PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now reciting Act; Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby abolish the Town Common described under the designation of Broadmeadows, in a Proclamation bearing date the eighteenth day of February, 1861.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this sixteenth day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and in the twenty-ninth year of Her Majesty's reign.

THE SUBDIVISIONS OF THE SHIRE OF BALLAN.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the sixteenth day of October, 1865.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act 1863* it is amongst other things enacted that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board, for any original or proclaimed district thereafter sometimes called "single district," the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall within three months after the receipt of the same divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions, thereafter called subdivisions, by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district; and it is also enacted that every shire shall after the proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such proclamation, and save as aforesaid

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and save where therein otherwise expressly provided all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue and be of full force and effect with regard to such shire and be read accordingly: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the fourteenth day of November, 1864, the Shire of Ballan was constituted: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by not less than twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said shire, praying for the division of the said shire into subdivisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order divide the Shire of Ballan into three separate electoral subdivisions in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

EAST RIDING—Commencing on the River Werribee at the boundary of the Central Riding; thence by that boundary, and the northern and eastern boundaries of the shire, and the River Werribee to the commencing point.

CENTRAL RIDING—Commencing at the source of the River Moorabool; thence by the northern boundary of the shire to a point north of the most northerly of the three westernmost sources of the Korjammunip Creek; thence south to that source, and by that creek and the Werribee River to the eastern boundary of the shire; thence by that and the southern boundary of the shire and the eastern boundary of the West Riding to the commencing point.

WEST RIDING—Commencing at the source of the River Moorabool; thence by that river to the north-west angle of Yallock parish; thence by the northern boundary of said parish to the Geelong and Mount Alexander road; thence by said road to the southern boundary of the shire; thence by the southern, western, and northern boundaries of the shire to the commencing point.

And the Honorable James Forrester Sullivan shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

INFANTICIDE.

FIFTY POUNDS REWARD.—FREE PARDON TO AN ACCOMPLICE.

WHEREAS at eight o'clock in the morning of Friday, the 13th of October instant, the body of a fully developed Female Child (apparently about twenty-four hours old at the time of death, and about twenty-four hours dead when found), was found in the reserve of the Spencer street Railway Station, Melbourne, wrapped in brown paper and an old black alpaca apron: And whereas an inquest has been held on the said child, and a verdict has been returned equivalent to one of wilful murder against some person or persons unknown: Notice is hereby given that a Reward of Fifty pounds will be paid by the Government for such information as shall lead to the conviction of the person guilty of causing the death of the said child.

The Governor will also extend Her Majesty's Free Pardon to any person implicated in this offence (not being the person who actually murdered the child), who will give the required information.

BOUNDARIES OF THE OMEO A. AND OMEO B. RUNS.

IN pursuance of the provisions contained in the 118th section of *The Land Act 1862*, the arbitrators appointed thereunder to ascertain the common boundary between the Omeo A. Run (occupied by James Pendergast) and the Omeo or Omeo B. Run (occupied by William Degraves) have made an award, the substance of which is as follows, viz.:-

"That the future boundary as dividing the Omeo A. from the Omeo B. Runs, that is, the northern boundary of the Omeo B. Run and the southern boundary of the Omeo A. Run, shall commence from a point one hundred and twenty chains north from the present home station of the Omeo B. Run, but on the eastern side of the morass, thence by a straight line easterly to the top of a conical hill known as the 'Sugar Loaf,' thence by the Great Dividing Range.

"That the said James Pendergast and William Degraves shall bear and pay the whole of their individual expenses that they may have incurred in the above case, except the cost of surveying and marking upon the ground the boundaries as awarded above, which shall be paid equally by the said James Pendergast and William Degraves."

REGULATIONS FOR BOYS ON TRAINING SHIPS.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has approved of the subjoined Regulations for establishing a uniform system for Training Boys on board Naval Training Ships in Victoria.

The following Regulations, adapted from the Imperial Service, are to be observed as far as circumstances will admit. A few cases will probably arise from time to time in which they cannot be followed to the letter; such instances will be reported to the officer commanding the local force, for the information and, if necessary, decision of the Government.

REGULATIONS FOR THE ENTERING AND TRAINING OF BOYS FOR THE NAVAL SERVICE OF THE COLONY.

ENTRY OF BOYS.

Great care is to be taken in entering boys for the Naval Service; the regulations issued from time to time by the Government are to be strictly attended to, and the annexed plan of a register of entries is to be kept in all ships.

CLOTHING BOYS.

