.

For regulation of disputed elections of mayors or councillors, and the business and proceedings of the councils.

For the appointment, removal, and salaries of officers generally herein, and regulating their several duties and hours of duty, and mode of keeping, balancing, and auditing accounts.

To erect toll-bars within the said towns, to collect tolls, and to fix and regulate the amounts thereof from time to time and exemptions, the appointment of collectors and other officers, and the appropriation of revenue derivable therefrom; and prevent the erection of any other tolls within three miles of the boundaries of the respective towns, without the consent of the council of such town.

To levy rates, general and special, including water and lighting rates, with the necessary powers to enter upon property for the purpose of valuing the same.

To effect loans on mortgage of general and special rates or general revenue, and to regulate the mode of repayment, and for the formation of a reserve fund, and the investing thereof.

For powers to take or lease land for permanent and other public works, and to let public lands.

To provide for sewerage, lights, drainage, water supply, erection of markets and abattoirs, pounds, baths, and wash-houses, appointment of poundkeepers and fixing of fees, and the general regulation thereof, and for any of the above or other public authorised purposes to enter upon private property.

The construction and maintenance of streets, public ways, and water-courses and drains, erection of bridges, and providing pleasure grounds, libraries, nurseries, and places of public resort or recreation; hospitals, asylums, and other buildings or places for charitable purposes, and to expend public funds in public rejoicings.

To expend municipal funds in constructing works outside the town boundary in connection with other local bodies or public companies, and in contribution to public charitable institutions outside the town boundary.

To expend funds in carrying out the various powers specified in this bill.

For appointing proper officers to receive licensing and registration fees and fines, under the Act number 237, and also from hawkers, auctioneers, and pawbrokers, to go to the general revenue of the respective towns.

To fill in low lands at owners' expense, after due notice given to such owners to fill in such lands.

To compel owners to pay half cost of flagging footpaths, and to proclaim as highways such private streets or ways as shall be made to the satisfaction of any such council, and erecting, and repairing bridges.

To enable the respective councils of the respective towns to enter into contracts for lighting, and for any public authorised works within the said towns respectively, and to preserve to such towns respectively any contracts entered into.

To enable the respective councils of the respective towns to sue for and recover all arrears of rates, and to sue for and recover all rates to be levied under this proposed Act, without prejudice to the recovery of rates due and in arrear before the passing of such Act.

To enable the mayors and magistrates of the respective towns to hear and adjudicate as justices of the peace in all such matters as may be brought before them as such justices, notwithstanding that such mayors and magistrates are ratepayers or members of the respective corporations, and to enable such mayors and magistrates to hear appeals from any valuation or rating.

To confirm in the councils of the said respective towns all the privileges, liabilities, and property now existing or held by the respective borough councils or corporations.

To repeal, so far as may be necessary, the Municipal Institutions Act, 1864, in respect of the above-mentioned several towns.

To enable the respective councils of the said respective towns to make bye-laws for the following objects or purposes, that is to say:—

