ADJUSTMENT OF THE BOUNDARIES OF THE SHIRE OF KYNETON, AND OF THE WOODEND, NEWHAM, AND ROCHFORD ROAD DISTRICT.**PROCLAMATION.**

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor, and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act 1863* it is amongst other things enacted that, for adjusting the boundaries of shires and districts to those of electoral districts, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, if it shall seem fit, but so far only as may be necessary for such adjustment, to do without petition all or any of certain acts therein mentioned, and amongst other acts to take away from any shire or district any portion thereof, and to add to any adjoining shire or district, or some one or more riding or subdivisions thereof, the portion so taken away: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the third day of January, 1865, the Shire of Kyneton was constituted: And whereas by another Proclamation bearing date the twenty-second day of February, 1864, the boundaries of the Woodend, Newham, and Rochford Road District were altered as therein mentioned: And whereas it is expedient to adjust in part the boundaries of the said shire and road district to those of an electoral district as provided by the said recited Act: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, proclaim that, with the advice of the Executive Council, I have taken away from the Shire of Kyneton a portion thereof, and have added to the Woodend, Newham, and Rochford Road District adjoining thereto the portion so taken away, for the purpose of adjusting in part the boundaries of the said shire and road district to those of an electoral district; and in order more clearly to show the boundaries of the said shire and road district as now altered I do hereby re-define the same in manner following, that is to say:—

THE SHIRE OF KYNETON—Commencing at the western source of the Coliban River; thence by that river to the north boundary of the parish of Edgecombe; thence by that boundary and a continuous straight line east to Piper's Creek; thence northerly by that creek to the south-east angle of portion 3, section 1, parish of Emberton; thence by a direct line easterly to the north-west angle of allotment 16 in the parish of Baynton; thence by the northern boundary of the last-named parish easterly to Pohlman's Creek; thence south-easterly by the last-named creek to the south-east angle of allotment 2 in the parish of Baynton; thence by a direct line to the head of Mollison's Creek; thence northerly, easterly, and southerly by Mollison's Creek to the junction of the southern branch of said creek, forming portion of the western boundary of the Pyalong Road District; thence southerly by the last-named boundary to the county boundary of Bourke; thence by the last-named boundary westerly and southerly to the northern boundary of the parish of Newham; thence by the last-named boundary westerly and south to the northern boundary of the parish of Woodend; thence by the northern and western boundaries of Woodend parish to the south-west angle of portion 111 in the said parish; thence east to the south-east angle of portion 110 of said parish; thence due south to the Great Dividing Range, forming the northern boundary of the county of Bourke; thence westerly by the last-named boundary to the commencing point; excepting the Boroughs of Malmesbury and Taradale.—(65.2094.)

THE WOODEND, NEWHAM, AND ROCHFORD ROAD DISTRICT—Commencing on the Great Dividing Range forming the northern county boundary of Bourke, due south of the south-east angle of portion 110, parish of Woodend; thence north to that angle; thence west to the south-west angle of portion 111 of said parish; thence by the western and northern boundaries of said parish to the boundary of Newham parish; thence by the last-named boundary north and easterly to the county boundary of Bourke; thence by the last-named boundary northerly and easterly to the western boundary of Lancefield Road District; thence by the last-named boundary southerly, easterly, and westerly to the boundary of Gisborne Road District; thence northerly, westerly, and southerly by the last-named boundary and the county boundary of Bourke to the commencing point; excepting the Borough of Woodend.—(65.2428.)

SECTIONS V. TO X. OF "THE POLICE OFFENCES STATUTE 1865" EXTENDED TO THE BOROUGH OF DUNOLLY.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the session held in the twenty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign (No. 255), called *The Police Offences Statute 1865*, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* extend all or any of the provisions contained in Part I. of the said Statute to any city, town, district, or place in Victoria, and may define the limits of any such city, town, district, or place, and vary and alter such limits, and may revoke any such Proclamation; and upon any such Proclamation the provisions so proclaimed shall extend to and be in force in such city, town, district, or place: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, do, with the advice of the Executive Council, by this my Proclamation extend the provisions contained in sections V. VI. VII. VIII. IX. and X. of Part I. of the said Statute to the Borough hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:

The Borough of Dunolly.

* A line bearing north 61° east (magnetic) from the Lighthouse on Gellibrand's Point, and running through the St. Kilda White Perch Buoy, divides the Inner from the outer anchorage of Hobson's Bay.

Vessels forced back within forty-eight (48) hours after having been piloted to sea, one-half (½) of the above rates.

Such sailing vessels as may receive the assistance of a steam tug for any intermediate distance to those above enumerated will be allowed (if considered just) a proportionate reduction of the rates of pilotage, on reference to the Pilot Board.

Exemptions.

All vessels under fifty (50) tons.

All vessels belonging to Her Majesty; all ships outfitting to or refitting from the fisheries; all ships employed in the coasting trade; all ships actually trading between any port of Victoria and any of the colonies of New South Wales, Queensland, Tasmania, New Zealand, Western and South Australia (the master of any such ship holding a certificate from the Pilot Board that he is competent to act as pilot to such vessel), unless the services of a pilot shall have been actually received; and all ships not having actually received the services of a pilot.

GENERAL RULES OF THE CASTLEMAINE HOSPITAL.

OBJECT.

THE institution shall be for the purpose of affording surgical and medical aid to destitute persons in cases of accident and disease.

CONTRIBUTORS.

2. Every benefactor of £10 and upwards, and every annual contributor of £1 and upwards, shall be and be alone regarded as "contributors for the time being" under the second section of the Act of Incorporation, and be eligible to be members of committee.

3. Benefactors and annual contributors shall, if the funds and accommodation of the hospital permit, be at liberty to recommend in every current year free patients, as follows:—

For a benefaction of £10 and an annual contribution of £1, two out-door patients; and for every additional benefaction of £10 or additional annual contribution of £1, one in and two out-door additional patients.

4. Every executor paying to the institution a bequest of £50 or upwards, and every person (not being a paid collector) raising in any one year the sum of £50 or upwards, and every other person elected at an annual meeting, at the recommendation of the outgoing committee, in consideration of special services rendered to the institution, shall be entitled to recommend annually one in and four out-door patients.

5. Every benefactor of £10 and contributor of £1 per annum shall be entitled to one vote; every benefactor of £30 and contributor of £3 per annum shall be entitled to two votes; and every benefactor of £50 and contributor of £5 and upwards per annum shall be entitled to three votes at all general meetings of contributors.

6. The current year shall, with respect to each benefaction, be reckoned from the day of payment; and, with respect to each annual contribution, from the day on which such contribution was first made.

7. Every firm or partnership becoming contributors shall exercise their privilege through some one member of the same.

8. No person shall hold or be eligible for any honorary office, or have any vote or exercise any privilege connected with the institution, during the current year for which his annual contribution shall not have been actually paid.

9. At the annual meeting of contributors in January all honorary officers, as president, vice-presidents, treasurer, secretary, medical officers, auditors, and referees, shall be chosen, and all matters pertaining to the hospital shall be open to discussion; and resolutions may be passed, approving or disapproving of all or any of the things done during the year just terminated, recommending any future procedure which may appear desirable, and deciding absolutely on any business brought before it which may, consistently with the Act of Incorporation and the bye-laws, be transacted at it.

