THE GENERAL SESSIONS FOR TALBOT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better administration of Justice in Courts of General Sessions in the Colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that Courts of General Sessions of the peace shall be established and holden in certain places therein named, and such other places or districts within the said colony of Victoria as the Lieutenant Governor thereof shall appoint; and that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor of the said colony, from time to time, to define and appoint by proclamation the limits and boundaries of such places or districts within which all such courts shall have jurisdiction respectively, and the places and times at which such courts shall be holden, and such limits, districts, places, and times respectively to revoke, alter, and vary as the said Lieutenant Governor shall think fit: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare and appoint that a Court of General Sessions of the peace shall be established and holden at the place and in and for the district hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:-

A Court of General Sessions of the peace shall be holden at Talbot, and shall have jurisdiction in and for the district of Talbot, the boundaries whereof shall be as follow, viz.:-Commencing at a point on the Tullaroop Creek due east of the north-east angle of the parish of Amherst; thence west to the road from Carisbrook to Amherst; by said road south-westerly to a point thereon bearing north from the north-east angle of allotment 31 of section 3, parish of Amherst; thence by a straight line westerly to the junction of the road from Amherst to Avoca with the telegraph line of road from Maryborough to Avoca; by said telegraph line westerly to its intersection with the Bet-bet Creek; by the last-named creek southerly to its junction with Branch Creek; by the last-named creek southerly to its source in the Great Dividing Range; by that range easterly to the source of Mount Greenock Creek; by that creek northerly to a point about half a mile southerly of its junction with McCallum's Creek; thence by a line east to the Tullaroop or Deep Creek; and by the last-named creek northerly to the point of commencement.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-first day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in the twenty-seventh year of Her Majesty's reign.

CONDITIONS.

The conditions under which the premiums for wine of the vintage of 1864 will be awarded, are as follow, viz.:-The exhibitor to state-

1. Name.
2. Motto used.
3. Locality.
4. Nature of the soil where grown.
5. Names of grapes.
6. Age of vines.
7. Distance the rows are planted.
8. Trenched by hand or plough.
9. Average yield per acre.
10. Aspect.
11. Distance from seaboard.
12. Altitude of vineyard.

Each sample to consist of six bottles from a bulk of not less than fifty gallons; but the owners of those to whom premiums or honorary certificates shall be awarded, will be required to furnish six additional bottles of the same wines after they have undergone a second fermentation, so that the judges may each year test a bottle, to prove their comparative and progressive merits.

The samples sent in for competition to be the property of the Board, and to be accompanied by a declaration that they have been made from grapes of the *bona fide* growth of the competitors.

The conditions under which the premiums for wines of the vintage of 1862 will be awarded are as follows, viz. :-

The same information to be furnished as required for wines of the vintage of 1864, and, in addition, the following conditions must be complied with, viz. :-

The samples to consist of twelve bottles from a bulk of not less than fifty gallons, which shall become the property of the Board, and shall be forwarded to England under its auspices.

These premiums are to be competed for in July, 1865, and shall be awarded, if considered worthy, by the judges.

TOBACCO CULTURE.

The same information to be supplied by the competitor as that provided for as regards wines, Nos. 5 and 6 excepted.

SILK CULTURE.

Competitors for the premium for best sample of silk, in reel or cocoon, produced in the colony by themselves, will be required to furnish information as to quantity produced, when and under what circumstances, and such further particulars as to culture as may be important to the public. The locality, aspect, distance from seaboard, altitude, &c., &c.; the rearing of the worms from which the silk was obtained; and, also, the general mode of treatment pursued; to be furnished by the competitors.

SILK CULTURE.

Full particulars to be given by competitors for this premium; and, when mulberries have been planted, the same conditions as attached to the other premiums, with reference to soil, locality, &c., &c., to be complied with.

WHITE MULBERRY CULTURE.

Full particulars as to soil, locality, &c., &c., as required by the above conditions, must also be furnished by competitors for this premium.

COTTON CULTURE.

The conditions for these premiums to be the same as those required for mulberry, wine, tobacco, and silk culture. Each sample to consist of not less than half cwt., which shall become the property of the Board, to be sent to England under its auspices.