1. For the regulation of their own proceedings.
2. Appointment and defining powers of permanent committees.
3. Collection of rates.
4. Conduct of elections of mayors and councillors, and of public meetings of burgesses and ratepayers.
5. Prevention and extinguishing of fires.
6. Definition and suppression of nuisances and houses of ill-fame, and to prevent the introduction and provide for the destruction of rats and other vermin.
7. Compelling residents to keep their premises free from offensive or unwholesome matters.
8. Regulation and licensing of porters, public carriers, carters, water-drawers, and water-carriers, boatmen, ferries, and public vehicles, and the drivers and conductors thereof, at such charges as may be deemed advisable.
9. Regulating the times and places for killing and sale of butchers' meat.
10. Establishment, regulation, and licensing of slaughter-houses, and appointment of inspectors thereof, and for fixing the rates and dues to be charged for slaughtering.
11. Establishment and regulation of markets, market-dues, weighing-machines, fares, and sales.
12. Preservation of public decency and public health, and directing the prosecutions of persons offending against this or any other bye-law.
13. Restraining of noisome and offensive trades.
14. Making regulations relating to buildings so as to provide for the public safety, and the licensing of builders.
15. To regulate the width of streets on which houses may be built.
16. To regulate the fencing of unoccupied lands.
17. Construction of verandahs, or shades, or awnings over public footpaths.
18. Impounding of stray cattle found on the streets or ways.
19. Extension of streets within their bounds through crown lands.
20. Compelling owners of property on which dangerous excavations or water-holes exist, to fill, fence, or otherwise protect the same.
21. To adopt by bye-law such clauses of the Melbourne Building Act as any council may deem advisable.
22. Construction of crossings for vehicles over footpaths.
23. For regulating or prohibiting cellar-openings on street footpaths, and erection of water-troughs in street by private persons.
24. For allowing the opening up of streets or ways for the purpose of laying on of water or gas to private premises, and the laying down of pipes or drains by private persons or companies.
25. The authorising or preventing the undermining of streets or thoroughfares.
26. For regulating or preventing the running of water, sludge, or other matter thereon, or on the lands abutting thereon, whereby any nuisance or obstruction, or injury to the said streets or thoroughfares may be created.
27. Regulation and licensing of nightmen, and the proper construction of privies and cesspools, and public urinals.
28. Driving of horses, sheep, and cattle through the streets.
29. Cleansing of the streets, channels, and footways, and compelling the removal of offensive and unwholesome matter from private premises.
30. Proper construction of water-dams or reservoirs for storage of water for mining or other purposes, and the cutting of races, erection of fencing or other works in connection therewith, so as to prevent danger to life, and the injury to property, public or private.
31. For appointing and payment of a public crier.
32. Regulations for the preservation and keeping free from obstruction or pollution, of rivers, creeks, water-courses, channels, culverts, drains, sewers, &c.
33. To prevent the digging up or removing the service of any surveyed street or public reserve.
34. To regulate the stopping up of streets and thoroughfares during their formation or repair, or during the progress of any works therein.
35. For preventing the wandering of goats and dogs within the town.
36. To prevent or regulate the use of fire-arms within the town.
37. Prevention of the sale of unwholesome articles of food or drink, or the injurious adulteration of same.
38. Prohibition or regulation of hawking within the town, and the issue of licenses.
39. Storage of spirituous materials and mineral oils and gunpowder.
40. Establishment and control of public cemeteries, parks, public gardens, town commons, baths, public libraries, museums,

places of public recreation, by means of appointed committees of management, or otherwise, with power to levy fees or dues, and to make such other bye-laws, rules, or regulations, as may be necessary for the general good rule and government of such town.

41. To provide and care for the maintenance of the destitute poor and sick within the respective towns.

To confer, confirm, vary, or extinguish other rights and privileges as in the said Bill mentioned.

To expend municipal funds in procuring and applying for Act of Incorporation and payment of fees, and to retain and employ professional and other services.

SHIRE OF CRESWICK.

THE following bye-law, regulating the examining, comparing, and stamping weights and measures, and the fees to be charged for the same, within the Shire of Creswick, was made by special order on the 13th October, and will be confirmed on the 10th day of November, at the ordinary meeting.

The copies of the standard weights and measures shall be entrusted to the custody of the shire inspector for the time being, who shall give security to the council for the proper use and safe custody of the same, as also the due payment of all moneys received by him, and the surrender of the said weights and measures and all other things the property of the corporation when he may be required so to do.

The inspector shall attend at the shire office every Monday, from Ten o'clock in the forenoon till Three o'clock in the afternoon, unless such day shall be appointed a public holiday, or that he may of necessity be absent, when he shall at the earliest possible date, a notice of which shall be posted on the door of the council chamber, or such other building in which the council may have deposited the said authorised copies, and when the said inspector is so in attendance, he shall examine, compare, and stamp, if necessary, all weights and measures which may be brought to him, and shall demand and take such fees for so doing as are mentioned in the schedule of this bye-law marked A.

The inspector shall travel through the district, or any place adjoining thereto, at such specified times as he may be directed by the council, due notice of which shall be given by placards posted up in the localities to be visited at least seven days before such visitation; and on such occasions, the period of the inspector's stay having been published, he shall examine, compare, and stamp, if necessary, all weights and measures which he may be requested, and shall demand and receive such fees for so doing as are mentioned in the schedule of this bye-law marked B.

The inspector shall, on or before the third day of each month, make a return to the treasurer of the shire of all moneys received by him during the past month, showing the several particulars for which the same were received, the number of prosecutions under the Act, and how the same were disposed of. He shall also keep a diary of the whole of the transactions under this Act.

If any person shall refuse to pay the inspector the fees for examining, comparing, and stamping any weights and measures, after having requested him to do so, he shall be liable to a penalty of not less than Twenty shillings, in addition to the amount of fees, and which may be recovered before any two or more justices of the peace, and the inspector shall be at liberty to detain the said weights or measures until the fees are paid.

