THE BOROUGH OF JAMIESON.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twelfth day of September, 1864.

WHEREAS by *The Municipal Corporations Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted that any district not being a district wholly or in part comprised within the limits of the city of Melbourne, or, save as therein provided, the town of Geelong, or of any of the boroughs constituted by or under the said Act, which district shall not exceed in area nine square miles, and shall have no one point in such area distant more than six miles from any other point therein, and shall contain a population of inhabitant householders not less than three hundred, may be constituted a borough in manner next hereinafter mentioned; and it is also enacted that if not less than one hundred and fifty of the inhabitant householders resident within any such last-mentioned district shall sign and cause to be presented to the Governor a petition, praying him to constitute such district a borough under the said Act, and in such petition shall set forth accurately the boundaries of the district to which such petition shall refer, and if within one month of the publication as hereinafter mentioned of such petition, an equal or greater number of inhabitant householders resident within such district so described shall not have signed and caused to be presented to the Governor a petition praying him not to grant the prayer of such first-mentioned petition, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by an Order in Council, if it shall seem fit, to constitute such district, or any portion thereof, a borough within the meaning of the said Act; and it is further enacted that in every such Order in Council as aforesaid the name and boundaries of the borough thereby constituted shall be set forth, and upon the making of every such order the district therein named shall be and be deemed to be a "borough" hereinafter sometimes called a "proclaimed borough" within the meaning of the said Act; provided that such district shall not comprise any locality not included within the boundaries set forth in the petition for the constitution thereof: And whereas a petition in accordance with the provisions of the said Act has been presented to the Governor, and notice of such petition has been duly given in the *Government Gazette* of the ninth day of August now last past: And whereas no petition has been presented to the Governor, in the manner allowed and prescribed by the said Act, praying him not to grant the prayer of the petition above mentioned: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth, in exercise of the power and authority conferred by the said Act, constitute the district hereinafter described a borough within the meaning of the said Act, and doth set forth the name and the boundaries of the said borough in manner following, that is to say:—

THE BOROUGH OF JAMIESON—Commencing at a point on the eastern bank of the river Goulburn, being the extreme north corner of allotment 8, section B; thence east one mile; thence south one and a half miles; thence west about one mile ten chains to the eastern bank of the river Goulburn; thence in a northerly direction along the eastern bank of the river Goulburn to the point of commencement.

INCORPORATED CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for Hospitals and Charitable Institutions*, it is amongst other things enacted that any institution established for the cure of disease, or for the relief of diseased, aged, incurable, or destitute persons, and supported in whole or in part by the voluntary contributions of not less than fifty persons, each of whom shall have paid not less than One pound per annum or Twenty pounds in one donation, may be incorporated as thereinafter mentioned, and all persons who shall have paid as aforesaid shall be deemed contributors within the meaning of the said Act; and it is also enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less twenty-five of the said persons praying that such institution may be incorporated, to cause the substance or prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition signed by an equal or greater number of such persons shall have been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication) the Governor in Council may declare the contributors for the time being to such institution to be and they shall thereupon become and continue a body politic and corporate by the style and title named in the Order in Council, and shall have perpetual succession and a common seal: And whereas the Governor in Council has received petitions signed by not less than twenty-five contributors to the Castlemaine Hospital and to the Castlemaine Benevolent Asylum respectively, qualified by payments as required by the said Act, praying that the said institutions may be incorporated: And whereas the substance or prayer of the said petitions has been published in the *Government Gazette*, and no counter-petitions have been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order declare the contributors to the said several institutions to be bodies politic and corporate in accordance with the provisions of the said Act in manner following, that is to say:—

The contributors for the time being to the institution called and known as the Castlemaine Hospital, situate in the borough of Castlemaine, are hereby declared to be a body politic and corporate by the style and title of "The Castlemaine Hospital."

The contributors for the time being to the institution called and known as the Castlemaine Benevolent Asylum, situate in the borough of Castlemaine, are hereby declared to be a body politic and corporate by the style and title of "The Castlemaine Benevolent Asylum."

And the Honorable James McCulloch, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

ADDITIONAL POLLING PLACE FOR THE ELECTORAL DISTRICT OF CRESWICK.

WHEREAS by *The Electoral Act*, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council shall, within thirty days after the commencement thereof, and afterwards as he shall see fit from time to time, appoint within and for each division of every province and district respectively one place and not more for taking the poll in such division at contested elections for the province or district, and every such appointment may revoke; provided that if the returning officer of the province or district and any police magistrate or superintendent of police acting in the locality shall by writing under their hands certify to the Governor that it is necessary so to do it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to appoint as aforesaid in and for such division one or more polling place or places, and the appointment of such place or places or any of them from time to time to revoke; provided also that no appointment of any polling place in or for any division of a province or district shall be revoked between the issue of any writ for election for the same and the return of such writ: And whereas the returning officer for the Creswick electoral district and the police magistrate acting in the locality hereinafter mentioned have, by writing under their hands, certified to the Governor that it is necessary to appoint an additional polling place for the Creswick division of the said district: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order appoint Coghill's Creek to be an additional polling place in and for the Creswick division, for taking the poll in and for such division at contested elections for the electoral district of Creswick.

UNITED COMMON.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act*, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that where there are two or more neighboring commons the Governor in Council may proclaim that the same shall be a common under the name of "The United Town and Gold Field [or, as the case may be] Common of" for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that the neighboring commons hereinafter mentioned shall be a United Common, under the following name, that is to say:—

THE UNITED TOWN AND GOLD FIELD COMMON OF REDBANK shall comprise the Redbank Town Common (described amongst others in a Proclamation bearing date the fourteenth day of September, 1863) and the Redbank Gold Field Common (described amongst others in two several Proclamations bearing date respectively the fourteenth day of September, 1863, and the twenty-first day of December, 1863).—(64.J.7093.)

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this fifth day of September, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in the twenty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign.
