NOTICE TO OFFICERS IN THE CIVIL SERVICE, AND ELECTORAL REGISTRARS, AND OTHERS IN THE EMPLOYMENT OF THE GOVERNMENT.

THE subjoined Instruction and copy of a Resolution of the Legislative Assembly (originally published in 1859) are re-published for the information of all Officers in the Civil Service, and of Electoral Registrars, and others in the employment of the Government:—

“Such officers are hereby accordingly instructed to refrain from taking any part in Elections for Members of Parliament beyond the recording of such vote or votes as by law they may be entitled to; and they are also informed that dismissal from the Civil Service will be the penalty for disobedience to this Order.”

“That an instruction be sent by the Government to each Government employé in the Civil Service under the control of the Ministry, requiring him to refrain from taking any part in Elections for Members of Parliament beyond the recording of such vote or votes as he may be by law entitled to; and that dismissal from the Civil Service will be the penalty of disobedience to the Order.”

ALLOWANCES TO WITNESSES.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twenty-seventh day of November, 1865.

WHEREAS by an Order of the Governor in Council, bearing date the twenty-second day of October, One thousand eight hundred and sixty, certain rates of allowances to be made to witnesses and interpreters summoned to attend at the Supreme and Circuit Courts, Courts of General Sessions, and Petty Sessions, at Inquests, and Magisterial Inquiries, were prescribed: And whereas it is expedient to rescind the said Order and make another in lieu thereof: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that on and after the first day of January next the said first-mentioned Order shall be rescinded, and that on and after that day the allowances to be made to witnesses and interpreters required to attend at any of the courts aforesaid shall be as follows: Provided that witnesses at Petty Sessions, Inquests, and Magisterial Inquiries, other than professional witnesses, or experts, police officers and interpreters, shall only be paid such allowances when summoned from a distance beyond twenty miles:—

FOR TRAVELLING.

1. To every witness or interpreter, not being a police sergeant, constable, or prisoner of the Crown, the sum actually paid, but not exceeding One shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) for every mile he may reside from the court at which he is required to attend.
2. To every witness, being a police sergeant or constable, and not using a Government horse or vehicle in going to or returning from the court at which he is required to attend, the sum actually paid, but not exceeding One shilling (1s.) for every mile he may reside from such court.

3. To every witness, being a police sergeant or constable, and using a Government horse or vehicle in going to or returning from the court at which he is required to attend, the sum actually and properly paid for forage.

4. To every witness, being a prisoner of the Crown, a ration of provisions in kind, but no money allowance.

5. To every witness and interpreter who may travel by ship, coach, or railway, the sum actually and properly paid for fares, both in going to and returning from the court at which he may be required to attend.

No allowance will be made to any witness or interpreter residing within three miles of the court which he may be required to attend.

In all cases, where practicable, witnesses and interpreters must travel by ship, coach, or railway, and in such part of the vessel, vehicle, or train as may be suitable to their station in life.

Any witness or interpreter paid ship, coach, or railway fares under the fifth clause will not be entitled to any allowance under any of the preceding clauses for the distance which he may travel by ship, coach, or railway.

To every witness or interpreter who may be necessarily detained, or who may be prevented from proceeding on his journey, or to his place of abode either before or after attending the court, the same allowance from the date of detention up to the day of attending the court or of departure as paid to witnesses residing beyond twenty miles from the court and mentioned in the 3rd column.

NOTE.—No allowance will be paid to aboriginal natives, but every protector, constable, or other person having charge of any such native will receive the expenses (not exceeding the above allowances) actually and necessarily incurred, for an aboriginal native, in taking him to and from, and keeping him in attendance at the court.

The abstract of payments to witnesses and interpreters must be certified at the Supreme and Circuit Courts by the Crown Solicitor; at Courts of General Sessions, by the Clerk of the Peace, countersigned by the Crown Prosecutor as inspected and approved; at Courts of Petty Sessions, by the Police Magistrate or Chairman of the Bench; at Inquests, by the Coroner; and at Magisterial Inquiries, by the Magistrate.

And the Honorable George Higinbotham, Her Majesty's Attorney General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1862* it is amongst other things enacted that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles

of any town not contained in any municipal district, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common respectively, as the case may be: And whereas by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted that when any Crown land remains unsold within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land a farmers' common: when one-eighth part of any agricultural area has been selected under the *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim any unselected and unleased portion of such agricultural area, not exceeding twice the quantity so selected and leased, to be a temporary common for the use of such selectors and lessees; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now reciting Act: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim, increase, or diminish (as the case may be) the Commons hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, that is to say:—

CARAMUT TOWN COMMON.—The unappropriated Crown Lands within the township of Caramut, comprising an area of 530 acres, more or less, shall be a Town Common for the use of all householders of the said township.—(65.L.13708.)

