WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that in and for each original district within thirty days after the commencement of this Act, and in and for each single proclaimed district within fifteen days after the constitution thereof, the Governor in Council shall, and from time to time afterwards if it shall seem fit may on the application of the board of any such district, appoint a sufficient number of polling places for every such district at which the poll shall be taken at all elections held for the same, and may from time to time on the like application alter and vary the same: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council, made on the thirtieth day of September, 1863, polling places were appointed for elections in original districts: And whereas by divers Orders made on the thirtieth day of November and the seventh day of December, 1863, and the first day of February and the thirtieth day of May, 1864, the polling places were varied and altered as therein mentioned: And whereas it is expedient to alter and vary the polling places in the undermentioned shire and district: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order appoint the polling place mentioned in the first schedule hereunto annexed to be an additional polling place for the shire of Ripon; and, with the advice aforesaid, doth further appoint that the polling place mentioned in the second schedule hereunto annexed shall be a substituted polling place for the Bannockburn road district, viz.:—

WHEREAS by *The Electoral Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council shall within thirty days after the commencement thereof, and afterwards as he shall see fit from time to time, appoint within and for each division of every province and district respectively one place and not more for taking the poll in such division at contested elections for the province or district; and every such appointment may revoke; provided that if the returning officer of the province or district and any police magistrate or superintendent of police acting in the locality shall by writing under their hands certify to the Governor that it is necessary so to do, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to appoint as aforesaid in and for such division one or more polling place or places, and the appointment of such place or places or any of them from time to time to revoke; provided also that no appointment of any polling place in or for any division of a province or district shall be revoked between the issue of any writ for election for the same and the return of such writ: And whereas the returning officer for the Murray electoral district and the police magistrates acting in the localities have, by writing under their hands, certified to the Governor that it is necessary to appoint additional polling places for the Mansfield division of the said district: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order appoint Jamieson, Gadhney's Creek, and Wood's Point, to be additional polling places in and for the Mansfield division for taking the poll in such division at contested elections for the electoral district of the Murray.

INCENDIARISM.

ONE HUNDRED POUNDS REWARD.—FREE PARDON TO AN ACCOMPLICE.

WHEREAS in the evening of Sunday, the 12th of June instant, a Stack, containing about forty tons of oaten straw, the property of Edward Wilson, was wholly consumed by fire, on the Arundel Farm, near Keilor: And whereas the said stack appears to have been maliciously set on fire by some evil-disposed person or persons: And whereas Mr. Wilson has offered a reward of Fifty pounds for such information as will lead to the conviction of the incendiaries: Notice is hereby given that a reward of Fifty pounds (supplemental to the reward offered by Mr. Wilson) will be paid by the Government for such information as shall lead to the conviction of the person or persons who set fire to the stack aforesaid.

The number of deaths during the month of May was 310, against 278 in April, and 279 in March. The mortality in May, it will be observed, was slightly in excess of the average of the same month in five successive years.

Males and females died during the month in the respective proportions of 59 and 41 per cent. Fifty-eight per cent of the deaths were of children under five years of age, against 52 per cent. in May, 1863; 54 per cent. in May, 1862; 53 per cent. in May, 1861; and 56 per cent. in May, 1860.

The largest number of deaths which took place on any one day was 17 on the 11th. The next largest was 16 on the 17th; then 15 on the 13th, 14 on the 3rd, and 13 on the 9th, 15th, and 24th. The days of lowest mortality were the 2nd and 29th, on the former of which the recorded deaths numbered only 5, and on the latter only 6.

A female at the advanced age of 84 died during the month of diarrhoea; also a male at 80 of old age; another male, aged 75, died of apoplexy.

Twelve violent deaths took place during the month, of which three were from drowning, viz., those of a mariner, aged 24, in Hobson's Bay; a tailor, aged 38, and a baker, aged 53, in the Yarra. A drayman, aged 30, a coal merchant, aged 37, and a drayman, aged 40, died of fractured skulls. A laborer, aged 25, died of a kick of a horse, as also did a child, aged 2. A child, aged 3½, died

from the effects of an accidental cut on the cheek. An infant, aged 3 months, and another of 20 days old, were suffocated in bed. Another infant was accidentally suffocated on the day of its birth in a manner not stated.

The deaths in public institutions numbered 59, or 19 per cent. of the whole number recorded. Of these 33 occurred in the Melbourne Hospital, 5 in the Benevolent Asylum, 6 in the Immigrants' Home, 13 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the hulk *Success*, lying in Hobson's Bay, and 1 in the Collingwood Stockade.