As soon as a boy has been entered he is to be sent to the barber, to have his hair cut and his head examined; he is then to have a warm bath, and be turned over to the gunner or boatswain in charge, who will supply him with a hammock, bag, olaws and lashing, a bed, blanket, and bed cover, which are to be legibly marked before being issued.

The paymaster will have in his charge the materials for clothing and necessaries, and a contractor, or person employed by authority, is to be employed to make them up. Each boy is to be supplied with the articles enumerated in the list as on this page.

In winter, in lieu of duck trousers, he is to be supplied with a comforter, two pair of woollen stockings, and an additional pair of serge trousers.

Boys on their first entry will be provided with their kits and other necessaries gratis.

As soon as the clothes are received, a ship's corporal, told off for the purpose, is to take them, to cause them to be marked and issued, and he is to see the boy place them in his bag. No further supply of clothes is to be given without the sanction of the commanding officer; the same rule is to apply to training brigs.

A uniform pattern of clothes is to be adopted for the boys; no alteration is to be made in this pattern after the clothes are supplied.

Articles of Clothing supplied gratis.

One cloth cap	Three drill frocks

One tailor will be allowed to every 200 boys. He is to be employed in repairing their blue trousers and frocks, and a proportion of boys are to be told off weekly in rotation for instruction under him, to learn to sew on buttons, to repair a seam, and to put a patch on, and they are to be supplied with needles and thread soon after they join.

One shoemaker for every 200 boys is also to be allowed, for the purpose of repairing shoes.

The barbers will have charge of the bath rooms, and will superintend the bathing, and teach boys those habits of cleanliness which are so essential to health.

GOOD CONDUCT BADGES, WITH PAY.

In order to stimulate the boys to diligence, assiduity, and good conduct, badges are, with pay, to be conferred on those who shall be recommended, in accordance with the following rules.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR GOOD CONDUCT BADGES, WITH PAY.

Any boy having served six months with general good conduct, cleanliness, and neatness, having made satisfactory progress in his drills and school studies, and having passed the following examination, will be entitled to wear a chevron of silver lace on his sleeve, and pay at the rate of 3d. per diem.

Having served another six months from the time of his receiving his first badge, and having made satisfactory progress, &c., he will be entitled to two chevrons of silver lace on his sleeve, and pay at the rate of 6d. per diem—the second badge not to be given before he has attained the highest numbers: half of these sums to be paid weekly to the boys, and the remainder credited to their individual accounts, and given them on leaving the ship with a good character: should they be discharged with disgrace, this sum will be forfeited.

SEAMANSHIP.

To know the names of the masts and yards, standing and some of the running rigging; to be able to pull in a boat; to have a perfect knowledge of the compass and lead-line; to be able to make all the bends and hitches, knots and splices, named in the instruction board; to have a knowledge of the different parts of a topsail, and to be able to pass an earring.

GUNNERY.

To know the first and second instructions, and to be out of the awkward squad of the rifle and sword drills.

SCHOOL.

To be able to read and write well, to write fairly from dictation, to know arithmetic as far as compound division, to have a general knowledge of the outlines of geography and history, and to have made satisfactory progress in religious knowledge.

ADVANTAGES.

Boys with good conduct badges, whose parents reside in the locality, may apply for leave to sleep on shore on Thursdays; they will be exempt from all punishment whilst wearing the badge (except for theft); they will enjoy all the privileges of a petty officer, and will never be employed as sweepers or bag-stowers; they are to have noted on their instruction certificate the number of badges that have been awarded to them for proficiency and exemplary conduct.

Boys that reside at a distance will have extra leave at Easter and Christmas.

These badges are to be competed for at the quarterly examinations, and are to be awarded by the captain.

Misconduct in aggravated cases will be punished by deprivation of the badge.

Note.—The lace will be furnished gratuitously to the recipients of the badge.

LEAVE.

Leave may be granted at least twice a week, that is, on Thursday and Saturday afternoons, and as follows:—

Boys whose parents reside in the locality may be allowed to go to the town once a week, and to return at 5 p.m.; but the other boys may be landed for a walk, or to amuse themselves, under the charge of an adequate number of instructors.

All boys under training are to have leave twice a year, if they desire it, and in the following proportion:—

Christmas, 2 weeks; Easter, 2 weeks.

This leave is not to be granted until the quarterly examinations are over, and those that have not made satisfactory progress may be detained on board for a period not exceeding four days after the rest, as a merited punishment for their indolence.

Note.—All boys returning from leave are to be medically examined, and have a bath.

MESSING.

