VileREAS by The Amending Land Act 1865 it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or reproclaimed, and may from time to time reproclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of The Land Act 1862 and the now reciting Act. Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby alter the commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

AMHERST FARMERS' COMMON.—The Amherst Farmers' Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date 4th November, 1861, is hereby diminished by deducting therefrom that portion thereof lying within the borough of Craigie, and described as follows, viz.—Seven hundred and fifty acres, more or less: Commencing at the north angle of allotment 34 of section 1, parish of Craigie; thence by the south-east side of the road from Amherst to Carisbrook, bearing south-westerly to the north-west angle of allotment 45, being a point on the west boundary of the borough of Craigie; thence by that boundary, being the south-west angle of allotment 15 of section 2, being the south-west angle of the said borough; thence by the south boundary of that borough, bearing south to the south-west angle of allotment 12, being a point on the Mount Greenock road; and thence by that road bearing northerly to the point of commencement.—(63.16256.)

CARISBROOK FARMERS' COMMON—The Carisbrook Farm-

Carisbrook Farmers' Common.—The Carisbrook Farmers' Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date 4th March, 1861, is hereby diminished by deducting therefrom that portion thereof lying within the borough of Craigie, and described as follows, viz.:—Five hundred and thirty acres, more or less: Commencing at the north-west angle of allotment 1, section 8, parish of Craigie; bounded thence by a road bearing east twenty-seven chains forty-one links to the north-east angle of the borough of Craigie aforesaid; thence by the least boundary of that borough, bearing south one hundred and eighty-five chains fifty links, more or less; thence by a line bearing S. 57° 25′ W. thirty-two chains fifty-three links; and thence by a line bearing north two hundred and three chains, more or less, to the point of commencement.—(64.I.SIE).

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

(Made by the Governor in Council under 29 Victoria No. 277, Part IV., ss. 46-58.)

1. The Chief Office, Melbourne, and every Post Office, being a Money Order Office, Hours or busin at which the Postmaster-General shall permit deposits to be received for remittance to his principal office, will be open for that purpose, and for the repayment of moneys withdrawn, during the hours appointed for the transaction of Money Order Business at the said offices, and for receipt of deposits on Saturdays, in addition, from 6 until 8 o'clock p.m., or earlier, or later, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct...

- 2. Deposits of one sixpence, or of any number of sixpences, or of pounds, shillings, and sixpences, will be received from any depositor at the Post Office Savings Banks, provided the deposits made by such depositor do not exceed £50 within any period of fourteen days. When the principal and interest together, standing to the credit of any one depositor, amount to the sum of £1000, all interest will cease so long as the same funds continue to amount to the said sum of £1000.
 - All deposits must be made in cash or in notes issued by Victorian Banks.
- 3. Every depositor on making a first deposit shall be required to specify his nam Christian name and surname, occupation and residence, to the officer of the Postmaster-General appointed to receive the deposit, and make and sign the following declaration, to be witnessed by the officer of the Postmaster-General appointed to receive deposits, or by some person known to him, or by a clergyman, or a justice of the peace; and if such declaration, or any part thereof, shall not be true, the depositor making the same shall forfeit and lose all right and title to his deposits :---

4. On making the declaration, and in all cases in which the signature of the depositor is required, if the depositor cannot write, his mark must be affixed in the presence of a witness, and attested by the signature of that witness.

Deposits how received, entered, reported to the Postmaster-General, and acknowledged. 5. Every deposit received by any officer of the Postmaster-General, appointed for that purpose, shall be entered by him at the time in a numbered book, and the entry shall be attested by him and by the dated stamp of his office, and the said book, with the entry so attested, shall be given to the depositor, and retained by him as primary evidence of the receipt of the deposit. The depositor shall sign his name in a place to be provided for his signature in the Depositor's Book. The amount of each deposit, and the name, occupation, and residence of the depositor, shall, upon the day of the receipt thereof, be reported to the Postmaster-General, and the acknowledgment of the Postmaster-General for the said deposit, signified in the following form by the officer whom he shall appoint for the purpose, shall be forthwith transmitted by post to the depositor as the conclusive evidence of his claim to the repayment of the deposit with interest thereon:—

If the depositor does not receive the said acknowledgment within ten days from the day on which he made the deposit, he must apply for the same to the Postmaster-General by letter, and if necessary he must renew his application to the Postmaster-General until he receives the said acknowledgment.

Interest.

