## ACT OF PARLIAMENT LEFT TO ITS OPERATION.

THE Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies has, in a Despatch bearing date the 11th day of August, 1865, intimated to the Governor that Her Majesty will not be advised to exercise Her power of disallowance in respect of the Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the 28th year of Her Majesty's reign, the number, title, and date of which are hereto subjoined, viz. :—

## REGULATIONS FOR PREVENTING COLLISIONS APPLIED TO HAWAIIAN SHIPS.

THE accompanying Order of Her Majesty in Council, which has been received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, is published for general information.

PRESENT:

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the rules and practice observed for the purpose of preventing collisions at sea, which were formerly adopted by maritime nations, have proved insufficient to satisfy the requirements of modern navigation: And whereas various alterations in such rules and practice have from time to time been made by different nations, but the rules so altered have been found to be in some cases inconsistent with each other, and in other cases to have the force of municipal law only: And whereas certain regulations for the purpose aforesaid have been sanctioned by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and are contained in the Table C, in the schedule to that Act: And whereas for the purpose of correcting certain clerical errors the said regulations have, in pursuance of the provisions in the said Act contained, been modified by an Order in Council bearing date the 9th day of January, 1863, and the said regulations, so modified, are appended to the said Order, and to this Order: And whereas by virtue of the said Act and of the said Order the said regulations so appended as aforesaid, so far as relates to British and French ships and also so far as relates to certain other foreign ships when within British jurisdiction, came into operation on the 1st day of June, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three: And whereas it is provided by the same Act, that, whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that the Government of any foreign country is willing that the regulations for preventing collisions, contained in Table C in the schedule to the said Act, or such other regulations for preventing collisions as are for the time being in force under the said Act, should apply to the ships of such country when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction, Her Majesty may by Order in Council direct that such regulations shall apply to the ships of the said foreign country, whether within British jurisdiction or not. And it is further provided by the said Act that whenever an Order in Council has been issued applying any regulation made by or in pursuance of the said Act to the ships of any foreign country such ships shall, in all cases arising in any British Court, be deemed to be subject to such regulation, and shall for the purpose of such regulation be treated as if they were British ships: And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty,

that the Government of His Majesty the King of the Hawaiian Islands is willing that the said regulations appended to the said Order, and to this Order, should apply to ships belonging to those islands when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct, that the said regulations appended to the said Order in Council, bearing date the ninth day of January, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and to this Order, shall from the date of this Order apply to ships belonging to the Hawaiian Islands, whether within British jurisdiction or not.

#### PRELIMINARY.

Art. 1. In the following rules every steam ship which is under sail and not under steam is to be considered a sailing ship; and every steam ship which is under steam, whether under sail or not, is to be considered a ship under steam.

#### RULES CONCERNING LIGHTS.

Art. 2. *Lights.*—The lights mentioned in the following Articles, numbered 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9, and no others shall be carried in all weathers, from sunset to sunrise.

Art. 3. *Lights for steam ships.*—Sea-going steam ships when under weigh shall carry—

- (a.) *At the foremast head*, a bright white light, so fixed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass; so fixed as to throw the light 10 points on each side of the ship, viz., from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on either side; and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least five miles.
- (b.) *On the starboard side*, a green light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass; so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the starboard side, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles.

- (d.) The said green and red side lights shall be fitted with inboard screens, projecting at least three feet forward from the light, so as to prevent these lights from being seen across the bow.

Art. 5. *Lights for sailing ships*.—Sailing ships under weigh or being towed shall carry the same lights as steam ships under weigh, with the exception of the white mast-head lights, which they shall never carry.

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To make the use of these portable lights more certain and easy, the lanterns containing them shall each be painted outside with the color of the light they respectively contain, and shall be provided with suitable screens.

Art. 8. *Lights for pilot vessels.*—Sailing pilot vessels shall not carry the lights required for other sailing vessels, but shall carry a white light at the mast head, visible all round the horizon, and shall also exhibit a flare-up light every fifteen minutes.

Fishing vessels and open boats shall, however, not be prevented from using a flare-up in addition, if considered expedient.

(a.) Steam ships under weigh shall use a steam whistle placed before the funnel, not less than eight feet from the deck.