Two boys are to be told off as captains to each mess; they are to wear a distinctive badge, and to be selected with great care; they should be boys of good character, and of good disposition; they are to be held responsible for the good order of their messes, and to portion out the food to each boy. At 11.30 one cook is to lay out the table with the mess-traps, &c., and one is to go to the coppers for the meat, &c., this to be divided, and a portion put into each plate by the captain of the mess, under the superintendence of the instructors and gunner; the boys are to be ranged outside of the stools and standing. When the dinner has been portioned out, it is to be inspected by a lieutenant or other officer; the senior boys of each mess are then to say grace; the boys are to take their places, and to dine with their caps off. If, on inspection, it is found that any boy has an undue proportion of bones, &c., the senior boy should be made to exchange dinners with the one that has an unfair share given to him; by this means this selfish practice will be easily corrected.

RECREATIONS AND AMUSEMENTS.

The main deck is to be well lighted every evening. A fiddler will be allowed to each training ship, to give those that desire it the opportunity of dancing.

After study hours the school-tables are to be open to the boys, and in the evening they are to be well lighted. It will be found that many boys will be delighted to avail themselves of this accommodation to write letters, to read books, and to amuse themselves with quiet games.

A fund should be formed to provide them with skittles, bats and balls, quoits, &c., for out-door amusements, and draughts, chessmen, dominoes, puzzles, &c., for winter recreation.

ARTICLES LOST BY NEGLIGENCE.

When small necessaries are lost by boys through negligence, they are to be replaced, and their value is to be deducted out of their pay, but in no case is the allowance of pay to be withheld for a longer period than one month.

BOY'S OUTFIT (SUPPLIED GRATIS).

Gunnery book.	One bed and cover.

A proper time and place is to be appointed for noting the requirements of the boys daily, which are to be ordered, if the state of their funds will admit of it, and at that time any boy is to be allowed to examine the state of his account, for which purpose a ledger is to be kept.

A source of funds is to be derived from savings. This fund is intended to provide extra vegetables, and flour for puddings occasionally; also thread for the tailor to repair their clothes, bristles and twine for the shoemakers to repair their shoes, blacking and shoe brushes for each mess, materials for keeping their mess-traps clean, shoe strings, braid for marking the frocks, and candlesticks for the messes. From this fund will be provided the requisites for the amusements, such as bats, balls, &c., for excursions; it is to be under the control of the commander.

POLICE.

The police are, in addition to the police duties, to have the care of the washing, bathing, and cleanliness of the boys, which will require constant supervision; they are to have charge of the clothing, which they are to mark before it is issued; they are to be attached to each division, to conduct the mustering of the clothes, and to make out not only the clothes lists, but also all demands for clothing, and to attend at all issues of it.

The sleeping deck of the boys is never to be left at night without a ship's corporal, and is to be well lighted. The police are to act as mates of decks, and to be responsible for the order, cleanliness, and regularity of the messes; they are to be selected with great care, and to be men of intelligence and good temper.

QUARTERLY EXAMINATIONS.

A system of quarterly examinations is to be established in every training ship, and the result noted in a book to be called "The Record of Progress Book."

First. The school examination is to be conducted by the chaplain and schoolmasters, and those boys that come out creditably are to be rewarded with some books as prizes.

Second. The seamanship examination is to be conducted by the senior lieutenant and boatswain, assisted by four petty officers. This examination is to embrace all the subjects noted in the different instructions in seamanship, and the result is to be noted in the rough progress book; great care is to be taken, especially to see that the boys have a proper knowledge of the compass and lead-line.

Third. The gunnery examinations are to be conducted by the gunner and his mates, and the results to be noted in the rough book, which, when complete, is to be given to the commander, who will also fill up the record of conduct, and at the same time award the good conduct badges to the deserving.

The examinations are to take place in the months of March, June, September, and December, and the results noted in the record book as follows:—

0. Nil.	3. Good.
1. Indifferent.	4. Very Good.
2. Fair.	

The highest number is not to be given until a boy has passed out for the instruction under which the figure is placed in the column of the record book. The progress in school is to be shown as follows:—

1. Fourth Class.	3. Second Class.
2. Third Class.	4. First Class.

This book is to be filled up in the presence of each boy, and the numbers he has obtained are to be read to him when noted; his conduct during the quarter is also to be inserted. The record book should also contain a notation of each boy's abilities, his address, &c., and, in fact, every particular relating to his entry or discharge, as also the period he was in the instruction brig. This will eventually prove of the greatest value as a book of reference, provided that it is properly kept up.

The boys that are sent to the training vessels for sea service are to be examined by the lieutenant commanding, the second master, boatswain, and quartermaster, and a report given on the 1st of every month to the captain of the ship, as per form.

The boys in those vessels are to come up to the ship to be examined quarterly, together with the boys in the ship, otherwise they are very liable to go back in some points, which will lead to some disappointment when they return to the ship.

