REGULATIONS FOR PREVENTING COLLISIONS APPLIED TO HAWAIIAN SHIPS.

THE accompanying Order of Her Majesty in Council, which has been received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, is published for general information.

Whereas the rules and practice observed for the purpose of preventing collisions at sea, which were formerly adopted by maritime nations, have proved insufficient to satisfy the requirements of modern navigation: And whereas various alterations in such rules and practice have from time to time been made by different nations, but the rules so altered have been found to be in some cases inconsistent with each other, and in other cases to have the force of municipal law only: And whereas certain regulations for the purpose aforesaid have been sanctioned by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and are contained in the Table C, in the schedule to that Act: And whereas for the purpose of correcting certain clerical errors the said regulations have, in pursuance of the provisions in the said Act contained, been modified by an Order in Council bearing date the 9th day of January, 1863, and the said regulations, so modified, are appended to the said Order, and to this Order: And whereas by virtue of the said Act and of the said Order the said regulations so appended as aforesaid, so far as relates to Certain other foreign ships when within British jurisdiction, came into operation on the 1st day of June, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three: And whereas it is provided by the same Act, that, whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that the Government of any foreign country is willing that the regulations for preventing collisions, contained in Table C in the schedule to the said Act, or such other regulations for preventing collisions as are for the time being in force under the said Act, so such other regulations for preventing collisions as are for the time being in force under the said Act, so such other regulation, and shall for the said foreign country, whether within British jurisdiction or not. that the Government of His Majesty the King of the Hawaiian Islands is willing that the said regulations appended to the said Order, and to this Order, should apply to ships belonging to those islands when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct, that the said regulations appended to the said Order in Council, bearing date the ninth day of January, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and to this Order, shall from the date of this Order apply to ships belonging to the Hawaiian Islands, whether within British jurisdiction or not.

### PRELIMINARY.

Art. 1. In the following rules every steam ship which is under sail and not under steam is to be considered a sailing ship; and every steam ship which is under steam, whether under sail or not, is to be considered a ship under steam.

### Rules Concerning Lights.

Art. 2. Lights.—The lights mentioned in the following Articles, numbered 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9, and no others shall be carried in all weathers, from sunset to sunrise.

Art. 3. Lights for steam ships.—Sea-going steam ships when under weigh shall carry—

- (a) At the foremast head, a bright white light, so fixed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the herizon of 20 points of the compass; so fixed as to throw the light 10 points on each side of the ship, viz., from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on either side; and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least five miles.
- (b) On the starboard side, a green light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass; so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the starboard side, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles.

(c.) On the port side, a red light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass; so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abut the beam on the port side, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two piles.

) The said green and red side lights shall be fitted with inboard screens, projecting at least three feet forward from the light, so as to prevent these lights from being

seen across the bow.

Art. 4. Lights for stram lugs.—Steam ships, when towing ships shall carry two bright white mast-head lights vertically, in addition to their side lights, so as to distinguish them from other steam ships. Each of these must-head lights shall be of the same construction and character as the mast-head lights which other steam ships are required to carry.

At 5. Light for stram ships are required to carry.

Art. 5. Lights for sailing ships.—Sailing ships under weigh or being towed shall carry the same lights as steam ships under weigh, with the exception of the white mast-head lights, which

they shall never carry.

Att. 6. Exceptionallights for small sailing vessels.—Whenever, as in the case of small vessels during bad weather, the green and red lights cannot be fixed, these lights shall be kept on deck, on their respective sides of the vessel, ready for instant exhibition; and shall, on the approach of or to other vessels, be exhibited on their respective sides in sufficient time to prevent collision, in such unaner as to make them most visible, and so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side, nor the red light on the starboard side.

To make the use of these portable lights more certain and easy, the lanterns containing them shall each be painted outside with the color of the light they respectively contain, and shall be provided with suitable screens.

Att. 7. Lights for shins at auchor.—Shins. whether steam

be provided with suitable screens.