EDGEcombe FARMERS' COMMON. described in a Proclamation bearing date 4th March, 1861, is hereby diminished by deducting therefrom 640 acres, more or less, being the portion thereof lying within the borough of Taradale and described as follows, viz.:—Commencing at the north-west angle of portion 53 in the parish of Edgecombe; bounded thence by that allotment and by allotment 54, bearing south to the south-west angle of the last named allotment, being a point on the south boundary of the borough of Taradale; thence by the said boundary of that borough bearing west to the south-west angle thereof; thence by the west boundary thereof bearing north to a point on the south boundary of the Taradale Gold Field Common; and thence by the said boundary of that common and a road bearing east to the point of commencement.—(63.G.6087.)

KIRKELLA TEMPORARY COMMON.—The allotments hereinafter enumerated, comprising an area of 4640 acres 1 rood 29 perches, shall be a temporary common, for the use of selectors in the agricultural area of Kirkella, viz.:—Parish of Kirkella, allotments 133, 134, 135, 136, 137, 138, 139, 140, 141, 142, 163, 164, 165, 166, M and N.—(65.L.11754.)

TARADALE BOROUGH COMMON.—The Borough Common of Taradale, described in a Proclamation bearing date 27th October, 1862, is hereby increased by adding thereto the land hereinafter described, and containing 640 acres, more or less: Commencing at the north-west angle of portion 53 in the parish Edgecombe, bounded thence by that allotment and by allotment 54, bearing south to the south-west angle of the last named allotment being a point on the south boundary of the borough of Taradale; thence by the said boundary of that borough bearing west to the south-west angle thereof; thence by the west boundary thereof bearing north to a point on the south boundary of the Taradale Gold Field Common; and thence by the said boundary of that common and a road bearing east to the point of commencement. (65.L.12558.)

TEESDALE TOWN COMMON.—The unappropriated Crown Lands within the township of Teesdale, comprising an area of 730 acres, more or less, shall be a Town Common for the use of all householders of the said township.—(65.K.13163.)

PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by *The Police Offences Statute 1865* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, proclaim any part of Victoria to be a Police District: Now therefore I do hereby, with the advice of the Executive Council, proclaim the undermentioned parts of Victoria to be Police Districts:—

Police District of Ararat.—That part of Victoria including Ararat, Beaufort, Buanga, Crowlands, Green Hills, Mount Cole, Moyston, Skipton, Streatham, and Wickliffe.

Police District of Avoca.—That part of Victoria including Avoca, Bealiba, Glenlogie, Lexton, Moonambel, Redbank, and St. Arnaud.

Police District of Ballarat.—That part of Victoria including Ballarat East, Ballarat West, Bald Hills, Black Hill, Bullarook, Buninyong, Burrumbeet, Carngham, Clunes, Coghill's Creek, Creswick, Durham Lead, Gordon's, Italian Gully, Junction, Kingston, Learmonth, Linton, Minersrest, Pitfield, Scarsdale, Sebastopol, Smeaton, Smythesdale, Soldier's Hill, Springdallah, Springs, and Warrenheip.

Police District of Belfast.—That part of Victoria including Belfast, Camperdown, Caramut, Cavendish, Dunkeld, Hamilton, Hexham, Mortlake, Penshurst, Terang, Warrnambool, and Woodford.

Police District of Benalla.—That part of Victoria including Benalla, Euroa, Gaffney's Creek, Jamieson's, Jericho, Mansfield, Matlock, Mulwalla, Shepparton, Violettown, Wangaratta, and Wood's Point.

Police District of Bourke.—That part of Victoria including Anderson's Creek, Brighton, Broadmeadows, Brunswick, Campbellfield, Cranbourne, Dandenong, Dromana, Eltham, Epping, Flemington, Hawthorn, Heidelberg, Kellor, Kew, Malvern, Melton, Moonsee Ponds, Mornington, Northcote, Nunawading, Oakleigh, Pentridge, Point Nepean, Preston, Queestown, Sunbury, Warburton, and Whittlesea.

Police District of Carisbrook.—That part of Victoria including Carisbrook, Amherst, Burnt Creek, Dunolly, Eddington, Goldborough, Inglewood, Kingower, Majorca, Maryborough, Newbridge, Talbot, Tarnagulla, and Wedderburne.