INSTRUCTION IN SEAMANSHIP.

In order to teach the boys to work together with system and silence, they should cross top-gallant yards and loose sails whenever the weather will admit of it, and once a week a forenoon is to be devoted to general exercise, when they are to be taught to reef and furl, as also to make, shorten, and shift sails; the yards are to be braced round as in tacking and wearing, and the top-gallant masts are to be occasionally sent on deck. The boys are also to be exercised at stations, and to man the ropes.

A monkey-yard is to be fitted in the waist of every training ship, being supported on iron crutches, and the junior boys taught to lay out on the yard, to take in a reef, to pass an ear-ring, &c. They are to have explained to them the names and uses of every part the topsail; it will be found that by this means they will quickly gain confidence, and soon be fit to be stationed aloft with the others.

On joining the boys are to be divided into watches, and placed in four divisions for instruction. Where there are a large number they are to be subdivided into eight, to correspond with the subdivisions of the watch bill; and they are to be taught to work together by being stationed as far as practicable by the Admiralty watch bill.

The boys are to be taught the names of the masts and yards, standing and running rigging, knotting and splicing, the use of the palm and needle, the compass, the bow-lights, heaving the lead, bending and unbending sails, the management of boats, and all the various niceties of rigging; swimming, and such other matters as are necessary in a seaman's life.

For this purpose the boys are to be arranged in classes, and a system devised by which a boy will be gradually passed out of one class to a higher one, a register of which is to be kept by the instructors.

First Instruction.

The names of all the masts and yards, decks, &c., and drilling at the monkey topsail yard on the gangway; also learning to pull in a boat.

Second Instruction.

For this instruction a jackstay is to be stretched along and set up; at intervals of three feet pieces of rope one fathom long are to be spliced into it; each boy in the class will hold one of these in his hands, and wait the orders of the instructor, who is to give directions which knot or bend is to be made; and when it is finished, each boy will wait until the instructor comes round to examine the work, and to explain its uses.

Fourth Instruction.

To learn the names of all the running rigging and blocks, as also to rig models, to set up rigging, as also to use the palm and needle; each boy is to be able to sew a seam and to work an eyelet-hole well.

These should be varied with the gunnery instructions; no boys should be kept long at any instruction, otherwise they will get tired and weary, therefore the seamanship instructions are to be alternated with the gunnery classes; the hours for changing the instructions are to be 10.15 a.m. and 2.15 p.m.

Two boats are daily to be sent with the boys that are in the first instruction, to learn to pull; and on Wednesday afternoon and Thursday forenoon the watch not at school are to man all the boats, and to go away for the purpose of boat exercise, viz., undr sail, to practise getting up and down masts, making and shortening sail, tacking, wearing, reefing, steering by compass, attending sheets, haulyards, &c.

A small work called the "Seaman's Catechism," being a series of questions and answers in gunnery and rifle exercise, knotting, handling boats, &c., is published by Mr. Hearle, Fore street, Devonport; it is recommended that every boy shall be supplied with it; the price is one shilling, which can be met by the advance money. It was printed expressly for boys, and will be found to be very instrumental in forwarding their progress in seamanship and gunnery.

GUNNERY INSTRUCTION.

All the boys are to be instructed strictly in the system laid down by the officer commanding the local force, and to be divided into four instructions, so as to alternate with the seamanship divisions.

First Instruction.

Handspike drill, manning both sides, and the detail.

Second Instruction.

Pointing, sponging, loading, and the detail rifle drill.

Third Instruction.

Pointing, extreme training, dismounting, mounting, detail, &c., sword exercise.

Fourth Instruction.

Independent firing, quick and broadside firing, shift breechings, trucks, trigger lines, bow and quarter firing, secure a lower deck gun.

The boys are to be accustomed to use powder, and the guns are to be laid at a moving target (a boat), which is to be kept pulling about abreast of the ship.

When practicable, as many boys as are not attached to the school division should be landed on Friday afternoons, under arms for rifle drill and evolutions, as also to learn to march. If the boys are taught to play on the fife and drums, a band will be established, which will very materially conduce to their marching well.

SCHOOL INSTRUCTION.

No boy is ever to be called off from school, on any pretence whatever, except in the single case when the surgeon requires his presence on account of illness; the issue of clothing, and other things of this nature, which are now frequently made the excuse for bringing boys out of school, are to take place immediately that the afternoon's school has concluded.

The boys are to be divided into two classes for school purposes, viz., those who are able to pass an examination test, and those that cannot pass this test; the former to form the upper school division, and the latter the lower school division.