Art. 7. Lights for ships at anchor.—Ships, whether steam ships or sailing ships, when at anchor in roadsteads or fairways, shall exhibit, where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding twenty feet above the hull, a white light, in a globular lantern of eight inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon, and at a distance of at least one mile.

Art. 8. Lights for pilot ressels.—Sailing pilot vessels shall not carry the lights required for other sailing vessels, but shall carry a white light at the mast head, visible all round the horizon, and shall also exhibit a flare-up light every fifteen minutes.

Art. 9. Lights for fishing vessels and boats.—Open fishing boats and other open boats shall not be required to carry the side lights required for other vessels; but shall, if they do not carry such lights, carry a lantern having a green slide on the one side and a red slide on the other side; and on the approach of or to other vessels, such lantern shall be exhibited in sufficient time to prevent collision, so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side, nor the red light on the starboard side.

Fishing vessels and open boats when at anchor, or attached to their nets and stationary, shall exhibit a bright white light.

Fishing vessels and open boats shall, however, not be prevented from using a flare-up in addition, if considered expedient.

RULES CONCENSING FOG SIGNALS.

RULES CONCERNING FOG SIGNALS.

Art. 10. Fog signals.—Whenever there is fog, whether by day or night, the fog signals described below shall be carried and used, and shall be sounded at least every five minutes,

(a.) Steam ships under weigh shall use a steam whistle placed before the fuunel, not less than eight feet from the deck.
(b.) Sailing ships under weigh shall use a fog horn.
(c.) Steam ships and sailing ships when not under weigh shall use a bell.

STEERING AND SAILING RULES.

Art. 11. Two sailing ships meeting.—If two sailing ships are meeting end on, or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, the helms of both shall be put to port, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

Art. 12. Two sailing ships crossing.—When two sailing ships are crossing so as to involve risk of collision, then, if they have the wind on different sides, the ship with the wind on the port side shall keep out of the way of the ship with the wind on the starboard side; except in the case in which the ship with the wind on the port side is close hauled and the other ship free, in which case the latter ship shall keep out of the way; but if they have the wind on the same side, or if one of them has the wind aft, the ship which is to windward shall keep out of the way of the ship which to lecward.

Art 13. Two ships under steam meeting.—If two ships under

Art. 13. Two ships under steam meeting.—If two ships under steam are meeting end on, or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, the helms of both shall be put to port, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

Art. 14. Two ships under steam crossing.—If two ships under steam are crossing so as to involve risk of collision, the ship which has the other on her own starboard side shall keep out of the way of the other.

Art. 15. Sailing ship and ship under steam.—If two ships, one of which is a sailing ship, and the other a steam ship, are proceeding in such directions as to involve risk of collision, the steam ship shall keep out of the way of the sailing ship.

Art. 16. Ships under steam to stacken speed.—Every steam ship, when approaching another ship so as to involve risk of collision, shall slanden her speed, or, if necessary, stop and reverse; and every steam ship shall, when in a fog, go at a noderate speed.

Art. 17. Fessels, overtaking other reseals—Every word over

Art. 17. Vessels overtaking other vessels.—Every vessel overtaking any other vessel shall keep out of the way of the said last-mentioned vessel.

Art. 18. Construction of Articles 12, 14, 15, and 17.—Where by the above rules one of two ships is to keep out of the way, the other shall keep her course, subject to the qualifications contained in the following Article.

Art. 19. Provise to sare special cases.—In obeying and construing these rules, due regard must be had to all dangers of navigation; and due regard must also be had to any special circumstances which may exist in any particular case rendering a departure from the above rules necessary in order to avoid immediate danger. immediate danger.

Art. 20. No ship, nuder any circumstances, to neglect proper precautions.—Northing in these rules shall exonerate any ship, or the owner, or master, or crew thereof, from the consequences of any neglect to carry lights or signals, or of any neglect to keep a proper look-out, or of the neglect of any precaution which may be required by the ordinary practice of seamen, or by the special circumstances of the case.