10. It shall be competent for the general committee by vote, or any twenty or more contributors by writing under their hands, to require the secretary to summon a general meeting of contributors at any time or times between the annual meetings; the occasion of calling every meeting shall be specified in the requisition, and no other business shall be transacted thereat; and every such meeting shall, with an intelligible reference to its object, be called by the secretary, by advertisement in one or more of the public newspapers of the colony, local if possible, at least one week before the day of meeting.

11. At all general meetings of contributors ten shall constitute a quorum, and as soon as a quorum is present the chair shall be taken; but if no quorum be present within half an hour of the time named, the meeting shall stand adjourned to the following week at the same day and hour, and so on from week to week until a quorum be formed.

12. All votes at the annual and other meetings of the contributors shall be taken by a show of hands, unless a ballot shall have been previously determined on by a majority present, in which case the vote or votes referred to shall be by ballot.

13. If the validity of any election at the annual meeting, or at any meeting of the general committee for filling up any vacancy

during the year, shall be disputed, the question in dispute shall be referred to five referees, to be chosen at the annual meeting, of whom three shall be a quorum, whose decision shall be final. The office of any of the referees may be declared by the general committee vacant, by his neglecting to attend four meetings in succession, to which he shall have been summoned by three days' previous notice, or in any of the ways, except absence, in which the office of any ordinary member of committee may become vacant under the twelfth section of the Act of Incorporation.

GENERAL COMMITTEE.

14. The administration of the affairs of the hospital shall be entrusted to a general committee, to be elected according to the provisions of the Act of Incorporation and bye-laws, and shall consist of fifteen members, including the president, vice-presidents, and treasurer.

15. The president, vice-presidents, and treasurer shall hold office for one year only, which shall become vacant in any of the ways in which the office of ordinary members of the general committee may become vacant under the twelfth section of the Act of Incorporation; and the president, vice-presidents, and treasurer shall go out of office (but may nevertheless be re-elected) on the second Thursday in the month of January in every year, at which time a fresh election shall be made by contributors.

16. If it shall happen that any member or members of the general committee, whose retirement may require to be determined by lot, shall be absent from the meeting at which it shall be necessary to determine by lot who shall go out of office, then the chairman of the meeting, if need be, shall inscribe the name or names of him or them so absent on the paper, and shall do all things necessary to be done on behalf of the absentee or absentees for determining the issue of the said lot, and the retirement or otherwise, and the decision then arrived at shall be valid and effectual as if such party or parties were present.

17. The secretary shall keep a collected list for each year of the attendance and non-attendance at ordinary meetings of the various members of the general committee, and a similar but distinct list in relation to special meetings; and in the event of any member of general committee or any honorary officer becoming disqualified, and his office becoming vacant, it shall be necessary, before the remaining members proceed to fill up the vacancy, that one month's notice of motion to that effect be given by some member of the general committee.

18. The general committee shall direct the general business of the hospital, frame rules for its internal regulation (the same not being repugnant to the bye-laws), alter, repeal, amend, and make new rules, enter into contracts for the supply of provisions and other articles for the use of the hospital, direct payment to be made for the same, fill up all vacancies in all honorary offices, as those of president, vice-presidents, treasurer, secretary, medical officers, auditors, referees, and visiting committee, between the annual meetings in January, and appoint and discharge all servants and paid officers of the institution. They shall meet on the first Thursday of every month, and on such other days as they may appoint by way of adjournment. As soon as a quorum shall be present the chair shall be taken by the president, or in his absence, by one of the vice-presidents, or in their absence, by a chairman appointed by the members then present; but if no quorum shall be present within twenty minutes of the time named, such meeting, as well as every special meeting hereinafter authorised, shall stand adjourned to the following week at the same day and hour, and so on from week to week until the next monthly meeting. They shall superintend and give all necessary directions for the admission, discharge, and dismissal of patients, in accordance with the terms and spirit of the bye-laws.

19. No proposition to enact or amend a bye-law, or frame or vary any rule, shall be entertained unless one month's previous notice has been given of such, and no motion to rescind a resolution shall be submitted within three months after such resolution has been passed, unless one month's notice of the same be given, and such motion be passed by an absolute majority of the whole general committee.

20. All ordinary meetings of the general committee shall be notified to the members thereof by circular, by the secretary, three days at least before the day of meeting, but no member thereof absenting himself for four consecutive ordinary meetings shall be at liberty to plead any insufficiency, or even entire lack of such notification, against the cessation of his office under the twelfth section of the Act of Incorporation.

21. No person shall be a member of the general committee and a salaried officer of the hospital at the same time, nor shall any salaried officer or servant be present at any committee meeting, except when required.

22. The general committee by vote, or three members thereof by writing under their hand, shall be at liberty at any time to require the secretary to summon a special meeting of the general committee, to be held within two weeks from the delivery thereof. Seven days' notice at least of such meeting shall be given to each member by circular, by the secretary, and the occasion for calling the meeting shall be stated both in the requisition and summons, and no other business than that so stated, or clearly indicated, shall be transacted at such meeting. But non-attendance at special meetings shall not in itself or in conjunction with any other induce a vacancy of office under the twelfth section of the Act of Incorporation.

23. The general committee shall present a general report of the affairs of the hospital at the annual meeting in January, which report shall be prepared by the treasurer, secretary, and medical officers, and be presented at a special meeting for revision and approval at least one week before the day appointed by the committee for the annual meeting.

VISITING COMMITTEE.

24. A house visiting committee consisting of six members shall be annually elected by, from, and subject to the general

committee, at their first monthly meeting, or as soon after as conveniently may be. It shall be their duty to visit the hospital at least once a week, to examine the buildings, inspect the wards, make enquiries respecting the quality and quantity of the rations, enforce rules, investigate accounts, and bring up a report at the next monthly meeting of the same, and all other things connected with the management of the institution, and requiring attention for the consideration of the general committee. The office of any member of the visiting committee shall cease by his ceasing to be a member of the general committee, or by neglecting to attend to his duties for three months in succession.

TREASURER.

25. The duties of the treasurer shall be to receive all moneys from the collector, the Government, and any others; pay all accounts of the hospital passed by the general committee, and those above £1 by bank cheque, which cheques shall be signed by the president and secretary, as well as by the treasurer; to keep proper accounts of receipts and disbursements in a book provided for the purpose; lay the book or a summary of accounts before the general committee at every monthly meeting, and furnish a balance-sheet every year duly audited.

26. He shall deposit all moneys received by him whenever the same shall amount to £5, in such bank as the general committee shall from time to time direct, and shall cause the different sums so deposited to be paid to the account of the Castlemaine Hospital.

SECRETARY.

27. The duties of the secretary are to keep proper minutes of all meetings and attendances, and record them in a book provided for the purpose; to call all meetings, to introduce and explain the business to be transacted, and to conduct and record all such correspondence as may be directed by the general committee, and to prepare in conjunction with the treasurer and medical officers the report for the annual meeting.

The common seal of the corporation shall be kept in a strong box with two locks and keys (one of which keys shall be kept by the treasurer and the other by the secretary), and be deposited at the bank where the hospital account is kept.