SHIRE OF CRESWICK.

THE following bye-law, providing for the management of the affairs of the Shire of Creswick, was made by special order of the council, at their meeting on the 13th October, 1864, after having been duly advertised, and is intended to be confirmed at the ordinary meeting on the 10th day of November.

1. At every ordinary meeting of the council the first business thereof shall be the reading of and putting for confirmation the minutes of any preceding meeting, and no discussion shall be allowed thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes, when confirmed, shall be signed by the president, or in his absence, by the chairman of the meeting.

2. The order of the business shall be as follows, or as near thereto as practicable:—

1. Reading copies of letters sent.
2. Reading letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
3. Reception and reading petitions and memorials.
4. Reading and ordering on reports of committees and officers.
5. Orders of the day.
6. Motions of which previous notice has been duly given.
7. Examination and passing accounts for payment.
8. Reading notices of motions for future meetings.

3. Every petition or memorial addressed to the council shall be in proper form, and must be presented by a councillor, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded; and no debate shall take place thereon except as to its being received and taken into consideration after the orders of the day or at any future meeting, or, if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.

4. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of the former meetings of the council, and any business which the president shall think fit to bring under consideration.

5. Every notice of motion shall be given to the secretary in writing, and shall be read aloud at the meeting previous to that in which the same is to be taken into consideration, and every notice of motion shall be considered in the order in which it is given.

6. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be considered unless the councillor who has given such notice, or some other councillor authorised by him, be present when the business is called on, and notices not so proceeded with shall be struck off the notice paper.

7. The mover of any motion which shall be referred to a committee shall for the occasion be a member of such committee.

8. Every councillor shall stand up while addressing the president.

9. The president's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice.

10. Every motion or amendment shall be entered on the minutes, with the names of the mover and seconder, and on a division thereon the votes shall be recorded, if required by any councillor.

11. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, one other may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote, but upon any amendment being carried, it shall be competent for any councillor to move one other amendment thereon.

12. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the council; but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained. But if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undispensed of shall have precedence at the next ordinary meeting of the council.

13. No councillor shall speak more than once on the same question, except by way of explanation or reply on an original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of an amendment last proposed, and after the reply, the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be put to the vote.

14. Every councillor, when proposing a motion or amendment, or speaking on any matter, shall address the president, and shall not be interrupted, except called to order, whereupon he shall sit down until the question of order shall have been decided; the councillor in possession of the chair may then resume the subject.

15. Any councillor who shall refuse to obey when ruled out of order, or shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, and who, if required by the president, shall refuse to withdraw such expression and make satisfactory apology, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, to be recovered before any two or more justices of the peace.

16. Any councillor may, with the consent of the president, require the secretary to take down the particular words used by a councillor, immediately upon the same being uttered.

17. Any councillor may record his protest against any resolution of the council, on giving notice of his intention so to do on the adoption of a resolution, and on such councillor entering his protest and his reasons for the same in a book to be kept for that purpose in the office of the council, and on his signing the same before the next meeting of the council; provided always that such protest may be expunged, if decided by a majority of the council not to be in accordance with truth, or not to be in terms respectful to the council.

18. No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until six clear days' notice shall have been given in some local newspaper, inviting applications for the same, or unless the salary or allowances attaching to such office, shall have been fixed before proceeding to such election.

19. All contracts shall be made by tender, unless the council shall otherwise direct. All tenders shall be addressed to the president, and only opened at the time of their consideration by

the council. The respective amounts, with the names of the parties tendering, shall in every case be entered on the minutes of the council. When any tender shall have been accepted by the council, the person tendering, or some one on his behalf, shall pay a deposit in accordance with a schedule hereto attached, into the hands of the treasurer, which amount shall be returned to the contractor when he obtains a final certificate from the engineer that the works under such contract are satisfactorily completed.

20. All payments shall be made by cheque, and signed by the president and one other councillor, and countersigned by the treasurer or such other person as the council may appoint; and no cheque shall be given unless the account for which it is payment shall have been passed at a meeting of the council.

21. The shire office shall be open every day except Saturdays and the days excepted by the Local Government Act, between the hours of Ten and Three, during which hours the secretary shall attend to transact the ordinary business of the council. The engineer shall attend during the hours of business at every meeting of the council.

22. The valuers appointed by the council shall visit and examine every rateable property within the shire, and after having valued such property shall deliver or cause to be delivered to the owner thereof a notice setting forth the amount at which such property is valued, together with other particulars sufficient to describe such property, and every such notice shall be signed by the valuers.