HEMP CULTURE.

Full particulars to be furnished by competitors for these premiums, of the growth, locality, soil, yield, &c., as required in other conditions. The quantity grown to be not less than one acre, and a sample of one cwt. of the produce shall be delivered at the offices and become the property of the Board.

The conditions for second premium for hemp culture to be the same as for the first premium.

HOP CULTURE.

Competitors for first premium for the best acre of hops in 1865 will be required to state full particulars of growth, locality, soil, yield, &c., as required under the conditions for other premiums.

The conditions for second premium for hops to be the same as for the first premium.

The several samples to be accompanied by a declaration, signed by the competitor before a justice of the peace, that the conditions under which the premiums are to be awarded have been strictly complied with.

The above-mentioned premiums to be awarded under the supervision of the Council of the Board of Agriculture.

VOLUNTEER FORCE.

THE Governor in Council has approved of the subjoined Rules, adopted by the Bendigo Volunteer Rifle Corps, in accordance with the provisions of the Act No. 183.

THE BENDIGO VOLUNTEER RIFLE CORPS.

RULES.

1. Every candidate for admission to the corps shall make a personal and written application to the officer commanding, stating name, place of abode, and occupation.
2. All members changing their permanent address shall, within fourteen (14) days, give notice to the captain of their company, or be fined a sum not exceeding Five (5) shillings.
3. Any member of the corps intending to be absent from his permanent address for a period of more than thirty (30) days must give notice of such intention in writing to the captain of his company, and deposit his arms, accoutrements, and uniform in the orderly room, or in such place in the district where the captain commanding shall appoint, under a penalty of Ten shillings (10s.).
4. Every member shall be responsible for the good and serviceable order of his arms, accoutrements, and uniform, and any damage done thereto shall be made good by him (accidents only excepted).
5. Any member attending parade or drill whose arms, accoutrements, or clothing (if in uniform), shall be dirty or in any way unserviceable from neglect, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Five shillings (5s.).
6. Any member guilty of talking or other irregularities on parade, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.).
7. Every member shall be liable to be sent to instruction drill by the commanding officer for want of knowledge occasioned by absence or other cause.
8. A general meeting of the corps shall be held in the first weeks of January and July respectively, of which one week's notice shall be given by circular or advertisement.
9. The commanding officer may at any time convene a special general meeting.
10. On a requisition being signed by not less than twenty members, the commanding officer must call a special general meeting.
11. That not less than three clear days' notice shall be given of any special general meeting by advertisement or circular, and no business shall be transacted unless a quorum of twenty (20) members be present.
12. At every general meeting the senior officer present shall be chairman. No person shall be permitted to speak to any question more than once (unless in explanation), except the mover of a resolution, who will be entitled to a reply.
13. All motions shall be delivered to the chairman in writing, and shall be decided by the holding up of hands, unless a division be demanded by two (2) or more members; no protest shall be received; no meeting shall be adjourned or dissolved without a motion for that purpose.
14. That a committee shall be appointed to take the management of the general business of the corps; such committee to consist of ten (10) members, namely, the commanding officer and secretary to be *ex officio* members, and eight (8) members to be elected by ballot; five (5) to form a quorum; the committee to be elected every six (6) months; retiring members to be eligible for re-election.
15. Should any member of the committee resign, cease to be a member of the corps, or be absent from three (3) consecutive meetings, the committee may declare the office vacant and elect another member in his place.
16. That none but those who are returned as effective volunteers shall be permitted to compete for any prize offered by the corps; no member of the corps shall be allowed to enter for any prize offered by the corps until his subscription and all other sums due from him be paid in full.
17. That the subscription be One shilling per month (the members of the band excepted), payable on the first day of every month, the first payment to be made on the first day of January, 1864.
18. That members shall be accountable for the good and serviceable order of their arms, accoutrements, and clothing, and shall make good any damage thereto occasioned by negligence.
19. That any member of the corps appearing in a state of intoxication whilst in uniform, or in any way conducting himself so as to bring disgrace upon the corps, or lending his uniform to any person not a member of the corps, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Forty (40) shillings.
20. A list of all fines imposed under the regulations in these rules shall be posted in the orderly room, or on the volunteer notice board of the corps, or be published in one of the local papers (fourteen (14) days' notice in writing having been previously given to members owing such fines), on the first day of the following month, and such fines must be paid during that month.
21. An account of all fines shall be kept in a book open to inspection in the orderly room.
22. Any member desirous of altering or rescinding any of the foregoing rules, or of adding any new rule, must give fourteen (14) days' notice of the same in writing to the officer commanding, who shall cause a copy of such proposed alteration, rescission, or addition to be posted in the orderly room, or on the volunteer notice board, or published in one of local papers, such notice to be given at least one week before the meeting.
23. If on the 1st January in any year a member's debit exceeds his credit by One pound or upwards, he shall be fined the amount of such difference; provided always, that the amount