The common seal shall not be affixed to any deed or other instrument except by order of the general committee, at a meeting at which seven members at least shall be present.

The office of the secretary shall become vacant in any of the ways in which the office of an ordinary member of committee may become vacant under the twelfth section of the Act of Incorporation.

COLLECTOR.

28. The collector shall devote his whole time to the interest of the hospital, such as canvassing the entire district of Castlemaine, obtaining contributions, and affording clerical assistance, &c. He shall give a receipt for every sum he receives, and keep a counterpart of such receipt. He shall hand over to the treasurer, in the first week of every month, the moneys received by him during the preceding month, and at the same time supply the treasurer with a statement of the contributors and the respective sums paid by them; and he shall enter into a bond with one surety jointly and severally in the sum of £200, or give some other security equivalent thereto, for the due fulfilment of his office.

AUDITORS.

29. The auditors shall in the first week of January in every year, or as soon after as conveniently may be, examine the collector's books, and also the treasurer's balance-sheet, with all accounts, vouchers, and documents relating thereto, and shall report thereon to the general committee at the meeting appointed by them.

The office of any auditor shall become vacant by neglecting to attend four meetings in succession to which he may have been summoned three days previously, or in any of the ways except that of absence in which the office of any ordinary member of committee may become vacant under the twelfth section of the Act of Incorporation.

MEDICAL OFFICERS.

30. The number of honorary medical officers shall be four, who shall hold office for one year only, and shall go out of office (but may nevertheless be re-elected) on the second Thursday in the month of January in every year, at which time a fresh election shall be made by the contributors.

31. The honorary medical officers and the resident surgeon, all of whom shall be legally qualified practitioners, shall constitute the medical staff of the hospital.

32. The medical staff, under the direction of the committee, shall receive and discharge all patients, and dismiss any from the institution who may be guilty of gross misconduct.

33. The medical staff shall take the general charge of all the patients, whether in or out-door patients of the hospital, and be responsible for their treatment.

34. The honorary medical officers shall have admission at all times to the institution; one of them, according to alphabetical order, shall attend every morning at Ten o'clock for a week, beginning with Monday, to constitute, with the resident surgeon, the medical officers for that week, and to take particular charge of all the patients admitted during that week, and direct their treatment onward until discharged. Every honorary medical officer shall visit his patients twice at least in every other week than the one before allotted to him in alphabetical order.

35. If the honorary medical officer and resident surgeon shall differ upon the mode of treatment in any case under their particular charge, the resident surgeon shall call in the next honorary medical officer in alphabetical order who may happen to be at home, to decide between them; and if the officer so called in shall differ from both of them, the whole staff shall be immediately convened, and the treatment decided by the majority present.

36. In case the honorary medical officer for the week, or in the continued joint and particular charge of any patient, shall not be present at Ten o'clock in the morning of any day, or in case any patients admitted between the visits of the honorary medical officer, for the week require immediate attention, the resident surgeon shall act alone, as though he had the entire management of the patients.

37. The medical staff shall hold a consultation on every contemplated surgical operation of a capital nature, except in great emergency; also upon every other case of importance or protracted continuance in the hospital; and also upon every suggested *post mortem* examination, save such as may be directed by the coroner of the district.

38. All capital surgical operations and all *post mortem* examinations not directed by the coroner shall be performed by the medical staff in alphabetical order, but if an honorary medical officer shall not, after summons left at his house, arrive at the hospital within such time as the resident surgeon may consider consistent with the patient's safety, the latter shall forthwith perform the duty.

39. No one shall be present at the time of any operation or *post mortem* examination, except such persons as may be connected with the institution or the medical profession.

40. The honorary medical officers shall make a daily report in a book to be provided for the purpose.

41. If any honorary medical officer shall neglect his duty for one month, of which neglect the absence of entries in the report-book mentioned in rule 40, without precluding other evidence, shall be taken as proof, his office may be declared vacant by the general committee.

PATIENTS.

42. Every person claiming the benefit of the hospital, whether as in-door or out-door patient, must produce a recommendation from a contributor, or, in the opinion of the resident surgeon, in cases of decided emergency, as in the opinion of the resident surgeon admit, not of delay, may be attended to, and if necessary admitted at any time, whether recommended by a contributor or not.

43. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement, no child under five years of age, no person insane or having a contagious, infectious, or other disease, which in the opinion of the honorary medical officer for the week, or in his absence, of the resident surgeon, ought not to come within the operation of the charity, shall be admitted to the hospital as an in-patient, nor any person who in his opinion may receive equal benefit as an out-patient.

In the absence of satisfactory reasons to the contrary being offered to the general committee, no person shall be allowed to remain in the hospital who in the opinion of the medical staff may receive equal benefit as an out-patient. Every person obtaining the benefits of the institution under a plea expressed or implied of destitution who shall in the estimation of the general committee, upon a representation being made to them, of the fact, be well able to pay for such benefits, shall be liable for the same after the rate of £3 per week; and every person admitted on the ground of emergency to the benefits of the hospital, and well able in the estimation of the general committee to pay for them, will also be required to pay for the same after the same rate.

44. The general committee shall, if necessary, make provision for the reception and treatment of patients laboring under contagious, infectious, or other diseases, excluded under clause 43 on the hospital ground, but at a suitable and safe distance from the hospital itself.

45. Ministers of religion shall have access to sick persons of their respective denominations at such times as shall be appointed by the committee, and any minister may attend any patient at any time when requested by such patient. No. 2692

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now recited Act: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby alter the commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

AMHERST FARMERS' COMMON.—The Amherst Farmers' Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date 4th November, 1861, is hereby diminished by deducting therefrom that portion thereof lying within the borough of Craigie, and described as follows, viz.:—Seven hundred and fifty acres, more or less: Commencing at the north angle of allotment 34 of section 1, parish of Craigie; thence by the south-east side of the road from Amherst to Carisbrook, bearing south-westerly to the north-west angle of allotment 45, being a point on the west boundary of the borough of Craigie; thence by that boundary, bearing south to the south-west angle of allotment 15 of section 2, being the south-west angle of the said borough; thence by the south boundary of that borough, bearing east to the south-east angle of allotment 12, being a point on the Mount Greenock road; and thence by that road bearing northerly to the point of commencement.—(64.J.6256.)

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

(Made by the Governor in Council under 29 Victoria No. 277, Part IV., ss. 46-58.)

1. The Chief Office, Melbourne, and every Post Office, being a Money Order Office, at which the Postmaster-General shall permit deposits to be received for remittance to his principal office, will be open for that purpose, and for the repayment of moneys withdrawn, during the hours appointed for the transaction of Money Order Business at the said offices, and for receipt of deposits on Saturdays, in addition, from 6 until 8 o'clock p.m., or earlier, or later, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct.

Hours of business.

2. Deposits of one sixpence, or of any number of sixpences, or of pounds, shillings, and sixpences, will be received from any depositor at the Post Office Savings Banks, provided the deposits made by such depositor do not exceed £50 within any period of fourteen days. When the principal and interest together, standing to the credit of any one depositor, amount to the sum of £1000, all interest will cease so long as the same funds continue to amount to the said sum of £1000.

Amount of deposits.

All deposits must be made in cash or in notes issued by Victorian Banks.

