ESCORTS BY RAILWAY.

NOTICE is hereby given that the Government of Victoria has determined to offer the sum of £200 for the purchase of a painting or paintings, by an artist or artists resident in Australia, provided such painting or paintings possess sufficient merit to qualify it or them to compare favorably with the works of eminent living artists of Europe. Such painting or paintings to be placed in the Public Gallery of Art of Victoria.

Every picture submitted must be painted and finished in oil on canvas, panel, or other suitable material, or in water colors.

The subject of the picture is left to the judgment and taste of the artist.

The pictures will be received in Melbourne, at the Museum of Building Materials, Queen street, between the 15th of October and the 15th of November, 1864, and will be publicly exhibited on and after the 1st December in that year for one month. Before the expiration of that period the judges appointed to determine upon those to be purchased will decide as to which, if any, be so purchased.

Each picture must be accompanied with a letter stating the name and address of the artist, and price required for the picture.

Every reasonable care will be taken of the pictures sent in; but the Government of Victoria will not be responsible for any loss of or for any injury to them.

Public notice will be given stating when the pictures may be removed from the place of exhibition.

The carriage, delivery, removal, unpacking and packing of the pictures must be provided for and done by the artists or their agents at their own risk and cost.

THE SHIRE OF ARARAT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that if at any time in any district, whether single or united, which shall contain an area of not less than one hundred square miles, the total amount actually paid in respect of the general rate then last made shall have amounted to One thousand pounds, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to proclaim, if it shall seem fit, such district, by such name as in and by such Order in Council may be assigned thereto, to be a shire within the meaning of the said Act, and such district shall thereupon be and be called such shire accordingly; and no district, after the proclamation thereof as such shire, save as herein provided with regard to the

adjustment of boundaries to those of electoral districts, shall be united with any other shire or district, or with any borough or municipal district: And whereas the area of the district herein-after named, and the amount of the last general rate therein, are not less than the area and amount in the said Act mentioned, and it seemed fit to make an Order in Council this day to proclaim the said district to be a shire accordingly: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the district heretofore proclaimed and called the Ararat Road District to be a shire within the meaning of the said Act, by the name in and by such Order in Council assigned thereto, that is to say:—

THE SHIRE OF ARARAT.

THE OXLEY ROAD DISTRICT ADDED TO.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time, if it shall seem fit, to add to any district not divided into subdivisions, or to any subdivision, or separately to two or more subdivisions of a district so divided, any portion of the colony actually adjoining to such district or subdivision, as the case may be, and not lying within the limits of the city of Melbourne or town of Geelong, or of any municipal or road district; and every such portion so added shall thereupon become and be part of such first-mentioned district to all intents and purposes, and of the subdivision, if any, to which the same shall have been added: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the thirteenth day of November, 1863, the boundaries of the Oxley road district were altered as therein mentioned: And whereas it has seemed fit to the Governor in Council to add the parishes or districts of Moyhu and Greta to the said road district: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the addition of the said parishes or districts of Moyhu and Greta to the Oxley road district, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act; and do hereby re-define the whole of the said road district added to as aforesaid, in manner following, that is to say:—

Commencing at a point in the centre of the King River, at its junction with the River Ovens; thence south-easterly by the centre of the said River Ovens to its junction with the Buffalo River; thence southerly by the centre line of the said river for a distance of twenty-four miles, more or less, to the source of the Buffalo River; thence by a direct line southerly and westerly to the source of the eastern branch of the King River; thence northerly and westerly by a direct line to Futter's Range, near the source of the Fifteen-mile Creek; thence westerly and northerly by Futter's Range to the Sydney road; thence due east to the Fifteen-mile Creek; thence northerly by the Fifteen-mile Creek to the Ovens River; thence south-easterly by the Ovens River to the commencing point; excepting the borough of Wangaratta.—(64.134.)

