## ADDITIONAL RULE OF THE PILOT BOARD.

52. The additional rule of the Pilot Board published in the *Government Gazette*, dated 20th June, 1862, by notice dated 16th June, 1862, is hereby rescinded, and the following additional rule in lieu thereof is hereby made:—

No pilot shall pilot into any port, harbor, or roadstead of Victoria, an armed ship or a privateer of the United States, or of the so-styled Confederate States of North America, which shall then be carrying with it, or shall have in its custody or control, any prize, or any prize of an armed ship or privateer of the said United States, or the so-styled Confederate States, then being in possession or under the control, or in tow of its captors or prize crew. All pilots of the ports of Victoria boarding any vessel which they may have reason to believe to be an armed ship, or a privateer of the United States, or of the so-styled Confederate States of North America, having in her custody or control any prize, or to be a prize of any armed ship or privateer of the said United States, or of the so-styled Confederate States, being either in tow or in company of any such armed ship or privateer, or in charge of a prize crew, shall before taking charge of such vessel exhibit the subjoined *Gazette* notice of the 15th

August, 1861, to the officer commanding such ship or privateer, or prize, and if he admits that his vessel does come within the meaning of Her Majesty's prohibition the pilots shall decline to pilot such vessel into port, unless she is in actual distress or danger, when in such case they shall demand from the master a written statement that such vessel is in actual distress; but should the officer in command of such vessel state in writing that she does not come within the meaning of the said prohibition they are to demand from the master a written statement as to what his vessel is, and for what purpose he is desirous of entering the harbor, and if it shall still appear from such statement that the vessel does not come within the meaning of Her Majesty's prohibition the pilots shall pilot the vessel into port.

## OBSERVANCE OF NEUTRALITY PENDING THE CONTEST IN NORTH AMERICA.

The subjoined Despatch from the Secretary of State for the Colonies to the Governor is published for general information and observance.

By His Excellency's Command,

SIR, Downing street, 1st June, 1861.

You are already aware that the Queen is desirous of observing the strictest neutrality in the contest which appears to be imminent between the United States and the so-styled Confederate States of North America. I have now to inform you that, in order to give full effect to this principle, Her Majesty has been pleased to interdict the armed ships and also the privateers of both parties from carrying prizes made by them into the ports, harbors, roadsteads, or waters of the United Kingdom, or of any of Her Majesty's colonies or possessions abroad.

It is Her Majesty's desire that this prohibition should be forthwith notified to all proper authorities within her dominions, and I am to desire that you take measures to secure its effectual observance within the limits of your government.

**W**HEREAS by *The Local Government Act*, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted, that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board, for any original or proclaimed district thereafter sometimes called "single district" the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall within three months after the receipt of the same divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions, thereafter called subdivisions, by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth: provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district; and it is also enacted that every shire shall after the Proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such Proclamation, and save as aforesaid and save where herein otherwise expressly provided all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue and be of full force and effect with regard to such shire and be read accordingly: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the twenty-seventh day of June, in the present year, the shire of Bannockburn was constituted: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by more than twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said shire, praying for the division of the said shire into three subdivisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order divide the shire of Bannockburn into three separate electoral subdivisions in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

**THE NORTH RIDING.**—Commencing at a point in the centre of Sutherland's Creek due east from the north-east angle of the parish of Durrivil, in the county of Grant; thence westerly by a line to the centre of the River Moorabool; thence southerly by the centre line of the said river to a point due east from the north east angle of the parish of Wabdallah; thence westerly

by a line to the north-west angle of the said parish; thence south by the western boundary of the said parish to the north boundary of the parish of Murgheboluc; thence eastward by the north boundary of the last-named parish to the west boundary of the parish of Gheringhap; thence by a line northward along the west boundary of the said parish to the River Moorabool; thence further north by a line along the west boundary of allotment A section IV., parish of Darriwil, to the north-west angle of the said allotment; thence east by a line to the north-east angle of allotment A section III.; thence east to a point in the centre of Sutherland's Creek; thence northerly by the centre line of the said creek to the commencing point.

**THE WEST RIDING.**—Commencing at the north-east angle of the parish Murgheboluc, in the county of Grant; thence by a line westerly along the north boundary of the said parish to a point in the centre of Native Creek; thence by the centre line of the creek westerly to the north boundary line of the pre-emptive section of Russell, Bell, and Gray, in the parish of Carrah; thence westerly to the north-west angle of the said pre-emptive section; thence south to its south-west angle; thence by a line south-westerly along the boundary of the shire of Bannockburn to the River Leigh; thence south by a line along the boundary of the said shire, in the parish of Dorog, and in the county of Grenville, to a point in the centre of Warramine Creek; thence easterly by the centre line of the said creek to its junction with the River Barwon; thence easterly by the centre line of the said river to a point due south of the south-east angle of the parish of Murgheboluc aforesaid; thence north along the eastern boundary of the said parish to the commencing point.

**THE EAST RIDING.**—Commencing at the north-west angle of the parish of Gheringhap, in the county of Grant; thence south by the west boundary of the said parish and a line to the centre of the River Barwon; thence easterly by the centre line of the said river to its junction with the River Moorabool; thence by the centre line of the said river to its confluence with Sutherland's Creek; thence northerly by the centre line of the said creek to a point due east from the north-east angle of allotment A, section III., parish of Darriwil; thence west by a line to the north-west corner of allotment A, section IV., of the said parish; thence south by the western boundary of the said allotment to the commencing point.

#### WORKS ON MAIN ROADS ORDERED UNDER "THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1863."

**THE** Governor in Council, in exercise of the power conferred by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, has, by Orders severally made on the 28th day of November, 1864, directed that the undermentioned District Boards of Road Districts shall, within the times by the said respective Orders appointed, execute the works on Main Roads hereinafter named and described, as provided by the 220th section of the said Act, that is to say:—

The District Board of the Dandenong Road District shall, pursuant to Order in Council made on the 28th day of November, 1864, and within six months from the making thereof, execute the following works on the Main Dandenong road, according to a plan deposited by the said District Board with the Board of Land and Works, and recorded as (64.3416), viz.:—Draining, forming, and metalling about three miles and seventy-six and a quarter chains, in six several sections.

The District Board of the Lauriston and Edgecombe Road District shall, pursuant to Order in Council made on the 28th day of November, 1864, and within six months from the making thereof, execute the following works on the main road from Kyneton to the Blue Mountain Gold Fields, according to a sufficient plan deposited by the said District Board with the Board of Land and Works, and recorded as (64.3242), viz.:—Draining, forming, and metalling about twenty-two chains.

The District Board of the Tylden and Trentham Road District shall, pursuant to Order in Council made on the 28th day of November, 1864, and within six months from the making thereof, execute the following works on the main road from Kyneton to the Blue Mountain Gold Fields, according to a plan deposited by the said District Board with the Board of Land and Works, and recorded as (64.3243), viz.:—Draining, forming, and metalling about sixty chains and ninety-five links, in two several sections.