Art. 13. *Two sailing ships crossing.*—When two sailing ships are crossing so as to involve risk of collision, then, if they have the wind on different sides, the ship with the wind on the port side shall keep out of the way of the ship with the wind on the

Art. 13. *Two ships under steam meeting.*—If two ships under steam are meeting end on, or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, the helms of both shall be put to port, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

Art. 15. *Sailing ship and ship under steam.*—If two ships, one of which is a sailing ship, and the other a steam ship, are proceeding in such directions as to involve risk of collision, the steam ship shall keep out of the way of the sailing ship.

Art. 17. *Vessels overtaking other vessels.*—Every vessel overtaking any other vessel shall keep out of the way of the last-mentioned vessel.

Art. 19. *Proviso to save special cases.*—In obeying and construing these rules, due regard must be had to all dangers of navigation; and due regard must also be had to any special circumstances which may exist in any particular case rendering a departure from the above rules necessary in order to avoid immediate danger.

3. In any case in which a doubt may arise as to the eligibility of a candidate in respect of age, health, or character, such inquiries as may be necessary will be instituted by the Civil

- § It should be understood that candidates are at liberty to name at their pleasure any or all of these branches of knowledge (subject only to the restriction above mentioned as to Natural Science), and that no subjects are *obligatory*.

5. The merit of the persons examined will be estimated by marks, and the number set opposite to each branch in the preceding regulation denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it.

6. No candidate will be allowed any marks in respect of any subject of examination unless he shall be considered to possess a competent knowledge of that subject.\*

7. The examination will be conducted by means of printed questions and written answers, and by *visd voce* examination, as may be deemed necessary.

8. The marks obtained by each candidate, in respect of each of the subjects in which he shall have been examined, will be added up, and the names of the candidates who shall have obtained a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining candidates will be set forth in order of merit, and such candidates shall be deemed to be selected candidates for the Civil Service of India. They shall be permitted to choose, according to the order in which they stand, as long as a choice remains, the Presidency (and in Bengal, the division of the Presidency) to which they shall be appointed.

9. Selected candidates before proceeding to India will be on probation for two years, during which time they will be examined periodically with the view of testing their progress in the following subjects:—

In these examinations, as in the open competition, the merit of the candidates examined will be estimated by marks, and the number set opposite to each subject denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it at any one examination. The examination will be conducted by means of printed questions and written answers, and by *visd voce* examination, as may be deemed necessary. The marks obtained at each of such periodical examinations will be added to those previously or subsequently obtained. The last of these examinations will be held at the close of the second year of probation, and will be called the "final examination," at which it will be decided whether a selected candidate is qualified for the Civil Service of India.

10. No candidate will be permitted to proceed to India until he shall have passed the final examination, and received a certificate of qualification from the Civil Service Commissioners, or after he shall have attained the age of twenty-four years.

11. The selected candidates who at the final examination shall be found to have a competent knowledge of the subjects specified in regulation 9 shall be adjudged to have passed, and to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India.

12. The seniority in the Civil Service of India of the selected candidates shall be determined according to the order in which they stand on the list resulting from the final examination.

13. No person will, even after passing the final examination, be allowed to proceed to India unless he shall comply with the regulations in force, at the time, for the Civil Service of India, and shall be of sound bodily health and good moral character. The Civil Service Commissioners will require such further evidence on these points as they may deem necessary before granting their certificate of qualification.

14. Applications from persons desirous to be admitted as candidates are to be addressed to the Secretary to the Civil Service Commissioners, Dean's Yard, London, S.W.

NOTE.—(1.) The Secretary of State for India in Council has authorized the Civil Service Commissioners to state that it is his intention to allow the sum of £100 for the first year of probation and £200 for the second year to each selected candidate who shall have passed the required examinations to the satisfaction of the commissioners, and shall have complied with such rules as may be laid down for the guidance of selected candidates.

(2.) All selected candidates will be required, at the commencement of the second year of probation, to attend at the India Office, to make the necessary arrangements for entering into covenants (binding themselves, amongst other things, to refund in certain cases the amount of their allowance in case of their failing to proceed to India), and for giving a bond for £1000, jointly with two sureties, for the due fulfilment of the same. The stamps payable by civilians on their appointment amount to £3 10s.

