TRANSMISSION OF MEMORIALS AND REPRESENTATIONS TO THE CROWN, ETC.

IN directing the publication of the following "Rules and Regulations for Her Majesty's Colonial Service," relating to the Transmission of Memorials and Representations to the Crown, the Secretary of State, and Public Offices and Boards in Her Majesty's Government, His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, with reference to the 208th and 209th rules, that it is desirable that any such document intended for transmission by any particular mail should be in his possession at least three clear days before that on which the mail is despatched.

[Extracts from "The Rules and Regulations for Her Majesty's Colonial Service."]

"SECTION VI.—CORRESPONDENCE OF INDIVIDUALS.

"203. Persons in a colony, whether public functionaries or private individuals, who have any representations of a public or private nature to make to the Government, should address them to the Governor of the colony; or, if the colony be a dependency of a Governor-in-chief, then to the officer in the immediate administration of its Government.

"204. The duty of the Governor or Administrator of the colony is to receive and act upon each such representation as public expediency or justice to the individual may appear to require, with the assistance in such cases as hereinbefore specified of his Executive Council; and if he doubts what steps to take thereupon, or if public advantage may appear to require it, to consult or report to the Secretary of State. Every individual has, however, the right to address the Secretary of State, if he thinks proper. But in this case he must transmit such communication, unsealed, to the Governor or Administrator, applying to him to forward it in due course to the Secretary of State.

"205. Every letter, memorial, or other document which may be received by the Secretary of State from a colony otherwise than through the Governor, will, unless very pressing urgency justifies a departure from rule, be referred back to the Governor for his report.

"206. This rule, requiring transmission of correspondence with the Secretary of State through the Governor, is based on the strongest grounds of public convenience, in order that all communications may be duly verified, as well as reported on, before they reach the Secretary of State. It extends, therefore, to communications relating to public affairs as well as the concerns of the writer; to those of all Public Functionaries of whatever rank, and to those from public bodies.

"207. Petitions addressed to the Crown, or the Crown in Council, Memorials to Public Officers, or Boards in Her Majesty's Government, &c., must be in like manner sent to the Governor for transmission home.

"208. The Governor is bound to transmit to the Secretary of State every communication so received by him, accompanied by such report as its contents may appear to him to require.

"209. He is to do this with all reasonable despatch, consistently, however, with the delay requisite for the preparation of such report."

COMMONS.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act*, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown Land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase and alter the commons respectively hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:-

THE UNITED MOLIAGUL, INKERMANN, AND WATTLE FLAT GOLD FIELDS COMMON (the component parts of which were described in two several Proclamations bearing date respectively the eighteenth day of March, 1863, and the sixteenth day of December, 1862, and were united by a Proclamation bearing date the eleventh day of May, 1863) is hereby extended, and the area hereafter described shall be and constitute the said United Common, viz.:-Ten thousand acres, more or less: Commencing at the west angle of the borough boundary of Dunolly; thence by the north-west boundary of said borough and a line bearing N. 44° E. one hundred and ninety-six chains to the watershed between the Burnt Creek and Murphy's Creek; thence by that watershed north-westerly to a point thereon bearing south from the west angle of allotment 1, section 1, parish of Moliagul, sold to W. Vesey; thence by a line north, passing said west angle of allotment 1, being one hundred and fifty-eight chains, more or less, from said angle, to the south boundary of the proposed McIntyre gold field common; thence by part of the south boundary of the proposed common last named, bearing west one hundred and eighty chains, more or less, to the watershed between the Avoca and Loddon Rivers; thence southerly by that watershed to a point bearing west one hundred and five chains and N. 46° W. one hundred chains from the west angle of the borough of Dunolly; thence east one hundred and five chains and S. 46° E. one hundred chains to the point of commencement: deducting all sold and legally appropriated land, as shown on plan deposited in the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(64.J.3791.)

THE UNITED BOROUGH AND GOLD FIELD COMMON OF SMYTHESDALE (the component parts of which are referred to and united by a Proclamation bearing date the first day of February, 1864) is hereby increased by adding thereto the unappropriated Crown lands within the borough of Smythesdale.—(64.J.9457.)