of such fine shall not in any case exceed £2, and that the officer commanding may, at his discretion, enforce only one-half the fine.

24. If any member at any time desire to quit the corps under the provisions of the Act, he shall be fined the amount, if more than Ten (10) shillings, whereby the debit exceeds his credit; provided that no such fine shall exceed £2, and that the whole or half may, at the discretion of the officer commanding, be remitted.

EMERALD HILL CORPS OF THE ROYAL VICTORIA VOLUNTEER ARTILLERY.

CONSTRUCTION OF THE CORPS AND ENROLMENT OF NEW MEMBERS.

1. The corps shall consist of those members whose names shall appear on the muster roll on the date on which these rules shall be approved by the Governor in Council, and of such other persons as may from time to time be admitted members in manner hereinafter mentioned.

From and after that date every person desirous of being enrolled shall forward to the commanding officer an application in writing, supported by two members of the corps, and the following particulars also in writing, viz. :-

Age
Height
Occupation
Private address
and
Business address

which particulars shall be posted up in the orderly room for a period of one week, and thereafter submitted to the general committee before admission of the candidate.

ADDRESS.

2. Any member changing his permanent address must give notice of the same in writing to the officer commanding within fourteen days of such change, under a penalty of Two shillings.

Any member of the corps intending to be absent from his usual address for a period of more than thirty days must give notice of the same in writing to the officer commanding, and deposit his arms and accoutrements in the store at the orderly room, under a penalty of Five shillings.

PARADES, DRILLS, ETC.

3. The names of all members attending parades and drills shall be noted down in a book to be kept for such purpose; and any member whose name shall not appear marked on such attendance book as present shall be deemed to have been absent, unless reasonable excuse shall be forwarded to the officer commanding before commencement of parade or drill.

Any member coming late may report himself to the senior officer present, assigning a reason for his late arrival, and if such reason shall be deemed sufficient, such member shall be considered as having been present at parade or drill.

Any member who, after having been supplied with uniform, shall attend parade not dressed in accordance with the established regulations (unless such parade shall have been ordered in plain clothes), or whose arms, accoutrements, or clothing shall be dirty, or in any way unserviceable from neglect, will be liable to a fine not exceeding Five shillings.

MANAGEMENT.

4. The business connected with the corps shall be managed by a "general committee," a "match committee," a secretary and treasurer.

The General Committee

shall consist of two sergeants, two corporals, and seven gunners, besides the officers, secretary, and treasurer, who will be *ex officio* members of all committees.

The general committee shall be elected at a special meeting of the corps, to be held every six months, at the expiration of which time all elected members shall retire from office, but will be eligible for re-election. Absence from three consecutive meetings (without sufficient excuse) will disqualify any elected member, and any vacancy caused by such disqualification, or by resignation, may be filled up by the appointment of the member having the next highest number of votes on the list of members voted for at the last election of members to serve on the committee.

The duties of the general committee shall be as follow :- To consider and decide as to the eligibility or otherwise of all candidates for admission to the corps; to consider and deal with such correspondence as may be submitted to them; to take charge of and be accountable for all property belonging to the corps; to consider, pass, and cause to be paid out of the funds of the corps all just and proper liabilities which may from time to time be incurred in the management or for the benefit of the

same; to report to the corps on the expenditure and condition of its funds and property, and on all other necessary matters, and generally to manage the civil affairs connected therewith.