6. Interest calculated yearly at the rate of four pounds per cent. per annum shall be allowed on every complete sum of ten shillings, or some multiple thereof, deposited, and shall be computed from the first day of the calendar month next following the day on which the sum of ten shillings shall have been deposited, or on which deposits of a less amount shall have made up the sum of ten shillings, up to the first day of the calendar month in which moneys are withdrawn.

The interest will be calculated to the 31st December in every year, and will then

be added to and become part of the principal money.

Trust account

7. Deposits may be made by a trustee on behalf of another person, in the joint names of such trustee and the person on whose account such money shall be so deposited; but repayment of the same, or any part thereof, shall not be made without the receipt and receipts of both the said parties, or the survivor or survivors, or the executors or administrators of such survivor, whose receipt and receipts, either personally or by agent appointed by power of attorney, which power of attorney may be executed by an infant of or exceeding the age of 14 years, shall alone be a valid discharge, except in case of insanity or imbecility of the party on whose behalf the deposits were made, when the Postmaster-General may, on proof of the fact to his satisfaction, allow repayment to be made to the trustee alone.

And in case any such declaration shall not he true, or if any person shall at any time have or hold or be possessed of any deposit or funds in more than one Savings Bank within the Colony of Victoria, every such person shall forfeit and lose all right and title to any deposit in or to any funds of every such Savings Bank.

8. Deposits may be made by any person under twenty-one years of age, or by a minors parent or other relative of a person under twenty-one years of age, in the name and on behalf of such person; and repayment shall be made to such minor in the same manner as if he were of full age, in case he shall have made the deposit, or to the parent or other relative who shall have made the deposit, on the application in writing of such parent or

9. Deposits may be made by married women; and deposits so made, or made by Married women who shall afterwards marry, will be repaid to any such woman, unless the husband (in any case where no order has been made by a court, judge, magistrate, or justice, protecting the earnings and property of the wife), shall give notice in writing of such marriage to the Postmaster-General, and shall require payment to be made to him; in which case the Postmaster-General may, at his discretion, pay the same or any portion thereof, together with any interest due in respect of the same to such husband or to such woman as to him shall seem proper: Provided that in case of any order made as aforesaid, the woman making deposit shall give notice of such order for the protection of her property, and shall produce the original order or certified copy thereof.

10. The trustees of any Friendly Society, the rules of which have been certified by the Registrar of Friendly Societies in the Colony of Victoria, or of any Charitable or Provident Society, may deposit their funds, without restriction as to amount, in the Post Office Savings Bank; provided always that such deposits shall not be of less amount than one sixpence, nor of any sum not a multiple thereof, and that a copy of the rules be forwarded by post to the Postmaster-General, with the names and addresses of the trustees, who will then be furnished with the necessary instructions.

Every depositor shall, once in each year, on the anniversary of the day on which he made his first deposit, forward his book to the principal office of the Postmaster-General, in a cover-to. be obtained at any Post Office Savings Bank, in order that the entries in the said book may be compared with the entries in the books of the Postmaster-General, and that the interest due to the depositor may be inserted in his book.

Depositora' books.

14. No charge shall be made upon depositors for the books at first supplied to them or for books issued to them in continuation thereof; but if any depositor shall lose his book and shall desire a new book, application must be made by him to the Postmaster-General by letter, stating the circumstances and enclosing postage stamps of the value of One shilling, to pay for the new book, should the application be granted, and the Postmaster-General shall, as he thinks fit, issue a new book, or return the stamps to the applicant.

Postage

15. No charge for postage shall be made upon the depositors for the transmission of their books to the Postmaster-General, or for the return thereof to them.

Withdrawals

16. Any depositor wishing to withdraw the whole or any part of the sum deposited by him, must make application for the same to the Postmaster-General, in the following form, a printed copy of which may be obtained at any Post Office Savings Bank:—

By the same post, the Postmaster at whose office the warrant is made payable shall be advised of the issue of the warrant. This warrant must be presented by the depositor at the Post Office named thereon, together with the depositor's book, in which the Postmaster shall enter the amount repaid, and attest the entry with his signature, and the dated stamp of his office. The Postmaster shall take a receipt from the depositor on the warrant for the amount repaid to him.

The Postmaster-General will endeavor to prevent fraud, and to identify every depositor transacting business with the Post Office Savings Bank. But if any person shall fraudulently represent himself to be a depositor, and by forwarding the proper notice of withdrawal, and by presentation of the depositor's book, and compliance with the rules of the department, shall obtain any sum of money belonging to that depositor, the Post-master-General will not be responsible for the loss thereof.