THE UNITED TOWN AND GOLD FIELD COMMON OF WEDDERBURNE (described in a Proclamation bearing date the seventeenth day of August, 1863) is hereby abolished; and the area hereafter described shall be and constitute the United Town and Gold Field Common for Wedderburne, viz.:-Commencing at the south-west angle of the Torpichen pre-emptive section; thence by the western boundary of that section and a line bearing north two hundred and eleven chains fifty links to the north boundary of the parish of Wedderburne; thence by that boundary bearing west three hundred and two chains; thence by the western boundary of said parish, bearing south four hundred chains; thence by the south boundary of same, bearing east four hundred and eighty chains to the west boundary of the parish of Korong; thence by that boundary bearing north two hundred and thirty-two chains, more or less, to the Korong Creek; and finally by the Korong Creek in a westerly direction to the point of commencement. Approximate available area of common 15,230 acres.—(64.1.9075.)

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that in every district divided into subdivisions the Governor in Council shall, within fifteen days after any subdivision of such district shall become such subdivision, appoint in and for such subdivision one place to be the place of polling at all elections held in and for such subdivision, and may from time to time afterwards appoint in lieu thereof another such place within such subdivision; and it is further enacted that every shire shall after the proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such proclamation, and save as aforesaid, and save where therein otherwise expressly provided, all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue to be of full force and effect with regard to such shire, and be read accordingly: And whereas by an Order in Council made on the twenty-fourth day of October last, the Shire of Warrnambool was divided into three subdivisions, and it is expedient to appoint a polling place for each subdivision: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order appoint the places hereinafter mentioned to be the polling places for the subdivisions of the Shire of Warrnambool opposite to which respectively such polling places are mentioned, viz.:

The mortality of October, 1864, was exactly equal to that of the same month in 1862, but was lower than the mortality in October 1863, 1861, or 1860. The mean temperature of October 1864 was lower than that in the corresponding period of any of the four previous years.

Deaths of males and females were respectively in the proportions of 55 and 45 per cent. of the whole mortality. Forty-one per cent. of the mortality was of children under five years of age, against 37 per cent. in October 1863, 40 per cent. in October 1862, 51 per cent. in October 1861, and 62 per cent. in October 1860.

The highest mortality on any one day was 11 on the 16th. Only two deaths were recorded as occurring on the 1st.

A male aged 84 of paralysis, another aged 87 of old age, a female aged 75 of bronchitis, another aged 82 of old age, died during the month. These were the oldest persons whose deaths were recorded.

Eight violent deaths occurred during the month, a number below the average. Of these 3 were of drowning, viz., a sail-maker, aged 27, in Hobson's Bay; a male, aged 35, in the Yarra; and an infant of a year old in Spencer street. A gentleman, aged 32, was killed by a fall from his horse; a plasterer, aged 40, died of a ruptured urethra; a female, aged 49, was suffocated whilst drunk; a girl of 2½ was passed over by a dray; a prisoner in the Collingwood Stockade, aged 29, was shot by a warder whilst attempting to escape.

The deaths in public institutions number 48, or nearly 25 per cent. of the whole mortality recorded. They occurred as follows:—23 in the Melbourne Hospital, 4 in the Benevolent Asylum, 4 in the Lying-in Hospital, 3 in the Immigrants' Home, 11 in the Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Industrial Schools, 1 in the Collingwood Stockade, and 1 in the Melbourne Gaol.

Of the 80 deaths of children under five years of age, 45, or 56 per cent., were of males, and 35, or 44 per cent., were of females; of those dying, 51 were under one year of age, 8 were between one and two years, 11 were between two and three, 7 were between three and four, and 3 were between four and five.

Of the 114 persons dying beyond the age of five years, 62, or rather more than 54 per cent., were males, and 52, or not quite 46 per cent., were females; 10 were between five and ten years of age, 5 were between ten and fifteen, 2 were between fifteen and twenty, 4 were between twenty and twenty-five, 12 were between twenty-five and thirty, 16 were between thirty and thirty-five, 13 were between thirty-five and forty, 19 were between forty and forty-five, 12 were between forty-five and fifty, 3 were between fifty and fifty-five, 6 were between fifty-five and sixty, 4 were between sixty and sixty-five, 4 were between sixty-five and seventy, 1 was between seventy and seventy-five, and 4 were seventy-five and upwards.

Whilst the whole mortality in September was 13 in excess of that in October, scarlatina and diphtheria increased from 11 fatal cases in the former to 17 in the latter month. The mortality from zymotic diseases, however, in October, was exceeded by that from constitutional diseases, and trebled by that from local diseases. Phthisis, in October, caused only 21 deaths, against 31 in September.