23. The secretary, engineer, rate collector, thistle inspector, shire inspector, and other officers, shall furnish official reports to the council each ordinary meeting.

24. Any bye-law may be suspended *pro tem.* in cases of emergency, and with the unanimous consent of the councillors present at any meeting.

SHIRE OF WARRNAMBOOL.
BYE-LAWS OF THE COUNCIL.

THE ordinary meeting of the council shall be held at the office of the council on alternate Saturdays, at Eleven o'clock in the forenoon. The business to commence as soon as the required quorum is present; but should a quorum not be present at the expiration of thirty minutes after the time appointed for meeting, no business shall be transacted at the meeting, and the names of all councillors present shall be recorded in the minute-book by the secretary.

2. Special meetings of the council may be convened by the secretary, in terms of sections 137 and 139 of the Local Government Act.

3. At every ordinary meeting of the council, the first business thereof shall be the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting or meetings (if any special), and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of proceedings. The minutes, when confirmed, shall be signed by the president, or, in his absence, by the acting-president.

4. At all ordinary meetings of the council, after confirmation of the minutes, the following shall be the order of business, namely:—

1. Reading, considering, and ordering upon correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day.
2. Receiving and reading petitions and memorials (if any).
3. Reading and ordering upon reports (if any).
4. Orders of the day.

5. Any petition or memorial addressed to the council must be presented by a councillor, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded; and no debate shall take place thereon except as to its being received and taken into consideration after the orders of the day, or at any future meeting, or, if necessary, that it be referred to a committee or the engineer for report.

6. Orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, and all business of which due notice has been given.

7. Notices of motion, bearing the signature of the mover, shall be given to the secretary in writing, and read aloud at the meeting previous to that at which the same shall be taken into consideration; and all such notices shall be considered in the order in which they are given.

8. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the councillor who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called on; in the absence of either, the notice may be renewed for the next meeting, on the vote of a majority of the councillors present.

9. Every councillor, including the president, shall stand while addressing the council.

2. The president's ruling shall be final in all matters of order or practice.

3. No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion, or impute motives; and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly; and any councillor making use of any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, shall, if required by the president, withdraw such expression, and make satisfactory apology to the council.

4. The president shall call to order any councillor out of order; and if the councillor deemed out of order shall not obey, he shall be liable to a penalty for every such offence not exceeding Five pounds.

10. Every motion or amendment put from the chair shall be entered on the minutes, with the names of the mover and seconder, and, on a division, the secretary may be required by any councillor to record the votes.

11. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but all amendments shall be discussed and put before the original motion; and no councillor shall move more than one amendment on the same question.

12. Any councillor moving or seconding any motion or amendment, shall be held to have spoken on that motion or amendment.

13. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, except by way of explanation or in reply, as the mover of an original motion, or as the mover of the amendment last proposed. After the reply, the question may be immediately put to the vote.

14. The president shall, on taking the vote on any motion or any amendment, put the question first in the affirmative, and then in the negative, and he may do so as often as may be necessary to enable him to decide which is in the majority.

15. The council shall in all cases vote by show of hands, except when inconsistent with or repugnant to any of the provisions of the Local Government Act.

16. Any councillor may enter his protest against any resolution of the council; notices of intention to protest must, however, be given in every case on the adoption of the resolution to be protested against, and the protest, signed by the councillor or councillors protesting, and specifying the reasons for protesting, must be entered before the next ordinary meeting of the council by the protesting councillor or councillors in the minute book.

17. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the council; but if on the question being put the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment be carried. The business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the council.

18. Any councillor may require the secretary to take down in writing any particular word or words used by any councillor immediately on the same being said.

19. All contracts amounting to Fifty pounds (£50) shall be made, by tender, and advertised not less than twice in a local newspaper. Tenders shall be addressed to the president, and only opened at the time of their consideration by the council. The respective amounts, together with the names of the parties tendering, to be entered in every case in the minutes of the council. The security in all cases of contracts shall be Ten pounds per cent. on the amount of contract, which amount shall be paid by the contractor or his agent to the officer appointed by the council to receive the same, immediately after the acceptance of tenders, which amount shall be lodged in a bank, at interest, by the said officer, to an account to be called the "Deposit Account," and no such moneys shall be refunded except by order of the council, on the engineer's certificate that the contractor is entitled to such refund. No officer or councillor shall have any pecuniary interest, either directly or indirectly, in any contract under the council.