3. Every depositor on making a first deposit shall be required to specify his Christian name and surname, occupation and residence, to the officer of the Postmaster-General appointed to receive the deposit, and make and sign the following declaration, to be witnessed by the officer of the Postmaster-General appointed to receive deposits, or by some person known to him, or by a clergyman, or a justice of the peace; and if such declaration, or any part thereof, shall not be true, the depositor making the same shall forfeit and lose all right and title to his deposits.

Postmaster-General after such period of one or two months, as the case may be, to pay and divide such funds at his discretion to or amongst the widow or relatives of the deceased depositor, or any one or more of them; or, if he shall think proper, according to the Statute of Distributions.

Funds of deceased depositor above £50.

20. In case any depositor shall die leaving any sum of money in the Post Office Savings Bank, which (exclusive of interest) shall exceed the sum of £50, the same shall only be paid to the executor or administrator on the production of the probate of will or letters of administration of the estate or effects of the deceased depositor, to the Postmaster-General.

Payment on death of a depositor being illegitimate and dying intestate.

21. If any depositor, being illegitimate, shall die intestate, leaving any person or persons who, but for the illegitimacy of such depositor, and of such person or persons, would be entitled to the money due to such deceased depositor, it shall be lawful for the Postmaster-General, with the authority in writing of the Attorney-General, to pay the money of such deceased depositor to any one or more of the persons who in his opinion would have been entitled to the same according to the Statute of Distributions, if the said depositor and such person or persons had been legitimate.

Incapacitated depositors.

22. If any depositor shall become insane, or otherwise incapacitated to act, and the same shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General, and if the Postmaster-General shall be satisfied of the urgency of the case, he may authorise payment, from time to time, out of the funds of such depositor to any person whom he shall judge proper, and the receipt of such person shall be a good discharge for the same.

Settlement of disputes.

23. If any dispute shall arise between the Postmaster-General and any individual depositor, or any executor, administrator, next of kin, or creditor or assignee of a depositor who may become bankrupt or insolvent, or any person claiming to be such executor, administrator, next of kin, creditor or assignee, or to be entitled to any money deposited in the Post Office Savings Bank, then and in every such case the matter in dispute shall be referred, in writing, to the Attorney-General, and whatever award, order, or determination shall be made by the said Attorney-General shall be final, to all intents and purposes, without any appeal.

Secrecy.

24. The officers of the Postmaster-General engaged in the receipt or payment of deposits, shall not disclose the name of any depositor, nor the amount deposited or withdrawn by him, except to the Postmaster-General, or to such of his officers as may be appointed to assist in carrying out the provisions of the 4th part of *Post Office Statute 1865*.

Interpretation.

25. In the construction of these Regulations the words Postmaster-General shall include the Deputy Postmaster-General; and unless there is something in the subject or context repugnant thereto, every word importing the singular number only, shall mean and include several persons or things as well as one person or thing, and the converse; and every word importing the masculine gender only, shall mean and include female as well as male; and the word month shall refer to a calendar, and not a lunar month.

REGULATIONS FOR THE GUIDANCE OF OFFICERS EMPLOYED IN THE TRANSACTION OF POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK BUSINESS IN THE CHIEF OFFICE, MELBOURNE.

(Made by the Governor in Council under 29 Victoria No. 277, Part IV., ss. 46-58.)

Treatment of Savings Banks in Chief Office.

1. When the Savings Bank Accounts, with their accompanying vouchers, have reached the Chief Office in the envelopes containing the Money Order Accounts, they will be sorted off to the Examiner, and will be checked as to the cast by that officer, who will also ascertain that the entries of payments correspond with the warrants, and that the total numbers and total amounts of Savings Bank deposits and payments have been duly carried into the Money Order Accounts, and that the total amount of deposits has been duly added to the total of orders issued, and the total amount of payments to the total amount of orders paid.

Introduction of daily totals of Savings Bank transactions into Money Order Account Current Book and its summary.

The Savings Bank Accounts and their vouchers will then be separated from the Money Order Accounts; the latter accounts having undergone the usual examination, will be entered in the Postmaster's Account Current Book (pattern 18). The introduction of the Savings Bank totals into this book will enable the Money Order Office to maintain as perfect a check upon the Postmasters, in regard to their remittances of Money Order and Savings Bank cash, as that office now maintains in regard to Money Order cash alone; and further, it will raise a check against the books of the Savings Bank in regard to the total number and total amount of Savings Bank deposits and repayments, which will be of considerable advantage.

The Savings Bank Accounts will then be recorded in a Summary (pattern 16), in which the total numbers and total amounts of deposits and payments at each office, and the aggregate of the transactions at all the offices, will be shown.

2. The Account will then be placed in the hands of the Acknowledgment Clerk, whose duty will be to fill up and address an acknowledgment for each deposit named in each account, then to pass the accounts, with their accompanying declarations and warrants, to the Deposit Ledger Keeper, and to retain the acknowledgments for subsequent comparison by the Examiner with the entries in the ledger. Acknowledgment of deposits.

3. A separate account for each depositor will be opened in the Depositors' Ledger (pattern 20); these accounts will be grouped under the Post Office at which the first deposits are made. There will be a separate series of consecutive numbers for the accounts of each group. To carry out this arrangement, each depositor's book, and all the forms connected therewith, have been made to show the name of the office at which the first deposit is made, and the numerical position of the depositor in the group of depositors proper to that office. Thus, if a depositor has received book 46 from the Post Office at Ballarat, his account in the Ledger of the Chief Office will be No. 46 of the accounts grouped under Ballarat. Depositors' Ledger.

The groups of accounts will be arranged alphabetically, according to the names of the Post Offices, and thus there will be no difficulty whatever in tracing the account of any one of them, or in at once assigning any application or paper connected with that account to the officer qualified to deal with it.

It is expected that depositors will frequently move from place to place. So long as they are merely travelling, their accounts will be retained in the group in which they were originally placed; but when they make a new and permanent settlement, their accounts will be transferred to the group proper to the new place of residence.

4. When the Ledger Keeper receives from the Acknowledgment Clerk the daily Savings Bank Accounts of the Postmasters, he will take those accounts in their alphabetical order and enter the deposits therefrom into the accounts of the depositors. When he opens a fresh account, on the occasion of a first deposit, he will take care that the statutory declaration has been duly made and forwarded with the account. These statutory declarations will daily be extracted from the accounts when the Ledger Keeper has examined them and sorted in alphabetical order, in which order they will be retained, and will thus form a complete alphabetical index to the depositors' names, and save the compilation of any such index. Duty of Ledger Keeper.

The deposits having been entered from the accounts into the ledger, the acknowledgments of these deposits will be compared with the entries in the ledger. This comparison will secure the accuracy of the ledger entries and of the acknowledgments. When this comparison has been concluded by the Examiner, the acknowledgments will then be folded and transmitted to the depositor.

5. When notices of withdrawal reach the Chief Office, they will be sorted by the Ledger Keeper, whose duty it will be—(a.) To compare the notice with the account of the depositor, and ascertain if the required amount is due to the applicant; (b.) To enter the amount proposed to be withdrawn in the proper column of the account in the ledger, in anticipation of the payment; and (c.) To pass the notices on to the Examiner, by whom the warrants will be prepared and checked against the entries in the ledger, and by whom the corresponding advices will be made out and issued. Withdrawals.