17. Except as hereinbefore mentioned, repayments shall be made only to a depositor Repayment to a in person, or to the bearer of an order under his hand, signed in the presence of either a clergyman, of a justice of the peace, or, in case of sickness, of the medical attendant. If the depositor resides out of Victoria, his signature must be verified by some constituted authority of the place in which he resides.

18. Applications to withdraw money deposited by any Friendly, Charitable, or withdrawals by friendly and Society. must be signed by two of the trustees of any such society, or, when and receipt for the Provident Society, must be signed by two of the trustees of any such society, or, when there is no trustee, then by the treasurer; and the names of the trustee or treasurer, or other officer of the society, authorised to receive the amount to be withdrawn, shall be stated in the notice of withdrawal, and the warrant for payment of the amount shall be made out in the name of such trustee, treasurer, or officer, and the receipt of such person apparently authorised shall be a sufficient discharge for the same.

19. In case any depositor shall die leaving any sum of money not exceeding Funds exclusive of interest, deposited in the Post Office Savings Bank, and probate of his will or letters of administration be not produced to the Postmaster-General, or if notice in writing of the existence of a will, and intention to prove the same or to take out letters of administration, be not given to the Postmaster-General at his principal office within the period of one month from the death of the depositor, or if such notice be given, but such will be not proved or letters of administration be not taken out, and the probate or letters of administration (as the case may be) produced to the Postmaster-General within the period of two months from the death of the depositor, it shall be lawful for the

Postmaster-General after such period of one or two months, as the case may be, to pay and divide such funds at his discretion to or amongst the widow or relatives of the deceased depositor, or any one or more of them; or, if he shall think proper, according to the Statute of Distributions.

Funds of deceased depositor above £50.

20. In case any depositor shall die leaving any sum of money in the Post Office Savings Bank, which (exclusive of interest) shall exceed the sum of £50, the same shall only be paid to the executor or administrator on the production of the probate of will or letters of administration of the estate or effects of the deceased depositor, to the Postmaster-General.

Payment on death of a depositor being illegitimate and dying intestate. 21. If any depositor, being illegitimate, shall die intestate, leaving any person or persons who, but for the illegitimacy of such depositor, and of such person or persons, would be entitled to the money due to such deceased depositor, it shall be lawful for the Postmaster-General, with the authority in writing of the Attorney-General, to pay the money of such deceased depositor to any one or more of the persons who in his opinion would have been entitled to the same according to the Statute of Distributions, if the said depositor and such person or persons had been legitimate.

Incapacitated depositors.

22. If any depositor shall become insane, or otherwise incapacitated to act, and the same shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General, and if the Postmaster-General shall be satisfied of the urgency of the case, he may authorise payment, from time to time, out of the funds of such depositor to any person whom he shall judge proper, and the receipt of such person shall be a good discharge for the same.

Settlement of disputes.

23. If any dispute shall arise between the Postmaster-General and any individual depositor, or any executor, administrator, next of kin, or creditor or assignee of a depositor who may become bankrupt or insolvent, or any person claiming to be such executor, administrator, next of kin, creditor or assignee, or to be entitled to any money deposited in the Post Office Savings Bank, then and in every such case the matter in dispute shall be referred, in writing, to the Attorney-General, and whatever award, order, or determination shall be made by the said Attorney-General shall be final, to all intents and purposes, without any appeal.

Secrecy

24. The officers of the Postmaster-General engaged in the receipt or payment of deposits, shall not disclose the name of any depositor, nor the amount deposited or withdrawn by him, except to the Postmaster-General, or to such of his officers as may be appointed to assist in carrying out the provisions of the 4th part of Post Office Statute 1865.

Interpretation

25. In the construction of these Regulations the words Postmaster-General shall include the Deputy Postmaster-General; and unless there is something in the subject or context repugnant thereto, every word importing the singular number only, shall mean and include several persons or things as well as one person or thing, and the converse; and every word importing the masculine gender only, shall mean and include female as well as male; and the word month shall refer to a calendar, and not a lunar month.

REGULATIONS FOR THE GUIDANCE OF OFFICERS EMPLOYED IN THE TRANSACTION OF POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK BUSINESS IN THE CHIEF OFFICE, MELBOURNE.