COMMON-TOLL ROAD.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS the District Board of the Bacchus Marsh and Maddingley Road District have complained to the Governor in Council that they ought, by reason of the traffic passing along a road hereinafter mentioned being common to their own district with the district in which tolls are payable upon such road, to have a share of such tolls in the manner provided in the 254th clause of *The Local Government Act, 1863*: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the portion of road hereinafter mentioned to be a

Common-toll road, for the purposes and within the meaning of the provisions of the said Act relating to common-toll roads, viz.:—

The portion of the road known as "The Melbourne and Ballarat Road," passing through the Melton road district and the Bacchus Marsh and Maddingley road district, shall be a Common-toll road of the road districts hereinbefore mentioned.

SEVERANCE OF A FARMERS' COMMON.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the council of each shire shall, in the place and stead of the Board of Land and Works, alone have control over all farmers' commons and temporary commons for the use of selectors of lands, such commons respectively being within the shire and proclaimed under the Act numbered CXLV. and over all farmers' commons within the meaning of the Act numbered CXVII., within the shire; and it is also enacted, that in all cases in which part only of any such common as hereinbefore mentioned shall be situated within any shire, the Governor in Council may order that the whole of such common either shall be and be deemed included in, or shall be and be deemed excluded from, such shire, or else may order that the several parts of such common so lying within and without such shire respectively shall be separate commons, and such common shall to all intents and purposes be deemed to be either within or without such shire, or such several parts thereof to be separate commons according to the tenor of such order: And whereas the farmers' common described amongst others in a Proclamation, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of November, 1863, under the designation of "The Burrabeet and Windermere Farmers' Common" is situate partly in the shire of Ballarat and partly in the shire of Ripon, and it is expedient that such portions situate as aforesaid should be separate commons: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do order and proclaim that the several parts of the farmers' common hereinbefore mentioned shall be separate commons, and be designated and subject to control as hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

The part of the said farmers' common situate within the shire of Ballarat shall be a separate common and subject to the control of the council of the said shire of Ballarat, under the designation of "No. 1, Burrabeet and Windermere Farmers' Common."

The part of the said farmers' common situate within the shire of Ripon shall be a separate common and subject to the control of the council of the said shire of Ripon, under the designation of "No. 2, Burrabeet and Windermere Farmers' Common."

WHEREAS by *The Electoral Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council shall within thirty days after the commencement hereof, and afterwards as he shall see fit from time to time, appoint within and for each division of every province and district respectively one place and not more for taking the poll in such division at contested elections for the province or district, and every such appointment may revoke; provided that if the returning officer of the province or district and any police magistrate or superintendent of police acting in the locality shall by writing under their hands certify to the Governor that it is necessary so to do

it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to appoint as aforesaid in and for such division one or more polling place or places, and the appointment of such place or places or any of them from time to time to revoke; provided also that no appointment of any polling place in or for any division of a province or district shall be revoked between the issue of any writ for election for the same and the return of such writ: And whereas the returning officer for the Ovens electoral district and the police magistrate acting in the locality have, by writing under their hands, certified to the Governor that it is necessary to appoint Morse's Creek an additional polling place for the Buckland division of the said district: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order appoint Morse's Creek to be an additional place in and for the Buckland division for taking the poll in such division at contested elections for the Ovens electoral district.

And the Honorable James McCulloch, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

BYE-LAWS OF THE HEATHCOTE ORIGINAL DISTRICT ROAD BOARD, MADE TO REGULATE THE PROCEEDINGS THEREOF.
THE business of the board on ordinary occasions shall be conducted with open doors, but any two members present may require the exclusion of strangers until the board has decided whether the debate shall be continued publicly or otherwise.

2. The regular meetings of the board shall be held on the first Tuesday in each month, commencing at Twelve o'clock noon, or as soon after as a legal quorum is present; but, in the event of no quorum being present before the expiration of one hour from the appointed time for meeting, the clerk shall make a note thereof in the minute book, stating the names of the members (if any) present, and such meeting shall stand adjourned in accordance with clause 133 of *The Local Government Act*.

3. Special meetings may be summoned by the clerk upon his receiving a written requisition signed by any three members of the board, and stating the matter to be brought before such meeting, and the clerk shall give each member of the board notice thereof in writing, four (4) clear days before such meeting.