Thus, when the warrants, after presentation to and payment by the Postmasters, return to the Ledger Keeper in the daily Savings Bank Account, the Ledger Keeper will not then have to make an entry of the payment, but he will then have to compare the entry in the Postmaster's account with the entry previously made by him in the ledger, against which entry he will have to note the date of payment. This previous entry of the warrant in the ledger, and subsequent comparison of the entry in the Postmaster's account with that entry in the ledger, will secure the immediate detection of any fraudulent alteration of the warrant, if the Postmaster had failed to detect such an alteration by a comparison of the warrant with the advice.

The Ledger Keeper will also require to make up the Monthly Summary, to insert the interest in each depositor's account annually (unless when the account is closed within the year, in which case the interest must be inserted on the closing of the account), and to cast and balance each depositor's account annually.

6. As has already been shown, the entries in the ledger will in all cases be checked by the Examiner; the accuracy of the debit sides of the depositors' accounts will be secured by comparing the acknowledgments of deposits with the entry of deposits in the ledger, and the accuracy of the credit sides will be secured by comparing the warrants (which will be prepared from the notices of withdrawal) with the entries in the ledger previously made by the Ledger Keeper from the same notices. Duty of Examiner.

The warrants will be numbered consecutively, and each separate warrant will be entered in a book (pattern No. 17). After all the warrants have been issued, they will be sorted to the Post Office at which they are made payable. An advice sheet will then be filled up, containing entries of all the warrants drawn upon each Postmaster, and reference made to their Money Order balance, for the purpose of ascertaining if they have sufficient funds to meet the withdrawals.

As a general rule, notices of withdrawal received on any given day will be so treated that the warrants and advices will be prepared on that day, and transmitted on the following day to the depositors and postmasters.

7. The check upon the aggregate of Post Office Savings Bank transactions will be as follows:—The daily totals of each Postmaster's receipts and payments will be carried into the Postmaster's Account Current Book and into the monthly summary of that book, which will give an aggregate total of the receipts and payments of all Postmasters on Savings Bank Account. (b.) The items composing the daily totals of receipts and payments by Postmasters will be entered in the Depositors' Ledger and in the summary of Check upon the aggregate totals.

that ledger, which will give the aggregate of all sums deposited and withdrawn. (c.) The total receipts by Postmasters, as shown by the summary of the Account Current Book, should agree with the total of the deposits, as shown by the summary of the Depositors' Ledger; and the total payments by Postmasters, as shown by summary of Account Current Book, should agree with the total of sums withdrawn, as shown by the summary of the Depositors' Ledger, due provision being made for warrants issued to depositors, but not cashed by them at the date of comparison of accounts.

8. All officers in the Chief Office receiving deposits from, and making repayments to, the public, must, in the transaction of this business, observe the regulations for the guidance of Postmasters and other officers as far as such regulations are applicable.

REGULATIONS FOR THE GUIDANCE OF POSTMASTERS AND OTHER OFFICERS AUTHORISED TO TRANSACT POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK BUSINESS.

(Made by the Governor in Council under 29 Victoria No. 277, Part IV., ss. 46-58.)

To the Postmaster

of

Postmaster authorised to receive deposits.

Hours of business.

Forms and books supplied.

One copy Regulations to be posted up for public information. One copy for Postmaster's use. If not understood apply to chief office.

A deposit of sixpence, or any number of sixpences or pounds shillings and sixpences, may be received. Copper coin need not be refused if of the value of one sixpence.
Limits of deposits of any one depositor to £50 within any period of fourteen days.

Deposits how to be received

Declaration to be made and witnessed.

Money to be next taken.

1. The Postmaster-General having selected your office to be, on and after a place of receipt for deposits in the Post Office Savings Bank, you are hereby instructed to keep it open for that purpose, and for the repayments to depositors, during the hours appointed for the transaction of money order business; and on Saturdays, in addition, from 6 until 8 o'clock p.m., for receipt of deposits only.

2. You are supplied herewith with the undermentioned forms and books, viz.:-
A.—Copy of general regulations for your own use.
B.—Copy of general regulations for exhibition to the public.
C.—Declaration forms for ordinary depositors (see Clause 3 of Regulations).
D.—Declaration forms for deposits on trust (see Clause 7 of Regulations).
E.—Depositors' books, numbered (see Clause 5 of Regulations).
F.—Forms of daily account, for reporting deposits and repayments to the Postmaster-General (see Clause 5 of Regulations).
G.—Forms of daily money order and savings bank account.
H.—Monthly statements of money order and savings bank transactions.
I.—Notices of withdrawals (see Clause 15 of Regulations).
K.—Orders to pay warrants when depositors cannot attend in person (see Clause 16 of Regulations).

You must return to the Controller of the Money Order Office any old forms of money order, daily account, or monthly statement, which may be in your possession on the day of commencing savings bank business.

3. You will place the large copy of the printed regulations in some conspicuous position in your office, where the public can read it conveniently. You will retain the small copy for your own guidance, and study it carefully; and if there be any part of the regulations, or of these instructions, which you do not understand, you will at once apply for further information to the Controller, Savings Bank Department, General Post Office, Melbourne.

4. You will learn from Clause 2 of the Regulations that you may receive deposits of one sixpence, or of any number of sixpences, or of pounds, shillings, and sixpences, from any depositor. You are not to understand from this clause that deposits of copper coin may not be made, but that every deposit must be of the value of one sixpence, or of some number of sixpences. You will also learn from this clause that no depositor (with the exceptions specified in Clause 10) may deposit more than £50 within any period of fourteen days. You must therefore be careful not to take more than £50 from a depositor when he first makes his deposit; and when he makes a further deposit, you must ascertain, by the examination of the previous entries in his book, that his deposits made within the previous fourteen days, together with that which he is about to make, do not exceed £50.

5. When a person applies to you to receive his first deposit for transmission to the Post Office Savings Bank, furnish him with the form of declaration required by Clause 3 of the Regulations (Form S. B., No. 8), and direct him to read it. If he cannot read, you must read it to him. He must sign it, and his signature must be witnessed by yourself, or by some person known to you, or by a clergyman, or by a justice of the peace. If he cannot write, he must affix his mark, and his mark must be witnessed. Next obtain the money

intended to be deposited. Next take one of the numbered depositor's books referred to in Clause 5 of the Regulations, and require the depositor to sign his name in the space allotted for that purpose within the cover of the book. If the depositor cannot write, his mark is, to be taken, and witnessed by yourself. Next enter in the book the christian name, surname, address, and occupation of the depositor, the date of the receipt of the deposit, and its amount, sign your name against the entry, and affix an impression of your dated stamp in the place prepared for the same in the depositor's book. You will next enter the whole of the particulars of the deposit in the form of daily account supplied to you for that purpose (Form S. B., No. 2), and after satisfying yourself that you have made correct entries of every item, namely, the number of the depositor's book, the amount deposited, the christian name, surname, address, and occupation of the depositor, you will insert on the form of declaration in the place indicated thereon the name of your office, and the number of the depositor's book, which you will copy from the book itself, and then deliver the book to the depositor, whom you must inform that in a few days he will receive an acknowledgment from the Postmaster-General, that the deposit has been entered in the books of the Post Office Savings Bank, and that if he does not receive that acknowledgment within ten days, he must write to the Postmaster-General and state that he has not received it. This course is enjoined in Clause 5 of the Regulations.

