REGULATION AS TO CROWN GRANTS OF LANDS SELECTED.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has made the subjoined Regulation, under *The Land Act, 1862*, § 133, relative to the issue of Crown Grants of leased moieties of allotments to original selectors and lessees or their heirs and assigns, viz.:-

Crown Grants of the leased moieties of allotments under *The Land Act, 1862*, shall not be made out and issued until the full amount of rent has been paid, and the persons entitled to such grants have made written application for the same to the Commissioner of Lands and Survey.

Persons claiming as the heirs of the original selectors and lessees must, in addition to the above application, give proof of heirship and of the death of the person through whom they claim; or if claiming as assignees, proof of the fact of their being the assignee of the original selector and lessee.

NEW MANUFACTURES AND INDUSTRIES.

THE Governor in Council having appointed

THE COMMISSIONER OF TRADE AND CUSTOMS,
THE HONORABLE R. S. ANDERSON, M.P.,
J. C. RIDDELL, Esq., M.P.,
T. J. SUMNER, Esq., and
WILLIAM LYALL, Esq.,

to be a Board to consider claims for Rewards and Premiums for New Manufactures and Industries, in accordance with the regulations submitted to Parliament on the 1st June, 1864, all persons who may deem themselves entitled to rewards or premiums under the regulations referred to, are requested to forward their claims to Mr. Chaloner Greville, secretary to the Board, Custom House, Melbourne.

A copy of the Regulations is attached, to the 4th clause of which the Board desire to direct particular attention.

REGULATIONS FOR EXPENDING THE SUM OF FIVE THOUSAND POUNDS, VOTED BY PARLIAMENT IN THE YEAR 1864, FOR THE PROMOTION OF NEW MANUFACTURES AND INDUSTRIES.

1. The Governor in Council shall appoint a Board, to whom shall be referred the consideration of all claims for premiums or rewards under the above grant.

2. Such sums as may be recommended by the said Board shall (subject to the approval of the Governor in Council) be paid to the persons or company who shall first successfully establish in Victoria any new manufacture or production.

3. Precedence of claim will be given to the following items, and the reward measured by the excellence and extent of the manufacture or article produced:—

Woollen Goods.—Blankets, rugs, flannels, cloth, or other woollen fabrics of general use.

Paper.—Wrapping, printing, or writing.

Glass.—Sheet or plate glass, tumblers, wine glasses, or bottles.

Crockery.—China, porcelain, or any of the finer classes of earthenware.

Leather.—For excellence in the manufacture of leather, for other and higher purposes than the sole and kip leather now produced.

Olive Oil.—The produce of trees grown in Victoria (the quantity not being less than 100 gallons).

Flax.—Not less than one ton, properly prepared for manufacturing purposes.

Flax (or Linseed) Oil.—Not less than 100 gallons, properly prepared for manufacturing purposes.

Hemp.—Not less than one ton, properly prepared for manufacturing purposes.

Cotton.—Not less than one ton, properly prepared for manufacturing purposes.

Hops.—Not less than one ton, properly prepared.

Silk.—Not less than one hundredweight, the produce of silkworms bred in Victoria.

4. It shall be competent for the Board to receive, and, if approved of, to recommend rewards for other articles of local manufacture or production, or to offer and publish such special rewards or premiums as it may think fit; and also to refuse reward or premium to any new article of growth or manufacture, if it is not considered to be of merit and usefulness sufficient to entitle it to favorable consideration.

PRIZE ESSAYS.*

IT is hereby notified that, in pursuance of a resolution of the Legislative Assembly, a premium of One hundred and fifty pounds will be awarded for the best essay on each of the two following subjects, viz.:-

I.

Pleuro-pneumonia; its causes, symptoms, post-mortem appearances (pathology); the best means of treatment; and practical hints on the avoidance of the disease and its eradication from the colony.

II.

Scab; its causes, symptoms, pathology; best means of treatment; and practical hints for its avoidance and extermination.

The possibility of determining by inspection of the entire or divided animal in slaughter-houses or butchers' shops whether the animal has died or been slaughtered; whether it has been the subject of the above or any other disease; and if so, what are the signs by which such disease can be recognized.

Whether food prepared from such flesh should be allowed to be consumed, or whether it should be confiscated and destroyed.

The essays must be legibly written on foolscap paper, on one side only, and leaving a two-inch margin.

No essay is to be in the handwriting of its author nor signed with his name; but for the purpose of identification each essay must bear a motto, and must be accompanied by a sealed envelope containing the name and address of the author, and on the outside, but not in the author's handwriting, the motto affixed to the essay.

The essays must be forwarded to this office, addressed to the Honorable the Chief Secretary, on or before the 1st February next.

The Government will appoint three judges to decide on the respective values of the essays, but it reserves to itself the power to withhold the premium in the case of either subject, should the essays be considered unworthy of the premium offered. The essays for which premiums may be awarded will be considered the property of the Government.

and passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, and numbered 213, intituled, *An Act to consolidate Acts now in force in Victoria relating to Real Property.*

This commission to remain in force until revoked.

Given under my hand and the seal of the Supreme Court, at Melbourne, this thirteenth day of July, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria passed
in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present
Majesty, intituled, *An Act to consolidate the Laws for the pro-
tection of Fisheries and Game*, it is amongst other things
enacted, that if any person shall set, lay down, use, or fish with any
kind of net in the Yarra Yarra, Plenty, Werribee, or Saltwater
Rivers, in the colony of Victoria, or in any other lake, creek, stream, or
pond, to which the Governor, with the advice of the Execu-
tive Council, shall, by proclamation duly published in the
Government Gazette, extend the provisions of the 11th clause of
the said Act, he shall forfeit such net, and also such sum, not
exceeding Ten pounds, as the convicting justice shall think fit:
Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of
Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby

extend the above-recited provisions of the said Act, being the
11th clause thereof, to Swan Bay and the Swan Ponds, in the
county of Grant.