Of the 181 deaths of children under five years of age, 104, or slightly over 57 per cent., were of males, 77, or rather less than 43 per cent. of females; of those dying 122 were under one year of age, 25 were between one and two years, 13 were between two and three, 12 were between three and four, and 4 were between four and five.

Of the 129 persons whose deaths occurred beyond the age of five years, 80, or about 62 per cent., were males, and 49, or nearly 38 per cent., were of females; 7 were between five and ten years of age, 5 were between ten and fifteen, 6 were between fifteen and twenty, 6 were between twenty and twenty-five, 22 were between twenty-five and thirty, 17 were between thirty and thirty-five, 19 were between thirty-five and forty, 11 were between forty and forty-five, 11 were between forty-five and fifty, 8 were between fifty and fifty-five, 4 were between fifty and sixty, 6 were between sixty and sixty-five, 1 was between sixty-five and seventy, 3 were between seventy and seventy-five, and 3 were seventy-five and upwards.

ADDITIONAL CLAUSE TO THE GENERAL BYE-LAW, No. 6, OF THE SANDHURST MINING BOARD OF 22ND FEBRUARY, 1864.—[26th May, 1864.]

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Sandhurst, begun and holden at Sandhurst, in the said district, on the twenty-sixth day of May, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

Lien clause.—The holder or holders of any registered claim (whether quartz or alluvial), or of any share or interest therein, may grant a lien upon the same to any person or persons as security for the payment of any debt or liability which he or they may have contracted; and upon production to the registrar of the register, or transfer, or certificate, by which the intending lienor holds each share, claim, or interest, intended to be made subject to such lien, and of the lienor's miner's right, and upon the execution of a lien ticket by a lienor or licensee, as in the form at present employed by the registrar in the frontage system, the said registrar shall register the said lien, and after making such registration, he (the registrar) shall issue to the licensee a duplicate of the lien ticket, and shall inscribe on the register, or transfer ticket, or certificate of the lienor, the date and amount of the lien, and name of the licensee. And every such lien so effected shall be a specific charge upon such subject or lien; and when more than one lien shall be effected on the same subject, each lien shall take precedence according to their respective dates:

Provided also that in event of such lienor neglecting to discharge such lien at the expiration of fourteen (14) days after the time specified for the discharge of such lien, then shall the

subject of such lien become the absolute property of the licensee, who shall be registered as the absolute owner thereof.

BYE-LAW REPEALING CLAUSE No. 12 ALLUVIAL, AND No. 17 PUDDLING AND CEMENT CRUSHING, OF THE GENERAL BYE-LAW, No. 6, OF THE SANDHURST MINING BOARD OF 22ND FEBRUARY, 1864.—[23rd June, 1864.]

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Sandhurst, begun and holden at Sandhurst, in the said district, on the twenty-third day of June, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

The clause No. 12 alluvial claims, and clause No. 17 puddling and cement crushing, of the General Bye-law, No. 6, passed by the Sandhurst Mining Board on the 22nd February, 1864, and gazetted on the 4th day of March, 1864, is hereby repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:

Shepherding claims in alluvial ground.—On the day on which any claim shall be taken possession of, not less than one-half the shareholders must remain thereon for two (2) consecutive hours, viz., from Nine (9) of the clock a.m. to Eleven (11) of the clock a.m.; and on every succeeding day each shareholder in such claim must (except prevented through sickness or any public holiday) be present thereon during the term above-mentioned, until work is commenced and continued in a *bona fide* manner. No share or interest in any claim being shepherded shall, under any circumstances, become liable to forfeiture, unless through absence from such claim during the hours specified above. But no person holding a share or interest in a claim under this clause can hold any other share or interest at the same time, unless such share or interest be represented by a miner other than himself, and in all respects in accordance with the provisions of the bye-law.

Puddling and cement crushing.—In all partially worked and unoccupied ground where horse machinery is employed, and miner or miners employing not less than three (3) men to each machine shall be entitled to hold one (1) acre to each machine, exclusive of the site of his or their mill; and where steam machinery is employed, three (3) acres, which may be taken up in not more than two (2) blocks; the working of either of which shall be deemed a working of the claim. Provided that no such claims be allowed on any gold field until after the expiration of twelve (12) months from the date of the day on which the prospecting claim of such gold field was allowed.

