THE MINING DISTRICT OF SANDHURST ALTERED.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-first day of March, 1864.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor

Mr. McCulloch	Mr. Francis

Mr. Verdon	Mr. Sullivan

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to erect any portion of the colony into a mining district, and to give such district some distinguishing name, and to define the limits and boundaries thereof, and also again to abolish any such district, and from time to time to alter and vary such limits and boundaries: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council, bearing date the fourth day of January, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, the several districts therein mentioned were erected into mining districts: And whereas by an Order in Council made on a subsequent date the mining district of Sandhurst has been altered as therein mentioned: And whereas it is expedient again to alter the said mining district: Now therefore

His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order alter the said mining district of Sandhurst, and doth define the limits and boundaries thereof to be as follow, that is to say:—

THE MINING DISTRICT OF SANDHURST.—Commencing at the south-western angle of the parish of Lockwood; thence west four miles; thence westerly to the junction of the Deep Creek and the River Loddon; thence northwards by the River Loddon to its junction with Kelsh's Creek; thence due east to the River Campaspe; thence southwards by the River Campaspe to a point due west of Mount Carmel; thence by a line east to the Corinella Creek; thence northwards by that Creek to Lake Cooper; thence by the eastern shores of that lake to the most northern point thereof; thence by a line east to the Goulburn River; thence southwards by that river to its junction with the Jerusalem Creek; thence by that creek to its source; thence by a range running southerly to the Main Dividing Range; thence westerly by that range to the most western source of Mollison's Creek; thence northwards by the Dividing Range to the source of the McIvor or Patterson's Creek; thence by a line north-westerly to the junction of the Rivers Coliban and Campaspe; thence westwards by the River Coliban, the Myrtle Creek, and the Mount Alexander Range, to the northern boundary of the parish of Harcourt; thence west seven miles and sixty-four chains, more or less; and thence north to the commencing point aforesaid.

And the Honorable James Forrester Sullivan, Her Majesty's Minister of Mines for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to split any mining district as thereinbefore mentioned into any number of divisions, and to define the limits and boundaries thereof respectively, and also to determine the number of members of the mining board of such district which shall be elected within and for every such division, and from time to time to alter any such division and the limits and boundaries thereof, and to vary the number of members which shall be elected within and for every such division, but so that the total number of members elected for such district shall in no case exceed or be less than ten: And whereas it is expedient to alter the number of the divisions of the mining district of Sandhurst and the boundaries and limits of certain of the divisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order split the said mining district of Sandhurst into the five divisions named in the first column of the schedule hereunto annexed, and doth define the limits and boundaries of each such division to be those mentioned or set opposite thereto respectively in the last column of the same schedule, and doth determine that the number of members of the mining board of such district which shall be elected within and for every such division shall be that

set immediately under the name of each such division, that is to say:—

SHIRE OF BUNINYONG.

THE following Bye-law No. 1 was duly adopted and passed by special order, in accordance with sections 133 and 174 of the Act 27 Victoria No. 176, at the ordinary meeting of the council of the Shire of Buninyong, on Thursday, the 24th day of March, 1864.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—TO REGULATE THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL AND OFFICE-BEARERS.