(Made by the Governor in Council under 29 Victoria No. 277, Part IV., ss. 46-58.)

Treatment of Savings Banks in Chief Office. 1. When the Savings Bank Accounts, with their accompanying vouchers, have reached the Chief Office in the envelopes containing the Money Order Accounts, they will be sorted off to the Examiner, and will be checked as to the cast by that officer, who will also ascertain that the entries of payments correspond with the warrants, and that the total numbers and total amounts of Savings Bank deposits and payments have been duly carried into the Money Order Accounts, and that the total amount of deposits has been duly added to the total of orders issued, and the total amount of payments to the total amount of orders

Introduction of daily totals of Savings Bank transactions into Money Order Account Current Book and its summary. The Savings Bank Accounts and their vouchers will then be separated from the Money Order Accounts; the latter accounts having undergone the usual examination, will be entered in the Postmaster's Account Current Book (pattern 18). The introduction of the Savings Bank totals into this book will enable the Money Order Office to maintain as perfect a check upon the Postmasters, in regard to their remittances of Money Order and Savings Bank cash, as that office now maintains in regard to Money Order cash alone; and further, it will raise a check against the books of the Savings Bank in regard to the total number and total amount of Savings Bank deposits and repayments, which will be of considerable advantage.

The Savings Bank Accounts will then be recorded in a Summary (pattern 16), in which the total numbers and total amounts of deposits and payments at each office, and the

aggregate of the transactions at all the offices, will be shown.

2. The Account will then be placed in the hands of the Acknowledgment Clerk, acknowledgment deposits. whose duty will be to fill up and address an acknowledgment for each deposit named in each account, then to pass the accounts, with their accompanying declarations and warrants, to the Deposit Ledger Keeper, and to retain the acknowledgments for subsequent comparison by the Examiner with the entries in the ledger.

3. A separate account for each depositor will be opened in the Depositors' Ledger Depositors' Ledger (pattern 20); these accounts will be grouped under the Post Office at which the first deposits are made. There will be a separate series of consecutive numbers for the accounts of each group. To carry out this arrangement, each depositor's book, and all the forms connected therewith, have been made to show the name of the office at which the first deposit is made, and the numerical position of the depositor in the group of depositors proper to that office. Thus, if a depositor has received book 46 from the Post Office at Ballarat, his account in the Ledger of the Chief Office will be No. 46 of the accounts grouped under Ballarat.

The groups of accounts will be arranged alphabetically, according to the names of the Post Offices, and thus there will be no difficulty whatever in tracing the account of any one of them, or in at once assigning any application or paper connected with that account to the officer qualified to deal with it.

It is expected that depositors will frequently move from place to place. So long as they are merely travelling, their accounts will be retained in the group in which they were originally placed; but when they make a new and permanent settlement, their accounts will be transferred to the group proper to the new place of residence.

4. When the Ledger Keeper receives from the Acknowledgment Clerk the daily Daty of Ledger Keeper. Savings Bank Accounts of the Postmasters, he will take those accounts in their alphabetical order and enter the deposits therefrom into the accounts of the depositors. he opens a fresh account, on the occasion of a first deposit, he will take care that the statutory declaration has been duly made and forwarded with the account. These statutory declarations will daily be extracted from the accounts when the Ledger Keeper has examined them and sorted in alphabetical order, in which order they will be retained, and will thus form a complete alphabetical index to the depositors' names, and save the compilation of any such index.

The deposits having been entered from the accounts into the ledger, the acknow-ledgments of these deposits will be compared with the entries in the ledger. This comparison will secure the accuracy of the ledger entries and of the acknowledgments. When this comparison has been concluded by the Examiner, the acknowledgments will then be folded and transmitted to the depositor.

5. When notices of withdrawal reach the Chief Office, they will be sorted by Withdrawals. the Ledger Keeper, whose duty it will be—(a.) To compare the notice with the account of the depositor, and ascertain if the required amount is due to the applicant; (b.) To enter the amount proposed to be withdrawn in the proper column of the account in the ledger, in anticipation of the payment; and (c.) To pass the notices on to the Examiner, by whom the warrants will be prepared and checked against the entries in the ledger, and by whom the corresponding advices will be made out and issued.