20. All contracts must be carried out in the time appointed in the specifications, and according to the general conditions of contract attached thereto; and the engineer shall in his reports on the contracts in progress state any infraction thereof, and shall also bring under the notice of the council all fines incurred for non-completion as to time, &c.

21. No final payment shall be made on any contract until the completion of same shall have been notified for fourteen days to the council.

22. No councillor shall be received as security for any officer, nor shall any auditor, or other officer become surety for any other employee of the council; and in all cases where security shall be required, the expense of preparing the same shall be borne by the party giving the same.

23. In all cases it shall be sufficient for the collector to call once for the payment of the amount due on the rate roll; and in the event of any such amount not being paid to him when called for, he shall leave a notice, bearing the date upon which he calls, demanding payment of such amount to the treasurer of the shire within fourteen days from the date of such notice, wherein shall be stated that in default of such payment legal proceedings for the recovery of said amount shall be taken.

24. The collector shall, once every fortnight, furnish the secretary with a detailed account of all rates collected, and at such other times as the secretary may deem necessary.

25. At any ordinary meeting of the council it shall be competent for a majority of not less than two-thirds of the council, in case of emergency, to suspend *pro tem.* any standing order herein contained, unless such action would authorise the expenditure of any sum of money exceeding Twenty pounds.

THE BALLARAT AND BALLARAT EAST WATER COMMISSION INCORPORATION BILL.

NOTICE is hereby given that application is intended to be made in the next session of the Parliament of Victoria for leave to bring in a Bill to incorporate, by the name of "The Ballarat and Ballarat East Water Corporation," the body hitherto known as the "Ballarat and Ballarat East Water Commission," and to make further provisions concerning the water supply of Ballarat and Ballarat East.

To vest in the proposed corporation the land and works now vested in or held by the said Ballarat and Ballarat East Water Commission, or vested in or held by the borough councils of Ballarat and Ballarat East, or any trustees for such body or councils respectively; for the purpose of such water supply.

To empower the proposed corporation to maintain all reservoirs, wells, shafts, dams, cisterns, tanks, drains, sluices, pipes, culverts, engines, and other similar works already constructed, or being in or upon the said land, and to erect, make, and maintain all such other buildings and works as may be necessary or expedient in or upon the said land, or in or upon any other land which may be hereafter taken by or vested in the proposed corporation for the purpose of such water supply; also to divert and impound the water from Henry Beales' Swamp, the Lal-lal Rivulet, and Two-mile or Stony Creek, and any other streams within the reserves already granted or hereafter to be granted for the water supply of Ballarat and Ballarat East, or within any other lands to be vested in or hereafter taken by the proposed corporation; and to make use of such water for the supply of the inhabitants of the boroughs of Ballarat and Ballarat East and the surrounding districts to which water will gravitate from the reservoir and Beales' Swamp aforesaid, and to do all such other things as may be necessary or expedient for the objects aforesaid.

To empower the proposed corporation to levy and recover rates or rents for water supplied, also to make bye-laws for all matters relating to such water supply, and to fix penalties for the infraction of such bye-laws; and also to permit the use of boats on any of the said reservoirs, and to let portions of the said reservoirs or other the lands of the corporation for the erection and maintenance of boat-houses, and to levy and recover tolls, rents, or charges therefor.

To provide for the constitution, management, and government of the proposed corporation.

To provide for the discharge of the debts and liabilities of the said Ballarat and Ballarat East Water Commission.

To empower the proposed corporation to borrow money at interest for the objects aforesaid, on the security of their works and revenue, and to provide for the repayment of the money so borrowed.

To empower the proposed corporation to open and break up the soil and pavement of streets and roads, and lay down pipes, service pipes, and other necessary works, and from time to time to take up and repair the same; also to enter any house or other premises supplied with water, for the purpose of inspecting the state of the service pipes and meters, ascertaining the quantity of water consumed, and whether any improper use is being made thereof, and for cutting off or removing any such pipes, and to purchase at a valuation any service pipes already laid by consumers.

To purchase or rent and take and hold any lands or buildings which may be necessary for the objects aforesaid, and to sell any lands vested in the proposed corporation which may be no longer necessary for the purposes thereof.

To confer on the proposed corporation and the committees, chairman, and other officers thereof, all such rights, powers, privileges, and advantages, and to impose on them all such duties as may be necessary or expedient for the objects aforesaid.