The general committee shall meet at least once a fortnight on such day as they may agree upon; shall be at liberty to make rules for the conduct of their business; and seven members of such committee shall at all times be sufficient to form a quorum.

The Match Committee

shall consist of five members of the corps, who shall be elected at the same time, in the same manner, for the same period, retire from office and be eligible for re-election in a similar manner in all respects as is herein provided in the case of the general committee, with the like powers for filling up vacancies occurring in their number.

The duties of the match committee shall be as follow:—To challenge and accept or decline challenges for matches with the rifle or other weapons; to make and carry out all necessary arrangements for such matches; to select members to compete therein; to take charge of and arrange as to the competition for prizes, and generally to manage all matters connected with matches.

The match committee shall meet at such times as may be agreed on, and three members shall always form a quorum.

The Secretary and Treasurer

shall be elected annually at a special or general meeting of the corps, and shall hold office for twelve months.

The secretary shall attend the meetings of the corps and committees; keep clear and intelligible minutes or records of all proceedings at such meetings; have the custody of all letters, orders, returns, and other papers connected with the corps, and conduct the correspondence relating thereto under the direction of the officer commanding.

The treasurer shall collect from the sergeants of detachments or others, all fines, or other moneys belonging to the corps; keep proper books of accounts containing entries of all receipts and payments; produce such books whenever required by the corps or general committee; prepare all necessary balance-sheets, and render such explanations regarding the financial affairs of the corps as may be required by proper authority.

The treasurer shall from time to time hand to the officer commanding, or lodge to his credit in a bank as hereinafter mentioned, the moneys received by him so that he shall at no time have more than £5 in his possession.

The secretary or treasurer may at any time be removed from office by the vote of the majority present at any special meeting of the corps. In the event of such removal, or of the resignation of the treasurer or secretary, the corps may at any special or general meeting elect a person to perform the duties for the remainder of the time for which such removed or resigned officer shall have been elected.

PROPERTY, UNIFORM, ETC.

5. Every member will be responsible for the good and serviceable order of his arms, accoutrements, and clothing, and any damage done thereto, except on duty, shall be made good by the person holding the same, or in default he may be fined to the amount of such damage.

Every member must produce his arms for inspection by the officer commanding, or other officer appointed for that purpose, whenever and so often as may be required, and must also return such arms to the officer commanding whenever directed by him so to do, or deposit the same in the orderly room, under a penalty of Ten shillings.

Any person ceasing to be a member of the corps must forward his uniform and the other property of the corps in his possession to the officer commanding, or in default he may be fined to the amount of the value of the property retained by him.

Any member expelled the corps within twelve months from receipt of new uniform shall pay to the officer commanding the full contract price of the same, or in default shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding the amount of such contract price.

Any member who may damage, lose, destroy, or retain any weapon, book, plate, or other property whatever belonging to the corps, shall make good the same to the satisfaction of the officer commanding, or in default be liable to a fine not exceeding the value of the property so damaged, lost, destroyed, or retained.

All property whatsoever belonging to the corps shall for all purposes be considered as vested in the commanding officer and his successors, whose decisions on all questions as to value or amount, with reference to the fines and penalties aforesaid, shall be conclusive.

FUNDS.

6. All moneys granted by the Government shall be at once obtained when payable, and deposited in a bank to the credit of the officer commanding, who shall keep a public account for the purpose, to which shall be added all sums arising from fines or other sources.

All fines shall be collected by the non-commissioned officers from the members of their respective detachments, and when received shall be handed over to the treasurer of the corps.

A book shall be kept called the "Fine Book," in which all fines shall be entered and signed by the commanding officer; a separate entry is also to be made when such fine is collected, with the signature of the receiving officer. This book shall be kept by the commanding officer, and shall be produced when required.