Thus, when the warrants, after presentation to and payment by the Postmasters return to the Ledger Keeper in the daily Savings Bank Account, the Ledger Keeper will not then have to make an entry of the payment, but he will then have to compare the entry in the Postmaster's account with the entry previously made by him in the ledger, against which entry he will have to note the date of payment. This previous entry of the warrant in the ledger, and subsequent comparison of the entry in the Postmaster's account with that entry in the ledger, will secure the immediate detection of any fraudulent alteration of the warrant, if the Postmaster had failed to detect such an alteration by a comparison of the warrant with the advice.

The Ledger Keeper will also require to make up the Monthly Summary, to insert the interest in each depositor's account annually (unless when the account is closed within the year, in which case the interest must be inserted on the closing of the account), and to cast and balance each depositor's account annually.

6. As has already been shown, the entries in the ledger will in all cases be checked Duty of Examiner, by the Examiner; the accuracy of the debit sides of the depositors' accounts will be secured by comparing the acknowledgments of deposits with the entry of deposits in the ledger, and the accuracy of the credit sides will be secured by comparing the warrants (which will be prepared from the notices of withdrawal) with the entries in the ledger previously made by the Ledger Keeper from the same notices.

The warrants will be numbered consecutively, and each separate warrant will be entered in a book (pattern No. 17). After all the warrants have been issued, they will be sorted to the Post Office at which they are made payable. An advice sheet will then be filled up, containing entries of all the warrants drawn upon each Postmaster, and reference made to their Money Order balance, for the purpose of ascertaining if they have sufficient funds to meet the withdrawals.

As a general rule, notices of withdrawal received on any given day will be so treated that the warrants and advices will be prepared on that day, and transmitted on the following day to the depositors and postmasters.

7. The check upon the aggregate of Post Office Savings Bank transactions will be check upon the aggregate of Post Office Savings Bank transactions will be considered totals. as follows:—The daily totals of each Postmaster's receipts and payments will be carried into the Postmaster's Account Current Book and into the monthly summary of that book, which will give an aggregate total of the receipts and payments of all Postmasters on Savings Bank Account. (b.) The items composing the daily totals of receipts and payments by Postmasters will be entered in the Depositors' Ledger and in the summary of

that ledger, which will give the aggregate of all sums deposited and withdrawn. (c.) The total receipts by Postmasters, as shown by the summary of the Account Current Book, should agree with the total of the deposits, as shown by the summary of the Depositors' Ledger; and the total payments by Postmasters, as shown by summary of Account Current Book, should agree with the total of sums withdrawn, as shown by the summary of the Depositors' Ledger, due provision being made for warrants issued to depositors, but not cashed by them at the date of comparison of accounts.

· 8. All officers in the Chief Office receiving deposits from, and making repayments to, the public, must, in the transaction of this business, observe the regulations for the guidance of Postmasters and other officers as far as such regulations are applicable.

3. You will place the large copy of the printed regulations in some conspicuous position in your office, where the public can read it conveniently. You will retain the small copy for your own guidance, and study it carefully; and if there be any part of the regulations, or of these instructions, which you do not understand, you will at once apply for further information to the Controller, Savings Bank, Department, General Post Office, Melbourne.

4. You will learn from Clause 2 of the Regulations that you may receive deposits of one sixpence, or of any number of sixpences, or of pounds, shillings, and sixpences, from any depositor. You are not to understand from this clause that deposits of copper coin may not be made, but that every deposit must be of the value of one sixpence, or of some number of sixpences. You will also learn from this clause that no depositor (with the exceptions specified in Clause 10) may deposit more than £50 within any period of

A deposit of sixpence, or any number of sixpences or pounds shillings and sixpences, may be re-ceived. Copper coin need not be refused if of the value of one six-pence.

In such a case the depositor's mark must be affixed to the receipt at the foot of the warrant, and must be witnessed by the person identifying him. If the warrant does not correspond with the advice, or you have reason to think that the person presenting the warrant is not entitled to receive the amount, you must refuse payment, and report the same to the Savings Bank Branch, General Post Office, Melbourne!

10. Warrants can only be paid to the depositor in person, or to a person authorised Paymentofwarrants when by him in the (Form S. B., No. 7), a copy of which you must supply if applied for. The order must be signed in the manner prescribed in Clause 17 of the Regulations, and when the warrant has been duly paid you must attach the order to it.