Entry in depositor's book.

Entry in daily savings bank account.

No. of book and name of office to be entered on declaration.

Depositor to be informed that he is to expect the Postmaster-General's acknowledgment, and if necessary to report its non-receipt.

Second, and subsequent deposits.

6. On making every deposit after the first the depositor must bring his book with him, and you must enter in that book the correct amount of such deposit, with the date on which it is made, affix your signature against the entry, and affix in the proper place an impression of your dated stamp.

7. You will enter the particulars of every deposit, as it is made, in your daily savings bank account as before; and in any case in which the previous deposits entered in the depositor's book were made at another post office, you will be careful to enter the name of that office, as well as the number of the book, in the proper column of the account.

Entry in daily savings bank account.

8. You may receive deposits—

A.—From a trustee on behalf of another person, in the joint names of that person and the trustee (see Clause 7 of Regulations). In such cases the declaration must be made by the trustee on the form specially provided; but the names of both parties must be entered in the depositor's book and in your daily savings bank account.

Deposits may be received from trustees on joint account.

B.—From persons under twenty-one years of age (see Clause 8 of Regulations).

From minors under twenty-one years of age. From women, whether married or single. Refer such depositors to Clause 9 of Regulations.

C.—From women, whether married or single (see Clause 9 of Regulations), which clause you must recommend female depositors to read carefully.

From trustees of Friendly, Charitable, or Provident Societies legally established: After reference to the Postmaster-General who will give you the necessary instructions.

D.—From the trustees of any Friendly, Charitable, or Provident Society, the rules of which have been duly certified (see Clause 10 of Regulations). As it will not be in your power to ascertain whether the rules of any of these institutions have been duly certified, you must, upon a first application from the trustees of any one of them to be permitted to deposit, refer the applicants to the Postmaster-General, from whom you will receive the necessary instruction and form of declaration.

9. Any depositor wishing to withdraw the whole or any part of his deposits, and applying to you for information as to the proper mode of effecting his object, must be supplied with one of the forms of notice of withdrawal (Form S. B., No. 4), (see Clause 16 of Regulations); but before supplying the form, you will of course satisfy yourself by inspection of the depositor's book, or otherwise, that the party applying is a depositor. You will instruct the depositor how to fill up the form, and impress on him the necessity of stating accurately on the form the name of the place where the first deposit entered in his book was made, and the number of that book. A few days after the receipt of the notice in Melbourne a warrant for the amount to be withdrawn will be issued, and sent by post to the address of the depositor, and an advice of the issue of this warrant will be sent to you. When the warrant is presented for payment at your office by the depositor, you must compare it with the advice, and require the depositor to sign his name to the receipt at the foot of the warrant. You must then ask him for his depositor's book, and compare his signature to the warrant with his signature in the book when his first deposit was made, and if you are satisfied that he is the party entitled to receive the amount, and if the warrant corresponds with the advice, you must pay the amount accordingly. If the depositor cannot write this comparison cannot be made, and you must then require him to bring some person known to you who can identify him as the person named in the warrant. In such a case the depositor's mark must be affixed to the receipt at the foot of the warrant, and must be witnessed by the person identifying him. If the warrant does not correspond with the advice, or you have reason to think that the person presenting the warrant is not entitled to receive the amount, you must refuse payment, and report the same to the Savings Bank Branch, General Post Office, Melbourne.

Withdrawals.

If depositor cannot write he is to be identified.

10. Warrants can only be paid to the depositor in person, or to a person authorised by him in the (Form S. B., No. 7), a copy of which you must supply if applied for. The order must be signed in the manner prescribed in Clause 17 of the Regulations, and when the warrant has been duly paid you must attach the order to it.

Payment of warrants when depositors cannot attend in person.

11. When you have paid the amount, stamp the warrant with your office stamp, enter the particulars in that portion of the depositor's book appropriated to withdrawals, giving the date of payment and the amount withdrawn; sign your name, and affix an impression of your dated office stamp in the proper place in the depositor's book. When this has been done, enter the warrant on the credit side of your daily savings bank account, giving in each column of that account the information required by the respective headings of those columns.

Warrant to be stamped with the date of payment and entered in depositor's book.

Entry of paid warrants in daily savings bank account.

Transfer of deposit from Penny Savings Bank to the Post Office Savings Bank.

12. If any depositor in any Penny Savings Bank shall present to you his deposit book and claim repayment, you must supply him with a notice of withdrawal (Form S. B., No. 4a), and direct him to fill it up and forward it with his book (in a cover which will be supplied to you for the purpose) to the Postmaster-General, Melbourne, and inform him that he will obtain payment and a new Post Office deposit book, if required, within ten days. If any depositor of a Penny Savings Bank wishes to make further deposits at your office, he must also be requested to forward his Penny Savings Bank deposit book to the Postmaster-General, Melbourne, and a new Post Office deposit book will be supplied to him within ten days. The necessary instructions will be forwarded to you to enable you to enter the amount due to the above-described depositors in a Post Office Savings Bank deposit book to be issued from your office.

Savings bank account to be added up, and totals to be entered in daily money order account.

13. At the close of business you must carefully add up both sides of your savings bank account, and enter the respective totals in the places indicated on the account. You must then enter on your money order account, in the places marked for the purpose in the form of money order daily account, the total number and total amount of savings bank deposits received by you during the day, and the total number and total amount of savings bank payments made by you during the day. You must add the total amount of savings bank deposits to the total amount of orders issued, and the total amount of savings bank payments to the total amount of orders paid, and these totals must also be entered in your money order cash book. You must then tie up the paid warrants and the declarations made by new depositors, and enclose them in the savings bank account, which must then be placed *inside* the daily money order account, and sent up with it in the ordinary envelope to the Money Order Office.

Paid warrants and declarations to be enclosed in savings bank account. All to be sent up with daily money order account.

Surplus money to be remitted.

14. The balance of the moneys received and paid by you on savings bank account will thus have become part of the balance due from you on the money order account, and you must remit, as at present, any sum which may be in your possession in excess of your money order reserve.

Notice of no savings bank transactions.

15. Should no savings bank transactions take place at your office on any day, you will not be required to send up a form of account, but you will be required to enter in each of the places set apart for savings bank totals in the daily money order account the word *nil*.

When savings bank transactions occur, and no money order business.

16. Should any savings bank transactions have taken place during the day on which no money order transactions have taken place, you will be required to send up a money order account with the word *nil* written across that part of it which refers to money orders, and the totals of the savings bank transactions inserted in the part which refers to them.

17. The daily totals of the savings bank transactions are to be entered in places prepared in the new form of monthly account, and also in the copy of that account in the new money order cash book now supplied to you.

Secrecy.

18. You are forbidden by the Postal Act to give any information, except to the Postmaster-General and the proper officers of the Post Office, as to the name of any depositor, or the sum deposited or withdrawn by him, and disobedience to this rule will incur the severe displeasure of the Postmaster-General. You will also be liable to forfeit a penalty not exceeding £100 for an offence against, or a wilful neglect or omission to comply with, this or any other of the Regulations.