4. *Confirmation of minutes*.—The first business of each ordinary meeting of the board shall be the reading and confirmation of the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereon except as to their accuracy, and when confirmed, shall be signed by the chairman for the time being.

5. *Order of business*.—After the confirmation of the minutes, the following shall be the order of business, unless altered by a special resolution of the board for any special purpose:—1st, reading copies of letters. 2nd, reading letters received and considering and ordering thereon. 3rd, reading petitions and memorials. 4th, reading reports, first of permanent committees, and second of special committees. 5th, orders of the day arising out of former minutes, and any business the chairman may bring before the meeting. 6th, motions of which notice shall have been given. 7th, giving notice of motion.

6. *Petitions*.—Every petition addressed to the board shall be presented by one of the members thereof, who shall be responsible for its being in proper form and being respectfully worded.

7. *Motions*.—No motion shall be proceeded with unless the member who gave notice thereof, or a member of the board duly authorised by him in writing, be present when called upon to proceed with the same.

8. *Motions referred to committee*.—The mover of any motion which may be referred to a committee shall, for the occasion, be a member of such committee.

9. No person, not being a member, shall be allowed to address the board without the consent of a majority of the members present.

10. *Points of order*.—1st, every member, including the chairman, shall stand while addressing the board. 2nd, the presiding chairman's decision shall be final on all questions of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument. 3rd, no member shall digress from the subject under discussion, nor impute improper motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly. 4th, any member who shall use an expression capable of being applied offensively to any other member, shall, if required by the chairman, withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology to the board. 5th, the chairman may call to order anyone out of order; and if the person deemed out of order refuse to sit down and be silent, the chairman shall order him by name to leave the room; and if he shall persist in his interruptions, the chairman shall in his discretion order his removal; and such person so offending shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5, to be recovered before a justice of the peace, and in default, a period of imprisonment not exceeding seven days.

11. *Motions and amendments, how proposed*.—Any member desirous of making a motion or amendment, shall address the chairman, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall be silent until the member calling to order, shall have been heard thereon, and the question of order disposed of, when the member in possession of the chair shall be allowed to proceed.

12. *Priority in speaking*.—If two or more members shall rise to speak at the same time, the chairman shall decide which of them is entitled to priority.

13. *Motions and amendments recorded*.—Every motion and amendment shall be entered on the minutes, with the name of the mover and seconder, and on a division thereon the votes shall be recorded.

14. *Amendments*.—One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another amendment may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote.

15. *Speaking*.—A member moving a motion shall be held to have spoken thereon, but a member seconding a motion without remark shall not be held to have spoken. No member shall speak twice on the same question, except by way of explanation, or reply upon an original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of an amendment. After the mover's reply, the amendment or motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.

16. *Voting*.—All questions before the board shall be decided by open voting.

17. *Documents*.—Any member of the board may require the production of documents relating to the matter under discussion.

18. *Protest*.—Any member may enter his protest against any resolution of the board, and the protest shall be entered by the clerk in the minute book, and the member or members so protesting shall sign the same.

19. *Recording particular words*.—Any member may require the clerk to take down the particulars of any words used by a member immediately on the same being used.

20. *Superseding questions*.—A question may be superseded—1st, by a motion "that the board do now adjourn." 2nd, by the previous question, viz., "that this question be now put," being proposed and negatived.

21. *Payments*.—All payments over One pound shall be made by cheque, signed by the chairman and one other member of the board, and countersigned by the treasurer.

22. *Officers*.—The officers of the board, shall consist of a treasurer, clerk, surveyor, valuer, and collector, and the board shall, if they see fit, combine any of these offices, and the persons so appointed shall enter into a bond with the board for the faithful performance of the several duties appertaining to their offices; and the clerk or collector shall have power to sue in the name of the board, before any justice, for the recovery of rates or other moneys due to the board.

23. Any officer of the board who shall participate in any contract or accept any fee or reward other than the salary or allowances made by the board, shall forfeit the sum of One hundred pounds sterling, in accordance with clause 153 of *The Local Government Act*.