The lower school division is in all cases to attend school regularly four half-days of not less than 2½ hours' duration; the upper will be required to attend only two half-days.

The examinations which boys will be required to pass to reach the upper division are—

1st. Writing from dictation a paragraph from a book of general information, with no great fault of orthography, and in a readable hand, also a letter on some ordinary topic tolerably expressed.

2ndly. Reading with fluency and intelligence one or more paragraphs from a modern narrative, such as the ship's library will supply.

3rdly. Working accurately sums in the compound rules.

In teaching backward boys to read and write, not more than 12 or 15 are to be grouped together. The plan of throwing all the backward boys together in one class under a single teacher is most obstructive to progress.

At the quarterly examinations, if a boy has attained the following standard of education, he may have the option of leaving school altogether if he desire it; after passing this test, his attendance is to be entirely voluntary.

Examination for a Boy to pass out of School.

1st. To know the compound rules of arithmetic, and to work an easy sum in proportion and practice.

2nd. To be able to read an ordinary book of general information fluently.

3rd. To compose a decent letter, or to write from dictation a passage of moderate difficulty of not less than ten lines of print. A magic lantern, with a proportion of slides, will be supplied to each training ship, to illustrate lectures which may occasionally be given instead of evening school.

The boys are to be encouraged to subscribe to establish a reading-room, where, during the dinner hour and in the evening, newspapers, periodicals, and books may be read; the subscription is not to exceed twopence from each boy per month, which is to be liquidated from his advance, and for which are to be supplied periodicals, daily and weekly newspapers.

Religious instruction is to be considered the special department of the chaplain, to whom one of the half-day's attendance is to be given up, besides the afternoon's school on Sunday. All (except Roman Catholics) should be able to repeat the Creed, Commandments, and their duty to God and their neighbor, within two months after their entry.

It would be a great mistake to make the studies too long, as the boys would not only become weary, but such a system would engender a feeling of distaste, which would militate most seriously against advancement; the times of study are to be—

In summer, from 9.15 to 11.30 a.m.

" " 1 to 3.45 p.m.

In winter, from 9.30 to 11.30 a.m.

" " 1 to 3 p.m.

PUNISHMENTS.

It has been found by experience that where a good system has been established, and that where the boys have felt that the commanding officer has an interest in their welfare, that very little punishment has been needed, in fact, there will be an almost entire absence of it. Except in cases of very daring disobedience, a boy should not be punished for a first or second offence. If he is judiciously reasoned with, he will usually acknowledge his fault, and promise to avoid a recurrence of the offence; this promise he will usually strive to keep. Much judgment will be required in dealing with boys, and it will be highly necessary to study their individual disposition and temper, without which little can be done.

The punishment of flogging is never to be resorted to, except in cases of theft and highly immoral character. Whenever flogging is resorted to, a full statement of the offence is to be made to the officer commanding the local force.

Caning will rarely be required, but when administered it is to be done in the presence of all the boys; the delinquent is to be made to stand out, and his offence explained to all the boys; the publicity of the punishment deters many boys from offending, and removes the erroneous impressions as to the cause of punishment which might otherwise exist in the minds of the other boys. A board is to be hung up on the lower decks specifying all the punishments that have been ordered during the week, together with the offences committed.

Confinement in a cabin for a day on bread and water is generally adequate to meet most cases, and works well; also, sending the offender to bed at 6 p.m., in the orlops, under a sentry's charge; this irksome punishment, if properly carried out, will ensure good behavior.

Idle boys, that have not made sufficient progress, are to be separated from the others during the hours of recreation, and kept to their books, &c., until they have made reasonable progress, and they are not to be allowed the indulgence of leave.

Leave breaking is an evil of such magnitude, that it should never pass unnoticed; it should be met by stoppage of leave and of pocket money, and in the more aggravated cases by an entire stoppage of all indulgences and recreation, as also bread and water in a cabin.

The following punishments are authorised, and, if judiciously awarded, they will be sufficient to check all offences committed by boys:

1st. To have their meals between the guns, and to stand there during the hours of recreation, and to be sent to bed at 6 p.m., under a sentry's charge, in the orlops. This punishment is not to exceed seven days.

2nd. Boys of careless or inattentive habits, with reference to their clothes, hammock, or bag, to carry them on their shoulder, not to exceed one hour on the same day, and limited to three days.

3rd. Stoppage of leave, not to exceed one month.

4th. Stoppage of pocket money, not to exceed one month.

5th. Caning may be resorted to, in moderation, but not to exceed six stripes or blows.