SIR,—I transmit to you, to be laid before your responsible advisers, in order that they may deal with the matter in such manner as may appear to them desirable, a copy of a letter from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, suggesting an arrangement by which a portion of the salt beef required for the navy might be cured in the immediate vicinity of Melbourne, and supplied at a fixed price to their lordships.

Admiralty, 19th May, 1865.

SIR,—I am commanded by my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to request you will state to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that it having been represented that a saving to the public may be effected by curing in Australia a portion of the salt beef required for the navy, they have given the subject their consideration.

My Lords are not prepared to incur the expense that would be involved (as a first outlay) by the purchase of land and the erection of the buildings and plant necessary for such an establishment, nor are they disposed to enter into contract with private individuals for the supplies which would be required.

But it has occurred to them that the Colonial Government of Victoria might be inclined to enter into an arrangement with the Admiralty for supplying at a fixed price per pound the quantity of salt beef which would be required, probably to the extent of 300,000 pounds annually, the whole of such meat to be the produce of oxen approved both before and after being slaughtered by an officer appointed by my Lords to superintend the process of curing, and to take charge of the store on the spot.

My Lords enclose, as a guide, a statement of the buildings and plant, with plans* of the same, that would be necessary for such an establishment; and they have further to observe that as it is contemplated to supply the naval depôts in China, India, America, and the Cape of Good Hope, from Australia, it would be desirable that the premises should be situated at or in the immediate vicinity of Melbourne (where freight is always obtainable), and possess a water frontage for the convenience of shipment.

My Lords request that the Secretary of State for the Colonies will obtain for them the views of the Colonial Government on this subject as early as convenient, and if the latter be disposed to accede to their proposal, they will without delay despatch an officer to Melbourne for the purpose of making all preliminary arrangements.

STATEMENT OF BUILDINGS, PLANT, &c., required for an Establishment for Curing Beef, say for from 2000 to 2500 head of cattle, or from 4000 to 5000 tierces of beef per annum, per Comptroller of Victualling's Letter of 21st March, 1865, or say about 40 per cent. less accommodation than at the Royal Victoria Yard per Storekeeper's verbal directions.

No. 1 Bullock Pound.

For the reception of bullocks before inspection, at a convenient distance from slaughter-house, and capable of containing

from 210 to 240 head of cattle, with gates, &c., and communicating with

A Bullock Pound

For cattle after inspection, which is also to have gates, &c., and communicate with

A Reserve Bullock Pound

For cattle in cold weather.

These three bullock pounds should be all about the same size, and have covered sheds, hay-racks, and water-troughs in each.

Slaughter-house.

To afford sufficient accommodation for hanging up the carcasses of from 72 to 90 oxen, with proper bearers and three winches with runners, &c., all complete. Hot water laid on, window openings to reach to the ground, filled in with strong framed bars and inside shutters; two blood-pits outside.

Offal Sheds.

No. 1. Fitted with hooks and tables for tongues and hearts.

Nos. 2 and 3. Gut-house. To be fitted with hooks and tables for the butchers to clean the offal; water laid on, and iron dung-tanks outside.

Nos. 4 and 5. Tripe-house. To be fitted with hooks for hanging up the tripe and other offal.

Utensil Store.

For keeping all the implements required in the slaughter-house and those used in curing beef.

Suet Shed.

Fitted with hooks, racks, and tables.

Salt Store.

To be fitted with bins capable of containing about 300 tons of salt.

Cutting and Salting House.

Fitted up with bins capable of curing 480 oxen, a large tap fitted to each bin, with gutters and a drain leading to tank for brine in pickle store to draw off pickle from bins previous to boiling it.

Two blocks for cutting up beef, and a salting or rubbing table to each bin for the men to work at.

Baskets on trucks.

Pickle Boilers.

Two large iron boilers for boiling the pickle (with proper pipes, pump, &c.) that comes from the salting bins previously to its being used for filling up casks.

Pickle Store.

Fitted with oak "stillions" or troughs (connected with brine-tank) for placing the casks to fill up with pickle after they have been filled with meat and "coopered," or for emptying pickle from casks.

Water laid on.

A loft over pickle store containing tubs for preparing pickle; they are to communicate with the pickle vats below in pickle store, and which are to have large taps.

Examining Store.

Adjoining pickle store, with large stove, two tables, two tubs, large scales and weights.

Cooper's Platform.

Adjoining the above, for "coopering" the casks, after they are packed; with a large seasoning copper, and water laid on.

Salt-Meat Stores.

Large store for containing about 4800 casks of salt meat.

And a large store for casks over the same.

MINUTE BY THE COMMISSIONER OF TRADE AND CUSTOMS.

It is unfortunate that the within suggestions from the Lords of the Admiralty should reach the colony at a time when, owing to long continued drought and the demand for stock to occupy the new country (to the northward), it would seem that meat was too scarce and too dear to induce such an operation as the one proposed being entered upon.

It is known, however, that the season is an exceptional one, and the fact of the demand for stock to occupy new country (now known as being well fitted for pasturage) promises in the future greatly enlarged supplies of meat suitable for the purposes herein referred to, and at a price enabling competition with any country in the world; and as regards climate and all necessary appliances our capability has long been proved. It is, however, in my opinion, beyond the province of the Government to invest in undertakings of this character; but it is none the less its duty to encourage and support their establishment, and I would therefore respectfully suggest that the within information should be published, and that the Government should offer the necessary land on easy terms to any person or company in proved position to comply satisfactorily with the within and other demands, including an arrangement with the home authorities. I assume that, to cover cost of buildings and to carry out the business, a capital of £50,000 would be required, and an early commencement of business should be demanded. As a first step, the correspondence, &c., including lithographing the plans, should be done at the Government Printer's, for publication or circulation.

The mean temperature of July was nearly two degrees lower than the average. The mortality was less than in the two previous months, but was in excess of the average for July during a period of six years.

Males contributed 62 per cent. and females 38 per cent. to the total mortality; 44 per cent. of the deaths were of children under five against 48 per cent. in June, 44 per cent. in July, 1864, 45 per cent. in July, 1863, 46 per cent. in July, 1862, 50 per cent. in July, 1861, and 48 per cent. in July, 1860.

Twelve deaths was the highest daily mortality recorded and three was the lowest. The former number occurred on six different days and the latter upon two.

Eight deaths of persons more than 75 years old occurred during the month, which is an unusually large number. They were returned as follow:—A male of 77 and one of 78 died of old age, a male of 78 of pneumonia, a male of 80 of diarrhoea, a male of 81 of dysentery, a male of 91 of apoplexy, a female of 75 of bronchitis, and a female of 78 of nephria.

The deaths which occurred from external causes numbered eleven. Of these, 2 were from drowning, viz., a female aged 20 months and a male aged 30 years. Five were from fractures and contusions, viz., a carter aged 21 who was killed by a cart passing over him, a contractor aged 22 by a fall from his horse, a seaman aged 26 by falling from a mast, a farmer aged 30 who died in consequence of accidental injuries to his spine, and a gunsmith aged 57 from the effects of a fractured leg. Two were from accidental suffocation, viz., an infant aged 13 days, and another aged 5 months. A laborer aged 30 was accidentally killed on the railway at Williamstown in a manner not stated. A mattress maker aged 35 was hanged judicially.