(3.) Candidates rejected at the final examination of 1863 will in no case be allowed to present themselves for re-examination.

1. Every article to be of the very best description, quality, and manufacture, and subject to approval, and should articles of any particular manufacture be ordered, the same are to be furnished at the rates set forth in the contract.

2. All orders for supplies under these contracts must issue from the Secretary for Railways, and all goods must be delivered free of charge to the Railway Stores, Williamstown, unless otherwise directed by the secretary.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service of the Victorian Railways, or by the purchase of articles manufactured in the penal establishments, or the manufacture of articles by the department.

4. The Government will not be bound to issue orders upon the contractors for all the articles enumerated in the schedules, but only for such articles, and such quantities of those articles as the Government may order from time to time; neither will the Government be bound to take from the contractors any larger supply of any of the articles than the orders which have been issued during the year, nor will they be bound to take any of the articles enumerated in the schedules for which orders have not been issued. Should the Government require a larger supply of any article than the quantity stated in the schedule, the contractor will be bound to supply the same at the contract rate.

5. Delivery, as a rule, is to be of the full quantity ordered at one time; but all deliveries must be accompanied with detailed invoices or bills of parcels in duplicate, showing quantity, rate, and value, also the number of the order for the goods, otherwise the goods will not be received.

6. In the event of supplies ordered under these contracts not being delivered within forty-eight hours, it will be competent for the railway storekeeper, on the order of the secretary, to purchase the same, or such articles as may be suitable for the service, at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price will be deducted.

7. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly, in the prescribed form, and render the same to the railway storekeeper for certification, previously to payment at the Treasury.

8. Any expense incurred on account of the rejection of supplies by a board of survey will be charged to the contractor.

9. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged to the contractor.

#### IRON CASTINGS.

## SHIRE OF WYNDHAM.

THE following Rules and Regulations for the management of the Wyndham Shire Farmers' Common were made and passed by the Council of the Shire, at a meeting thereof held at Wyndham, on Wednesday, 4th day of October, 1865.

1. All persons within the Shire of Wyndham will be entitled to commonage, for land under cultivation, as follows:—One head of cattle for every two acres up to thirty, one head for every four acres from thirty-one to sixty, and one head for every eight acres from sixty-one to one hundred.
2. No person will be allowed to graze more than twenty-eight head of cattle, or to run bulls or entire horses on the common, without the permission of the managers; and in no case will sheep be permitted to graze on the said common.
3. The fees for the depasturing of cattle and horses on the common shall be—for every head of cattle, Six shillings per annum; and for every horse, Nine shillings per annum, payable quarterly in advance. Any person will be allowed to graze one horse in lieu of two head of cattle.
4. Persons wishing to obtain a license to depasture cattle must apply to the nearest manager in their district. Each person must pay the fees to the manager, and shall be required to have his name and address, together with the brands and description of his cattle, entered on the manager's books; he shall also receive from the manager a receipt for the fees he has paid, and an order to the herdsman for the admission of his cattle to the common.
5. All persons taking cattle to the common will be required to deliver them into the charge of the herdsman, and produce the order from the manager; the herdsman shall sign the same and enter a copy of it in the herd book; and shall afterwards, with the assistance of the owner of the cattle or his agent, proceed to brand the cattle with the common's brand in pitch.
6. In the event of any registered cattle or horses being impounded, the herdsman will be required to pay the whole expenses for the release of the said cattle or horses. The herdsman shall have authority from the managers to impound all unregistered cattle and horses, or sheep, found grazing on the common, and shall receive, as an equivalent, all trespass money, and enter the same in the herd book.
7. The herdsman must reside on the common, and shall muster the cattle at any time when required to do so by the managers, with whom he shall enter into security for the safety of all cattle entrusted to his care; but the managers will not be responsible for any cattle depasturing on the common.
8. It will be the herdsman's duty to see all the cattle under his care once every twenty-four hours; he shall keep a record describing the brands of all licensed cattle, the same to be open to the inspection of commoners; he shall also make an entry of each day's transactions in the herd book; failing to do so, will subject him in each case to a penalty not exceeding Twenty shillings.
9. No commoner will be allowed to remove cattle or horses from the common without first producing his receipt from the managers, showing that the fees have been paid for the same. If any commoner fail to renew his license, or remove his cattle or horses when the quarter expires, the same will be considered as trespassers.
10. Should the fees collected be insufficient to pay the herdsman's wages and other contingencies, an additional charge will be made upon each commoner in fair proportion to the number of cattle by him depastured; and each license granted will be under the condition that he can be sued for the same, and the amount to be recoverable before any justice of the peace.
11. Should the managers at any time consider the herdsman incompetent or neglectful of his duties, they can remove or discharge him without notice, and he can have no claim upon them for any compensation whatever.
12. The managers do not hold themselves responsible for any

neglect or irregularity of the herdsman, and can alter or amend these rules when they consider it necessary.