1. The business of the council at all ordinary meetings shall be conducted with open doors, unless it shall become necessary to exclude strangers on account of their disorderly conduct.
2. The council shall commence business so soon after the time notified as there is a sufficient number of councillors in attendance to constitute a quorum directed by law, but if at the expiry of an hour from the time specified there is not a quorum present, no business shall be transacted by the council at the meeting; and the names of all councillors present shall be recorded in the minute book by the secretary.
3. The minutes of any preceding meeting not previously confirmed shall be read as the first business at all meetings of the council, in order to their confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings.
4. The reading and ordering on reports of special committees and of officers, and the reading of memorials and receiving depositions, shall follow the correspondence.
5. Every petition or memorial addressed to the council shall be in proper form, and be presented by a member of the council, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.
6. On the presentation of a petition or memorial, no debate shall take place thereon until notice has been given as hereinafter provided; and the only questions that shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation shall be, that the petition be received, and, if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.
7. No report of a committee shall be considered or adopted on its presentation, nor until due notice shall be given. All such reports shall be read and received *pro forma*, and, if ordered by the council, printed for distribution among the councillors, to be considered at any subsequent meeting.
8. If in the report of a committee there are distinct recommendations contained in such report, such report shall not be adopted until the sense of the council has been taken separately on each.
9. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the president may think fit to bring under consideration; any councillor may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable in the form of a notice of motion, such notice to be given in writing to the secretary at least four clear days previous to the meeting at which the same is to be taken into consideration; and all such notices of motion shall be considered in the order in which they are given.
10. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the councillor who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him in writing, be present when the business is called on. Notices not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.
11. No bye-law shall be made save by a "special order" of the council, as provided for by sections 133 and 174 of Act of Parliament No. 176.
12. No motion in which it is proposed to take action on any petition, or in which it is proposed to adopt any address or standing order, shall be entertained, unless the mover shall submit therewith a draft of such petition or standing order; and the draft so submitted shall in no case be taken into consideration until it shall have been referred to the legislative committee, who shall report thereon, and the mover of every such proposition shall be *pro hac vice* a member of such committee.
13. The mover of any motion which may be referred to any committee shall be *pro hac vice* a member of such committee.
14. Before any motion is put from the chair, in case the mover is not prepared with his motion in writing, the secretary shall take down the same in writing, and obtain signatures of the mover and seconder.
15. It shall be competent for any councillor, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any subject at the next or any subsequent meeting, and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given by the secretary to each councillor, by post, of the day for which the order of the day or notice of motion for which such call is made is set down for consideration; and any councillor not in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes under consideration, or not in attendance at the voting upon such question or any amendment thereof, shall be liable to a penalty of Ten shillings, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council; the fines to be applied by the council to charitable purposes.
16. On any motion being put from the chair, the secretary shall enter in the minute book the names of the councillors who voted thereon, and specify whether such councillors voted for or against the motion so put from the chair.
17. All reports sent in to the council by any councillor or councillors thereof, or by any officer of the council, shall be written on sheets of large foolscap paper, on one side only, a broad margin being left, so that they can be properly bound together.
18. Any councillor moving or seconding any motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken on that motion or amendment.
19. If two or more councillors rise to speak at the same time, the president shall decide which is entitled to precedence.

20. No councillor shall speak twice on the same motion or amendment, except by way of explanation, or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last proposed; and the president shall, without waiting for the interposition of the council, call to order any councillor proceeding to speak a second time on the said motion or amendment. After the reply, the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.

21. The president when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule of precedent applicable to the case without argument or comment, and his decision as to what is order or explanation shall be final *pro hac vice* in each case.

22. Every councillor, including the president, shall stand up when addressing the council in discussion of any question.

23. Any councillor may require the secretary to take down any particular words used by a councillor immediately upon the same being used.

24. Any councillor may, of right, require the production of any of the documents of the council relating to the question or matter in discussion.

25. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be moved before the original question is put to the vote.

26. Upon the adoption of any amendment by the council, such amendment shall be held to have quashed the original motion, and for all purposes of subsequent discussion the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.

27. The president shall, on taking the vote on any motion or amendment, put the first question in the affirmative, and then in the negative; and he may do so as often as is necessary to enable him to form and declare his opinion from the show of hands as to which party has the majority; and the council shall vote in all cases by show of hands: Provided always that if at any such meeting there shall be an equality of votes in the election of the president, it shall be decided by lot which of the councillors having an equal number of votes shall be the president.

28. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the council, but if on the question being put the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the council.

29. Any councillor may enter his protest against any resolution of the council, provided such protest is not inconsistent with truth or disrespectful to the council. Notice of intention to protest must, however, in every case be given on the adoption of the resolution protested against, and the protest signed by the councillor or councillors protesting, and specifying the reason for protesting, must be entered before the next regular meeting of the council by the protesting councillor in a book to be kept for that purpose in the secretary's office, and duly referred to in the minutes of the council, the same to be considered also a part of such minutes.

30. A notice of motion may be dispensed with in cases of emergency, where the council considers it necessary to do so, there being not more than one councillor absent at such council meeting.

31. No election to any vacant office, at the disposal of the council, shall take place until six clear days' public notice shall have been given by advertisement in one or more of the local newspapers inviting application from candidates properly qualified.

32. That a letter-book be kept by the secretary, containing all correspondence received and sent by the council. And that the engineer keep a journal for reference, showing how his time has been employed.

33. That the secretary of the council keep a debtor and creditor account for each division of the shire, the same to be posted up for reference at all ordinary meetings.

34. That the officers of the council (with all books and documents) attend at the place of meeting at least one hour prior to the hour of meeting, to afford members any information required.