When 'entry of paid warrants in this has been done, enter the warrant on the credit side of your daily savings bank account, giving in each column of that account the information required by the respective headings of those columns. _

B., No. 4a), and direct him to fill it up and forward it with his book (in a cover which will be supplied to you for the purpose) to the Postmaster-General, Melbourne, and inform him that he will obtain payment and a new Post Office deposit book, if required, within ten days. If any depositor of a Penny Savings Bank wishes to make further deposits at your office, he must also be requested to forward his Penny Savings Bank deposit book to the Postmaster-General, Melbourne, and a new Post Office deposit book will be supplied to him within ten days. The necessary instructions will be forwarded to you to enable you to enter the amount due to the above-described depositors in a Post Office Savings Bank deposit book to be issued from your office.

15. Should no savings bank transactions take place at your office on any day, you will not be required to send up a form of account, but you will be required to enter in each of the places set apart for savings bank totals in the daily money order account the word nil.

Should any savings bank transactions have taken place during the day on which no money order transactions have taken place, you will be required to send up a money order account with the word nil written across that part of it which refers to money orders, and the totals of the savings bank transactions inserted in the part which refers to them.
- 17. The daily totals of the savings bank transactions are to be entered in places prepared in the new form of monthly account, and also in the copy of that account in the new money order cash book now supplied to you.

Secrecy.

18. You are forbidden by the Postal Act to give any information, except to the Postmaster-General and the proper officers of the Post Office, as to the name of any depositor, or the sum deposited or withdrawn by him, and disobedience to this rule will incur the severe displeasure of the Postmaster-General. You will also be liable to forfeit a penalty not exceeding £100 for an offence against, or a wilful neglect or omission to comply with, this or any other of the Regulations.

SIR,—I transmit to you, to be laid before your responsible advisers, in order that they may deal with the matter in such manner as may appear to them desirable, a copy of a letter from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, suggesting an arrangement by which a portion of the salt beef required for the navy might be cured in the immediate vicinity of Melbourne, and supplied at a fixed price to their lordships.

Admiralty, 19th May, 1865. SIE,—I am commanded by my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to request you will state to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that it having been represented that a saving to the public may be effected by curing in Australia a portion of the salt beef required for the navy, they have given the subject their consideration.

My Lords are not prepared to incur the expense that would be involved (as a first outlay) by the purchase of land and the erection of the buildings and plant necessary for such an establishment, nor are they disposed to enter into contract with private individuals for the supplies which would be required.

But it has occurred to them that the Colonial Government of Victoria might be inclined to enter into an arrangement with the Admiralty for supplying at a fixed price per pound the quantity of salt beef which would be required, probably to the extent of 300,000 pounds annually, the whole of such meat to be the produce of oxen approved both before and after being slaughtered by an officer appointed by my Lords to superintend the process of curing, and to take charge of the store on the spot.

My Lords enclose, as a guide, a statement of the buildings and plant, with plans of the same, that would be necessary for such an establishment; and they have further to observe that as it is contemplated to supply the naval depots in China, India, America, and the Cape of Good Hope, from Australia, it would be desirable that the premises should be situated at or in the immediate vicinity of Melbourne (where freight is always obtainable), and possess a water frontage for the convenience of shipment.

My Lords request that the Secretary of State for the Colonies will obtain for them the views of the Colonial Government on this subject as early as convenient, and if the latter be disposed to accede to their proposal, they will without delay despatch an officer to Melbourne for the purpose of making all preliminary arrangements

Two blocks for cutting up beef, and a salting or rubbing table to each bin for the men to work at.

Baskets on trucks.

Pickle Boilers.

Two large iron boilers for boiling the pickle (with proper pipes, pump, &c.) that comes from the salting bins previously to its being used for filling up casks.

Pickle Store.

MINUTE BY THE COMMISSIONEE OF TRADE AND CUSTOMS. IT is unfortunate that the within suggestions from the Lords of the Admiralty should reach the colony at a time when, owing to long continued drought and the demand for stock to occupy the new country (to the uorthward), it would seem that meat was too scarce and too dear to induce such an operation as the one proposed being entered upon.

It is known, however, that the season is an exceptional one, and the fact of the demand for stock to occupy new country (now known as being well fitted for pasturage) promises in the future greatly enlarged supplies of meat suitable for the purposes herein referred to, and at a price enabling competition with any country in the world; and as regards climate and all necessary appliances our capability has long been proved. The mean temperature of July was nearly two degrees lower than the average. The mortality was less than in the two previous months, but was in excess of the average for July during a period of six years.

Males contributed 62 per cent. and females 38 per cent. to the total mortality; 44 per cent. of the deaths were of children under five against 48 per cent. in July, 49 per cent. in July, 1864, 45 per cent. in July, 1863, 46 per cent. in July, 1862, 50 per cent. in July, 1864, 45 per cent. in July, 1865, 50 per cent.