### REGULATIONS

For the Open Competition of 1866.\*

REGULATIONS

For the Open Competition of 1866.

1. On Monday, 19th March, 1866, and following days, an examination of candidates will be held in London. Not less than a candidates will be selected, if so many shall be found duly qualified. Of these, will be selected for the Presidency of Bengal, [ for the Upper Provinces, and for that of Bombay,—Notice will hereafter be given of the days and place of examination.

2. Any natural-born subject of Her Majesty, who shall be desirous of entering the Civil Service of India, will be entitled to be examined at such examination, provided he shall, on or before the 1st February, 1866, have transmitted to the Civil Service Commissioners, Dean's Yard, London, S.W.—

(a) A certificate of his birth, showing that his age on the 1st March, 1866, will be above seventeen years and under twenty-one years;

(b) A certificate, signed by a physician or surgeon, of his having no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity, unfitting him for the Civil Service of India;

(c) Satisfactory proof of good moral character;

(d) A statement of those of the branches of knowledge hereinafter enumerated in which he desires to be examined.

3. In any case in which a doubt may ariso as to the eligibility of a candidate in respect of age, health, or character, such inquiries as may be necessary will be instituted by the Civil Service Commissioners.

4. The examination will take place only in the following branches of knowledge. S—

† The number of appointments to be made, and the number in each Presidency, &c., will be announced hereafter.

† Candidates are at Hierty to send in their names and evidence of age as soon as they think it to do so; but evidence of health and obstracter must bear date not earlier than the 1st January, 1860.

† It should be understood that candidates are at liberty to name at their pleasure any or all of these branches of knowledge (subject only to the restriction above mentioned as to Natural Science), and that no subjects are obligatory.

5. The merit of the persons examined will be estimated by marks, and the number set opposite to each branch in the preceding regulation denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it.

6. No candidate will be allowed any marks in respect of any subject of examination unless he shall be considered to possess a competent knowledge of that subject.

7. The examination will be conducted by means of printed questions and written answers, and by vivá voce examination, as may be deemed necessary.

8. The marks obtained by each candidate, in respect of each of the subjects in which he shall have been examined, will be added up, and the names of the candidates who shall have obtained a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the romaining candidates will be set forth in order of merit, and such candidates shall be deemed to be selected candidates for the Civil Service of India. They shall be permitted to choose, according to the order in which they stand, as long as a choice remains, the Presidency (and in Bengal, the division of the Presidency) to which they shall be appointed.

9. Selected candidates before proceeding to India will be on probation for two years, during which time they will be examined periodically with the view of testing their progress in the following subjects:†—

called the "final examination," at which it will be decided whether a selected candidate is qualified for the Civil Service of India.

10. No candidate will be permitted to proceed to India until he shall have passed the final examination, and received a certificate of qualification from the Civil Service Commissioners, or after he shall have attained the age of twenty-four years.

11. The selected candidates who at the final examination shall he found to have a competent knowledge of the subjects specified in regulation 9 shall be adjudged to have passed, and to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India.

12. The seniority in the Civil Service of India of the selected candidates shall be determined according to the order in which they stand on the list resulting from the final examination.

13. No person will, even after passing the final examination, be allowed to proceed to India unless he shall comply with the regulations in force, at the time, for the Civil Service of India, and shall be of sound bodily health and good moral character.—The Civil Service Commissioners will require such further evidence on these points as they may deem necessary before granting their certificate of qualification.

14. Applications from persons desirous to be admitted as candidates are to be addressed to the Secretary to the Civil Service Commissioners, Dean's Yard, London, S.W.

Note.—(1.) The Secretary of State for India in Council has authorized the Civil Service Commissioners to state that it is his intention to allow the sum of £100 for the first year of probation and £200 for the second year to each selected candidate who shall have passed the required examinations to the satisfaction of the commissioners, and shall have complied with such rules as may be laid down for the guidance of selected candidates.