Seventy deaths, or 26 per cent. of the whole number recorded, took place in public institutions. Of these 30 were in the Melbourne Hospital, 9 in the Benevolent Asylum, 9 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 3 in the Immigrants' Home, 14 in the Industrial Schools, 1 in St. Vincent de Paul's Orphan Asylum, 2 in the Melbourne Gaol, and 3 in the hulk *Success*.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 119; of these 67, or nearly 56 per cent., were of males, and 52, or about 44 per cent., were of females; of those dying, 77 were under one year of age, 18 were between one and two years, 13 were between two and three, 7 were between three and four, and 4 were between four and five.

The number of persons who died at a more advanced age than five years was 151; of which, 101, or not quite 67 per cent., were males, and 50, or rather more than 33 per cent., were females; 8 were between five and ten years, 8 were between ten and fifteen, 3 were between fifteen and twenty, 12 were between twenty and twenty-five, 17 were between twenty-five and thirty, 20 were between thirty and thirty-five, 17 were between thirty-five and forty, 16 were between forty and forty-five, 10 were between forty-five and fifty, 7 were between fifty and fifty-five, 8 were between fifty-five and sixty, 11 were between sixty and sixty-five, 5 were between sixty-five and seventy, 1 was between seventy and seventy-five, and 8 were of seventy-five and upwards.

Most deaths (41 per cent.) resulted from local diseases, under which head affections of the nervous and respiratory systems caused the greatest number. About a fourth of the mortality was from zymotic diseases, which is not a high rate. The most fatal complaint under this head was whooping-cough, which caused 19 deaths. Deaths from constitutional and developmental diseases showed decreased numbers as compared with previous months. Phthisis, which is of the constitutional class, only caused 26 deaths against 36 in June, and 31 in May.

TENDERS are hereby invited and will be received until Noon of Wednesday, the 11th October, 1866, for the conveyance of Post Office Mails, as undermentioned, for one year, from the 1st January, 1866, to 31st December, 1866.

Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and may be forwarded (if by post, pre-paid) addressed to the Deputy Postmaster General, with the words "Tender for the Conveyance of Mails" endorsed on the cover, or placed in the Tender Box at the General Post Office.

Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender, and every tender will be taken to include the entire service as called for.

Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit receipt for a sum equal to twenty per cent. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance if delivered at the address named in the tender shall be deemed sufficient.

The money deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them on application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts, but not otherwise.

Persons tendering are requested to state the description of the vehicle they intend to use, and the number of horses by which it is to be drawn.

A separate tender must be sent in for each service, but notwithstanding this condition any offer will be entertained for the performance of any number of services for a lump sum. The number of the service or services tendered for must be plainly endorsed on the outside of the cover.

SHIRE OF STAWELL.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—FOR THE COUNCIL OF THE SHIRE OF STAWELL.

THE ordinary meetings of the council shall be held at office of the council on the first and third Tuesday in every month, at Two o'clock p.m., but should a quorum not be present at the expiration of one-half hour after the time appointed for meeting, the names of the councillors present shall be entered in the minute book, and the meeting shall be adjourned.

2. At every ordinary meeting of the council the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting for confirmation the minutes of any preceding meetings not hitherto confirmed, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes when confirmed shall be signed by the president, or, in his absence, by the acting president.

3. The order of business shall be as follows, or as near thereto as practicable:—

1. Reading copies of letters sent.
2. Reading letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
3. Payment of accounts (on the third Tuesday in each month).
4. The acceptance of tenders, if any.
5. Reading and ordering on reports of committees and of officers.
6. Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
7. Orders of the day.
8. Motions of which previous notice shall have been given.
9. Reading notices of motion for consideration at future meetings.

4. Every petition or memorial addressed to the council shall be in proper form, and must be presented by a councillor, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded; and no debate shall take place thereon except as to its being received and taken into consideration after the orders of the day, or at any future meeting—or, if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.

5. The order of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the president which may think fit to bring under consideration.

6. Every notice of motion shall be given to the secretary in writing, and shall be read aloud at the meeting previous to that in which the same is to be taken into consideration, and every such notice shall be considered in the order in which it is given.

7. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be considered unless the councillor who has given such notice, or some other councillor authorised by him, be present when the business is called on. Notices not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.

8. The mover of any motion which may be referred to a committee shall, for that occasion, be a member of such committee.

9. Every councillor shall stand up while addressing the president.

10. The president's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice.

11. Every motion or amendment shall be entered in the minutes, with the names of the mover and seconder; and on a division thereon the votes shall be recorded, if so required by any councillor.

12. One amendment only shall be discussed at a time, but if lost another may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried, it shall take the place of the original motion.

13. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for the adjournment of a meeting; but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next ordinary meeting of the council.

14. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, excepting by way of explanation or reply upon an original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment then last proposed; and after the reply the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.

15. Every councillor, when proposing a motion or amendment, or when speaking on any matter, shall address the president, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, whereupon he shall sit down until the question of order shall have been decided; the councillor in possession of the chair may then resume the subject.

16. Any councillor who shall refuse to obey when ruled out of order, or who shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, and who, if required by the president shall refuse to withdraw such expression and make a satisfactory apology, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for the offence.

17. Any councillor may require the secretary to take down any particular words used by a councillor immediately upon the same being uttered.

18. Any councillor may record his protest against any resolution of the council on giving notice of his intention to do so, on the adoption of such resolution, and on such councillor entering such protest, and his reason for protesting, in a book to be kept for that purpose in the office of the council, and on his signing the same before the next meeting of the council; provided always that such protest may be expunged if decided by a majority of the council not to be in accordance with the truth or not to be in its terms respectful to the council.

19. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would involve the expenditure of any sum of money exceeding Fifty pounds shall be entertained by the council unless notice of such motion be given in the usual manner.

20. All contracts shall be made by tender, unless the council shall otherwise direct. All tenders shall be addressed to the president, and only opened at the time of their consideration by the council; the respective amounts, together with the names of the persons tendering, are to be entered in every case on the minutes of the council. When any tender exceeding One hundred pounds shall have been accepted by the council, the tenderer, or some person for him or on his behalf, shall pay a deposit in the sum of Ten pounds per cent. on the amount of the contract, to the treasurer of the council, which amount so deposited shall be returned to the contractor when he obtains a final certificate from the surveyor that the works under such contract are satisfactorily completed.

21. All payments shall be made by cheque, signed by the president and one other councillor, and countersigned by the treasurer, who shall also stamp such cheque with the seal of the shire council; and no such cheque shall be given unless the account for which it is to be given shall have been passed at a meeting of the council.

22. The shire office shall be open daily between the hours of Ten a.m. and Four p.m., except Saturdays, when the office shall be closed at noon; during this time the secretary shall be in attendance for the purpose of transacting the ordinary business of the council. The engineer shall be in attendance during the hours of business at every meeting of the council.

23. The officers of the council shall furnish or deliver official reports to the council at each ordinary meeting.

24. Any bye-law may be suspended *pro tem.*, in case of emergency, with the unanimous consent of the councillors present at any meeting.

The above bye-law was confirmed by special order at an adjourned meeting, held on Thursday, 27th July, 1865.