6th. Confinement in a cell or cabin. This punishment is not to exceed seven days. In cases of aggravated misconduct, the delinquent may be put on a diet of bread and water from one to three days.

7th. Flogging. This punishment is never to be resorted to, except in cases of theft, or highly immoral character; to be limited to twenty-four lashes.

Boys of continued irregular habits and disorderly conduct, may be made to mess by themselves until they are reformed, and their messes are willing to take them back.

Boys whilst under punishment are not to be allowed leave of absence. These punishments are always to be awarded in conformity with the regulations laid down in the printed instructions; and a defaulter's book is to be kept, in which all punishments are to be recorded. This book is to be examined and signed by the captain of the ship once per week.

REGULATIONS FOR THE DISCHARGE OF BOYS.

A boy having completed one year's time, after passing out of his examinations, shall have his kit completed, after which he is to be returned as disposable for sea service.

When boys become disposable for sea service, a report of the same shall be made for the information of the Governor in Council; and at the expiration of one-half of the term of detention originally allotted to them, provided their character has been good, a license will be granted to masters of the mercantile marine making application for the said boys, under clause 23 of 27 Vict. No. 216.

Before a boy is discharged, his bedding and bed cover are to be washed, and his kit completed. When a draft of boys has been prepared, they are to be mustered with their traps before them; their certificates of conduct and ability are to be read aloud to them, as also their account from the ship's books, after which they are to be reported to the captain as ready for his inspection.

No boy is ever to be discharged without a clothes list being sent with him; this is to be attached to the usual papers that accompany him.

No. 1.—SYSTEM OF SCHOOL TRAINING.

The upper school division is to consist of two classes for instruction, and to be called the first and second classes; they are also to be subdivided into four parts, so as to regulate the attendance.

The qualifications of the classes are to be—
1st class.—Read and write well, and correctly from dictation; arithmetic, rule of three (simple and compound), fractions (vulgar and decimal), practice.

2nd class.—Read and write well, and freely from dictation; arithmetic, reduction to compound division.

The lower school division is also to consist of two classes for instruction, to be called the third and fourth classes; they are also to be arranged into two parts each, so as to regulate the attendance.

The qualifications of these classes are to be—
3rd class.—To read and write fairly; arithmetic, multiplication to reduction.

4th class.—To read and write a little; arithmetic, numeration to multiplication.

The first and second classes should always be taught geography and historical reading. Nothing should be attempted with the third and fourth classes beyond reading, writing, and arithmetic, except religious instruction and the compass.

These classes will attend school in the following order:—
One-fourth of the first and second classes will attend daily, so that each boy shall have weekly two half-days' instruction, of not less than two and a quarter hours' duration each.
The half of each of the third and fourth classes will attend daily, so that each boy shall receive four half-days' tuition, of not less than two and a quarter hours each in duration.

This routine will ensure two half-days' attendance to the upper division, and four half-days' to the lower division. By this system the boys of the lower school division will attend alternately mornings and afternoons four days a week. No deviation from this routine is to be permitted.

All boys in the first instructions are to go over the mast-head at the hours of changing drills. The instructors are always to attend with them whilst going aloft.

Every boy is to be medically examined by the surgeons once per month.

Deck cloths should be laid immediately after the decks have been scrubbed. The orlop decks should be painted.

Great pains are to be taken to see that the boys are properly clothed, and particularly that they wear woollen stockings and shoes in cold weather; and also that they have a comforter round their necks. From damp decks spring colds and chilblains, to prevent which the decks are always to be washed with hot water, and immediately dried up, and deck cloths laid.

In winter the boys are on no account to be roused out before 6.30 a.m.; and after the hammocks are stowed, they are to go to breakfast; after which the lower decks are to be cleaned with hot water, and they will dry whilst the boys are at drill.

Hammocks are to be scrubbed after breakfast on alternate Tuesdays, and triced up to dry in the early part of the forenoon.

REGULATIONS WHICH ARE TO BE HUNG UP BETWEEN
DECKS IN TRAINING SHIPS.

REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED, BY THE INSTRUCTORS AND
BOYS OF H.M.S.

1. Instructors are expected on all occasions to show an example of cheerfulness and willing obedience in executing their several duties. They are to abstain from using violent and abusive language, and to discourage all improper conduct in others.

2. The instructors in their several stations are expected to report all skulking characters, and to point out all those who, by activity and good conduct, deserve encouragement.

3. Nothing whatever is to be taken in at, or thrown out of, the ports, nor any clothes to be hung about the chains, head, rigging, or in the messes between decks.

4. When any duty is carrying on, the strictest silence is to be kept.

5. All complaints are to be made of the quarter deck to the commanding officer, in order that they may be communicated to me.

