MURRAY RIVER CUSTOMS.

**W**HEREAS the arrangements as regards the Duties on Goods brought into Victoria *via* the River Murray, made with the Governments of New South Wales and South Australia, by treaty under date 31st May, 1859, and published by notice in the *Government Gazette*, dated 18th August, 1859, have been annulled by those Governments, by letter dated 23rd September, 1863, from the South Australian Government (one of the contracting parties): Notice is hereby given that all goods which may be brought into Victoria (whether by way of the River Murray or otherwise) subsequent to the expiration of such agreement, and upon which no duties have been paid to this Government, are liable to forfeiture.

And all persons are hereby cautioned against being concerned in bringing into the colony any goods on which the duties due have not been paid, otherwise they are liable to a penalty of treble the value of the goods, or one hundred pounds, at the election of the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, the goods being also liable to forfeiture.

All persons, therefore, are warned that the Customs Laws on the River Murray, or elsewhere, will be strictly enforced.