(2.) All selected candidates will be required, at the commencement of the second year of probation, to attend at the India Office, to make the necessary arrangements for entering into covenants (binding themselves, amongst other things, to refund in certain cases the amount of their allowance in case of their failing to proceed to India), and for giving a bond for £1000, jointly with two sureties, for the due fulfilment of the same. The stamps payable by civilians on their appointment amount to £3 10s.

(3.) Candidates rejected at the final examination of 1863 will in no case be allowed to present themselves.

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

### SHIRE OF WYNDHAM.

SHIRE OF WYNDHAM.

The following Rules and Regulations for the management of the Wyndham Shire Farmers' Common were made and nassed by the Council of the Shire, at a meeting thereof held at Wyndham, on Wednesday, 4th day of October, 1865.

1. All persons within the Shire of Wyndham will be entitled to commonage, for land under cultivation, as follows:—One head of cattle for every four acres from thirty-one to sixty, and one head for every four acres from thirty-one to sixty, and one head for every four acres from thirty-one to sixty, and one head for every eight acres from sixty-one to one hundred.

2. No person will be allowed to graze more than twenty-eight head of cattle, or to run bulls or entire horses on the common, without the permission of the managers; and in no case will sheep be permitted to graze on the said common.

3. The fees for the depasturing of cattle and horses on the common shall be—for every head of cattle, Six shillings per annum; and for every horse, Nine shillings per annum, payable quarterly in advance. Any person will be allowed to graze one horse in lieu of two head of cattle.

4. Persons wishing to obtain a license to depasture cattle must apply to the nearest manager; and shall be required to have his name and address, together with the brands and description of his cattle, entered on the manager's books; he shall also receive from the manager a receipt for the fees he has paid, and an order to the herdsman for the admission of his cattle to the common.

5. All persons taking cattle to the common will be required

also receive from the manager a receipt for the fees he has pard, and an order to the herdsman for the admission of his cattle to the common.

5. All persons taking cattle to the common will be required to deliver them into the charge of the herdsman, and produce the order from the manager; the herdsman shall sign the same and enter a copy of it in the herd book; and shall afterwards, with the assistance of the owner of the cattle or his agent, proceed to brand the cattle with the common's brand in pitch.

6. In the event of any registered cattle or horses being impounded, the herdsman will be required to pay the whole expenses for the release of the said cattle or horses. The herdsman shall have authority from the managers to impound all unregistered cattle and horses, or sheep, found grazing on the common, and shall receive, as an equivalent, all trespass money, and enter the same in the herd book.

7. The herdsman must reside on the common, and shall muster the cattle at any time when required to do so by the managers, with whom he shall enter into security for the safety of all cattle entrusted to his care; but the managers will not be responsible for any cattle depasturing on the common.

8. It will be the herdsman's duty to see all the cattle under his care once every twenty-four hours; he shall keep a record describing the brands of all licensed cattle, the same to be open to the inspection of commoners; he shall also make an entry of each day's transactions in the herd book; failing to do so, will subject him in each case to a penalty not exceeding Twenty shillings.

9. No commoner will be allowed to remove cattle or horses

shillings.

9. No commoner will be allowed to remove cattle or horses from the common without first producing his receipt from the managers, showing that the fees have been paid for the same. If any commoner fail to renew his license, or remove his cattle or horses when the quarter expires, the same will be considered

or horses when the quarter expires, the same will be considered as trespassers.

10. Should the fees collected be insufficient to pay the herdsman's wages and other contingencies, an additional charge will be made upon each commoner in fair proportion to the number of cattle by him depastured; and each license granted will be under the condition that he can be sued for the same, and the amount to be recoverable before any justice of the peace.

11. Should the managers at any time consider the herdsman incompetent or neglectful of his duties, they can remove or discharge him without notice, and he can have no claim upon them for any compensation whatever.

12. The managers do not hold themselves responsible for any

neglect or irregularity of the herdsman, and can alter or amend these rules when they consider it necessary. 13. All diseased cattle found trespassing will be immediately