13. All diseased cattle found trespassing will be immediately destroyed.

14. Special licenses will be granted in exceptional cases, when considered necessary.

# RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE N. AND S. WOORAGEE, SOUTH BARNAWARTHA, AND NORTH BARNAWARTHA FARMERS' COMMONS, WITHIN THE SHIRE OF YACKANDANDAH.

EVERY farmer or tenant farmer within the same parish or same agricultural area as any of the abovenamed commons, also any holder of a business license, publican's license, or splitter's license, resident upon or within the boundaries of any of the aforesaid commons, shall be entitled to depasture thereon such description of stock as may be decided by the managers of the respective commons.

2. Each person so entitled to commonage as in the preceding clause, shall be permitted to depasture cattle on the common to which he is so entitled, according to the following scale, that is to say:—Two head of cattle or one horse for every 10 acres owned or tenanted by him; the holder of a business license, publican's, or splitter's license, two head of cattle or two horses.

3. The assessment on stock depasturing on each of the above commons to be as follows, viz:—

For every horse over 12 months old, Four shillings per annum.

For every head of cattle over 12 months old, Two shillings per annum.

4. All assessments to be paid half-yearly in advance. The half-years to commence on the first day of October and the first day of April in each year.

5. The owners of stock depasturing on any of the aforesaid commons will be required to muster them in their own yards, or some more convenient place, as often as may be found necessary, to be branded with the common's brand in pitch, upon notice in writing being given them by the herdsman or managers. All stock to be branded by the herdsman or managers. All unbranded stock found on the common to be considered as straying, and to be impounded forthwith.

6. Bulls or entire horses will not be permitted to run on the common without the written consent of the managers.

7. The herdsman of the respective commons, or any person authorised by the managers, may have authority to impound all straying or unauthorised stock found thereon, a registry of which he will be required to keep so that all damages and fees arising therefrom may be properly accounted for.

8. It shall be necessary for the owners of any cattle diseased or supposed to be diseased to remove such cattle from the commons within 24 hours after notice in writing requiring them so to do has been given them from a majority of the managers, and in the event of the owner's refusal so to do, he shall be considered as a trespasser, and be liable to the penalties mentioned in clause 129 of *The Land Act 1862*. Any person being found depasturing more cattle than what he has taken out a license and paid for, shall be liable to the penalties mentioned in clause 129 of *The Land Act 1862*.

9. The managers shall have the power of appointing and of discharging the herdsman.

10. The managers are not to be held responsible for any neglect or irregularities of the herdsman.

11. A record to be kept by the managers or the herdsman, showing the number and description of cattle each person has paid for.

12. The managers shall give a printed receipt to each man, showing the number and description of stock, and the amount paid in respect of them.

13. All stock shall be at the owner's risk.

14. The managers to hand into the secretary of the shire, on the 1st day of October in each year, the various books of account kept by them in respect of the common, together with a statement showing the receipts and expenditure for the past year, for the purpose of being audited by auditors appointed by the council.

15. The shire council will appoint managers for the respective commons at its first meeting in September in each year; such managers not to enter into office until the first day of October following, and to continue in office until the first day in October in the succeeding year. Should any manager vacate his office during the currency of any year, the council will appoint another in his stead, who shall continue in office so long only as the manager in whose stead he was appointed would have continued in office.

16. The managers shall elect a secretary from among themselves, who shall keep the common's account, issue licenses, receive and disburse moneys connected with the common, subject to the consent and approval of the other managers, and shall pay to the secretary of the shire the balance (if any) after defraying the working expenses of the common.

17. The secretary to furnish security to the amount of Fifty pounds.
