THE Governor in Council, on the 12th of December, 1864, made the following appointments and arrangements with reference to Common-toll Roads, under the provisions of the Act 27 Victoria No. 176, § 265, 266, 267, viz:—

WARDS OF THE BOROUGH OF NEWTOWN AND CHILWELL.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twelfth day of December, 1864.

WHEREAS by The Municipal Corporations Act, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of councillors for any original or proclaimed borough, hereinafter sometimes called in common "single borough," the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by one-fourth of the number of persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in such borough, within three months after the receipt of the same divide the borough into three separate wards by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of such wards shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made upon or within thirty days before any day appointed for holding any annual election of councillors in or for such borough: And whereas the Governor has received a petition signed by more than one-fourth of the number of persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the borough of Newtown and Chilwell, praying that the said borough may be divided into three separate wards, to be designated and bounded as set forth in the petition: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by this present Order divide the said Borough of Newtown and Chilwell into Three separate Wards, by the names hereby assigned to the same respectively, and with the several boundaries hereinafter set forth, that is to say:—

THE WEST WARD.—Commencing at a point on the north bank of the River Barwon, being the centre of the West Melbourne road; thence north to a line passing through the centre of the West Melbourne road to Aberdeen street; thence west by a line passing through the centre of Aberdeen street to a Government road forming the western boundary of portions 1 and 2, section 9, parish of Moorparryal; thence north by a line passing through the centre of that road to a Government road forming the northern boundary of portions 7 and 8, section 18, in the said parish; thence west by a line passing through the centre of that road to a Government road forming the western boundary of portions 8, 9, and 10, section 18, in the parish afore-said; thence south by a line passing through the centre of that road to the north bank of the River Barwon; thence by a line bearing south to the centre of the stream; thence southward and eastward by a line passing through the centre of the river to a point due south of the West Melbourne road; and thence by a line bearing north to the commencing point.

THE SOUTH WARD.—Commencing at a point on the north bank of the River Barwon, being the centre of La Trobe terrace; thence north by a line passing through the centre of La Trobe terrace to Noble street; thence west by a line passing through the centre of Noble street to the West Melbourne

road; thence south by a line passing through the centre of the West Melbourne road to the centre of the stream of the River Barwon; thence northward and eastward by a line passing through the centre of the river to a point due south of La Trobe terrace; and thence by a line bearing north to the commencing point.

THE NORTH WARD.—Commencing at a point, being the centre of Aberdeen street and La Trobe terrace at their intersection; thence south by a line passing through the centre of La Trobe terrace to Noble street; thence west by a line passing through the centre of Noble street to the West Melbourne road; thence north by a line passing through the centre of the West Melbourne road to Aberdeen street; thence east by a line passing through the centre of Aberdeen street to the commencing point.

And the Honorable James McCulloch, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

DISTRICT FOR BEER LICENSES.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight
Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath,
Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of
Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by The Wines, Beer, and Spirit Sale Statute, 1864, it is amongst other things enacted that a beer license shall authorise the licensee to sell and dispose of, not earlier than Six o'clock in the morning nor later than Eight o'clock in the evening, any ale or beer to be drunk in the house or on the premises described in such license, except in the city of Melbourne or town of Geelong, or in any borough, and if the premises described in such license be subsequently to the granting of such license brought within any borough, such license shall expire at the end of the then current year; provided that upon the application by the council of any borough the Governor in Council may by proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare the whole or any part of such borough a district wherein beer licenses may be granted, and may on a like application revoke any such proclamation: And whereas the Council of the Borough of Creswick has made application that the whole of the said borough may be declared a district under the proviso of the Act above recited: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power conferred by the above-recited Act, do by this my Proclamation declare the whole borough of Creswick to be a district wherein Beer Licenses may be granted.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twelfth day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in the twenty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign.