BYE-LAWS, made by "special order," at a meeting of the council held on Wednesday, the 15th day of June, 1864, in accordance with sections 171, 174, and 175 of *The Local Government Act, 1862*—

1. The ordinary meetings of the council shall be held at the office of the council, on the second Wednesday of every month, at Eleven o'clock in the forenoon. The business to commence as soon as the required quorum is present, but should a quorum not be present at the expiration of one hour after the time appointed for meeting, no business shall be transacted at the meeting, and the names of all councillors present shall be recorded in the minute book by the secretary.

2. Special meetings may be summoned at any time by the secretary, upon his receiving a written requisition signed by three councillors, stating the matter to be brought forward at such meetings, provided he shall give to each councillor written notice thereof at least four clear days before such meeting.

3. At every ordinary meeting of the council the first business thereof shall be the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting for confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of proceedings. The minutes, when confirmed, shall be signed by the president, or in his absence, the acting president.

4. At all meetings of the council, the reading, considering, and ordering upon correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, the receiving and reading of petitions and memorials, and bringing up of reports of committees and of officers, shall have precedence of regular business.

5. Any petition or memorial addressed to the council must be presented by a councillor, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded, and no debate shall take place thereon except as to its being received and taken into consideration after the orders of the day, or at any future meeting, or if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.

6. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, all business of which due notice has been given, and any subject which the president may think fit to bring under consideration.

7. Notices of motion shall be given to the secretary in writing, and read aloud at the meeting previous to that at which the same shall be taken into consideration, and all such notices shall be considered in the order in which they are given.

8. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the councillor who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called on. Notices not proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.

9. Every councillor, including the president, shall stand while addressing the council.

10. The president's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice.

11. Every motion or amendment shall be entered on the minutes with the names of the mover and seconder, and on a division, the secretary may be required by any councillor to record the votes.

12. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried, it shall be competent for any councillor to move one other amendment thereon.

13. Any councillor moving or seconding any motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken on that motion or amendment.

14. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, excepting by way of explanation or reply upon an original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of an amendment last proposed; and after the reply, the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.

15. Any councillor when proposing a motion or amendment, or if speaking on any matter, shall address the president, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall be silent, until the councillor calling to order shall have been heard, and the question of order decided; the councillor in possession of the chair shall then proceed with the subject.

16. Any councillor who shall refuse to obey when ruled out of order, or who shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, and who, if required by the president, shall refuse to withdraw such expression and make a satisfactory apology, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5.

17. Any councillor may require the secretary to take down any particular words used by a councillor, immediately upon the same being used.

18. All questions before the council shall be decided by show of hands, and the president shall, on taking the vote on any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative; and he may do so as often as may be necessary to enable him to decide which party has the majority: Provided always, that if at any meeting for the election of president there should be an equality of votes, it shall be decided by lot which of the councillors having an equal number of votes shall be the president.

19. Upon the adoption of any amendment of the council, such amendment shall be held to have quashed the original motion; and for all purposes of subsequent discussion, the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.

20. Any councillor may enter his protest against any resolution of the council. Notice of intention to protest must, however, be given in every case on the adoption of the resolution to be protested against; and the protest, signed by the councillor or councillors protesting, and specifying the reasons for protesting, must be entered before the next ordinary meeting of the council, by the protesting councillor or councillors, in a book to be kept for that purpose in the office of the council.

21. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the council; but if on the question being put the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment be carried. The business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the council.

22. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to revoke or alter any motion that may have passed the council, shall be entertained, unless in compliance with clause 136 of the Act 27 Victoria No. 176.

23. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would involve the expenditure of any sum of money exceeding £50, shall be entertained by the council, unless notice of such motion be given in the usual manner.

24. It shall be competent for any councillor, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any subject, at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof, and of the date for which the order of the day or notice of motion for which such call is made is set down for consideration, shall be given by the secretary to each councillor, and any councillor not in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes on for discussion, or at the voting on such question, or any amendment thereon, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £2, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown.

25. No election to any vacant office at the disposal of the council, the yearly emolument of which shall exceed £50, shall take place until six clear days' public notice shall have been given by advertisement in the local newspapers, inviting applications from candidates properly qualified.

26. No tenders for works shall be received unless accompanied by a preliminary deposit, according to the following scale, as a guarantee of the *bona fide* intention of the tenderer:—

If the tender is under £100 a deposit of £2	3