6. It is the duty of every boy to report all skulkers and lazy characters, in order that they may be made to do their share of the work.

7. It is the duty of every boy to detect a thief as a common enemy to all on board; and any boy screening or holding communication with a thief will be considered as equally bad in character, and will not be allowed to mess with the other boys. No article can ever be lost on board, therefore everything found is to be taken to the ship's corporal for its proper owner.

8. All quarrelling and fighting will be severely punished, and on no account are cards, dice, or gambling of any sort to be allowed, in any part of the ship.

9. If any boy should disobey the orders of his instructor, or captain of mess, he will be punished.

10. Selling or exchanging clothes and all trafficking is strictly forbidden, and will be punished by the forfeiture on both sides of the article so sold or exchanged, and further as may be deemed necessary.

11. The boys are to be mustered at divisions, according to the instructions to which they belong. The warrant officers in charge of the boys, assisted by their instructors, will be responsible for the progress they make in the instructions; they will take care never to allow them to appear otherwise than clean in their skin and orderly in their clothes.

12. All are expected to feel a proper pride in their ship, and to merit encouragement by showing activity, and a cheerful spirit in the performance of their several duties.

2. All orders for supplies under these contracts must issue from the Secretary of Railways, and all goods must be delivered free of charge to the Railway Stores, Williamstown, unless otherwise directed by the secretary.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service of the Victorian Railways, or by the purchase of articles manufactured in the penal establishments, or the manufacture of articles by the department.

4. The Government will not be bound to issue orders upon the contractors for all the articles enumerated in the schedules, but only for such articles, and such quantities of those articles as the Government may order from time to time; neither will the Government be bound to take from the contractors any larger supply of any of the articles than the orders which have been issued during the year, nor will they be bound to take any of the articles enumerated in the schedules for which orders have not been issued. IRON CASTINGS.

TENDERS will be received until Noon on Wednesday, the 1st day of November, 1865, from persons willing to furnish Iron Castings, in such quantities as may be required for the Government Railways, from 1st January until the 31st December, 1866.

The castings are required for locomotive engine work, carriage work, &c.

Whenever specially ordered, the castings shall be run from the very best "cold-blast iron," and of such particular brand, quality, and mixture as may be described in the order; or of such other substituted mixture as may be approved or directed by the Locomotive Superintendent, so as to produce a hard, close, soft, or other description of metal.

The castings are to be clean, sharp, free from surface scale, shell, cold shuts, blow holes, honeycomb, cinder, or any other imperfection, and are to be sound in every respect and thoroughly close in grain. When specially ordered, the castings are to be run with heads or runners of such weight as may be requested, and no extra charge shall be made or allowed for same; and the contractor will be required to remove the head or runner from the casting where possible, and charge the casting at the nett weight only, trimmed and cleaned. In cases where it is necessary to cut off the head in a lathe or machine, such head will be cut off by the Government, and returned to the Melbourne Station there to be delivered to the contractor free of cost of carriage.

Whenever ordered the castings are to be moulded in loam without a pattern, and loam price will be paid according to schedule, but no extra charge will be allowed for patterns, strickles, or loam boards. COAL.

SHIRE OF METCALFE.

BYE-LAW No. I.—FOR PROVIDING FOR THE DUE MANAGEMENT OF THE AFFAIRS OF THE COUNCIL, AND REGULATING THE CONDUCT OF THEIR OFFICERS AND SERVANTS.