Twelve deaths was the highest daily mortality recorded and three was the lowest. The former number occurred on six different days and the latter upon two.

Eight deaths of persons more than 75 years old occurred during the month, which is an unusually large number. They were returned as follow:—A male of 77 and one of 78 died of old age, a male of 78 of pneumonia, a male of 80 of diarrhea, a male of 81 of dysentery, a male of 91 of apoplexy, a female of 75 of bronchitis, and a female of 78 of nephria.

The deaths which occurred from external causes numbered eleven. Of these, 2 were from drowning, viz., a female aged 20 months and a male aged 30 years. Five were from fractures and contusions, viz., a carter aged 21 who was killed by a cart passing over him, a contractor aged 22 by a fall from his horse, a seaman aged 20 by falling from a mast, a farmer aged 30 who died in consequence of accidental injuries to his spine, and a gunsmith aged 57 from the effects of a fractured leg. Two were from accidental suffocation, viz, an infant aged 18 days, and another aged 5 months. A laborer aged 30 was accidentally killed on the railway at Williamstown in a manner not stated. A mattress maker aged 35 was hanged judicially.

Seventy deaths, or 26 per cent. of the whole number recorded, took place in public institutions. Of these 30 were in the Melbourne Hospital, 9 in the Benevolent Asylum, 9 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 3 in the Immigrants' Home, 14 in the Industrial Schools, 1 in St. Vincent de Paul's Orphan Asylum, 2 in the Melbourne Gool, and 2 in the hulk Success.

About a fourth of the mortality was from zymotic diseases, which is not a high rate. The most fatal complaint under this head was whooping-cough, which caused 19 deaths. Deaths from constitutional and developmental diseases showed decreased numbers as compared with previous months. Phthisis, which is of the constitutional class, only caused 26 deaths against 36 in June, and 31 in May.

2. At every ordinary meeting of the council the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting for confirmation the minutes of any preceding meetings not hitherto confirmed, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes when confirmed shall be signed by the president, or, in his absence, by the acting president.

3. The order of business shall be as follows, or as near thereto

Every petition or memorial addressed to the council shall be in proper form, and must be presented by a councillor, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded; and no debate shall take place thereon except as to its being received and taken into consideration after the orders of the day, or at any future meeting—or, if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.

5. The order of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the president which may think fit to bring under consideration.

6. Every notice of motion shall be given to the secretary in writing, and shall be read atoud at the meeting previous to that in which the same is to be taken into consideration, and every such notice shall be considered in the order in which it is given.

7. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be considered unless the councillor who has given such notice, or some other councillor authorised by him, be present when the business is called on. Notices not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.

8. The mover of any motion which may be referred to a committee shall, for that occasion, be a member of such committee.

9. Every councillor shall stand up while addressing the president.

12. One amendment only shall be discussed at a time, but if lost another may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried, it shall take the place of the original motion.

13. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for the adjournment of a meeting; but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournmentshall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business them undisposed of shall have precedence at the next ordinary meeting of the council.

14. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, excepting by way of explanation or reply upon an original niction of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.

15. Every councillor, when proposing a motion or amondment, or when speaking on any matter, shall -address the president, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, whereupon he shall sit down until the question of order shall have been decided; the councillor in possession of the chair may then resume the subject.

THE attention of shippers is called to the 97th, 102nd, and 117th clauses of The Customs Act 1857, subjoined, which the Collectors of Customs have received instructions to enforce. Any goods shipped without being previously entered are liable to forseiture.

Clause 117. If any goods liable to duty on importation, or taken from the warehouse to be exported, or entitled to drawback on exportation, which are enumerated in the content of any ship, shall not be duly shipped before the departure of such ship, or shall not be duly certified by the proper officer as short shipped, such goods shall be forfeited; or if any such goods shall be taken on board such ship not being enumerated in such content, the master of the ship shall forfeit the sum of Five pounds in respect of every package of such goods; and if any goods duly shipped on board such ship shall be landed at any other place than that for which they shall be cleared, unless otherwise accounted for to the satisfaction of the commissioner, the master of such ship shall forfeit a sum equal to treble the value of the goods so landed; and if any goods shall be shipped or waterborne to be shipped without being duly cleared or otherwise contrary to this Act, the same shall be forfeited.