Police District of Castlemaine.—That part of Victoria including Castlemaine, Blanket Flat, Campbell's Creek, Castle-mains Municipality, Daylesford, Elphinstone, Forest Creek, Fryerstown, Glenlyon, Guildford, Maldon, Newstead, Old Race-course, Taradale, Vaughan, and Yandoit.

Police District of Geelong.—That part of Victoria including Geelong, Batesford, Colac, Drysdale, Dungee, Inverleigh, Kildare, Lethbridge, Little River, Meredith, Newtown, Queenscliff, Rokewood, Shelford, South Barwon, Steiglitz, Winchelsea, and Wyndham.

Police District of Gipps Land.—That part of Victoria including Sale, Alberton, Bairnsdale, Bald Hills, Bruthen, Edward's Reef, Livingstone Creek, Mount Pleasant, Palmerston, Rosedale, Stradbroke, Stratford, Stringer's Creek, Tarraville, Traralgon, and Warrangarra.

Police District of Kilmore.—That part of Victoria including Kilmore, Avenel, Broadford, Donnybrook, Longwood, Pyalong, Seymour, Tallarook, and Yea.

Police District of Kyneton.—That part of Victoria including Kyneton, Bacchus Marsh, Ballan, Blackwood, Blue Mountain, Gisborne, Lancefield, Malmesbury, Middle Gully, Myrning, Romsey, Tylden, and Woodend.

Police District of Melbourne.—That part of Victoria including Melbourne, East Collingwood, Emerald Hill, Fitz Roy, Footscray, Hotham, Frahan, Richmond, St. Kilda, Sandridge, Toorak, and Williamstown.

Police District of Moor.—That part of Victoria including Heathcote, Eohuca, Murchison, Redcastle, Rochester, Runnymede, Rushworth, and Wairo.

Police District of Ovens.—That part of Victoria including Beechworth, Belvoir, Buckland, Chiltern, Morse's Creek, Rutherglen, Snowy Creek, Stanley, Tarraville, Wahgunyah, Woolshed, and Yackandandah.

Police District of Portland.—That part of Victoria including Portland, Balmoral, Branxholme, Casterton, Coleraine, Dartmoor, Digby, Harrow, and Heywood.

Police District of Sandhurst.—That part of Victoria including Sandhurst, Axedale, Back Creek, Bullock Creek, Durham Ox, Eaglehawk, Elysian Flat, Epsom, Golden Square, Huntley, Lockwood, Lour Gully, Myers' Flat, Raywood, Robinson Crusoe, Sandhurst Municipality, Serpentine Creek, Strathfieldsaye, and White Hills.

Police District of Swan Hill.—That part of Victoria including Swan Hill, Cowana, Kerang, Kulkyne, and Narung.

Police District of Wimmera.—That part of Victoria including Stawell, Darling Flat, Dimboola, Glenorchy, Great Western, Horsham, Landsborough, Navarre, and Quartz Reef.

BEECHWORTH MINING DISTRICT BYE-LAWS.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE GOLD FIELDS COMMON, IN THE MINING DISTRICT OF BEECHWORTH.

At a meeting of the Mining Board of the Mining district of Beechworth, begun and holden at Beechworth in the said district, on 6th day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

1. Licenses to depasture stock shall be granted under the hands of the managers, and no person shall depasture stock on any gold fields common until the fees for such stock shall have been paid, and the stock branded by the herdsman with the common brand. All unbranded stock shall be dealt with as illegally depasturing.
2. No entire horse or boar shall be allowed to run upon any common; and no bull except by the special permission of the managers.
3. No animal supposed to be laboring under any contagious or infectious disease shall be allowed to depasture on any common.
4. No person shall be allowed to depasture any cattle on any common unless such cattle be *bond fide* his or her own property.
5. The following shall be the scale of fees for depasturing cattle on any of the gold fields commons in the district of Beechworth, and shall be paid half-yearly in advance, viz.:—
Horses, mules, asses, and foals, 6s. per head per annum.
Bullocks, cows, heifers, steers, calves, 3s. per head up to 20 head; and for all in excess of 20 head, 4s. per head per annum.
Sheep and goats, 8d. per head per annum.
Swine (over 6 months old) 2s. per head per annum.
Calves and foals under 9 months old, whose dams are paid for on the common, shall be allowed to run free. All calves and foals otherwise depasturing shall be charged for.
6. Special licenses may be issued to butchers and others engaged in slaughtering, on the following terms:—
Horned cattle, 3d. per head per week.
Sheep 1d. ditto, ditto.
Swine, 1d. ditto, ditto.
7. Special licenses may be issued to dairymen to depasture cattle for dairy purposes only on the following terms, viz.:—
Not exceeding 20 head, 3s. per head per annum, above that number, 4s. per head per annum.
8. The managers shall keep proper books of account, and shall receive no fees until the stock be branded with the common brand. Receipts shall be given for all fees on printed forms consecutively numbered, duplicates of which shall be kept for inspection by the auditors.