SHIRE OF MORTLAKE. BYE-LAWS OF THE COUNCIL.

THE meetings of the council shall be held at the office of the council, at Mortlake, at Eleven o'clock a.m., on the first Friday in each month.

2. Should a quorum not be present within one hour after the time appointed for holding any meeting, the circumstance shall be entered in the minute-book, together with the name or names of the councillor or councillors present, if any.

3. The first business at all meetings of the council shall be the reading and confirmation of the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings; after confirmation, such minutes shall be signed as confirmed by the president of the council, or, in his absence, by the acting president.

4. Special meetings of the council shall, on the requisition of three or more councillors, be convened by the secretary, the object of such meeting being set forth in the requisition.

5. At all ordinary meetings of the council, after confirmation of the minutes, the following shall be the order of business, viz.:

1. Reading, considering, and ordering upon correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day.
2. Receiving and reading petitions and memorials, if any.
3. Reading and ordering upon reports, if any.

6. The orders of the day shall include all business before, but not disposed of at, former meetings of the council, all matters of which due notice has been given, and any business the president, with the concurrence of the majority of the council, may see fit to bring under consideration, and shall have precedence in the order in which they appear in the minute-book and notice-book respectively.

7. Any memorial or petition addressed to the council shall be presented by a councillor, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded; and no debate shall take place thereon, except as to its being received, until notice shall have been given as herein provided.

8. Every councillor shall stand while addressing the president.

2. The president's decision shall be final on all points of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument, except by way of citing precedent.

3. No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion, nor impute improper motives; and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly, and any councillor making use of any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, shall, if required by the president, withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology to the council.

4. The president shall call to order any councillor out of order; and if the councillor deemed out of order shall not obey, he shall be liable to a penalty for every such offence not exceeding £3.

9. The president shall stand while addressing the council on any subject.

10. Notice of motion, bearing the signature of the mover, shall be delivered to the secretary, who shall enter it in a book kept for that purpose, and the councillor giving such notice shall read it aloud, and endorse thereon the day upon which he intends to submit it for consideration.

11. Every motion or amendment shall be committed to writing before it is entertained, and shall then be entered in the minute-book with the names of the mover and seconder; and on the division thereon, if any, the votes shall be recorded, and the names of the councillors voting *pro* and *con* specified.

12. Any councillor when proposing a motion or amendment shall address the president, and shall not be interrupted except by a call to order, when he shall be silent until the councillor calling to order shall be heard, and the question of order decided, when the councillor in possession of the chair shall proceed with the subject.

13. Any councillor moving or seconding any motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken on that motion or amendment.

14. No member shall speak twice on the same question, except by way of explanation, or in reply to any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last proposed; after the reply, the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.

15. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but all amendments shall be discussed and put before the original motion, and no councillor shall move more than one amendment on the same question.

16. The president shall, on taking the vote on any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative, and he may do so as often as may be necessary to enable him to decide which is in the majority.

17. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the council, but if on the question being put the motion for adjournment be negatived, the subject then under consideration, if any, or if none, then the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed before any subsequent motion for adjournment be entertained.

18. Upon the adoption of any amendment by the council, such amendment shall be held to have quashed the original motion, and for all purposes of subsequent discussion the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.

19. The council shall in all cases vote by show of hands, except when inconsistent with, or repugnant to, any of the provisions of the Local Government Act.

20. Any councillor may protest against any resolution of the council by delivering the same in writing to the secretary duly signed, the reason or reasons for protesting being therein stated; and the secretary shall make an entry of the same in the minute-book.

21. No motion the effect of which if carried would involve the expenditure of any sum of money exceeding £50 shall be entertained by the council unless notice of such motion be given in the usual manner.

22. Any councillor may require the secretary to take down in writing any particular word or words used by any councillor, immediately on the same being said.

23. In all cases it shall be sufficient for the collector to call once for any sum due on the rate roll; and in the event of any such sum not being paid to him when he calls for it, he shall leave a notice bearing the date upon which he calls, demanding payment of such sum at the office of the council within fourteen days from the date of such notice, wherein shall be stated that in default of such payment legal proceedings for the recovery of such sum shall be taken.

24. Any officer or servant of the council who shall wilfully by any act of omission or commission of any matter or thing appertaining to his duties, by which the council shall sustain any loss or damage, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £25.

25. In the event of any contractor not completing his contract within the term stipulated in the conditions thereof, the engineer shall immediately report thereon to the council.

26. No councillor or officer of the council shall be received as surety for any officer appointed by the council.

27. All tenders shall be addressed to the president of the council, and shall not be opened till the day fixed for their consideration, or any postponement thereof, and then by the president or the acting president only.

28. All tenders must be accompanied by a preliminary deposit of not less than two per cent. on the amount of contract; and any contractor whose tender shall be accepted by the council, and who fails or refuses to pay the deposit hereinafter referred to, and signs the contract, shall forfeit the amount of his preliminary deposit.

29. Successful tenderers shall, within six days from the date of the notification of the acceptance of their tenders, deposit with the council a sum equal to £5 per cent. on the amount thereof, as security for the due fulfilment of their contracts, such amount to be refunded to the contractor on production of the engineer's certificate of satisfactory completion of the works under the contract; but in the event of the non-performance of such works by the contractor through any cause whatsoever, the council shall be entitled absolutely to forfeit such deposit as liquidated damages for breach of contract, and to retain the same for their own use and benefit.