Any member who may be fined must pay the amount of such fine to the non-commissioned officer, or other person authorised by the commanding officer to receive the same, within seven days of its notification to him, and in default of such payment may be proceeded against according to law. In the event of such fine not being paid within seven days from its notification, the same shall be publicly intimated to the corps at their next parade, and the name of the defaulter posted in the orderly room until payment.

At every half-yearly meeting of the corps a balance-sheet showing the actual financial position of the corps, together with a plan of the proposed distribution and expenditure of the funds for the ensuing six months, shall be submitted by the general committee for the approval of the meeting; and no payments shall be made except by the vote of the general committee, in accordance (as far as practicable) with the plan of distribution and expenditure adopted at such meeting. The accounts of the corps shall be audited half-yearly, by two auditors to be elected at any general meeting.

MEETINGS.

7. The officer commanding is empowered at any time to convene a special general meeting of the corps.

On a requisition, signed by not less than twenty members, the commanding officer shall call a special general meeting, giving not less than three days' notice.

Such notice shall consist of an advertisement in three of the daily newspapers and an intimation on parade (when practicable).

At every meeting the senior officer present shall be chairman. No person shall be permitted to speak to any question more than once (unless in explanation), except the mover, who will be entitled to a reply.

No person shall be allowed to vote or take any part in the proceedings at any meeting who is not at the time an "effective" member of the corps, or who shall have any unpaid fine or penalty recorded against him; but a newly joined member will not be so disqualified on the ground of non-effectiveness if he shall have passed recruit and gun drills.

All motions must be delivered to the chairman in writing, and shall be decided by the holding up of hands, unless a division be demanded by two or more members.

No protest can be received.

No meeting shall be adjourned or dissolved without a question to that purpose.

LIABILITIES INCURRED BY THE CORPS FOR MEMBERS.

8. An account shall be kept by the treasurer between the corps and each of its members, wherein the member shall be debited with all liabilities incurred by the corps on his behalf, and credited with all sums earned by him as an effective.

9. If on the 1st January in any year a member's debit exceed his credit by One pound (£1) or upwards, he shall be fined the amount of such difference; provided always, that the amount of such fine shall not in any case exceed Two pounds (£2), and that the officer commanding may, at his discretion, remit one-half of the fine: the amount paid under this rule shall be placed in the book to the credit of the member paying it.

10. If a member at any time desire to quit the corps under the provisions of the Act, he shall be fined the amount if more than Ten shillings (10s.) whereby his debit exceeds his credit; provided that no such fine shall exceed Two pounds (£2), and that the half may, at the discretion of the commanding officer, be remitted.

REPEAL OF OLD LAWS, ETC.

11. All regimental rules and company bye-laws affecting this corps, are hereby rescinded and repealed so far only as the said corps is affected thereby.

No alteration or addition whatever shall be made to these bye-laws, unless at a meeting of the corps especially convened for that purpose.

The foregoing rules and regulations were adopted by the corps at a special general meeting held on the 23rd day of December, 1863.

MINING OPERATIONS AUTHORISED WITHIN EXEMPTED LAND AT DAYLESFORD.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has, by Order made on the 21st day of March, 1864, under the authority conferred by the Gold Fields Act, 21 Victoria No. 32, authorised the holders of miners' rights to prosecute mining operations on the Police Reserve at Daylesford, on the following conditions, viz. :—

1. The surface of the ground shall not be occupied for the purpose of residence, and no tents or huts shall be erected thereon.
 2. That portion of the reserve on which buildings belonging to or in the occupation of the police are situate shall not be injured or encroached upon; and the miners shall not sink any shafts, or make any excavation, in the vicinity of such buildings unless specially authorised so to do by the Honorable the Minister of Mines.
 3. The workings shall be open at all reasonable hours to the inspection of any mining surveyor or other duly authorised officer.
 4. All instructions given by any mining surveyor or other duly authorised officer, relative to the mode of timbering or otherwise protecting the ground, shall be complied with by the miners.
 5. On ceasing to mine, the miners shall fill up all shafts and excavations made by them, remove all débris, clay, and gravel, as well as all fences and buildings erected by them, and leave the surface of the ground in as good a condition as before the commencement of mining operations.
 6.