The mortality in October, 1865, was greater than that in the same month of any year since 1860. It was also in excess of the mortality in September, but was not so great as that in either August or July.

Males contributed 56 per cent., females 44 per cent. to the total mortality. Persons under and over five contributed 52 and 48 per cent. respectively. In October, 1864, 41 per cent. of the deaths were of children under five, 37 per cent. in October, 1863, 40 per cent. in October, 1862, 51 per cent. in October, 1861, and 62 per cent. in October, 1860.

The returns show 14 deaths as having occurred on the 9th, 13 on the 13th and 25th, and 12 on the 30th. These were the days of highest mortality. Those of the lowest were the 3rd, 11th, and 20th, for each of which only 4 deaths were noted.

Five persons of 75 years old and upwards died during the month, viz.:—A male aged 79 of bronchitis, a male aged 80 of heart disease, and a male aged 90 of brain disease. A female aged 75 cut her throat, and a female aged 76 died of gastritis.

The deaths from external causes numbered 22, of which 14 are believed to have been accidental, 6 to have been suicidal, and 2 to have been homicidal. The following are the particulars:—A female aged 3 and another aged 40 were drowned; a child aged 4 and a male aged 40, the latter described as the manager of an hotel, died of burns; an infant aged 9 months and a female child aged 4 years of scalds; two infants aged respectively 8 weeks and 2 months were suffocated by being overlain; an engineer aged 23 was suffocated by choke-damp; a girl aged 15 died of sunstroke; a dairyman aged 67 was killed by a kick from a horse; a clerk aged 26 was killed by being accidentally run over; a seaman aged 37 was killed by an accidental fall; a gardener aged 20 accidentally shot him-self; a female aged 27 committed suicide by hanging; a male aged 32, a male aged 53, and a female aged 75, committed suicide by cutting their throats; a female aged 31 committed suicide by drowning; an infant only a day old was murdered by suffocation; and another was murdered on the day of his birth by fracturing the skull.

The deaths in public institutions numbered 46, or nearly 18 per cent. of the whole mortality, viz.:—24 in the Melbourne Hospital, 2 in the Benevolent Asylum, 6 in the Yarra Bend Asylum, 1 in the Immigrants' Home, 2 in the Lying-in Hospital, 7 in the Industrial Schools, and 4 in the Melbourne Gaol.

Of the 122 persons whose deaths occurred at a more advanced age than five years, 77, or nearly 63 per cent., were males, and 45, or about 37 per cent., were females; 8 were between five and ten years, 3 were between ten and fifteen, 5 were between fifteen and twenty, 13 were between twenty and twenty-five, 10 were between twenty-five and thirty, 15 were between thirty and thirty-five, 13 were between thirty-five and forty, 14 were between forty and forty-five, 14 were between forty-five and fifty, 11 were between fifty and fifty-five, 4 were between fifty-five and sixty, 2 were between sixty and sixty-five, 4 were between sixty-five and seventy, 1 was between seventy and seventy-five, 3 were between seventy-five and eighty, 2 were eighty and upwards.

Sickness chiefly from diphtheria is on the increase in Richmond, and whooping-cough is very prevalent at Sandridge and Emerald Hill.

2. The flour and bread must be the produce of prime wheat from which twenty per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste for second quality, and twelve per cent. for third quality of bread.

3. Fresh meat is to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and, when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than five inches, must have been cut off.

4. The supplies coming under the head of rations and medical comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto, on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of department, either for delivery at the Stores and Transport Office, or at the office of the department concerned, as may be stated in the order.

5. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order, they will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account.

6. The order issued by the head of department must accompany the goods, and the account is to be rendered simultaneously with delivery of the supplies. In other cases the account is to be rendered monthly.

7. 9. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the person to whom the rations are due, or to the contractor, in waiting for a board of survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 5.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivery or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report of the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the Government may direct; it will also be in the power of the Government to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. It will be competent for the Inspector of Stores on behalf of the Government, or the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of three full calendar months; it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of the month.

MEDICINES, CHEMICALS, ETC.
