Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do order and proclaim that the several parts of the farmers' common hereinbefore mentioned shall be separate commons, and be designated and subject to the control hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

### ST. KILDA VOLUNTERR ARTILLERY CORPS.

RULES.

1. An annual meeting of the corps shall be held in the month of January in each year, of which one week's notice shall be given, at which the civil staff, consisting of the commissioned officers, five members of the corps, and a sceretary and treasurer, shall be appointed (of whom three shall form a quorum), who shall audit the accounts, manage and dispose of the funds of the corps, and generally take into consideration any matters connected with the corps which may be referred to them by the officer commanding.

officer commanding.

2. The officer commanding the corps may at any time convene a general meeting, and must do so on the written requisition of twelve (12) members, at which no rule or bye-law shall be passed

unless three days' notice by advertisement or circular shall have been given. At every meeting the senior officer present shall preside. Twenty to form a quorum.

3. All members changing their permanent address must, within fourteen days, give notice of the same, in writing, to the officer commanding, under the penalty of Five shillings.

4. Any member of the corps intending to be absent from his permanent address for a period of more than thirty days must give notice of such intention, in writing, to the officer commanding, and deposit his arms, accourtements, and uniform, in a place to be appointed by the officer commanding, under a penalty of Ten shillings.

5. At every parade, on the roll being called, any member not answering to his name or number shall be deemed absent, unless a sufficient reason shall be forwarded to the officer commanding before the end of the month. Any member coming late, and assigning a reason for so doing which is deemed sufficient by the officer commanding, shall be considered as having been present at that parade.

6. Any member who, after having been supplied with uniform, shall attend parade not dressed in accordance with the established regulations, or whose arms, accoutrements, or clothing, shall be dirty, or in any way unserviceable from neglect, will be liable to a fine of Two shillings and sixpence.

7. Any member guilty of talking or other irregularities on parade, will be liable to a fine of Two shillings and sixpence.

8. Every member will be responsible for the good and serviceable order of his arms, accoutrements, and clothing, and any damage done thereto shall be made good by him.

9. Any member not producing his arms for inspection when called upon to do so, will be liable to a fine of Two shillings and sixpence.

10. A list of all fines imposed in any month, and which have

called upon to do so, will be liable to a fine of Two shillings and sixpence.

10. A list of all fines imposed in any month, and which have not been previously paid, shall be signed by the officer commanding, and posted in the orderly room, or other place appointed, on the list of the following month.

11. All fines must be paid to the drill instructor, or other person appointed by the officer commanding, within one month of being posted; and the person so receiving such fines shall hand them over to the treasurer, who shall keep an account and submit the same for inspection half-yearly or whenever deemed advisable.

12. An account shall be kent by the officer commanding be

submit the same for inspection half-yearly or whenever deemed advisable.

12. An account shall be kept by the officer commanding between the corps and each of its members, wherein the member shall be debited with all liabilities incurred by the corps on his behalf, and credited with all sums earned by him as an effective, and in January of each year a statement shall be exhibited showing the individual value to the corps of each effective.

13. If on the 1st of January in any year a member's debit exceed his credit by One pound (£1) or upwards, he shall be fined the amount of such difference; provided always that the amount of such difference; provided always that the amount of such difference; provided always that the amount of such fine shall not in any case exceed Two pounds (£2), and that the officer commanding may remit the whole or any part of such fine, or defer the payment of it for one year.

14. If a member at any time desire to quit the corps under the provisions of the Act, he shall be fined the amount if more than Ton shillings (10s), whereby his debit exceeds his credit; provided that no such fine shall exceed Two pounds (£2), and that the whole or any part of such fine may at the discretion of the officer commanding be remitted.

15. If any member wishes to transfer to another corps, the officer commanding the corps to which transfer is desired must pay to the credit of this corps the value of his uniform at the time of transfer, or in default thereof the member so desiring to be transferred shall, previous to transfer, be made to pay a proportionate amount for the same, according to the length of time such uniform shall have been worn.

Bye-law No. 1.—Standing Orders to regulate the Proceedings of the Council.

1. The business of the council at all ordinary meetings shall

1. The business of the council at all ordinary meetings shall be conducted with open doors, unless it shall become necessary of exclude strangers on account of their disorderly conduct.

2. The council shall commence business so soon after the time notified as there is a sufficient number of councillors in attendance to constitute a quorum directed by law, but if at the expiry of an hour from the time specified there is not a quorum present, no business shall be transacted by the council at the meeting; and the names of all councillors present shall be recorded in the minute book by the secretary.

3. The minutes of any preceding meeting not previously confirmed shall be read as the first business at all meetings of the council, in order to their confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings.

4. The reading and ordering on reports of special committees and of officers, and the reading of memorials, shall follow the correspondence.

5. Every petition or memorial addressed to the council shall

5. Every petition or memorial addressed to the council shall be in proper form, and be presented by a member of the council, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.

6. On the presentation of a petition or memorial no debate shall take place thereon until notice has been given as hereinferer provided, and the only questions that shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation shall be, that the petition be received, and, if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.

7. No report of a committee shall be considered or adopted on its presentation nor until due notice shall be given. All such reports shall be read and received pro formd, and if ordered by the council, printed for distribution among the councilors, to be considered at any subsequent meeting.

8. If, in the report of a committee, there are distinct recommendations contained in such report, such report shall not be adopted until the sense of the council has been taken separately on each.

9. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the president may think fit to bring under consideration; any councillor may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable in the form of a notice of motion, such notice to be given in writing to the secretary at least four clear days previous to the meeting at which the same is to be taken into consideration; and all such notices of motion shall be considered in the order in which they are given.