BE it ordered by the Council of the Shire of Metcalfe as follows:—

1. The ordinary meetings of the council shall be held on the first Wednesday in every month, commencing at Ten o'clock a.m., or as soon after as a quorum shall be present. Should a quorum not be present within one hour, the meeting shall be adjourned, and an entry of the same made in the minute book; also noting the councillors present.
2. Special meetings of the council shall, on the requisition of three or more councillors, be convened by the president or secretary, the object of such meeting being stated in the requisition, and also in the circular convening the meeting.
3. The first business at all meetings of the council shall be the reading and confirmation of the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereon, except with regard to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. After confirmation the minutes shall be signed by the chairman of the meeting of which they are a record.
4. The following order of business shall be observed at all ordinary meetings, viz.:—
 - A. Reading and ordering upon correspondence.
 - B. Reading and considering petitions and memorials.
 - C. Reading and ordering on reports of committees and officers.
 - D. Orders of the day.
 - E. Motions of which notice has been given.
 - F. Examination of and passing accounts for payment.
 - G. Reading notices of motions for future meetings.
5. Any memorial or petition addressed to the council shall be presented by a councillor, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded; and no debate shall take place thereon except as to its being received, until notice of motion shall have been given in accordance with clause 7, or until its immediate consideration shall be resolved on by a majority of the whole council.
6. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of previous proceedings of the council, or business undisposed of at such meeting, and any unimportant business which the president or any councillor may bring forward.
7. No motion for the expenditure of a greater sum than £20, or for any important business, shall be introduced unless notice of such motion shall have been given to the secretary at previous meeting and read aloud. All such notices shall be numbered as they are received, and filed in the office for inspection, and their consideration shall be in their numerical order.
8. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be considered, unless the councillor giving the same (or one acting on his written authority in that behalf) be present when the business is called on. Notices not so proceeded with shall be struck off the notice paper.
9. No motion or amendment shall be entertained or discussed until it has been seconded; and one amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost any other may be moved before the original motion. The adoption of any amendment shall be held to have quashed the original motion, and for all purposes of subsequent discussion shall be acted upon as an original motion.
10. Every councillor, including the president, shall stand up while addressing the council.
11. The ruling of the president shall be final on all points of order or practice, and shall be given without argument or comment; he shall also decide who shall first be heard in cases where two or more councillors rise to speak at the same time.
12. Any councillor when speaking to a motion or amendment shall address the president, and shall not be interrupted except by a call to order, when the member calling to order shall be heard, and the point of order decided before the business shall be resumed or other matters brought forward.
13. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment: if the motion be carried the business undisposed of shall have precedence at the next ordinary meeting of the council; but if lost the subject previously under consideration, or the next in order, shall be discussed before a subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained.
14. No councillor shall be allowed to speak more than once on the same proposition, except the mover by way of explanation or reply, or the mover of an amendment last proposed. After the reply the amendment or motion, as the case may be, shall be put to the vote.
15. Any councillor who shall refuse to obey, when called to order, by the president, or shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, and who shall refuse to withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology when required to do so by the president, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5, to be recovered before any two or more justices of the peace.
16. Any councillor may, with the consent of the president, require the secretary to take down the particular words used by a councillor immediately, on the same being uttered.
17. The voting shall in all cases be by show of hands taken for and against the motion. Every motion or amendment, with the names of the mover and seconder, shall be entered on the minutes, and the votes shall be recorded if required by any councillor.
18. Any councillor may protest against any resolution of the council, by giving verbal notice of his intention to do so on the adoption of such motion, and entering his protest with the reasons for the same in a book to be kept for that purpose, and signing the same before the next meeting of the council; provided always that such protest may be expunged if decided by a

majority of the council to be at variance with truth and disrespectful to the council.

19. It shall be competent for any councillor, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any subject at the next or any subsequent meeting, and if such motion be carried, the secretary shall give notice thereof to each councillor seven clear days at least before the meeting for which such call is made.

20. No motion, the effect of which shall be to rescind a former resolution of the council, shall be entertained unless notice thereof be given at a preceding meeting, and a call of the council made for the purpose; and such previous resolution shall not be rescinded unless the motion for the rescinding thereof shall be carried by two-thirds of the councillors present.

21. It shall be competent for a majority of the whole council to suspend at any meeting one or more of the standing orders herein contained, except the purport of such suspension be the rescinding of any motion previously adopted by the council.

22. In committee meetings these standing orders shall also be observed.

23. The revenue raised in any locality, including licenses, rates, and Government grant on account of same, or from whatever source received, shall be as a general rule expended in that locality, except for the execution of necessary works for the benefit of the shire generally.

24. All contracts shall be let by tender, unless otherwise directed by the council. Tenders shall be addressed to the president, and endorsed "tender," and only opened at the time of their consideration by the council; they shall be on the printed forms and in accordance with the schedule given in the specifications.

25. When any tender shall be accepted by the council, the tenderer, or some person on his behalf, shall immediately pay to the secretary a deposit at the rate of five per cent. on the amount of his tender, which amount shall be refunded when the contractor obtains his final payment after the completion of the contract. Should the successful tenderer not be prepared with such deposit, the council shall at once re-consider the tenders for such contract.

26. In all cases where contracts shall be entered into, an agreement shall be drawn up between the council and the contractor for the execution of such works, and shall be signed by two members on behalf of the council, and the shire seal attached, and also signed by the contractor. Any officer or servant of the council, who shall wilfully, by any act of omission or commission of any matter or thing appertaining to his duties, cause the council to sustain any loss or damage, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5, recoverable before any two or more justices of the peace.

35. No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall be made until 14 days' notice shall be given in some local newspaper, inviting applications for the same, nor unless the salary or allowance attaching to such office shall be fixed by the council before proceeding to such election.
