CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH REWARDS WILL BE GIVEN FOR THE DISCOVERY OF NEW GOLD FIELDS DURING THE YEAR 1864.

THAT person will even majestrate of the district. In such a practicable, the exact locality, and the distance from the nearest town.

New years of the same in writing to the warden or police magistrate of the district. In such notification the discoverer shall state, as nearly as practicable, the exact locality, and the distance from the nearest gold workings or nearest town.

2. No reward will exceed £1000. In fixing the amount to be paid for any discovery, regard will be had to the number of men employed on the new gold field, its distance from the nearest gold workings, the character of the deposits in which the gold occurs, and the depth of sinking.

3. If two or more persons simultaneously discover gold in the same locality, or in places immediately adjacent, and they each severally comply with the conditions above mentioned, the sum proper to be awarded will be divided amongst the several persons who have discovered the gold field, in such manner as shall be just.

4. Rewards shall be given in accordance with the following

A. For the discovery of a gold field distant more than one mile and less than two miles from the nearest gold workings, and on which there shall be employed, three months after the report of the discovery having been made, not less than 200 men, a sum not exceeding £200.

B. For the discovery of a gold field distant more than two miles and less than three miles from the nearest gold workings, and on which there shall be employed, three months after the report of the discovery having been made, not less than 200 men, a sum not exceeding £300.

C. For the discovery of a gold field distant more than three miles and less than five miles from the nearest gold workings, and on which there shall be employed, three months after the report of the discovery having been made, not less than 200 men, a sum not exceeding £400.

D. For the discovery of a gold field distant more than five

made, not less man 210 men, a sum not exceeding ±400.

D. For the discovery of a gold field distant more than five miles from the nearest gold workings, and on which there shall be employed, six months after the report of the discovery, not less than 500 men, a sum not exceeding ±1000.

The words "nearest gold workings," shall mean gold workings on which miners are actually employed in searching for gold.

the same shall be a common under the name of "The United
Town and Gold Field [or, as the case may be] Common of

on either: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the
Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the neighboring commons hereimafter
mentioned to be a United Common, under the following name,
that is to say:—

THE UNITED TOWN AND FARMERS' COMMON OF BACCHUS MARSH, comprising the Darley Town Common (described in a Proclamation bearing date the ninth day of May, 1864), and the Bacchus Marsh Farmers' Common, near Goodman's Creek, described in a Proclamation bearing date the eighteenth day of February, 1861. And the said United Common shall be for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either of the above-mentioned commons.—(64.1.3594.)

WHEREAS by The Land Act, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold field common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act, Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby alter and proclaim the commons hereinalter mentioned in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

March, 1864), is hereby altered by withdrawing therefrom allotments 4 A, 46, 54, 55, 56, and 61, in the parish of Kelfeera; and by adding thereto, in lieu of and equivalent in area to the before-named allotments, the reserve adjoining_and north of allotment 1 of section K, in the parish of Benalla, and west of allotment 6 of section I, in same parish; and the following allotments on the west bank of the Broken River:

Parish of Benalla, allotments 5, 6, 17, and 23 of section P; 32, 13, 18, 19, 21, 22, 23, 24 to 29, and 34 to 38 inclusively of section U; and those portions of allotments 17 and 18 of section C, not already comprised within the existing common; as shown on plan deposited in Crown Lands Office; excluding from the above-described area all sold and legally appropriated Crown lands.—(64,L3918.)

"WEIGHTS AND MEASURES STATUTE."

THE attention of the Councils of boroughs or shires and the Boards of road districts is invited to the following clauses of the Weights and Measures Statute (about to become law), 19, 28, 29, 30, 31; and it is suggested that such Councils or Boards as may be desirous of being supplied with Authorised Copies of the Standard Weights and Measures for their respective districts, should apply for the same without delay.

Any two or more Councils of boroughs or shires or Boards of road districts adjoining, which may intend to form a "union" under the Act, should at once meet and decide upon the necessary arrangement, of which full particulars should be communicated to this department under the respective seals of any such council or board.

19. Issue of authorised copies. Authorised copies to be deposited.—Upon application made by the council of any borough or shire or the board of any road district and upon payment of the price fixed by the Governor in Council in that behalf the said Commissioner shall issue, to such council or board one or more sets of authorised copies of the standard weights and measures and such authorised copies shall be the property of the body corporate of the borough shire or district for which the same have been issued and every such council or board shall cause one set of such authorised copies to be deposited with and safely kept by each of the inspectors hercinafter mentioned at such place and in such building within the limits for which such inspector has been appointed as the council or board directs.

28. Unions.—Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore con-

anything hereinbefore contained the Governor in Council or board directs. 23. Unions.—Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained the Governor in Council at the request of and pursuant to any agreement made by the councils or boards of any two or more of any adjoining boroughs shires and road districts may proclaim such boroughs shires and districts to be a "Union" for the purposes of this Act and by such proclamation fix the proportion in which the expenses devolving upon such union under this Act shall be borne by the several bodies corporate of such boroughs shires or districts.

29. Powers &c. of unions.—All acts and things which in respect of any borough shire or road district may under this Act be done had or suffered by or with regard to the council board or body corporate thereof respectively may in respect of any union be had done or suffered by or with regard to the councils and boards (or the number of members thereof which may legally exercise the powers of such councils and boards respectively) of the boroughs shires and road districts constituting such union jointly and for the purposes of this Act such councils and boards may hold meetings at the office of one of such councils or boards and may make bye-laws for the regulation of their proceedings at such meetings.

30. Bue-laws.—All bye-laws made by the joint councils and

30. Bye-laws.—All bye-laws made by the joint councils and boards of any such union shall be made as nearly as may be in accordance with the provisions of any Act for the time being in force regulating the manner in which bye-laws shall be made by any borough council.

31. Authorised copies &c. to be vested in bodies corporate jointly.—The authorised copies of the weights and measures and all stamps brands beams scales and books issued for such union shall be vested in the said bodies corporate as co-partners and any bond entered into or other security given by any inspector of weights and measures appointed for such union shall be to the said bodies corporate jointly.

The deaths during April, 1864, numbered 278 against 279 in March, 310 in February, and 324 in January. Whilst the mortality of the month was low, it will be observed that the mean temperature was considerably above the average.

Deaths of males during the month amounted to 51 per cent., and those of females to 49 per cent. of the total. Sixty-two per cent. of the deaths were of children under 5, against 57 per cent. in March, 1863; 58 per cent. in March, 1862; 65 per cent. in March, 1861; and 61 per cent. in March, 1860.

Seventeen deaths took place on the 12th, and 14 on the 14th and 25th. These were the highest numbers recorded. The lowest were 4 on the 30th, and 5 on the 3rd and 13th.

The oldest persons whose deaths occurred during the month were, a male, aged 78, of diarrhœa, and another male, aged 75, of old age.

Only six deaths from violence took place during the month, a number considerably below the average. They were thus \described:—A steward, aged 42, was drowned in the Yarra, as were also a laborer, aged 27, and a lad, aged 16. A drayman, aged 33, and a steward, aged 55, perished in a conflagration. A child, 10 months old died of scales.

The deaths in public institutions numbered 35, or nearly 13 per cent. of the total mortality. Of these 27 were in the Melbourne Ilospital, 4 in the Benevolent Asylum, 1 in the Lying-in Hospital, 2 in the Immigrants' Home, and 1 in the Central Gaol.
